Veteran Covers Six Grades In 20 Months, Receives Diploma

CORSICANA—(AP)—Some doubted he would make it—or take it. Others said it was a "publicity stunt."

But 26-year-old Marvin Wheat surprised them all Friday night. He had earned a high school education with lightning speed—covering six grades in about 20 months.

And he was the big attraction at Corsicana High School's annual commencement. He was awarded a government "certificate of equivalency," which means he can enter college.

Some 1,200 persons cheered as the lanky war veteran—and father of two children—received the diploma. Wheat enrolled in the seventh grade at Sam Houston School here in the Fall of 1949. It was the first time he had been in school since the depression days of 1936.

The early-haired ex-GI, who won the Silver Star for his Pacific island-hopping activities during the war, went through courses so fast he never got to know his classmates very well. He was in the seventh grade just six weeks, completed junior high the next nine months, and graduated with the Corsicana High School class of 1951. His senior work included six weeks in summer school last year.

And his educational plans still aren't over. He hopes to enter Navarro Junior College here next Fall, if he makes enough money this Summer as a pipe line crewman.

Attractive Redhead Hauled Back To Safety From Ledge

SAN FRANCISCO—(AP)—An attractive 20-year-old redhead, who identified herself as Lois E. Mayo, a bookbinder and former student at the University of New Mexico, was hauled back to safety Friday from a dizzy perch on a ledge of Golden Gate Bridge.

A quick witted, husky-six-footer, James Lopes of Oakland saw her run from a halted cab and climb the railing. Stopping his own car, Lopes ran and grabbed her just as she appeared to be starting to jump to the cold waters of the Golden Gate, far below.

He hauled her back, kicking and scatching, to the roadbed of the bridge.

The taxi driver, Ralph Pherson, said Miss Mayo engaged him in San Rafael to drive to San Francisco, but that in the middle of the bridge, she jabbed a knife against his neck and ordered him to stop.

The girl declined to talk to police. They said they found a note which read:

"Dearest darling—I'm doing this so you can be happy. As for my sake don't worry."

Miss Mayo told officers she had been on a three-day "vacation" and had not slept since Wednesday night nor eaten for 48 hours. She fainted when they brought her a plate of soup. She was revived and taken to a hospital for observation.

Recovering from the shock of her experience, she told doctors: "My vacation is over. I hope I've still got a job."

U. S. 8TH ARMY HEADQUARTERS, KOREA

The Eighth Army Saturday clamped down the most restrictive regulations since censorship was introduced last December.

Until further notice, war correspondents can not identify allied units except as United Nations forces. They can not be identified by unit number or even nationality.

(This will not apply to stories of action prior to midnight, June 1.)

Areas of action may not be identified by commonly accepted front names. No stories may refer to the Western, West-Central, Central, East-Central or Eastern fronts.

However, correspondents may use such general terms as "The Imjin River area" for the Western front, "the Yonchon area" for the West-Central front, "The Whachon Reservoir area" for the Central front, "the Inje area" for the East-Central front, and "The Yangyang area" for the Eastern front.

Issued By Hutton

The new rules were issued by Lt. Col. Philip W. Hutton, chief censor, shortly after Lt. Gen. James A. Van Fleet, Eighth Army commander, told correspondents a stringent new set of censorship would be required by "the new phase the war has entered."

Other restrictions:

- No mention can be made of patrol bases or outpost line, or of the establishment of a defensive position or line.
- No mention can be made of small towns occupied by UN troops.
- No mention can be made of towns as reference points from which to measure distance or indicate direction.
- UN troops will not be identified precisely with any place name. Towns indicating general areas will be passed.
- The use of fronts in datelines will not be passed.

Mild Polio Year Forecast In Texas

AUSTIN—(AP)—State Health Officer George W. Cox Friday predicted a relatively mild polio year for Texas.

Cox noted that total incidence of the disease this year to date is 186 cases, compared to 905 over the same period in 1950.

The health officer was cautious about predictions, however. "Hot weather is later in coming this year than it was last," he warned. "That might explain the relatively low case reports."

Fifteen new cases were reported for Texas last week. They were concentrated in Nueces County, which had 10. Harris County had four cases, and Tarrant County had one.

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The Rural Electrification Administration has approved a \$50,000 loan to Cap Rock Electric Cooperative of Stanton, Texas.

Reds Lose Heavily In Italian Elections

ROME—(AP)—The full scope of the stinging defeat handed the Communists in local elections in Northern Italy was revealed Saturday in final figures published by the Ministry of the Interior.

The figures showed: 1. Premier Alcide de Gasperi's Christian Democrats won 34 of the 53 cities of more than 30,000 population. They formerly controlled 19.

2. The Christian Democrats won 109 of 152 cities with populations between 10,000 and 30,000. They formerly controlled 54.

3. The Christian Democrats took 1,870 of the towns under 10,000 with the Communists winning 689. The anti-reds formerly had 1,112. About 2,500,000 Sicilians will ballot Sunday for 90 deputies to the regional Parliament.

