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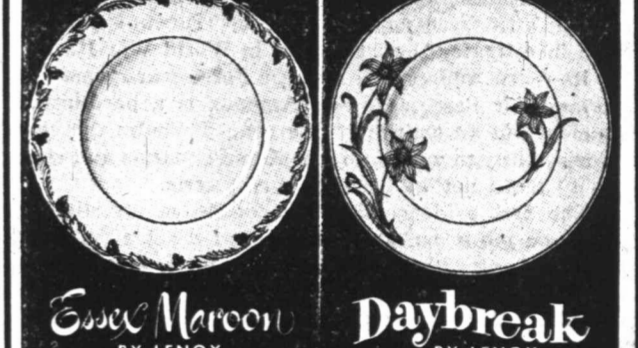
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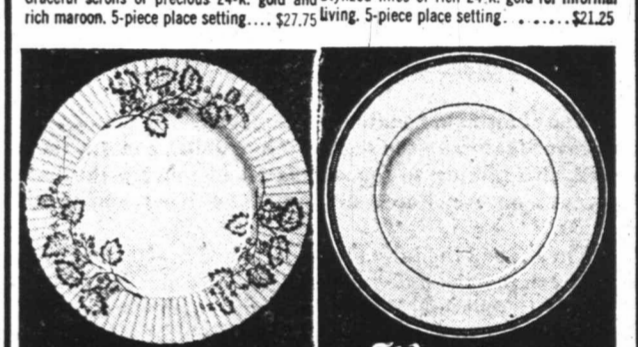

