No formation water was made on either of the above drillstem tests. The discovery topped the Ellenurger at 12,042 feet, elevation 2,781 feet. That makes it 1.791 feet high to a dry hole located two and onehalf miles to the northwest.

Drillsite is 660 feet from south and 1.980 feet from east lines of section 129, block D, CCSD&RGNG survey. That makes it 18 miles northwest of Rankin and 20 miles northeast of McCamey. It is also 121/2 miles south of



Watchdog Committee

The Johnson Senate Preparedness Committee is proving itself a fit successor to the famous Truman Committee which investigated the war effort in World War II.

Its recent report assailing Air Force management at Lackland Air Base, near San Antonio, is a hard-hitting document but an eminently fair one. It shows the committee's ability to move into a confused situation and come up with facts, not wild charges or hysteria.

The best evidence that the committee investigators did a good job is perhaps the fact that the Air Force did not bound back with claims that the senators had overshot the mark. Air Force spokesmen in effect acknowledged the merit of the criticisms, and promised the bad practices would not be allowed to recur.

When Johnson's committee stepped in, rumors were afloat that Lackland was guilty of such overcrowding that suicides, deaths from pneumonia, poor food and medical care and other sub-standard conditions were the rule.

The chairman, Senator Lyndon Johnson of Texas, sent four investigators to the scene. They didn't content themselves with talking to top officials and touring the base. They put on Air Force uniforms and lived among the recruits.

They found the tales of sub-standard health conditions almost completely unfounded. Only two deaths had occurred in 18 months: Food and medical care were good.

But the overcrowding proved no myth. At a base, designed for 20,000 men, they found upwards of 68,000. tion. The really grim result of this was not bad health but a virtually complete breakdown of basic Air Force training. They judged the manpower waste to be tremendous.

For this they blamed the Air Force's "greedy" policy of trying to get its hands on more men than it could possibly train with existing base facilities. The committee two sections of the saw it as a bald effort to heard manpower.

* THE DOCTOR SAYS

Of all kinds of cancer, that which

develops on the skin or the exposed mucous membrances is the easiest to catch early and treat promptly. Everyone knows that cancer gen erally can be cured at the beginning and therefore neglect of skin cancer is particularly unfortunate.

Yet it still happens all too often. There are several things to look for. If you have a sore on the skin or perhaps around the lips or eyes which does not heal as quickly as you think it ought to, don't just

forget about it. If your skin has a lump or ulcer give yourself a break and let the doctor look at it. Some of these sores or lumps will be cancer and they are easy to get rid of while they are small and may be so hard after they have grown a while

that there is no sense in taking a Besides the cancers of the skin there are some skin conditions which may lead eventually to cancer and therefore should be watched even if not treated so that they car

be attacked at the first sign of dif-The most important of these are the scaly, brown or black patches which are quite common in elderly people and are usually located on the parts of the skin most exposed to the sun and air. These patches have the name of keratoses

ing since a little common sense about taking precautions can save a lot of grief. The patches of keratosis (when necess sary) can be cut out or treated by X-rays or the electric needle, the choice of method depending on size, location, and most of all the judgment of the doctor. The actual skin cancers, too, can

be treated by surgery, X-ray, or radium or combinations of these. If the patient has not been careless about letting some warning sign run on too long the results are almost always excellent

SWEET-SOUR PORK-With pork on the market in good supply, now's the time to serve it in a variety of interesting ways. Economical pork shoulder is used in this good tasting sweet-sour pork dish. To prepare: Cut one pound lean pork shoulder into onehalf-inch cubes and brown in a little hot fat. Sprinkle well with salt and pepper, and one cup buillon and cook slowly, covered, for 20 minutes. Add two medium green peppers cut into one-inch pieces, three tablespoons chopped onion and four slices pineapple cut into eighths. Cook another 10 minutes. Mix three tablespoons cornstarch with one-fourth cup sugar, one-fourth cup vinegar, two teaspoons soy sauce and one-half cup sirup from canned pineapple. Add to pork mixture. Stir constantly until thickened, cook five minutes longer and add salt and pepper to taste. Serve in individual rice rings or nests of boiled rice.





This gave a year's net gain in the state's crude reserve position of some 72 million barrels for a total of 13.6 billion barrels. In crude oil reserves, Texas provided 12 per cent of the national gain. The rising importance of liquids obtained from natural gas is reflected in the figures which show that Texas has 2.5 billion barrels of natural gas liquids in reserve This is 58 per cent of the national reserves in this category. Texas proided 65 per cent of the national gain in natural gas liquid reserves. Growing reserves of natural gas in Texas hit the 102.4 trillion cubic feet mark as of Jan. 1, 1951. Texas has 55 per cent of the natural gas reserves in the nation. Of the country's total 1950 gains in natural gas reserves, Texas accounted for 63 per cent. All figures are on reserves whose locations and extent have been proved and measured. 