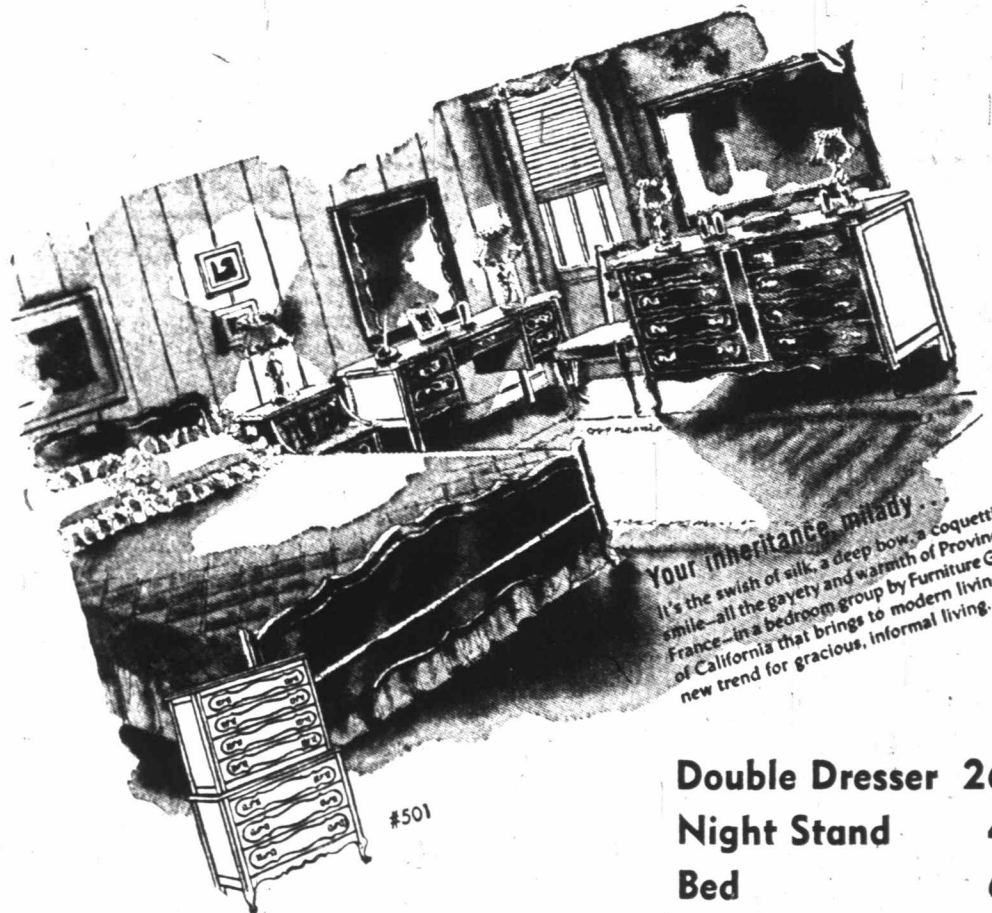

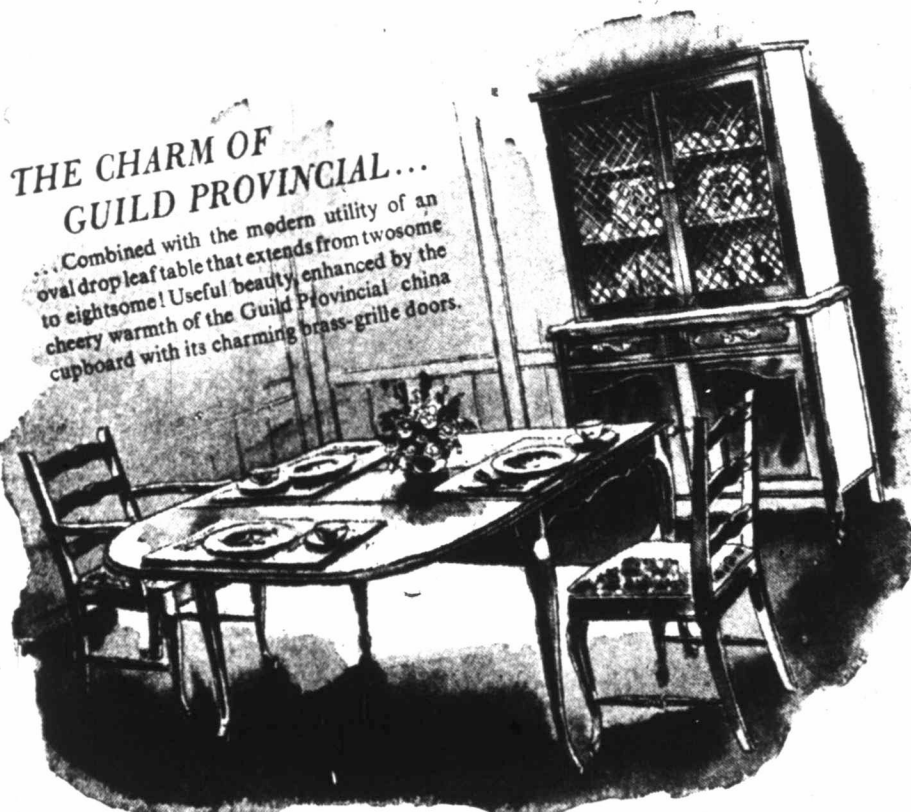

This brought a second contempt charge. Sam Serio, general accountant for the Maceo interests, and his assistant, R. N. Cox, were ordered to return at 10:30 a. m. Monday for further questioning. Other witnesses were excused until June 28, when a public hearing will be held. Maceo and Company's ledger accounts and other memoranda were produced by Serio after the committee threatened a contempt citation Friday if he continued to refuse to hand them over. Ferrantello was under examination most of Saturday morning. "I refuse to answer because it might tend to incriminate me," was Ferrantello's stock reply, according to Rep. Waggoner Carr of Lubbock, a committee member.

