House, Senate Head For Showdowns On Spending, Taxation

AUSTIN — (AP) — Both House and Senate headed toward showdowns Tuesday on how much money the state should spend for vital services the next two years.

Whatever amount they decide should be spent will be millions of dollars more than the state's present tax structure is expected to yield.

In the face of an apparent need for new levies, the House Revenue and Taxation Committee Monday night stalled the session's first major tax bill.

Opponents called the bill a sales tax in disguise, "grossly discriminatory" against firms relying on a big volume of business to make a small profit.

Rep. Jack Bryan of Buffalo, author of the bill, said retail firms weren't paying their share of the tax burden. He thought the big retailers should help solve the state's "hundred-million-dollar tax need."

Members of the House Appropriations Committee anticipated a tough fight to secure approval on the House floor of their "package" bill covering expenses of state departments, courts, colleges and eleemosynary institutions the next biennium.

Chairman Henry Rumpy of Winters and Rep. Jack Cox of Breckenridge called for a united committee front to help carry the bill to passage. At a "policy" meeting called by Rumpy in advance of House debate, Cox told committee colleagues, "Even if every committee member works as diligently as he can, we're going to have a hard time getting this bill passed in its present form."

A bill designed to banish from Texas all slot machines of chance won unanimous Senate committee approval after public hearing Monday night. A bill doing the same thing receives House committee action Tuesday night.

Public Safety Director Homer Garrison, Jr., described the machines as "the root of the bankroll of organized crime."

A resolution by Senator George Nokes of Corsicana seeking a special House-Senate investigation of organized crime was snubbed in effect by the Senate State Affairs Committee. The panel adopted a substitute resolution directing the Senate's Standing Committee on Investigations to take action.

We Can't Relax Defense Pace

Secretary of Defense Marshall took time the other day to comment sadly on the growing complacency toward the U. S. defense effort notable both in Congress and the nation at large.

He pointed out that two months ago lawmakers were demanding to know why he wasn't doing more in mobilizing military strength.

This change of mood can be seen in many places. President Truman is basking in the Florida sun and Secretary of State Acheson thinks it's safe to enjoy Bermuda for a while.

Congress appears pre-occupied with the RFC scandal, the crime investigation, the Tydings-Butler election squabble, and similar matters.

The Pentagon is proceeding leisurely in working out the details of its expanding armaments program.

What accounts for this relaxed mood? Many things, apparently. Our recent limited but definite gains on the Korean front, leading us to believe we may not get pushed off the peninsula after all.

Not to be overlooked is the Administration's consistent failure to sustain a sense of urgency.

It may well be that there is less actual danger than we believed two months ago.

But part is almost certainly due to the fact we have made important beginning strides toward a real defense both at home and in Europe.

Though the promises are big enough to give the Russians pause, they will continue to do so only as they are translated into reality—into guns and tanks and planes and men.

If the situation is indeed brighter than two months ago, should it not be viewed simply as proof that the Russians respect strength and nothing more?

Why, then, do we see fit to relax the pace of our mobilization program at the very moment it is beginning to pack real weight in the struggle with Russia?

Basically, until paper is turned into men and steel, we're right where we were on January 1.

We've killed a lot of Chinese Reds but we haven't eliminated a single Russian soldier.

We Americans never will be quite the political equals of our Soviet friends until we stop swinging like a pendulum from total alarm to total indifference.

In many parts of America today sharp-eyed individuals must be breathing easier.

To be sure, those "flying saucers" they saw haven't turned out to be real in the sense that they are experimental aircraft either from this or some other planet.

A Navy research man has disclosed that a new type of research balloon has been in use for just about as long as people claim to have been seeing the saucers.

In compensation for the ridicule they've endured, how about honorary commissions as Air Force spotters for all of these very excellent observers?

