The story is of some tough soldiers and a tender nurse who break through a stubborn Scottish sergeant's fierce pride to teach him how to give and take friendship for the first time in his lonely life. The characters were drawn from the author's own wartime experiences.

Dixon Plays Scot Soldier

Charles Dixon plays the part of Sgt. Lachlan MacLachlan, the bitter Scottish soldier, with the sympathy and understanding necessary for such a difficult role. His portrayal was a job well done even including the Scottish accent.

Virginia Dunagan gave her usual heartwarming performance of the British hospital nurse who accepts a proposal of marriage from a man she knows has only a few weeks to live.

The parts of the soldier-patients, who could easily be called representatives from the United Nations, were played with the ability of experienced actors and gave a light-hearted humorous air to the play throughout the three acts.

Cast Named

Howard E. Davis played the part of Yank, the easy-going Southerner who's stuck with a nickname that makes his blood boil. Davis will long be remembered for his excellent performance as the Yank who tried so hard to make friends with the Scottish sergeant and quoted the Books of the Bible when he lost his temper.

Others in the play were Jim Newman as Digger, the loud-mouthed and soft-hearted soldier; Llewellyn Hoey, as Kiwi, the cocky New Zealander; John R. Davis, Jr. as Blossom, the Basuto tribesman who can't speak a word of English except his nickname and C. G. Cooper as Tommy, an irrepressible cockney. Wally Jackson plays the part of the colonel who has to tell Lucky he is not going to recover. The orderly is played by Fred Retter.

"The Hasty Heart" was given in observance of International Theater Month. Theaters all over the world have been urged to emphasize the theme that "theater serves international understanding" during this month.

The play will continue through Saturday with performances at 8:30 p.m. each night in the City-County auditorium.

There still seem to be a good many people who are somewhat confused about hernias or ruptures, what they are and what to do for them. Correspondents have written in to ask what hernia is, whether someone is too old to have an op-

eration, how a double hernia should be handled, and what should be done if a hernia comes back if it has been operated on once. Of course each person with a hernia is a little different and there may be exceptions to every rule, but in general it is not hard to answer most of the questions on this subject. First, hernia and rupture merely are two names for the same thing. The skin, and particularly the muscles underneath principally are responsible for keeping the rest of our anatomy where it belongs. Inside the abdomen in particular, however, there are a number of organs and structures which keep pressing on this outer cover. The pressure inside is increased by muscular exertion such as lifting a piano or coughing.

Also there are some spots around the covering of the abdomen which are weaker than others—and this is especially true of men. It is at these spots that the wall may give way and the contents of the abdomen tend to bulge through forming a rupture. That's really all a hernia is, a bulging through the surrounding wall of some of the structures which lie within a cavity. For a person not engaged in heavy manual labor the rupture may not cause any trouble, though there is always the risk that it some day will come out farther and get strangling or develop some other complication. But treatment usually is wise and unless there are good reasons to the contrary, surgery is best. A truss or support does not cure, and injection treatment has been almost completely abandoned. The operation can be done at almost any age without special risk, but one has to decide whether the occupation of the patient, size of the rupture, and other considerations justify the period of invalidism and the expense.

Double Trouble
All that a double hernia means is that the wall has given way on both sides so that there is a rupture in each place. Operation is the same (though it takes twice as long) and surgeons often repair both at the same time. The final question fortunately does not come up as often now as it did in the past. No operation always is successful and occasionally the rupture breaks through again. If it does, which is uncommon today, it will have to be operated on again if one desires a permanent result.

Dewayne Peterson of Tarzan won a similar award in 1949. The list of 1950 winners was announced by the state 4-H club leaders of Texas A&M College.