Behind Closed Doors
All proceedings were behind closed doors. Attorney General Price Daniel, State Police Director Homer Garrison, Jr., and a battery of half a dozen assistant attorneys general helped the committee frame questions. Dallas Police Chief Carl Hansson and Dallas County Assistant District Attorney Joe Geary aided in the investigation of Ferrantello. Hansson told reporters outside the Civil Appeals Courtroom, which served as a hearing room, that Ferrantello was a "fairly big-time" operator in Dallas. Ferrantello presented an affidavit telling the committee he would not produce records because they "would be incriminating and would be used against me on the trial of my case, if and when the same should go to trial." He referred to possible trial on a 1949 Dallas County indictment charging him with operating a gambling house. Committee members said the only two questions he answered were whether the sun was shining and whether he had on a blue jacket. The answer was "yes" in both instances.

Siata To Horse Racing
Ferrantello was ordered to appear before the committee again June 25. On hand from Galveston with Serio were Frank Maceo, cousin of the late Sam Maceo; Victor J. Ferrantello, a nephew, and R. N. Cox, Serio's assistant. While much of the Maceo business operations are legitimate, a considerable amount of their revenue comes from gambling, he indicated. Initial scrutiny of the records showed "five different accounts that the committee definitely considers are revenue from gambling," Meredith told reporters. "What kind of gambling?" he was asked. "It ranges from slot machines to horse racing," he replied, refusing to specify the other types of gambling involved. The near \$4,000,000 gross income, he emphasized, was from non-corporate earnings. Thus, the figure would not include earnings of such Maceo enterprises as Gulf Properties, Inc., a real estate holding company. It would include profits from such establishments as the swank Ballroom, the Turf Club and the Studio Lounge, all in Galveston. The records—nine pasteboard boxes full—were turned over to State Auditor C. H. Cavness and Assistant Attorney General Dan Gardner for safekeeping. Cavness and his staff will check the figures, which Meredith said reflected "a very complicated business set-up."

mean technical moves to halt the shooting. And then, he said, the next step would be to negotiate a settlement "which would lead to a real stabilization of the problem and the removal of the troops on both sides." Acheson declared truce must not be based on a question of seating the Chinese Reds in the United Nations or the Tiao of Formosa—points which the Reds have insisted must be a part of any agreement. "We take the position," he said, "that those questions are not a part of the settlement of the Korean difficulty." He added that when the shooting is over, the questions "can be discussed in channels." Senator Brewster (R-Maine) asked Acheson if the United States ever has considered recognizing Red China. "We are not contemplating it," Acheson replied, "haven't contemplated it, we have been against it x x x and we have opposed the entry of these people into the various organs of the United Nations." Questioned by Senator Johnson (D-Texas), Acheson said he did not think any of the United Nations Allies would pull troops out of Korea if MacArthur's plan to extend the war against China were adopted. "Do you believe they would?" Johnson asked. "I do not think that anybody would pull out and quit," Acheson said. And he denied that any of the nations had threatened to withdraw from Korea over the MacArthur proposals.

Disagrees With MacArthur
But he steadfastly opposed the general's war program which he said held the threat of another war while the Administration policy of a limited war is designed to avoid another world struggle. MacArthur has declared the fighting can end only in a "bloody stalemate" which holds the risk of war unless Red China is beaten by bombing, a naval blockade and the use of Chinese Nationalist troops in Korea and against the Chinese mainland. It was his public advocacy of these policies that led to the ouster by President Truman. But under direct orders from the President, Acheson refused to tell senators what was said at the White House meetings where MacArthur's dismissal was discussed. Senator Wiley (R-Wis) brought up the subject of the meetings attended by the President, Acheson, Secretary of Defense Marshall and Gen. Omar Bradley, chairman of the joint chiefs of staff. Acheson said Truman "is the sole judge of what he should disclose in regard to confidential private discussions with his own cabinet." He insisted the President has a right to order his subordinates not to disclose private conversations "and so far as I am concerned, that instruction will be obeyed."