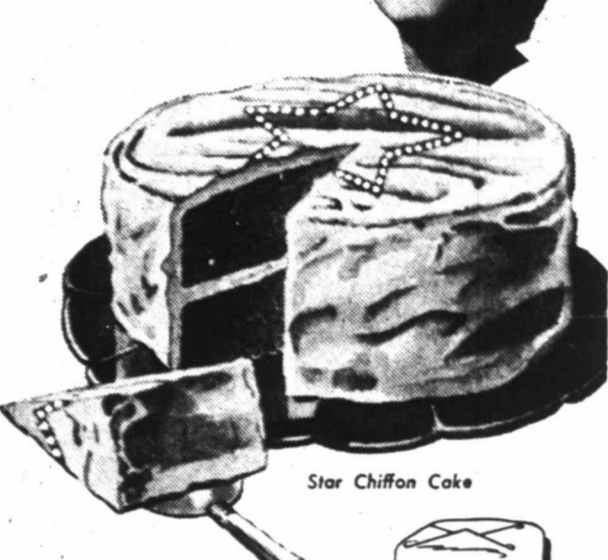

### Industrial Plants Receive Special Income Tax Permits

The largest project is a catalytic cracking unit and other facilities for producing ingredients for aviation gasoline and synthetic rubber, to be built for \$18,486,342 for the Gulf Oil Corporation at Fort Arthur, Texas.

The others are: a \$11,000,000 benzene plant to be built at Texas City, Texas, for Pan American Refining Company; facilities costing \$4,056,576 for separation of isobutane, to be built for Phillips Petroleum Company, at Borger, Texas; Levelland Refining Company, \$2,441,763 catalytic cracking unit at Levelland, Texas.

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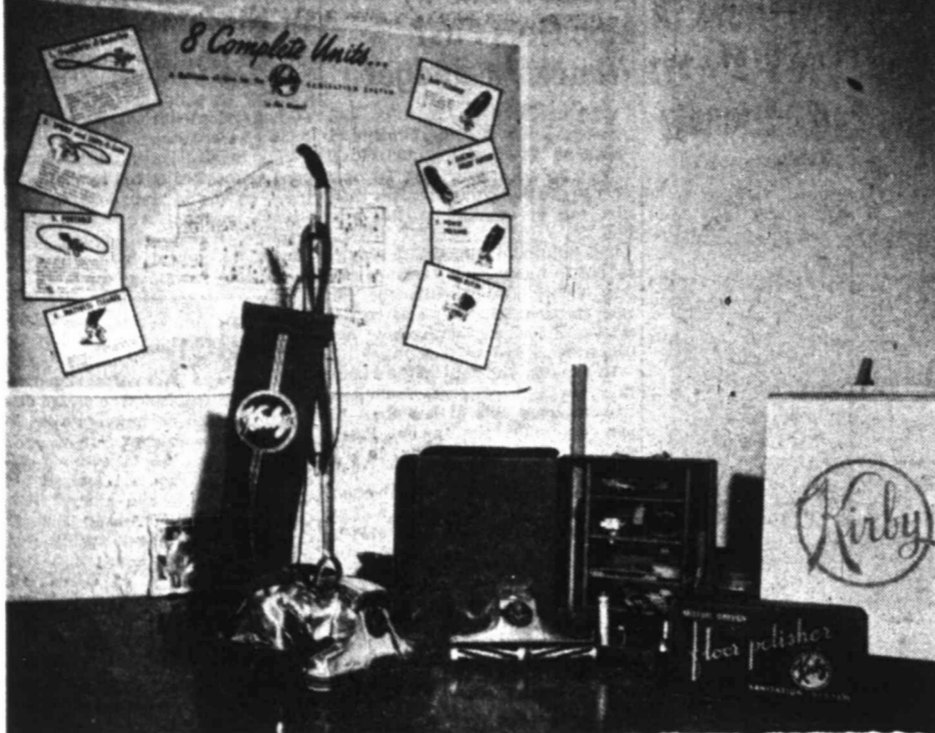

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### Father Cox, Leader Of Jobless March On Washington Dies

PITTSBURGH —(P)— The Rev. James R. Cox, one of the most striking figures of the depression years and one-time nominee for the presidency on a short-lived ticket, died Monday night.

The 68-year-old Catholic priest, nationally famous as a leader of a job-seekers' march to Washington in 1932, was stricken by a cerebral hemorrhage. He had been in failing health for several years.

He collapsed in the rectory of old St. Patrick's Church, where he had been pastor 28 years, and died a few hours later without regaining consciousness. At his bedside were the Rev. James L. Burns, his senior assistant, and others of the clergy who long had been associated with him in religious and social work.

Born March 7, 1886, in Pittsburgh, Father Cox sold newspapers on city streets to help pay for his education. Having known the rigors of poverty firsthand, he early became an outspoken champion of the underdog, a helper of struggling, confused youth. As a young priest, he drew both boys and girls off the streets, and taught them sports, dramatics and music. One of his boxing pupils was the late Harry Greb, world middleweight champion.