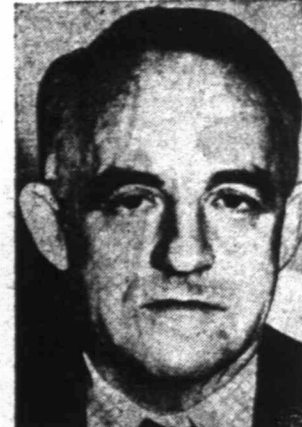
furnished by the Anderson, Clayton Company of Houston and the 4-H cotton improvement program is sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Martin County agricultural agent Ralph L. Jones supervised young Tunnell's demonstration.

James is a senior in Stanton High School and has completed six years of 4-H work. His demonstrations have included beef cattle, swine, grain sorghums and cotton. He is a Gold Star boy and was a member of the Martin County 4-H Grass Judging Team in 1949 and 1950. His Sears-Roebuck Foundation gift was a champion in the county show and reserve champion in the area show.

In 1950, he was selected to receive the "Best Citizen" award in his school. He is an honor student and in 1950 was named center on the all-district football team.

From the standpoint of acreage, his 1950 cotton demonstration was the largest grown by any of the seven winners and consisted of 30 acres. Here is his story of the winning demonstration.

"Seedbed preparation is a very important factor in my farming operations. I had planned to plant a green manure crop on my cotton land in the fall of 1949 but dry weather prevented it. The land was listed early in January and then chiseled in the furrow to break up the hard pan. This makes for deep-

Mobilization Has All Texas Humping

By CLAYTON HICKERSON

DALLAS—(AP)—The mobilization program has Texas humping, with three things most noticeable:

1. More oil, gas, and synthetic rubber are being drawn out of fabulously rich soil.
2. A growing stream of military planes—from small liaison craft and the world's fastest jets to the giant strategic bomber, the famed B-36—is coming from Texas manufacturing plants.
3. Air Force bases are being reactivated wholesale, to turn out more trained warriors and technicians.

With the employment index in Texas at an all-time high, much of the defense employment data is restricted. But some examples are enlightening.

About 50,000 Texans are engaged in aircraft production in the Dallas-Fort Worth area alone. More than half of these are in the cavernous Consolidated Vultee plant at Fort Worth, working on stepped-up B-36 bomber orders.

Dallas Is Air Center
Two companies at Houston are building small arms. Another is building heavy artillery. Other Houston area firms have opened up new tank assembly and repair shops.

Almost everything in the air line is being built within a 40-mile circle that includes Dallas, Fort Worth and suburban Garland.

The Federal Government has reactivated synthetic rubber plants along the Texas Gulf Coast, and also encouraged farmers to plant guayule—a strange plant from which natural rubber can be processed.

Reynolds Aluminum Company has announced plans to build one of the greatest aluminum plants in the nation near Corpus Christi. It will cost at least \$80,000,000. Three or four nearby towns will have great reduction plants.

Plans for Texas' second fully-integrated steel processing plant were announced by Lone Star Steel Company, which will erect it at Daingerfield in East Texas. Sheffield's plant at Houston so far is Texas' only plant which produces plate steel from raw ore.

Heavy chemical industries have recruited several thousand new workers at Beaumont and Port Arthur. The Red River Ordnance plant at Texarkana adds several thousand in its stepped-up ammunition production program.

Oil Industry Expands
Texas' great oil industry is putting heavy emphasis on high-octane aviation gasoline.

When World War II started, Texas refinery capacity was 4,956,599 barrels daily. Daily crude runs now are hitting a record of 6,000,000 barrels, compared to 5,300,000 barrels daily last year, and oilmen expect to add 100,000 in 1951.

Oil production barely is holding its own at 2,800,000 barrels daily in Texas. But the industry expects the Texas Railroad Commission—which regulates the industry—to allow greater production.

Magnolia Petroleum Company, a standard affiliate, has completed two cracking units to speed up the output of higher-valued chemicals essential to aviation fuel. Continental Oil Company plans a \$10,000,000 catalytic cracking plant at nearby Lake Charles, La.

Policeman Evidently Carries Rabbit's Foot
LONG BEACH, CALIF.—(AP)—Policeman John D. Emmons must carry a lucky rabbit's foot.