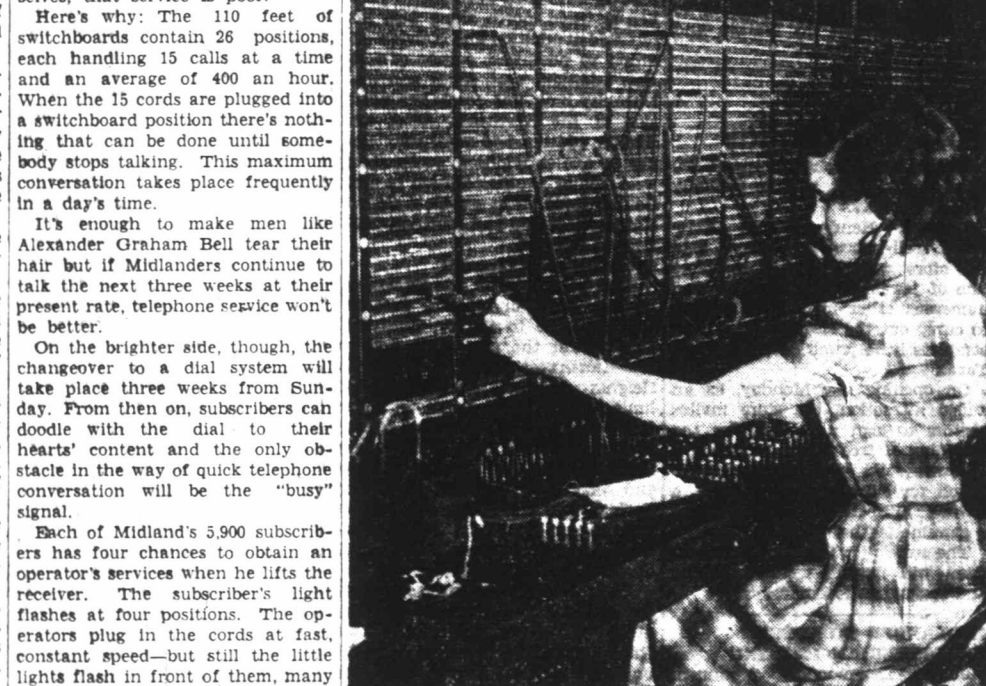

Midland Telephone Service Is True Lesson In Patience

By WICK FOWLER
Midland telephone service is a lesson in patience. But many callers feel the test before an operator answers the flashing lights. Midland residents, exasperated at the lack of speed in completing calls, blow off steam at the operators, who have heard every possible complaint that could be classified. A visit to the telephone exchange would show why service is slow—and it's not very often the fault of the operators. They'll say, themselves, that service is poor. Here's why: The 110 feet of switchboards contain 26 positions, each handling 15 calls at a time and an average of 400 an hour. When the 15 cords are plugged into a switchboard position there's nothing that can be done until somebody stops talking. This maximum conversation takes place frequently in a day's time. It's enough to make men like Alexander Graham Bell tear their hair out if Midlanders continue to talk the next three weeks at their present rate, telephone service won't be better. On the brighter side, though, the changeover to a dial system will take place three weeks from Sunday. From then on, subscribers can doodle with the dial to their hearts' content and the only obstacle in the way of quick telephone conversation will be the "busy" signal. Each of Midland's 5,900 subscribers has four chances to obtain an operator's services when he lifts the receiver. The subscriber's light flashes at four positions. The operators plug in the cords at fast, constant speed—but still the little lights flash in front of them, many impatiently flickering. They class those who anonymously abuse them with rude drivers of automobiles. "For some reason, some people act differently when driving than they do when walking," one said.

was inadequate. Al Case, Midland telephone manager, said the monthly call rate here has risen steadily until the manually-operated switchboard capacity has been exhausted. It's just outmoded and overkaded. When the dial system goes into effect, most of the operators now working at local boards will handle long distance calls. The number at the toll boards will be increased from 16 to 43. In the meantime, Midland will continue to be a busier city, telephone service will be inadequate and patience will be rubbed raw. And, as one critic admitted, "You may as well try to talk down a dust storm."

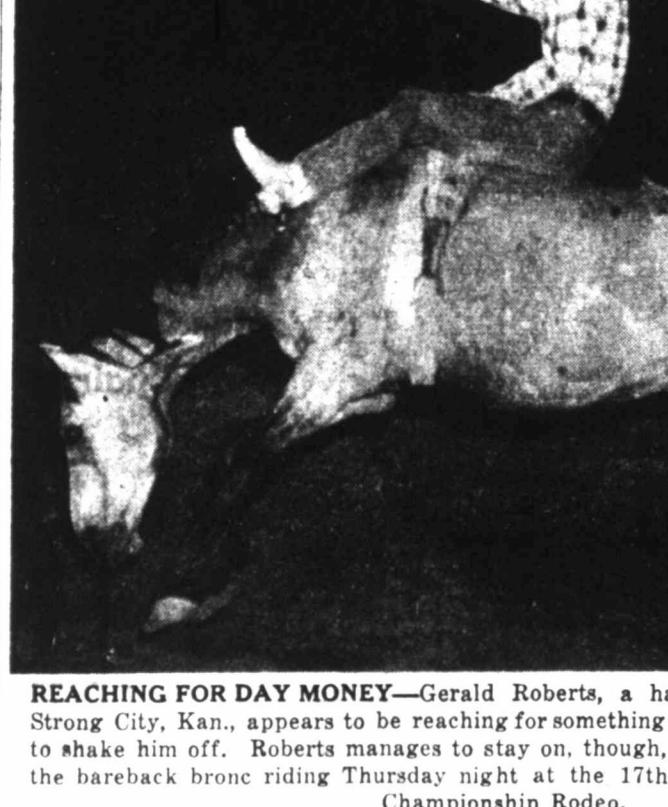
People Are Meaner In This War, Says 99-Year-Old Observer

