U. S. Gloom Isn't Warranted

A national public opinion poll came up the other day with some rather astounding statistics. It found that 30 per cent of the American people thought the Russians were winning the Cold War, while only nine per cent believed this country had the edge.

The rest either felt neither side was winning, had no opinion, or didn't know what was meant by "cold war." But if this is an accurate index of U. S. mood today, it is at sharp variance with the facts as seen by many of our

most able leaders and seasoned experts. Indeed, some of those officials are pretty upset over what they consider the foolish defeatism they find on every hand. One such is Robert A. Lovett, undersecretary of Defense, who can't understand why a nation of such unmatched power should at the peak of its strength be acting