He was thrown from a patrol car after a collision. He skidded along the pavement on his back for 80 feet. His car's left back wheel was ground to pieces.

West Texas is on the mobilization efforts as well as the industrial coast and Dallas-Fort Worth areas.

On a 4,000-acre tract east of Amarillo, the Atomic Energy Commission has a mystery project. AEO has been non-communicative about what is going on except to say it does not involve radioactive materials. The site is 17 miles from Amarillo and was the Pantex Ordnance plant in World War II. About 1,000 persons will work there.

Military Installations
To the south, the Midland-Odessa area has at least one order for 100,000,000 gallons of high octane aviation gasoline.

The biggest military center is San Antonio, site of Lackland Air Force Base, Fort Sam Houston and Randolph Air Force Base. Lackland—where reports of overcrowding and lack of facilities for Air Force recruits drew a senatorial investigation—is handling one of the greatest floods of manpower in Air Force history. Randolph AFB, assigned a new \$30,000,000 aero-medical center, will be the top military medical center in the world, according to Rep. Paul Kilday (D-Texas).

The Air Force wants more than 50 million dollars for work at Amarillo Air Force Base. Sheppard Air Force Base at Wichita Falls is bulging with Air Force recruits re-routed there from San Antonio. Carswell Air Force Base at Fort Worth—home of the B-36—will get new space for its super-bomber fleet at a cost of more than \$2,000,000.

New barracks will go up at Fort Hood in Central Texas. Fort Bliss in far West Texas is assigned a guided-missile center and an aircraft firing center. Camp Wolters at Mineral Wells is being reactivated as a training site for Air Force construction engineers.

Sonnets In His Bonnet, Doc Can't Stop Writing

NEW YORK—(NEA)—A sonnet may be a 14-line poem to other people, but to Dr. Merrill Moore it's a "compulsion neurosis."

Which means, the Boston psychiatrist-poet explains, that writing sonnets is something he can't stop. "Other men may dream of trout casting all day long," he says, "but my constant preoccupation is writing sonnets."

Now 47, the tall, sandy-haired, ruddy-cheeked doctor has been in

Because of their mixed parentage, he calls his newest book "Illegitimate Sonnets." It is his ninth work. One of his earlier ones was a collection of 1000 of his sonnets, making it the largest book of sonnets by a single poet ever published.

"Anything at all can make a sonnet subject," he says. "I'm more interested in people than anything else, and especially in people's minds. Most of my sonnets deal with people and what they do and say."

Poetry, he thinks, often helps people that are depressed mentally. He keeps copies of Kipling's inspirational "If" around for patients with the blues. He feels that medicine and the muse can mix.

the department of sonnetation for 30 years. He thinks he's written "well over 100,000" of the 14-liners in that time.

Only First Draft
He wrote them in college, medical school, a five-year Army stint and sandwiched them in between patients. It only takes him from one to three minutes to dash one off. But that initial writing is only a first draft. His usual practice is to keep them for a year, then revise each one 30 or 40 times.

He has developed a dislike for the strict rules of the old-established Italian and English types. "Some authorities feel that if it ain't got an octet and a sestet it ain't a sonnet," he says.

In his American, or garden-variety sonnet, he doesn't bother with forms and formulas. He may write eight lines and six lines, or maybe 7-3-4, or 5-5-3-1, or whatever; he feels like. But they are still an outgrowth of both the old types.

More than 100 Oriental woodblock prints will be shown in the art room, 211 in the high school building beginning Thursday and continuing through March 22. The prints are printed on mulberry paper from cherrywood blocks. Ines Parker, art director, received the prints from the Robert Lee-Galleries, Inc., of Newton, Conn. They will be on display from 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. on weekdays.

Subject matter of the drawings range from landscapes to birds, flowers, under-water scenes, horses, nature studies and moonlight series. All paintings are of an oriental nature, using a multitude of vivid colors. They are done by wood-blocks from original oriental free-brush paintings by prominent Japanese artists. The exhibit is open to the public.

