

# Plan Would Give **Federal Payments** On Non-Crop Land

WASHINGTON - Conservation work done by farmers on noncrop federal land would be eligible for government payments under a bill ntroduced by Rep. Granger (Dem.)

The federal aid would be extended only to such projects as small Without Any Refill reservoirs and ditches built to improve nearby or adjoining crop lands on individual farms. Under the bill, such work would qualify the farmers for payments under the soil conservation and allotment act.

Granger said in a statement that a long-standing interpretation of the conservation law forbids such payments when the work is done on federal lands.

Many worthwhile projects in Utah and other states with large amounts of federal lands have been denied government payments under this ruling, he said. He explained that most water sources in western states are located on governmentowned forest or grazing lands.

# Atomic Reactor To Operate Ten Years

RALEIGH. N. C. - The world's first privately-owned and operated atomic reactor, here at North Carolina State College, will start with four gallons of a green-yellow liquid fuel about as heavy as ginger ale.

# Better Method In Treatment Of Infections Asked



# Air Force Eyes Ice Islands As Polar Outposts

FAIRBANKS, ALASKA -(AP)-In 10 weeks of good weather just ahead, American airmen hope to learn the secrets of huge "ice islands" that may be used as floating observation stations near the North pole.

The Air Force's 375th Weather Reconnaissance Squadron has found at least three of the mammoth ice cakes, the largest 18 miles long, 20 miles wide and an esti-mated 200 feet thick.

"There can be no question," says Lt. Col. Joseph C. Fletcher, commanding the 375th, "that they offer safe, stable platforms on which semi-permanent camps could be established."