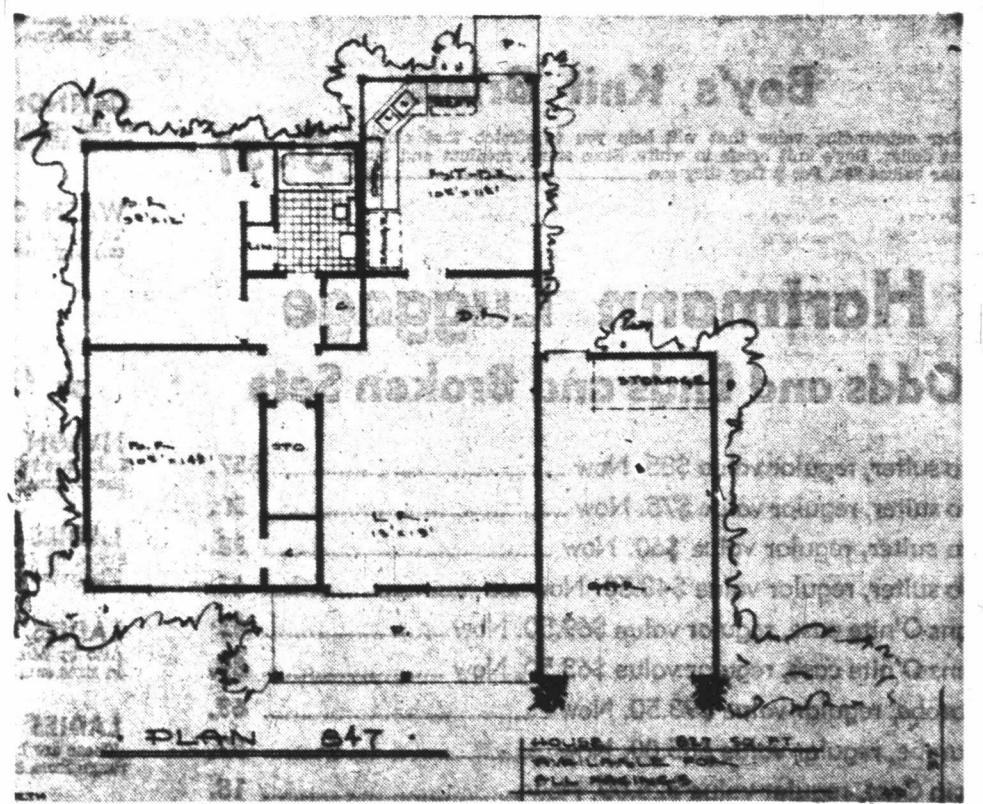
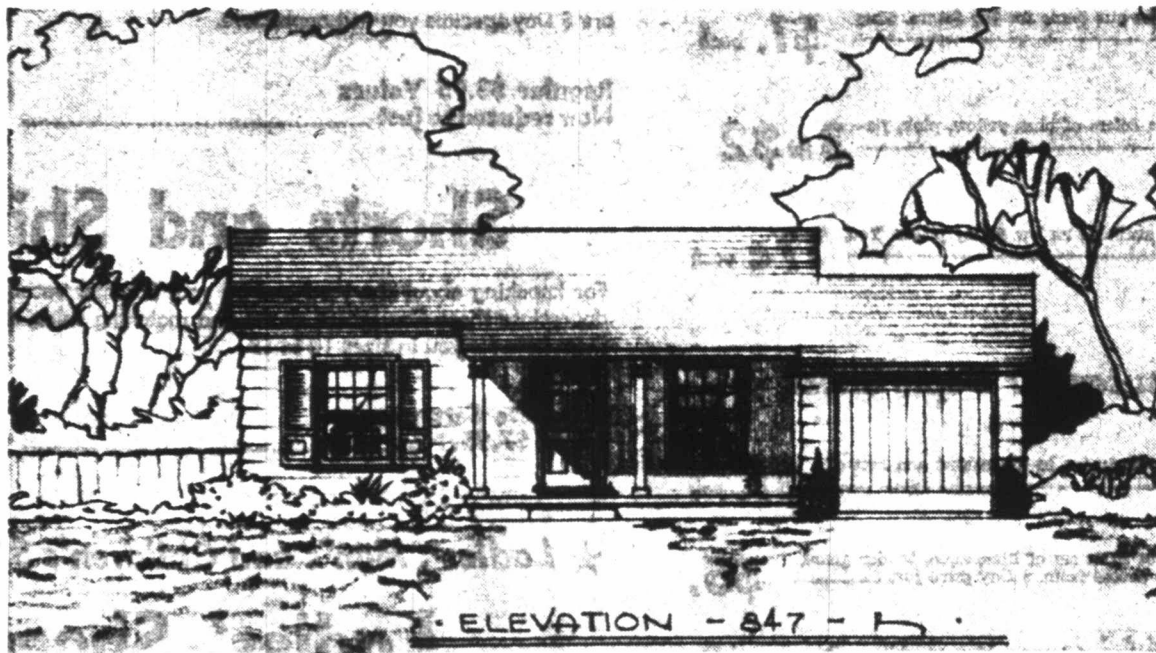

French Book Gets Uncle Sam Told Off, But It's Really Satire That Sells Job We've Done

PARIS (NEA)—Evil, brutish Uncle Sam gets told off in a neat little red, white and blue propaganda booklet circulating here. But it's sarcastic propaganda, and even Communists can understand that it does a pretty good job of selling America and the Marshall Plan.

On the surface, it seems to be telling a story of how cruel America (pictured as "The Man With the Cigar Between His Teeth") is to France. But the cruelty takes very pleasant forms. To wit:

"His misdeeds can't be counted. For example, he furnishes us, under the name of the Marshall Plan, carburetors which we lack, thus multiplying our traffic difficulties."

And it singles out Monsieur Metallo, one of America's victims. Uncle Sam was horribly vicious to poor Metallo. As the booklet tells it, this is what happened: **Princely Existence**

"This brave young man was living in sweet idleness, leading, princely existence. But The Man With the Cigar Between His Teeth saw all this.

"He brought machinery, raw materials. The factories reopened. Everywhere the big chimneys began to smoke again, the motors started to turn.

"Now this poor Monsieur Metallo works every day. No more unemployment compensation; he has to be content with pay hardly four times higher. And water on his dinner table has been replaced by wine.