HOW TO MAKE THIS EXTRA SPECIAL EASTER CAKE

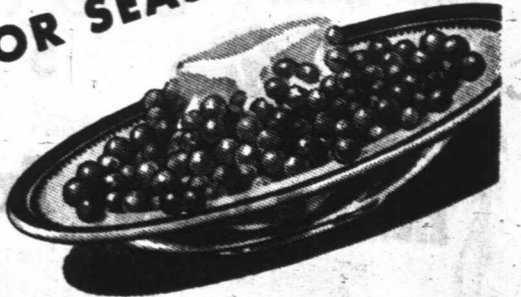

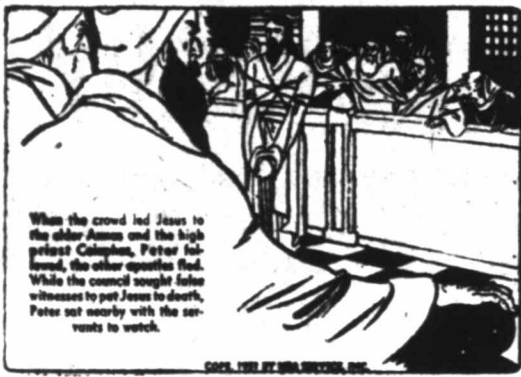

JACOBY ON CANASTA

By OSWALD JACOBY

Last week I give most of the rules of samba, the new three-pack canasta game that is sweeping the country. There wasn't room to discuss red and black three, so I'll take them up now.
In samba there are six black threes, since there are three ordinary decks in the samba pack. These are stop cards, as in regular canasta. You may meld them only when you are melding out on that play. You are never allowed to meld a wild card with black threes, so there is no such thing as a canasta of black threes.
Another thing to remember about black threes is that they cannot be melded in sequences. The lowest possible card in a sequence is a four. The only melds possible with black threes are three black threes, four black threes, five black threes, and six black threes. There are no bonuses for having them.
There are likewise six red threes in the samba pack. They are bonus cards, much as they are in canasta, but there are differences. Each red three counts 100 points, but all six count 1,000 points. There is no extra bonus at all for having four red threes or five red threes.
However, and this is important, red threes do not count in your favor until your side has completed two canastas (a seven-card sequence counts as a canasta for this purpose). Until that time, all your red threes count against you.
This rule makes it important to get two canastas made in a hurry. It also makes it possible to set the opponents back more easily, if you happen to get a fast out and if the opponents happen to have several red threes.
Curiously enough, some people have trouble understanding the samba rule that you draw two cards from the stock. "Does this mean," a Houston correspondent recently asked, "that you can take the discard pile and then also take one card from the stock pile?"
No, it doesn't mean that at all. When it is your turn to play, you draw either from the discard pile or from the stock pile—just as in canasta. You never draw from both. If you draw from the stock pile, you take two cards instead of only one card. That's all there is to that rule.
STILL HAS FLOGGINGS
SINGAPORE — (AP) — Punishment by flogging is going to stay on the law books in this British crown colony. A government spokesman said there is no intention at present of introducing legislation to abolish whipping.
He said Singapore was not among the 10 colonial governments which had agreed in principle to rule out corporal punishment. Whipping, in addition to sentence, can be ordered in Singapore for conviction on charges of rape and grievous hurt.

Schoolboys' Arrogance Irks Hungary

BUDAPEST—Government officials in charge of education have expressed alarm at a recent breakdown of discipline in Hungarian schools.

"The educational level in our schools has decreased to an appalling extent," newspapers quoted minister of education Jozsef Darvas. "A considerable part of the students do not learn at all. They come to school unprepared, behave disorderly, and are disrespectful with pedagogues."

It was apparently a backfire of an early 1950 purge of high-ranking education ministry officials accused of raising "Maximalist demands," allegedly to make studies difficult for students of worker and peasant origin.