Army Of Unemployed  
Nation-wide attention first was focused upon him in January, 1932, when he set out from old St. Patrick's at the head of an "Army of the Unemployed." More than 20,000 men made up this army, and they traveled to Washington—in jalopies and trucks and on foot—to petition President Hoover for relief.

"It is jobs these men want—not charity," Father Cox declared. All along the way crowds gathered to watch the strange caravan and especially to glimpse the leader.

Later, Father Cox organized the "Blue Shirts" to further his program aimed at social and economic betterment of the masses, particularly the unemployed. At its peak, the organization claimed 300,000 members.

In August, 1932, Father Cox joined forces with "Coin" Harvey of Arkansas and a national convention assembled in St. Louis as the "Liberty Jobless" Party. But the two men split there, each then heading his own ticket.

Nominated For President  
Father Cox was nominated for the presidency at a meeting of some 50,000 in Pitt Stadium. He campaigned briefly, then withdrew, urging his supporters to vote for Franklin D. Roosevelt. After Roosevelt's election, the "Blue Shirts" were disbanded. Eventually Father Cox was named a member of the National Recovery Board in Pennsylvania.

Meanwhile, Father Cox intensified his efforts to relieve the distress of those out of work. He set up soup kitchens in this heavily industrial area, kept them going throughout the depression, and reckoned that in all more than 2,000,000 free meals were served.

Newspapers called him a frank and "picturesque man of the cloth." To many people he was "the pastor of the poor."

H. L. Mencken Leaves Hospital  
BALTIMORE —(P)— Baltimore's leading man of words, H. L. Mencken, is up and at 'em again. To a limited extent, anyway.

The 70-year-old critic and authority on the American language is leaving the hospital Tuesday for the second time in three years. Doctors had written him off when he went in last October 12 with a heart attack so severe he was not even expected to regain consciousness. Mencken did the next day.

Four weeks later he was demanding cigars and beer. The first news dispatch to be carried by telegraph was word of the nomination of Henry Clay for president by the Whig party on May 1, 1844, at Baltimore.

### Baltimore Mother's Story Of How Her Son Became Addict Sparks Anti-Dope Campaign

BALTIMORE —(P)— "Mom, I'm helpless." "Then you can't leave it alone," Mrs. X said in despair. That's part of how a mother told the Baltimore Evening Sun she finally realized her 18-year-old son was a dope addict.

He started smoking "reefers"—marihuana—she related. Soon, he was pawing possessions for a "needle"—heroin. Mrs. X said she then had to give him money for drugs.

"Oh, I know it sounds awful," she sobbed. "But I talked it over with my husband, and we didn't know who to turn to. We thought if we did anything else we'd get our child in trouble."

The son, Paul, now 18, is in jail. Mrs. X visits him and describes him rolling on the floor in agony, crying: "I got to have a needle! I got to have a needle!"

The story of Mrs. X and her son is one that has aroused Baltimore to an all-out battle against drugs. And a self-searching query how they can better help those who have succumbed.

Mrs. X tells how she and other worried parents tried to do their own investigating. Drive To Dance Halls They drove to dance halls and ice-cream parlors.

"It was all in the open. There were about 20 teen-agers in one place, she said. "Every one of them was under the influence of drugs."

"The boys were all wearing these drape suits, and the girls were in tight dresses, and their hair was bleached. Their eyes were all glassy, and their heads flopped this way, that way. It was pitiful."

She told police, "Catch them with the stuff," they said. "Catch them with the stuff," she says. "I see them out there every night, selling it—like candy."

Federal narcotics agents recently have caught several with the "stuff." Their court testimony told of the growing sale of drugs in Baltimore. Of peddlers giving it to teen-agers to make them addicts to build up a trade.

Getting Some Help  
Mrs. X is getting some help now, although it may be too late for her own jaded son. Parents from all over the city will respond to a "call to arms" Tuesday night at a meeting by the Citizens' Committee on Youth Problems. They'll map plans to fight drug addiction among Baltimore's youngsters.

Mayor Thomas D'Alesandro this week named an emergency youth council of leading citizens for the same purpose. And Monday he asked the city solicitor to study legislation to compel drug addicts to remain in a hospital until cured.