"And this is not an isolated case! No! The same bad luck has happened to thousands, to dozens of

thousands of 'Metallos,' in the four corners of the lovely country of France."

Isn't Content

Sadistic Uncle Sam wasn't content with just improving the economic condition of the people. The booklet makes it clear that America's cruelty went much deeper than that.

"By inundating France and the Continent with his frightful drugs (penicillin, streptomycin, sulfamides), The Man With the Cigar Between His Teeth has condemned to partial unemployment one of our most active corporations (the doctor).

"Our old locomotives are unemployed, too, thanks to him, and replaced by frightful modern machines. And the venerable boats we

had left have been supplanted by steamboats, cargo boats, oil tankers and fruit boats.

"And our dear old oil lamps, relics of the Occupation! By putting our dams back in working order, he has made them useless. As for the wheat in our fields, it is harvested to the very last blade by his murderous engines."

Comparison Drawn

The booklet, illustrated with drawings that bite as much as the sarcastic text, next draws a comparison between diabolical Uncle Sam and benevolent Uncle Samovar, "the founder of the celebrated Marshal Plan (Marshal Stalin, of course)."

This latter is truly France's friend (sarcasm drips heavily here).

Listen to what the booklet has to say about Uncle Samovar's plan: "Everyone knows this wonderful work, of immeasurable social importance, destined to come to the aid of Europe's oppressed peoples. The system is simple: countries that accept this plan (and even if they don't accept it) Uncle Samovar all their agricultural, mineral and industrial products—including their men in time of war.

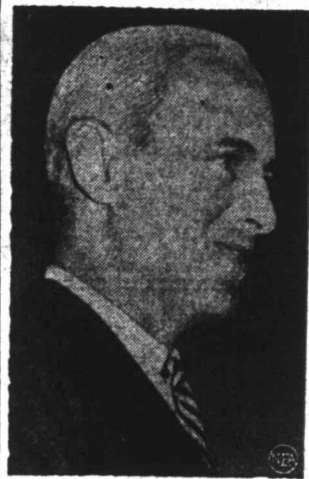
Has Answer

Why is Uncle Samovar so generous? The booklet has the answer to that one, too. His country is the land of the great artists, inventors and discoverers. Among them, in case you've forgotten, were "Leonardo Vichynski," who planted the Mona Lisa; "Cristo Colomboff," discoverer of America; "Edisonaki," father of the phonograph; and "Pascalov," immortal inventor of the wheelbarrow.

Finally, the booklet draws a comparison between the "wretched existence" of the workman "who groans in the chains" of Uncle Sam with the "little paradise" of Uncle Samovar's worker-citizens.

The pictures show the "wretched existence" worker has a home, car, washing machine, refrigerator, radio and a few assorted freedoms. The worker-citizen in the "little paradise" is pictured smothered by the famous "Handbook of Work" and surrounded by necessary rubber stamps.

Even sarcastically, Uncle Sam comes out ahead.

Korea War Comes To Sixth Grade Of Huntington's School

HUNTINGTON, IND. —(NEA)—The war in Korea and the tension in the rest of the world have suddenly come very close to the sixth-grade pupils in Huntington's Lincoln School.

They felt their teacher ought to be allowed to stay home and go on teaching because "if we had more teachers like him we would love school." And they thought the draft board ought to do something about it.

But Dean Stephan, 23, who is something of an idol to his young students, thinks teachers ought to go into the armed forces just like anyone else. When the school year ends, that's just what he's going to do.

This Spring, when Stephan first got his draft notice, the Lincoln sixth-graders decided they'd better take some action. Acting as their spokesman, 12-year-old Jean Elsten promptly took her case to the Huntington Herald-Press.

Asking For Help
"Dear Editor," Jean wrote. "We pupils are from Lincoln school. We have a teacher, Dean Stephan. We think very much of him. He comes to visit our children in his spare time. He tries to do everything possible to make us like school."

"We are begging you to help us, to not draft our wonderful teacher. He said if he wasn't drafted he would teach us next year. And I think if we had more teachers like him we would love school. . . . I am signing this letter for all our Lincoln children. I am looking for an answer soon."

Jean got her answer quickly, although it was not quite what she expected. Herald-Press Editor Howard Houghton replied on page one, right under the Korean war headlines. In his lengthy letter back to Jean, he wrote:

"What you say of your teacher is proof that he is a fine leader of boys and girls. There is no doubt that he belongs in the schoolroom, guiding his pupils by precept and example and inspiration, along with the lessons from the text books."

"If the world today was the kind of world in which everybody could be doing what he does best and what he rightly should be doing, then there would be no question about your teacher remaining with you."

"But there are evil men in the world who do not believe in boys and girls having the teachers they want. . . . The boys and girls in their schools are taught to fear and hate. . . . These men are not satisfied merely to rule their own countries that way. They want to

way even more necessary, must serve a certain time in the armed forces of our nation. . . .

"Your teacher will not ask any further deferment. You may be before the board. . . . and tell why you want him to remain with his pupils. I will go with you if you wish. . . . And if your teacher, in spite of your wishes, goes to the armed forces, you must be a soldier, too."

"Because, you see, if your teacher must go to the Army for a time, it will be because he must help make a world where boys and girls may go to a school like you have, and grow up to be free men and women."

While Jean was studying her front-page answer, Stephan was granted a temporary deferment. Adam Wall, Lincoln school principal, had gone to the draft board without Stephan's knowledge.