Leaders of the association of working youth were reprimanded for allegedly behaving as if they felt themselves superior to headmasters.

Budding Scribes Told To 'Look To Russia'

BERLIN—For the budding newspapermen of East Germany, the professor's first advice is: "Look to Mother Russia, son, and learn." Leipzig University's newly-founded journalism institute starts its course off with extensive lectures on the Soviet press.

At Leipzig, the future newshawks go through a three-year course. Applicants, according to "Taegliche Rundschau," newspaper of the Soviet Control Commission in Russian-occupied East Germany, must have an "unequivocally progressive" outlook. The student's curriculum includes a course in social science, which lays a firm Marxian foundation for the future newsmen, then comes journalism proper, an elective subject, and finally, a full-steam language course—in Russian.

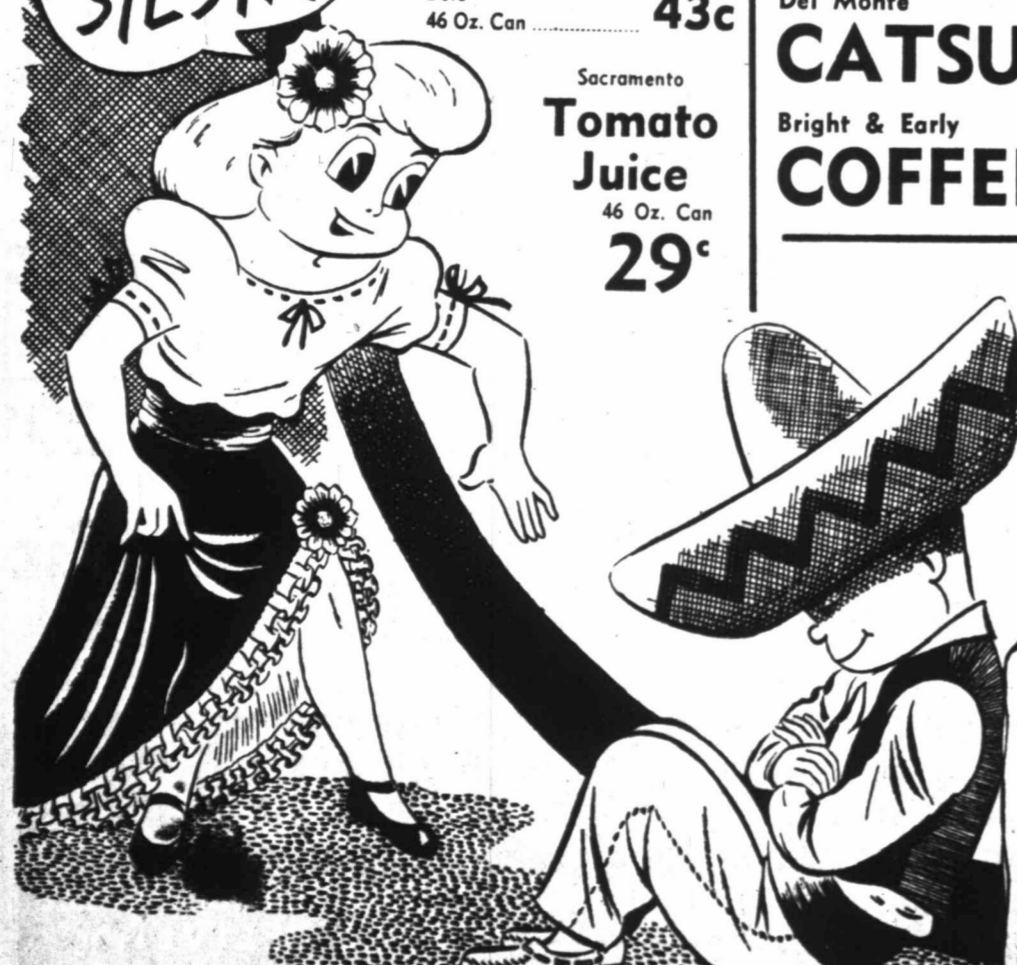

YOU CAN SET YOUR WATCH BY IT— Midland Telegraph Service—Western Union To You— Is Far Cry From Samuel Morse's Great Miracle Of 1844