The city's legislators are joining the attack at the General Assembly now in session in Annapolis. House Speaker John Luber Monday night introduced a bill to confiscate any cars carrying drugs. Already signed into law is his bill to give mandatory prison sentences to anyone convicted of selling drugs to minors.

A Baltimore state senator also has introduced a bill to give progressively stiffer mandatory sentences to anyone selling drugs.

Registering Bookies Use Up All Blanks  
LOS ANGELES —(P)— The new police chief, William Parker, issued an order two weeks ago for all convicted bookmakers in Los Angeles to register at police headquarters.

The response was surprising and has created a problem. To date 1,027 persons have obeyed the order but now the police department has run out of forms for them to sign. Chief Parker said Monday a call has gone to the printer for additional forms.

Oklahoma City Bus Driver Questioned In Death Of Bride  
OKLAHOMA CITY —(P)— An Oklahoma City bus driver is being questioned in the death of his 68-year-old bride the day after she died her home to him.

An investigation dramatically halted Mrs. Minnie Bell Jones' funeral, and an autopsy revealed two minute stab wounds in her chest. Her bridegroom in secret, Jess M. Jones, 68, was arrested and held without bond Monday.

Lt. Wayne Harbolt of the homicide squad said it wasn't until her death last Tuesday that anyone knew of the woman's marriage January 30 to Jones, who rented a room at her home.

Relatives called Harbolt's attention to bruises about Mrs. Jones' head. A physician said one of the wounds entered the woman's lung and caused an internal hemorrhage. Death earlier had been attributed to a heart attack.

Kerrville Hospital Termed 'Sore Thumb'  
AUSTIN —(P)— The state owns a 240-bed hospital at Kerrville, but can't decide what to do with it. "Our plans are indefinite," Claud Gilmer of Rock Springs, chairman of the State Hospital Board, told a House committee Monday.

"I personally am not satisfied that Kerrville could be operated profitably from any standpoint. An institution needs 1,500 patients to be profitable. At the most Kerrville can take care of 240. "It is a sore thumb. All small institutions are."

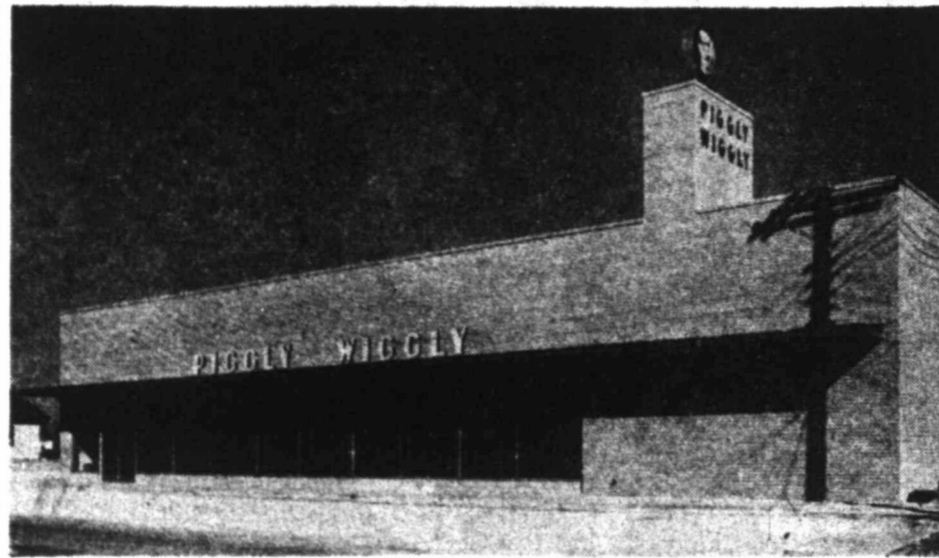

### Pakistan Reports Surplus Of Food

KARACHI —(AP)—While its Indian neighbor pleads for food, Pakistan still has a surplus of both rice and wheat, official sources here report. An economic deadlock over the question of exchange rates—Pakistan refused to devalue its currency when India joined other soft currency countries in a downward revision in 1949—has halted trade between the two neighbors.

Official sources said about 200,000 tons of rice in the Pakistan Province of Sind will be surplus in the crop year 1950-51. Most of this will be consumed in east Pakistan and in Ceylon. Of a similar quantity declared surplus in 1949-50 about 50,000 tons are still in Karachi awaiting disposal.