Stephan, an Indiana University graduate and son of Huntington's school superintendent, says a lot of other men his age have gone into the armed forces on the first call.

It isn't called by the end of the school year, he hopes to enlist.

Jean and the other sixth-graders, who now know they must be soldiers too, promised they would stop trying to keep their teacher out of the Army.

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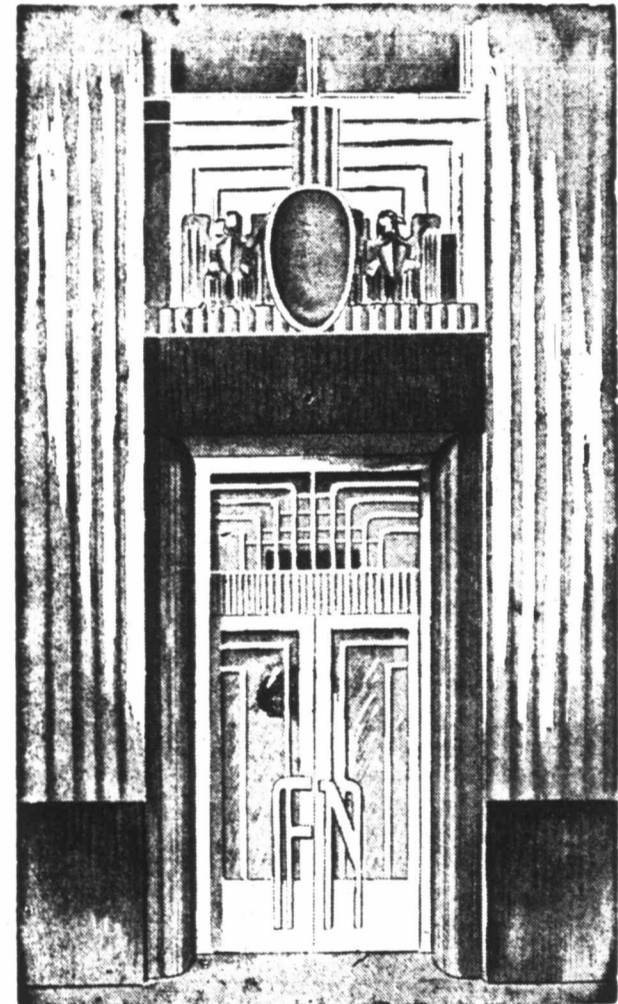

Name-Changing For Friendship's Sake

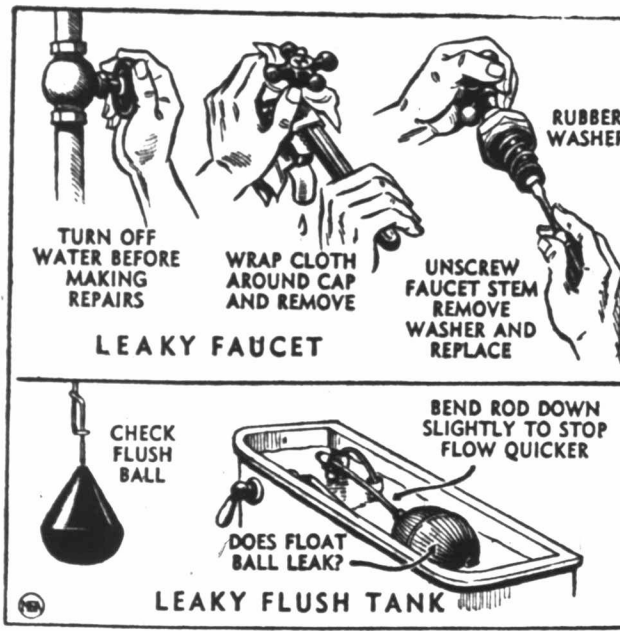
SAN FRANCISCO—The Chinese Reds have come up with a new idea on how to win friends and influence people—changing place names that are "derogatory to national minorities."

Leaks Are Repaired Easily

Little things can add up to a major nuisance. The drip, drip, drip of leaky plumbing, for instance, not only raises hobs with your attempts to count sheep at night, but produces a nasty shock when the bill comes in from the water department.

That slow dripping sound generally indicates the sort of leak you can fix yourself. Most of the time it's nothing more than a worn-out washer. Since washers take a beating every time you turn the water on and off, they're bound to wear out from time to time, and pretty soon you'll get in the habit of keeping a supply of various sizes in your tool kit.

It may sound superfluous, but remember to turn off the water leading to a fixture before you start your repair job. Almost all plumbing installations of recent vintage have shut-off valves on the pipes below the faucets; if yours doesn't, shut off the main water supply.

Then wrap a cloth around the faucet cap, loosen it with a wrench, and unscrew just that much short. In the court house here, boosted prices to meet the cost of living and right away the change started costing him money.

If the leak isn't a drip from the end of the faucet, but a sort of weeping up through the cap, remove the cap nut and replace the packing washers.

Sometimes you'll find the faucet leak where they're attached to the supply pipe. For some reason this happens most often with faucets for hose connections outside the house or in the garage. Cotton string wound tightly around the connecting threads and daubed with a plumber's compound will do the trick nicely.

Flush tanks on toilets that never seem to stop running usually have something wrong with the flush ball which drops down and stops water from running out of the tank, or with the float ball, which shuts off the water when the tank is full.

