

The site was described by the Midland mentors as being four miles from Dillon and six miles from Breckenridge, both small Colorado

cities on Highways 40 and 6. Nestled in the rugged. mountainous country, the camp is to be called "Hidden Valley Camp

for Boys." The Midland coaches stress the fact that the Summer camp will in no asy interfere with their coaching duties at Midland High School. They said it was the only project they knew of that would not hinder their jobs as Midland coaches.

At the same time, Jones said he thinks the camp "will be a great thing for Midland boys."

"While the camp could acco date 150 boys," he said. "We will have only 50 this Summer. We to have only Midland boys there this Summer if at all pos-

Varied Program Boys from eight through 17 years of age may attend the camp. A varied athletic program is being arranged, including horseback riding and swimming. A national forest of many acres will be at the disposal of the youths. The forest urrounds the camp on three sides. In addition, the Blue River and the Swan River merge on the Midland men's property.

Hidden Valley will be open from une 24 through July 29 this year, according to Jones. He said the boys will stay in modern cabins of log type structure, and take their meals in a large dining hall that is part of a lodge on the camp grounds. A senior counselor will be available for every five boys in the camp. Midland Elementary school coaches will fill these posiions, for the most part.



The cumulative summary through March 9, issued Wednesday by the Department of Defense, listed 8,101 killed action, 36,108 wounded and 10,440 missing in action.

The wounded total includes 937 who died later. Also 85 among the missing are known dead, raising total deaths to 9.123.

Of those listed as missing, 1,011 denied. since have returned to U. S. military control and 110 are know prisoners of war.

Total Army casualties increased 1.952 during the week to 45.440. Navy total rose by 10 to 606; the Marine Corps 231 to 8,069, and the Air Force, eight to 424.

Last week I give most of the rules of samba, the new three-pack canasta game that is sweeping the country. There wasn't room to discuss red and black three, so I'll take

In samba there are six black threes, since there are three ordinary decks in the samba pack. These are stop cards, as in regular canasta. You may meld them only when you are melding out on that You are never allowed to meld a wild card with black threes so there is no such thing as a canasta of black threes.

Another thing to remember about black threes is that they cannot be melded in sequences. The lowest possible card in a sequence is a four. The only melds possible with black threes are three black threes, four black threes, five black threes and six black threes. There are no bonuses for having them.

There are likewise six red threes in the samba pack. They are bonus cards, much as they are in canasta, but there are differences. Each red three counts 100 points, but all six count 1,000 points. There is no extra bonus at all for having four red threes or five red threes.

However, and this is important red threes do not count in your favor until your side has completed two canastas (a seven-card sequence counts as a canasta for this purpose). Until that time, all your red threes count against you.

This rule makes it important to get two canastas made in a hurry It also makes it possible to set the opponents back more easily, if you happen to get a fast out and if the opponents happen to have several red threes.