Approximately 175,000 tons of surplus wheat have been reported from Punjab, most of it from harvests which under normal conditions would be sold to India.

### Tire Without Noise Wouldn't Be Safe

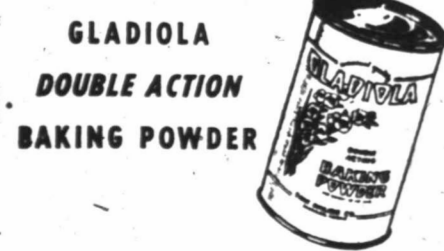

The ministry reported Indian manufacturers exported 44,047 large tires and 36,995 tubes in 1950 and other exporters shipped 12,500 sets of such tires and tubes. These went to numerous destinations, the ministry said.

### Leave Ruins Of Old Life, Build New, Widows Urged

NEW YORK.—(AP)—The married woman who finds herself a widow need not turn into a weeping willow, in the opinion of author Marjorie Hillis Roulston, who has learned through bitter personal experience.

As Marjorie Hillis, Mrs. Roulston wrote "Live Alone and Like It," in 1936. Several years later she married. After 10 happy years, she lost her husband through death. It was the following weeks and months that made her decide to write her new book, "You Can

plains "that I had pressing problems immediately after my husband's death. For a time, I was too exhausted, physically and mentally, to want to solve them. Grief is exhausting."

"But since they involved the disposal of two large houses, I was finally convinced that I couldn't delay any longer. Just disposing of those houses, in which my husband and I had lived happily, took all of my time for a while. After that I had to find and furnish a new apartment. When it was all over, I found I'd returned to some semblance of normal living."

But that doesn't mean that from then on the sailing was smooth. While she found it possible to be fairly cheerful during the busy daytime hours, Mrs. Roulston dreaded seeing the hands of the clock point to five, the hour when her husband used to come home.

"I finally made a habit of having people in at this time every night for a while," she says. "It kept me busy, kept me from thinking. It also helped me to establish a new pattern of entertaining, one in which I was hostess without the help of my husband."

The problem of friends is, for a widow, a very real one, Mrs. Roulston says. As a single woman, she felt she did not fit in with the married couples with whom she and her husband had been friends. So she picked an apartment in Manhattan and returned to the friendships she had had prior to her marriage. It worked out very well for her. She thinks there's a comparable solution for every widow who will try to find one.

A former magazine editor, Mrs. Roulston doesn't feel that she wants to return to a full-time staff job. She intends, instead, to continue with her writing.

"The older woman who must work," she says, "should content herself with a small job, particularly if she has never worked before or if she's been out of things for some time. I find that I just don't want to do as much as I used to do. The ideal solution for the widow in need of a job to supplement her income is a part-time job, one that isn't too exhausting."

"Mrs. Roulston does not believe that travel is an antidote for grief. "My friends, who meant well, urged me to go to Europe after my husband's death," she says, "but I didn't. I felt that traveling alone would only serve to emphasize my loneliness."

Beginning a new life alone means a complete readjustment, Mrs. Roulston emphasizes, and this takes time.

"But there can be a thrill in making this new life of your own," she maintains. "I don't mean that it will ever be a life as full as that you had when you were married, but it can be both stimulating and interesting. All you need is the will and the enterprise to begin again."

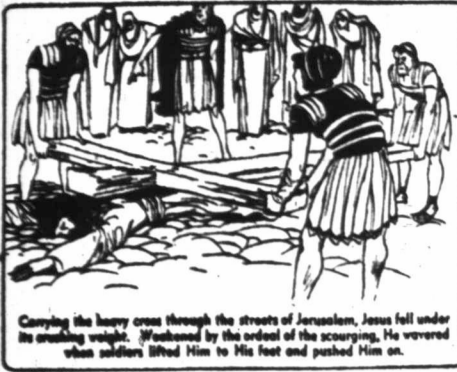

**Business Leader Says Faith Needed To Check Communists**

**NEW YORK**—(NEA)—For more than 60 days the American public has been on a dangerous buying spree. It's causing inflation. We have to stop or be overwhelmed by it. We've got to do something quick. The new controls may help but I doubt it.