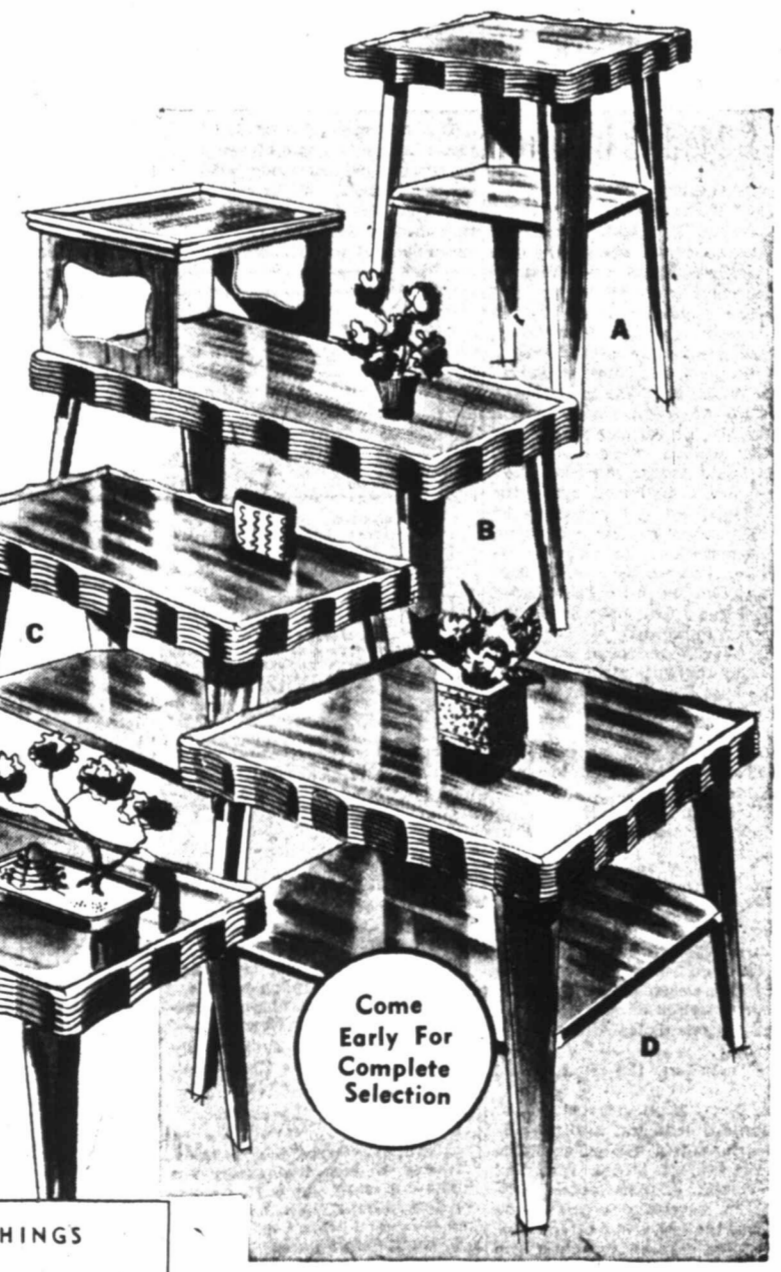

Operation Of Dial Phones Explained At Rotary Club Meet

Midland's new dial telephone system, which will be in operation the latter part of June, was described in detail by four representatives of the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company at the regular meeting of the Rotary Club Thursday noon in Hotel Scharbauer.

Jim Monk, district manager of the telephone company, who was in charge of the program, reviewed briefly the firm's \$2,000,000 dial system-expansion program in Midland. The new made-to-order system, the most modern anywhere, will be cut into service at midnight, some night in June, he said. The dial equipment now being installed in the company's new two-story building, which was erected at a cost in excess of \$500,000.

New Numbers
The dial changeover, new five-digit numbers, service for additional customers, and a new directory were discussed by Al Case, Midland manager. He said new numbers will be announced early in May and new directories will be delivered in advance of the changeover. He said the 1,800 persons now on the waiting list will receive telephone service when the new system goes into operation.

Thailand Has Plans For Home Guard
BANGKOK.—(AP)—Thailand has decided to organize a home guard to aid in defense of the country for the first time in her history.

Units of the home guard, which will be trained in air raid precautions, police work, guarding, supplying the military and anti-sabotage work, will be set up initially in eight provinces considered strategic.

Dunham Bares Plan To Make Him 'Fall Guy' In RFC Probe

WASHINGTON.—(AP)—RPC Director Walter L. Dunham was quoted Thursday as saying a fellow board member urged him to resign and "become the fall guy" in a Senate investigation of political influence in the RFC.

Senator Fulbright (D-Ark.) told reporters Dunham named Director C. Edward Rowe as the man who made the proposal. Fulbright heads a Senate Banking subcommittee which has been receiving testimony from Dunham behind closed doors.

Another subcommittee member, Senator Capehart (R-Ind.), said Dunham used the words "become the fall guy" in describing the incident. He said Dunham filed documents with the subcommittee to back his story. Fulbright said Dunham made a trip to Florida recently and, before leaving, dictated a letter of resignation but did not file it.

Gives Data To Probers
Fulbright continued: "Dunham said Rowe called him in Florida and told him this whole thing could be solved if he would file some memoranda, along with his resignation. The memoranda was dictated by Rowe."

Dunham, Fulbright said, handed the memos to the subcommittee and "the gist of it was that Dunham was to take all the blame." Capehart said Rowe will be asked about it later. Rowe is scheduled to be one of the windup witnesses in the subcommittee's investigation of alleged favoritism and influence in the making of huge government loans. No date has been set definitely for his appearance.

It was the second successive closed door sessions the senators have had with Dunham, 68-year-old former Michigan banker. He told them Wednesday he believes a group of men close to the White House had tried to "use" him, but declared he had never permitted anyone to influence him in RFC matters.

THE DOCTOR SAYS

Use Common Sense Caution
To Cure Cancer Of Skin Early

Of all kinds of cancer, that which develops on the skin or the exposed mucous membranes is the easiest to catch early and treat promptly. Everyone knows that cancer generally can be cured at the beginning and therefore neglect of skin cancer is particularly unfortunate. Yet it still happens all too often.

There are several things to look for. If you have a sore on the skin or perhaps around the lips or eyes which does not heal as quickly as you think it ought to, don't just forget about it. If your skin has a lump or ulcer give yourself a break and let the doctor look at it. Some of these sores or lumps will be cancer and they are easy to get rid of while they are small and may be so hard after they have grown a while that there is no sense in taking a chance.

