

Uncertainty Makes For War

It is time for the United States and the West to make up their minds more clearly about what they will do to defend Yugoslavia, Greece, Turkey and Iran from Com-

The loss to the Reds of any of these nations would endanger the military position of all the others, since it would open them to flanking maneuvers. More than that, such a loss would imperil Western Europe for the same

There is no dispute among military men on these points. The only question is: What shall we do about it?

For weeks and months efforts have been under way to weave Greece and Turkey into the West's defensive system in some fashion. Some men have urged creation of a Mediterranean pact to supplement the Atlantic Pact. Others believe the two countries should be woven into the latter treaty.

The Turks themselves are said to favor being made a signatory to the Atlantic Pact. They fall back on the fundamental military fact that the defense of Western Europe and the Near East cannot be fairly separated.

The British oppose this on the ground that widening the Atlantic Pact means widening the "area of conflict." 

Highest Court Rules States Can't Ban Strikes In Utilities

WASHINGTON -(P)- The Supreme Court has ruled that states cannot ban strikes in vital public utilities, even in emergency. The lecision, affecting only a Wisconsin act, threw a cloud over similar aws in other states

By a 6-3 vote, the high court Monday knocked out a Wisconsin law prohibiting utility strikes which interrupt essential public services. The court said Congress has taken over legislation in the field and that the states may not interfere.

Law officials in Massachusetts and New Jersey indicated a belief the court's decision does not necessarily mean their laws banning utility strikes are invalid. In other states, officials withheld comment

Vinson said these "supreme" federal laws apply to local utilities operating within a single state, because these utilities affect interstate commerce. Thus, said Vinson, the law does not permit state regulation in "the field of peaceful

strikes" in utilities. A dissenting opinion by Justice Frankfurter argued that the federal laws regulate only national strike emergencies, leaving control nurely local emergencies to the states. He was joined by Justices Burton and Minton.

And all rights, contended Frankfurter, must bow to public welfare.