I'm amazed at the short memories of people. Despite their experience only a few years ago with controls and rationing they still believe there is some magic in controls that will stop inflation and make everything easy.

Controls may be a necessary evil at this time. But higher taxes are needed just as much as ever if we are going to strike at the causes of the cyclonic inflation that is threatening our economy and making it cost more every day to re-arm ourselves.

Joe Stalin must be keeping his fingers crossed. He knows that steeper taxation is not politically expedient and doesn't win votes in a democracy.

But as I travel about the country, I talk with all kinds of people. I feel a great many citizens are way ahead of their representatives in Congress in wanting more taxes quickly rather than see their small businesses and incomes riddled by inflation.

At the risk of making myself unpopular, and speaking only for myself and not the NAM, I think we should increase taxes heavily on the \$5,000 to \$10,000 a year income group.

The inflationary force of the country originates mainly in that group. But Congress will hesitate to do anything about it. There are too many votes involved.

Instead, they probably will work

out some formula to keep the cost-of-living clause in wage controls. But they will try to increase taxes on corporations and the higher income brackets. Corporations don't have any votes. The big income group has only a few.

I think we should also have a general sales tax. Probably it

all unnecessary government expenses at this time, as recommended by the Hoover Commission.

We are not increasing war production fast enough. President Truman wants only 10 per cent more of our national production to go for war purposes, which means just 18 per cent for the July, 1951, to July, 1952, period.

**After Adjustments**  
I think we can do it easily with little or no shortages, once we have made adjustments for scarce materials of war production such as copper, tin and aluminum. But we also must stop scare buying. The only way we can talk to the Reds is through strength.

Nor can we check communism without another kind of strength. I mean the willingness to make sacrifices to save our way of life

for our children. Everyone must do his individual share, not pass the necessary sacrifices on to others.

If we trusted each other more we'd do a better job of defense. But we won't do that until we have regained faith in the essential decency of man.

That's why I believe strongly we must have a revival of our faith in God the way our forefathers had. It gave the founders of this democracy a moral toughness we lack.

I am convinced we are not teaching enough religion today in our homes, schools and churches. We need more than our economic and military strength to face this world crisis. We need also the spiritual strength religion has always given men.

**★ THE DOCTOR SAYS ★**

**Excessive Perspiring May Be Caused By Nervous Condition**

"What causes a person's feet to perspire the year round?" writes a reader. "Please explain why a person will perspire excessively even in cold weather," asks another. "Ever since I can remember I have perspired a lot. I try not to perspire but I can't help it," says still another reader.

It is easy to see how having a wet skin all the time could be an awful annoyance. A woman hit the nail on the head when she said she tried not to perspire but it happened just the same.

The reason is that the sweat glands lying in the skin cannot be controlled by the brain; the amount of sweat which they empty out is regulated by the sympathetic and parasympathetic nervous systems which act independently of the mental processes. They also control such things as blushing which most of us also have discovered cannot be consciously prevented.

Why some people are troubled with excessive perspiration and others are not is hard to say. True, occasionally abnormal sweating is the result of carrying too much fat, a toxic gopher, incomplete recovery from a serious illness or some other easily identified physical cause, but often it exists alone and in people who are perfectly healthy.

In such cases the finger of suspicion points at the nervous element and perhaps this is partly in-born rather than anything acquired. Some victims of excessive perspiration, for example, also show other nervous signs such as tendency to easy blushing, a spastic colon, or just being "high strung."

If, as is usually the case, no physical explanation can be found to account for the difficulty, what can be done? Anything which acts favorably on the sympathetic nervous system including appropriate exercise, exposure to sunlight, or frequent bathing might be expected to help. In other words the state of the general health is reflected to some extent in the actions of the sweat glands.

**Deodorants**  
Many of those who complain of perspiration do not have it all over, but in the hands, feet, arm pits or some other localized area. Frequently local applications with dusting powders or one of the deodorants and antiperspirants on the market helps.

Most of these contain an aluminum compound and seem to be perfectly safe. Finally, it may be said that worry about excessive perspiration certainly doesn't help any, and quite possibly may make it worse.