Besides the cancers of the skin there are some skin conditions which may lead eventually to cancer and therefore should be watched even if not treated so that they can be attacked at the first sign of difficulty.
The most important of these are the scaly, brown or black patches which are quite common in elderly people and are usually located on the parts of the skin most exposed to the sun and air. These patches have the name of keratoses.
Now, these patches are not cancerous when they start. But they so often develop in that direction that it is sometimes—but not always—a good idea to remove them. There are two things which always seem wise, however. One is to watch them because if they grow it may be a danger signal.

The other is that persons who show a tendency to develop these patches should try to protect their skins as much as possible from exposure to sun. Indeed they are more likely to develop in the first place in people who spend a lot of time in bright sunshine, like sailors and farmers.

ing since a little common sense about taking precautions can save a lot of grief. The patches of keratosis (when necessary) can be cut out or treated by X-rays or the electric needle, the choice of method depending on size, location, and most of all the judgment of the doctor.

The actual skin cancers, too, can be treated by surgery, X-ray, or radium or combinations of these. If the patient has not been careless about letting some warning sign run on too long the results are almost always excellent.

Midlanders Answer To Variety Of Nicknames

C. "Kip" Harper, R. L. "Buck" York, H. B. "Red" Rouse, Gilbert "Doc" Sevier, W. A. "Art" Yeager, L. C. "Scrutty" Skaggs, "Donk" Frest and "Donkey" Roberts.

Not "Tex" But "Major"

Arthur Harvey most often is called "Tex" because he is head of the Tex-Harvey Oil Company. However, he prefers "Major" Harvey. Major was his rank coming out of World War II.

N. B. Larsh has "Po" for a nickname. They say it's a shortened version for Napoleon Bonaparte.

Why is it that all last name Carters come up with "Nick" as a nickname? G. R. "Nick" Carter did.

"Pete" Peterson, Randolph "Randy" Rubin, W. H. "Buck" Greenstreet, T. A. "Slick" Frasier, J. E. "Army" Armstrong and O. W. "Windy" Hine.

H. C. Hannaford is "Hank" and so the co-workers where Mrs. Hannaford works, call her "Hank."

Midland has Bills, Bobs, Jims, M's, Eds, Rays, Joes, by the hundreds, as shortened versions of William, Robert, James, Edward and Joseph. Of course, anyone with a Mc in his name is just "Mc" or "Mac."

"Pat" is one of the most widely owned Midland nicknames. "Pat" Ruckman heads an imposing list. R. W. "Pat" Patterson is another. J. S. "Pat" Patton is one we know. And a lot of girls have "Pat" to their names, too.

All Doctors Are "Doc"

Ten-to-one you call any and all doctors of your acquaintance, "Doc."

A lot of Midlanders are called "Curley" and not because of any curls of hair, either. In fact, the lack of hair may earn this name.

J. C. Mayes, Sr., is called "Pete" and his son, J. C., Jr., sometimes is called "Repeat."

A take off on one's last name, often brings the nickname. In Midland, we have Robert "Strip" Stripling and C. R. "Skid" Skidmore. And of course, there is H. N. "Phil" Phillips.

And many times the first name is chopped, for example: Al Case, Al Vineyard, Al Kelley, Al Ray, Cliff Rogue, Cliff Cool and Stan Erskine.

Guess what Horace Busby is called at The Reporter-Telegram office? Did you guess "Bus"? You're right!

Midland has "Blackies" and Whites. Also a "Brownie," who is Martin G. Brown.

F. R. Harrove uses his initials "PR" as an unusual nickname.

One just can't seem to run out of nicknames. More are: L. G. "Copper" Daugherty, Harry "The Coar" Krist, E. D. "Pitz" Fitzgerald, "Tinker" Downing (Delbert's son), R. E. "Stoney" Stone, "Chuck" Reglin, C. R. "Rube" Hemingway and C. R. "Frosty" Barnett.

In addition to the medical doctors, others get the nickname of "Doc." There is "Doc" Forman and "Doc" Ellis.

Besides the physicians, "Doc" is applied to pharmacists, chiropractors and naturopaths.