"What Hath God Wrought!"
On May 24, 1844, Samuel Finley Breeze Morse, an American artist of note who knew comparatively little about things mechanical and electrical, saw his fondest dream come true when he sent the now historic first telegram—"What Hath God Wrought!"
The biblical quotation (Numbers, Chapter 23, Verse 23) was flashed over the first telegraph line from the chamber of the United States Supreme Court, then in the capitol building at Washington, to the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad station in Baltimore.
The telegraph revolutionized world communications.
Like many of the great inventions, this one was considered a folly and there was a long period of struggle to get it recognized and accepted.
By the time of the Whig political convention in Baltimore, May 1, 1854, a line had been completed as far as Annapolis Junction, 22 miles

from Washington.
Although the line was completed only halfway to Baltimore, it was opened for the filing of the first telegraph news story, which, was sent to Washington newspapers.
Washington was awaiting the news of the Whig presidential nomination. Delegates returning from Baltimore were bringing the news by train. When they arrived at Annapolis Junction, someone got the news of Henry Clay's nomination for president and flashed it to Washington over the new telegraph line. The delegates were surprised when they arrived in Washington and found the news already was known.
Now Everywhere
Now Western Union is everywhere. And by now, Midland is pretty familiar with its telegraph office—the faithful Western Union.
We are going to write about the installation here at home.
And we can't do it in 10 words, either. It's too interesting for saving words, like you do when you

send a telegram.
Western Union, as we find it in Midland in 1951, is fast operating and highly efficient. It has much specialized equipment and gives service.
Location of the Midland installation is in the Scharbauer Hotel.
When R. O. Smith, who has been with Western Union 15 years, came to Midland, there was one telegraph operator and himself to man the office. Now there are seven operators.
Pauline Schatz, well-known in the Midland office, has been with the company 10 years. Operators include Jackie Reed, Frankie Dewbre, Vonelle Cochran, Nancy Poore and Mary McCann.
There are five delivery boys.
The Western Union office here has been in Hotel Scharbauer since the hotel was built in 1928. Little is known of the activities of telegraph service here before that time. A Miss Morrison is remembered as the manager when the office was located in the Scharbauer.
Miss Holly Goodwin was the sole operator when Smith came to Midland as manager in 1934.
Varied Services
In addition to standard telegraph services, the Midland office of Western Union offers other services.
For example, there is telegraphic money order service—fast and safe telegraphic transfer of funds. Request for money order service up to \$30,000 or \$35,000 and more doesn't phase the office here.
In fact, the Midland office has handled, and does handle, some pretty big transfers of funds.
"Yes, we would telegraph a million dollars," Manager Smith says. There is quite a demand for messenger distribution service in Midland. The Western Union messenger boy is a traditional "errand boy." Here, he performs a wide variety of personal and business errands. Oil offices keep him on the go.
Smith estimates that 700 messages of telegraph service is an average day in Midland, that includes sending and receiving.
Another service offered and used here is C&D ticker quotations of markets and sports.
You would be surprised at the customers for market quotations in Midland. They are many.
The baseball ticker customers are service clubs that carry inning by inning results in the diamond sport season.
Here's a service we bet you didn't know was offered in Midland—service dealer location.
It is called Operato. 25 Service Dealer Location. Various firms or individuals subscribe to the service. For example, they want to find the Youngstown Kitchen dealer in Midland. Operato 25 service will tell them where such a dealer is located.
Press Messages
Press messages are another service of Western Union here. Long stories may be dispatched at a low rate.
Smith remembers that when President Truman visited Texas, he

