

WASHINGTON-A red hot report on the problems of U.S. migratory farm labor is being filed at the White House early in March. The report will contain strong recommendations for correcting some of the worst abuses. in temporary, seasonal domestic employment by the big factory" farms.







Examination of their lives only too often reveals an instability of character as the cause of their wasted talent.

BROWNWOOD -(AP)- Work toward producing Texas' first sub-stantial crop of castor beans is underway.

The beans will be grown on about

15,400 acres of a 10-county area in a project sponsored by the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Oil from the castor beans is needed for hydraulic systems and as a high viscosity lubricant in aircraft.

About 70 county agricultural agents and administrative agents meet here Tuesday with Agricul-Department specialists to learn the latest research information on castor bean production. The information will be passed on to

Dr. D. L. Van Horn of Stillwater, Okla., USDA agronomist in charge of castor bean research. Wednesday began looking for a site for a hulling plant in the Brownwood area to process this year's crop.

The Agricultural Department has approved a proposed procurement contract that would guarantee growers 10 cents a pound. The current market price is about 12 cents. Growers would have the option of selling to the government or on the