And yes, Midland's veterinarians are nicknamed "Doc."

The city has a few Doctors of Philosophy and sometimes they are called "Doc." And some at the office of The Reporter-Telegram affectionately call James C. Watson, oil editor, "the doctor."

If a Midland man is a left-hander, he sometimes gets a southpaw nickname of "Lefty."

Sport Menickers

Sports has brought some better known nicknames to Midland. Among these are "Big Jim" Prince, Stanley "Scooter" Hughes, Dwight "Rip" Collins, Dick "Dickie Bird" Willenburgh, Leon "Hook" Hayes, "Kenny" Jones, John "Hoss" Alvis, and that umpire "Red" or "Odessa" Ellers. Once the fans had an ump here they called "Mortimer Snerd," among other things.

Midland had a famous high school footballer named Frank "Dunny" Goode. And there was "Docie" Foster, "Black Jack" Taylor, "Lizard" Hall and many, many others. In basketball there was Leonard "Hoot" Harris.

The late Clarence Scharbauer, Sr., had a nickname of "Prunes."

Keith Ward, disc jockey, is tabbed "The Flop-Eared Mule," which was the theme song for one of his programs.

Age has nothing to do with nicknames. There is "Sonny" Brinkerhoff. There is George "Elder" Hyatt. The "elder" probably is "younger."

There are too many "Smitties" or "Smittys" to name them all. There's "Smitty" at Western Union and "Smitty" at the Post Office and on and on.

"Cap" for captain is one of the favorite military nicknames carry-overs. And Midland has a "Colonel." He is J. B. Wright.

If your name is Cobb, then you most always are Ty Cobb, and Midland has such a man.

Among the high school athletes are "Bro" Reed Gilmore, "Slick" Bush and "Turkey" Drake.

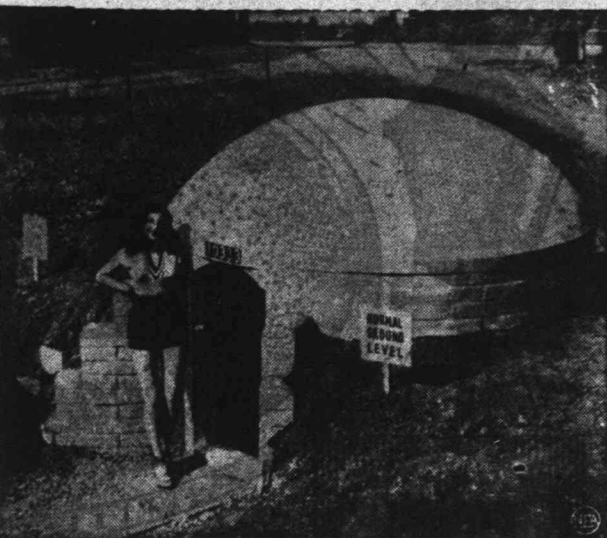

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'The Big Grab'

One of a series exposing the Federal Government's confiscation of the oil-rich Tidelands

When "Honest Harold" Ickes cast the cloud on the state's ownership of submerged oil lands off their coasts, a wave of highly speculative "investing" was set off.

Here's what happened:

When it became apparent that Secretary of the Interior Ickes had changed his mind after stating firmly that the Tidelands legally belonged to the states and had decided they belonged to the central government after all, there was a rush to file for federal leases on underwater properties.

Some of the applications for federal leases plopped right on top of valuable state leases issued by California and paid for by the leasees in good faith.

Ickes let the applications cool in the Department of the Interior.

Now that the Supreme Court has spoken, saying Texas, Louisiana and California don't own those undersea oil lands, a great clamor has been set up to honor those old lease applications that Ickes allowed to pile up.

Don't Want To Wait

Congress isn't so sure it will let the Supreme Court get away with its bizarre opinion.

And, even if it does, it wants to make sure those leases won't be handed out at bargain rates by the Federal Government.

Impatient holders of the old lease applications don't want to wait. They are suing in District of Columbia District Court to force the Interior Department to issue them leases under the Mineral Leasing Act of 1920.