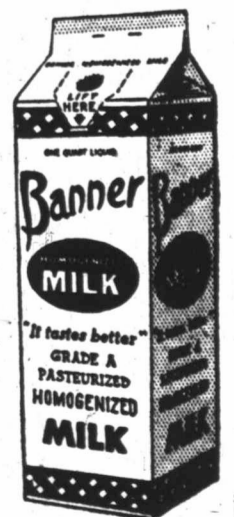

**"YOUR COMMISSION!"**  
We are ending the journey in our quest of abundant living. I would pause with my comrades of the Way to meditate on a verse which has spoken to me like a beating refrain down through many years: "In the presence of God who is the Life of all, and of Christ Jesus who testified to the good confession before Pontius Pilate, I charge you to keep your commission free from stain." (I Timothy 6:13-14, Moffatt.)

Your commission! You have a commission given to no one else—it is unique and different, for you are unique and different. God is opening a fresh book of revelation through your character and life. If you do not respond, if you hold back and frustrate His purposes, that book of revelation will never be revealed, and the world will be poorer—and so will you. thing on the inside but—emptiness. When I suggested he would have to live "within," he sighed and said there was nothing there. He had lost his commission—and himself. He has missed the purpose and the person. Had he taken the purpose, now his inner person would be rich and full and adequate and essentially undisturbed as the outer fades out. Here is the central treasure—your commission—keep that and, if all else goes, you have the one thing that matters.

Gracious Father, I have a commission from Thee. I feel that commission in my very bones. I have something at the center of life that makes life purposeful and meaningful. Help me to organize life around that one central fact, and not to organize this purpose around some triviality. For if I do, then I shall have a ceaseless whirl around a central emptiness. Quicken the sense of being commissioned! In Jesus' name. Amen.

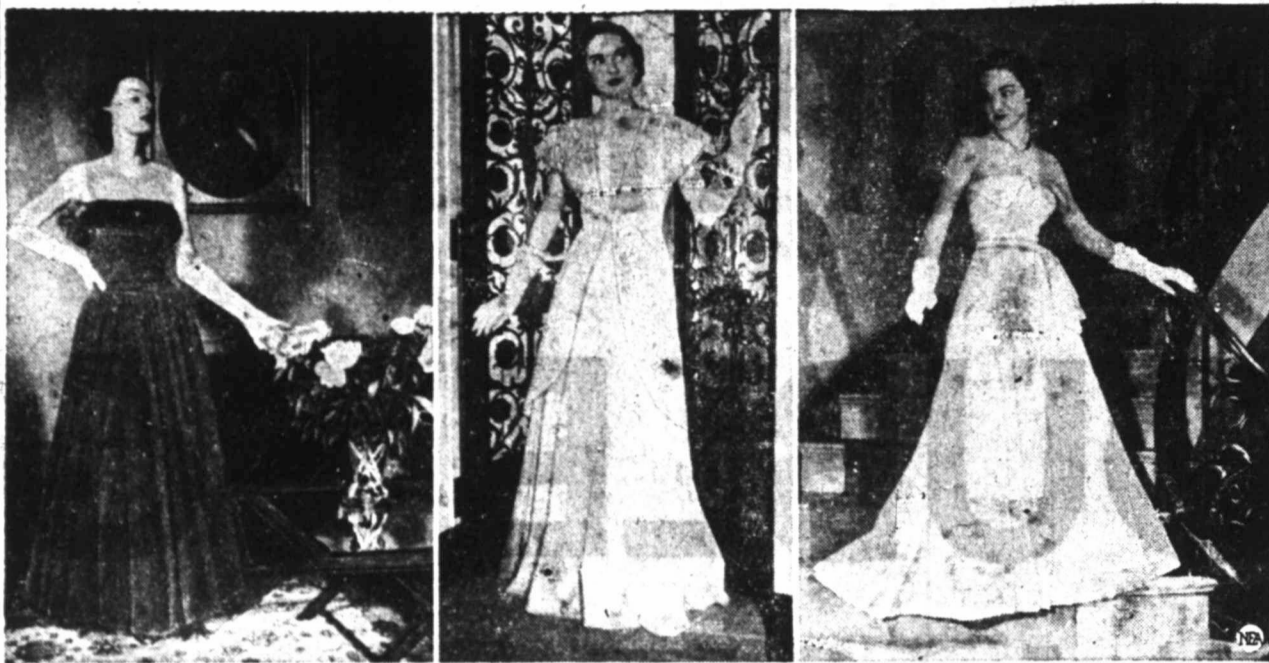

### Malaya Steps Up Japanese Imports