was sent to Sierra Blanca (press message stop on the tour) to assist in getting out the volume of copy from the presidential entourage. He also was called to Waco when the President was there.
Two Western Union services that Midland does not have because the city isn't quite large enough are "Wake Up Service" and "Singsongs." These are quite popular services in the larger cities.
Did you know Western Union offers "survey service" and right here in Midland, if you want it. For example, you wanted to know how many persons entered a certain store during a given time period. You could contact Western Union and get "survey service" and find out exactly. Just about any survey data wanted will be gathered for you.
Oil companies here use telegraph service of Western Union extensively. There is a heavy traffic of drilling reports and other data. Banks receive financial reports. The only code messages received or sent here are from banks.
Emergency and death messages carry an RX symbol and get priority. Also the government gets top priority for an XB message. These usually are messages of dead or wounded soldiers.
Smith recalls times when ice storms downed Western Union's lines and messages were dispatched by everything from planes to personal carriers.
December is the busiest month of the year for the WU office in Midland and not because of Christmas greetings either. December brings the year-end with the many reports and inventories of businesses and companies. Also new stocks are ordered.
"You know, folks used to be scared when they got a telegram," Smith says. "Now, they aren't. They have learned that good news comes as well as bad news."
The old Morse dot and dash system gave way several years ago to automatic equipment for sending and receiving telegraph messages.
Personnel of the WU office are made to keep contents of all messages strictly to themselves. Private business messages and all other are kept confidential.
Did you know the universal telephone number for a Western Union office is 4321 and that is true in Midland. However, one can get Western Union simply by asking for it by name.
Western Union sends greetings for you on most occasions. A new service is the "Storkgram" in the case of new arrivals. For Easter, there is the "Bunnygram" and of course you know Christmas, Thanksgiving, Mother's Day, et al.
The Midland office is open from 7:30 a.m. to 10 p.m. daily except Sunday when the hours are 8 a.m. to 11 a.m. and 3 p.m. to 7 p.m.
There are 13 key relay points for messages in the United States. Midland's relay point is Dallas.
Yes, telegrams still are the traditional black messages on yellow blanks.

Eggs Are Symbol Of Easter

Fresh, life-giving eggs have always been a symbol of Easter. Now is the time, therefore, to brush up on egg cookery. Eggs are plentiful and an important budget food.

Poached Eggs
Bring water in shallow pan to the boiling point—enough to have about two inches of water. Reduce heat to hold temperature at simmering. Break each egg into a sauce dish and slip egg into water quickly at the surface. Cook 3 to 5 minutes depending on the firmness desired. Remove eggs with slotted pan or spoon, and drain.

Broiled Eggs
Heat just enough fat to grease a shallow skillet or flame-proof baking dish. When fat is just hot enough to sizzle a drop of water, break eggs and slip into skillet from a sauce dish if preferred. Cook on top the range just until eggs turn white, about 1 minute. Place skillet in heated broiler and broil eggs at moderate temperature to desired doneness, 2 to 4 minutes.

Baked (Shirred) Eggs
Break and slip 1 or 2 eggs into greased individual shallow baking dishes. Bake in slow oven (325 de-

grees F.) 12 to 18 minutes, depending upon firmness desired. Serve from baking dishes.
Variations: Circle a strip of partially cooked bacon around edge of dish.
Line bottom of dishes with buttered crumbs. Place a slice of cheese atop crumbs, then break eggs into dish. Top with grated cheese or crumbs. Proceed as above.
Pour 1 to 2 tablespoons cream into each dish. Break eggs into dish and proceed as above.

French Omelet
(Serves 2)
Three eggs, 3 tablespoons milk or water, 3/8 teaspoon salt, 1/8 teaspoon pepper, scant, 1 tablespoon fat.