Harold Ickes thinks the leasing ought to be granted under the old act, although he once stated that the act should not apply to submerged oil lands. Ickes "changes like a weather vane," former Senator Sheridan Downey once observed.

Under federal law, you can get oil "prospecting" (wildcat) leases, without bidding in competition with others, on a first-come, first-serve basis, at a few cents an acre.

Congress Looks Again

Congress is taking another look. Even if the Department of the Interior is to boss the Tidelands oil, Congress isn't sure it wants the 1920 mineral leasing law to apply.

Much evidence of speculation on federal leases has been uncovered.

In Wednesday's article, a letter was quoted from the official record to show that a California man had stated that it would be possible, if federal leases were granted, to sell them to big oil companies. It is obvious that the big oil companies would be happy to buy off federal leaseholders to protect their investments under state leases.

The evidence points to some outright speculation on the outcome of the Supreme Court decision against the individual states.

It is to be remembered that the United States Supreme Court did not hand down its decision in the California Tidelands case until June 23, 1947.

Long before that, however, Ickes had had his famous change of mind, which he admits came about after "applicants and their attorneys" pressed the matter upon him.

Sinclair, Cherry

Among the applicants for federal leases sent to the Department of the Interior was one on May 5, 1939 in the name of Earl G. Sinclair and Lauren D. Cherry.

Robert W. Kenny, as attorney general of California, gave evidence to Congress of what he called "a traffic throughout the United States whereby people have been led to believe that there is a great get-rich-quick opportunity if state Tidelands can be upset."

He used Lauren D. Cherry's unapproved, but undented, application as an example.

Kenny offered in evidence documents showing that Cherry sold interest in his application on at least four occasions.

A two per cent interest in the application was sold for \$100 to Alma Goetsch of Long Beach, Calif. in 1939—eight years before the Supreme Court spoke.

Andrew Shearer of Long Beach paid \$75 for a one per cent interest in May, 1941. Alma Goetsch put in \$110 for an additional interest of one per cent June 3, 1941.

Mere Applications

Anna H. Kruezfeldt of Long Beach found she could buy an interest on the installment plan. She paid \$65 down on a one per cent interest priced at \$175.

It must be remembered that

these sales were not in oil leases. They were in mere applications—applications that could not be granted until the Supreme Court ruled the "right way."

The Supreme Court number came up as expected.

Payoff hasn't come yet.

Former Senator Burton K. Wheeler is a lawyer for some of those applicants who want federal leases right now.

Ickes is taking their part, too.

Texas officials, especially Attorney General Price Daniel, do not believe the Tidelands fight has been made in good faith by the Federal Government.

Daniel Cites Double-Talk

Daniel believes the people have been misled—misled not only on the merits of the controversy over oil between the Federal Government and the states; but have had a Supreme Court opinion slapped on the books that threatens the very theory of resistance to high dictatorial powers in this country.

He urges that Congress undo this injustice of the Supreme Court.

Daniel cites the double talk. First, the American people were told the Tidelands should be made a naval reserve for national defense. Now, some of the same folks who talked like that want to hand out federal oil leases on applications that have been used for speculative purposes.

"This naval reserve and national defense has been put up as a smoke screen," Daniel told Congress.

"I think that I can illustrate that best by recalling former Secretary of Interior Ickes' testimony," Daniel said at a hearing.

"He sat right here in this chair and told the committee it was his idea that this property should be set aside for naval purposes."

Naval Smoke Screen

"There is your smoke screen to get plenty of popular appeal behind their idea. That is for the purpose of getting it in the hands of the Federal Government."

"Then, before he left the stand, he (Ickes) told the committee what he really thought ought to be done with it after the Federal Government got hold of it under the pretense of naval reserves and national defense. He told the committee he thought the Mineral Leasing Act applies to all of these lands and criticized the solicitor of the Interior Department and Attorney General Clark for holding to the contrary."

"So he thinks the Mineral Leasing Act ought to apply to these lands."

"That would mean all this proposed naval reserve on the California Coast would go out at 25 cents an acre to these 1,021 applicants who have their applications on file like Senator Wheeler's clients."

Ever See Your Own Ghost? It's Possible, Professor Declares

LONDON — (AP) — Ever seen your own ghost?

It's possible, says professor Jean L'Hermite, Paris brain specialist, writing in the British Medical Journal.

After long study the professor says he is convinced ghostly doubles, which he calls "autoscopic hallucinations" are not fanciful inventions.

"Usually the image is very clear, but not vivid in color," L'Hermite writes. "When the subject attempts to get near it, the image draws back, or fades away."

L'Hermite says he hasn't yet figured out what the vision of phantoms portends—if anything.

India Has Plans For Penicillin Production

NEW DELHI — (AP) — Three officials of the World Health Organization will discuss with the Government of India plans for starting a penicillin production plant in India.

The United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund has offered to provide the necessary apparatus and equipment at an estimated cost of \$850,000. The World Health Organization has offered \$350,000 to provide highly-skilled technicians to design and put into operation the penicillin plant.

The W.H.O. has also agreed to send Indian personnel abroad for specialized training on the subject.

Betrayal Foretold Sleep Loss Termed Major Accident Cause

CHICAGO — (AP) — An extra hour of sleep may mean the difference between a traffic accident and a safe trip, says Dr. W. A. Eggert, chief psychologist for the Kemper Insurance Group.

Dr. Eggert has shown in a survey that a driver who sleeps seven hours or less a night is inviting trouble.

On the other hand, his research indicates the accident free driver averages eight hours or more sleep per night. His findings were based on a year-long study of industrial drivers.

By removing the black lettering that marks sugar and flour sacks, you can turn them into dress fabrics with a linen-like finish. Begin by placing the bags in a large pan half filled with water. Add a pint of kerosene and a cup or more of soap. Keep the pan heating over a low flame for a whole day, stirring frequently. Then rinse them and transfer them to a pan of clean, cool bleach solution. When the bags are snowy white, follow your usual laundry procedure of washing and ironing.

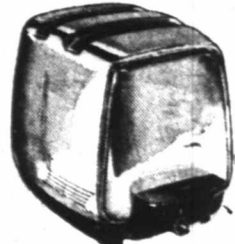
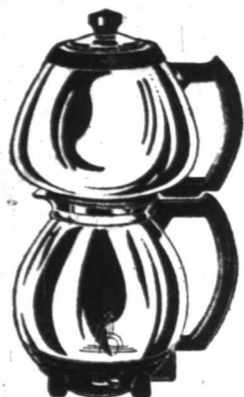

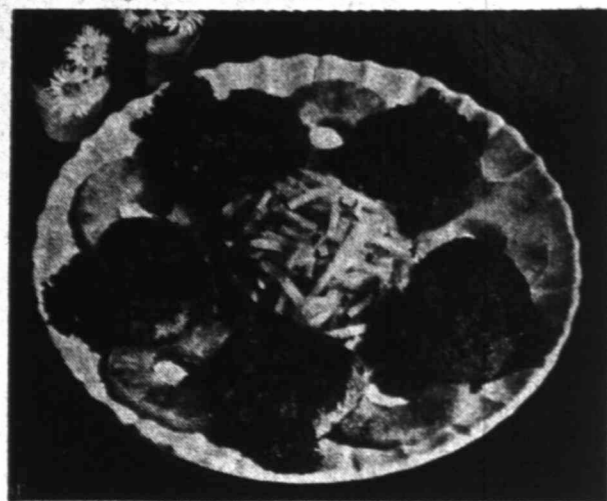

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SAUSAGE-PINEAPPLE DINNER—The popularity of sausage links and patties for breakfast is an accepted fact. Sausage served for dinner can provide some interesting main dishes, too, and will help to keep the food budget in line. One happy way to serve pork sausage patties for dinner is in combination with pineapple slices. Form two pounds bulk pork sausage into eight flat patties, a little larger than pineapple slices. Partially cook patties in a skillet, browning lightly with prepared mustard and place in an oblong shallow baking dish. On the slices lay the sausage cakes. Bake in a 250 degree F. oven for 30 minutes. Baste once or twice during cooking with a little pineapple sirup. Serves four.