Mix eggs, milk, salt and pepper thoroughly. Avoid foaminess. Heat fat in skillet (approximately 8-in.) just hot enough to sizzle a drop of water. Pour in egg mixture. Reduce heat. As the mixture at the edges begins to thicken, draw the cooked portions with the fork toward the center so that the uncooked portions flow to the bottom. Tilt skillet as it is necessary to hasten flow of uncooked eggs. Do not stir and keep mixture as level as possible. When eggs no longer flow and surface is still moist, increase heat to brown bottom quickly. Carefully loosen edge. Fold in half or roll. Total cooking time—5 to 8 minutes.

HOLLYWOOD — (P) — William Spaeth's specialty is walking barefoot across a bed of hot coals. It isn't difficult, he says, if you have tough feet and the coals are set up right. This time somebody crossed him up.
Spaeth says you should use small bits of charcoal sprinkled on a bed of sand. As you step, the embers sink into the sand with no damage to the foot.
From a hospital bed where he was recovering from second and third degree burns on his soles, Spaeth said that at a rehearsal for his act, somebody used king-size coals. They didn't sink.

Site Of Magna Carta Signing Is Disputed

LONDON — (P) — Where was the Magna Carta signed in 1215?
With the festival of Britain this year—736 years after King John's reluctant rendezvous with his barons—two places are claiming the honor of telling visitors that their territory includes the historic site.
Egham Urban Council in Surrey County, is in no doubt that the signing was at Runnymede Meadows, on the south bank of the Thames in their district.
But in Wraysbury village on the opposite bank of the Thames they insist the signing took place on Magna Carta Island in the Thames, opposite Runnymede, but within Wraysbury Parish.

MUSICAL TERMS IN HEBREW

TEL AVIV — (P) — A dictionary with 1200 musical expressions in Hebrew is expected to be published in Israel. The "Va'ad Halashon" (Hebrew Language Council) originally believed that it might only be necessary to determine some 100-120 musical expressions in the revived Bible language, but experience has shown that many more are needed—even if a number of non-Hebrew (often Italian) words which are internationally used, are admitted into modern Hebrew as well as on these organisms for food.

Color photographs, better for wartime camouflage detection, are made in quick time and as easily as black-and-white prints, by a new process. Seeing Eye Dogs Are Trained To Keep Master From Harm

There is an institution in Morristown, N. J., for the training of seeing eye dogs. Their duty is to guide blind people. The dogs used for this training are German Shepherds, better known as police dogs.

They are taken very young to be trained—and it takes three months to complete the course. First the dog must learn to obey three spoken orders. They are left, right and forward. The dog wears a leather harness with a handle rising from the back so the blind person can hold it comfortably. The dogs keep him from bumping into overhanging objects or obstructions.

When the dog comes to a curb he stops until his master finds the

step. The dog must learn to disobey orders sometimes for his master's safety. For instance, if his orders are to go forward and there is an obstruction there he must use his own head and go around the object but he must keep going in the general direction.

Their pace is a little faster than an average walker.

Must Train 30 Days
The blind person must spend 30 days in training with his dog and he must be very kind to him and know how to give orders. The first time the blind person takes the dog out into traffic the trainer goes along to be sure there is no mistake.

The seeing eye dog is never punished or scolded for mistakes because any animal taught by fear is never well trained. When a blind person first arrives at school he is given full charge of his guide and in a very short time a bond of affection grows between them which only death can break.

If the dog dies the master knows that it will not be very long before he goes to the Seeing Eye for another friend.

Arrange five sections on a dish to form a scalloped basket. Cut remaining cake into cubes and pile into center. Cover with scoops of vanilla ice cream. Decorate with chocolate fondant eggs where cake sections join.

Chocolate Fondant Eggs
(Makes 3/4 Pound)
One-third cup butter, 2 squares unsweetened chocolate, melted, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract, 1 1/4 cups confectioner's sugar.

Soften butter; beat in melted chocolate and vanilla extract. Add sifted confectioner's sugar and knead until smooth. Make egg shapes out of tablespoons of the fondant. Chill in refrigerator until firm.