Texas Oil, Gas Reserve Pace Nation's Total Gain

DALLAS—Despite heavy production, Texas operators increased proved reserves of both oil and gas to record highs during 1950, an analysis by the Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association showed Wednesday.

"These statistics are reassuring to a state whose economy benefits from oil and gas production and to a nation whose military security depends so greatly on petroleum products," said Charles S. Simons, association general manager.

The nation's oil and gas reserve figures released jointly Wednesday by the American Petroleum Institute and the American Gas Association showed that U. S. total proved reserves of crude oil and liquids from natural gas at the close of 1950 were estimated at 29.5 billion barrels—an all-time high. There was a net increase, nationally, last year of more than 1.1 billion barrels.

Texas reserves of liquid hydrocarbons from both crude oil and natural gas liquids totaled more than 16 billion barrels at the beginning of 1951. This was 54 per cent of the U. S. total. Texas provided 37 per cent of the national increase in liquid hydrocarbon reserves.

Number One Position
Texas' percentage of the country's crude oil reserves at the beginning of 1951 was about 54 per cent, maintaining the number one position it has held among the oil states for several years. The operators offset their crude oil withdrawals of 818 million barrels during 1950 with additions to reserves totalling about 890 million barrels. This gave a year's net gain in the state's crude reserve position of some 72 million barrels for a total of 13 billion barrels. In crude oil reserves, Texas provided 12 per cent of the national gain.

The rising importance of liquids obtained from natural gas is reflected in the figures which show that Texas has 2.5 billion barrels of natural gas liquids in reserve. This is 58 per cent of the national reserves in this category. Texas provided 65 per cent of the national gain in natural gas liquid reserves. Growing reserves of natural gas in Texas hit the 102.4 trillion cubic feet mark as of Jan. 1, 1951. Texas has 55 per cent of the natural gas reserves in the nation. Of the country's total 1950 gains in natural gas reserves, Texas accounted for 63 per cent.

All figures are on reserves whose locations and extent have been proved and measured. They do not include any estimate of oil or gas which may underlie the vast untested acreage which appears favorable for future production.

G. E. "Tommy" Thompson, a Navy veteran of World War II, was the only one eligible to receive a 15-year pin. Three teachers received 10-year awards, including Lois Miller, Winifred Walker, and Leta Blundell. Steve Neely, superintendent of the Natural Gasoline Division of Cabot Carbon Company, was given a 10-year pin for his service as a member of the school board.

Five-year pins were presented to Mrs. Clyde Martin, Mrs. Fred Pearson, Mrs. J. W. Morris, Mrs. L. L. Morris, Mrs. Bertha Hahn, Mrs. Sue Nolan, Mabel Smith, Josephine Anderson, Uradean Beshers, Mrs. Alice Knox, Band Director G. T. Gilligan, S. J. Lovell, and Clyde Martin. Also receiving the five-year awards were Eddie Mae Mosley, school tax collector, J. M. Waddell, member of the school board, and Clifford Casey, school engineer.

Members of the school staff and school board, with their husbands and wives, gathered at the new primary cafeteria for the banquet where they heard a stirring address by Waurine Walker, immediate past president of TSTA and a member of the staff of the Texas Education Agency. She was introduced by Thompson.

Irvin Clayton, president of the Kermit TSTA unit, was master-of-ceremonies. P. C. Shands, a member of the school board, presented the service pin awards, and musical numbers were presented by G. T. Gilligan, Gary DeShazo, Floyd Morris and Bob Fleming, all music department supervisors of the schools.

Sound Experts Say Silence Makes Noise

NEW YORK—(AP)—Silence can be heard as a subdued hiss, or even as a soft hum, according to sound experts of the Radio Corporation of America. They have constructed a vault-like cavern to eliminate sound, but the hums and hisses still persist in this soundproof laboratory.

The laboratory has enough rug padding to cover 250 average living rooms. The padding has been stuffed around walls and ceilings and beneath an open-grated floor. RCA scientists say the hisses and hums may be the "noise" of molecules hitting the ear drums, or they may be caused by the coursing of the body's blood stream.