Other Tips Cited

If it's the flush ball, it's probably worn out like a faucet washer, and needs replacing. If the float ball is at fault, bending the float rod slightly so the water stops coming in before it reaches the top of the overflow tube ought to do the trick. Sometimes the float ball springs a leak and since it no longer floats, needs replacing, too.

When a length of pipe springs a leak, the best permanent repair is to shut off the water leading to that pipe and call your plumber, since most homeowners don't keep pipe, cutting tools and threading machines around the house.

Plumbers can't always turn up the minute you want them, however. One emergency repair most homeowners can accomplish with materials at hand is to tightly wrap a thick layer of rubber tape around the leak. Or you can cut out the leaking section and replace it with a length of rubber hose fastened to the ends of the rest of the pipe with hose clamps. By the time you've fiddled around with this, though, chances are the plumber will have turned up.

Insulation Of Home Cuts Air Conditioning Costs In Two Ways

The costs of a home air conditioning system for summer comfort can be reduced if the home is properly insulated, according to American Builder magazine.

There is an initial saving in the installation, the publication points out, because a smaller, less expensive air conditioning unit can be specified for a well insulated building.

Insulation, it is added, also can produce economy in operation by reducing appreciably the amount of time that the air conditioning equipment needs to be run to maintain comfortable indoor temperatures. Reducing operating time, of course, cuts power costs.

Among materials available for home insulation, one of the most popular is structural insulation, which both builds and insulates. Known also as insulating board, it is made in the forms of sheathing, lath, building board and interior finishes.

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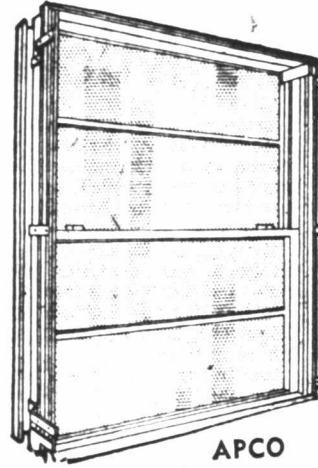

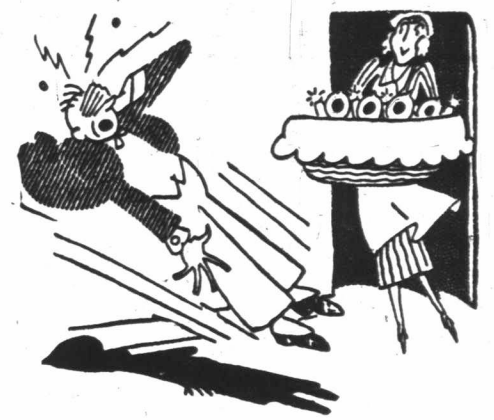

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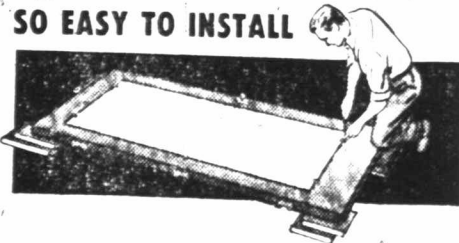

Burro Club, Headed By Native Texan, Becomes Washington Institution

WASHINGTON—(AP)—“The Burro Club of Capitol Hill,” organized only last year with John Hardesty of Texas as its president, already has become a Washington institution.

The club, made up of 110 male secretarial employees of Democratic Representatives, has built a reputation for lively programs mixing fun with serious business.

The club holds twice-monthly luncheons at which top government executives talk and answer questions. Occasionally the club throws a strictly social affair. “We have to carry on a lot of business with these officials by telephone,” said Hardesty in explaining the purpose of the organization. “Therefore, we’d like to know them personally, or at least get an idea what they look like. By the time we get through questioning them, we have a lot better picture of the way their particular agencies operate.”

Hardesty is an aide of Rep. Omar Burleson of Anson. So many requests come to the average congressman that he must entrust many of them to members of his staff. A large number of the requests involve conversations with important federal officials.

Hardesty is a Luncheon Guest Last week the Burro Club had Dillard Lasseter, head of the Farmers Home Administration, as a luncheon guest. In line with the policy of lining up speakers whose departments or divisions are in the

forefront of the news, the club scheduled assistant secretary of state George McGhee as its next speaker.

Originally from Dallas, McGhee is in charge of the department's office of Near Eastern, South Asian and African Affairs. The trouble spot of Iran, with its vast oil reserves, is one of his concerns.

A two-year-old orphan girl of Japanese-American blood soon will be able to come to America with her adopted parents, Air Force Sergeant E. H. Shelton, Jr., of Palestine, Texas, and Mrs. Shelton.

The East Texas airman and his wife, living in Japan for three years, fell in love with the little orphan whose American father is unknown. They formally applied to adopt her and bring her to the United States, but learned that because she is half Japanese she is excluded under the immigration laws.

So they wrote Rep. Tom Pickett of Palestine of their problem. He introduced a bill on January 9 and asked prompt consideration because Sergeant Shelton was expecting to be transferred from Japan.

With unusual speed, House and Senate committees approved the measure. Last week President Truman signed the Pickett bill exempting Jacquelyn from terms of the Immigration Act of 1924.

Sergeant Shelton and his wife, the former Elizabeth Durham of Palestine, submitted to the congressional committee numerous references from prominent East Texans.

The sergeant's father was the late Emmett Hank Shelton, one-time county judge of Anderson County and owner of a cotton gin and other properties in Palestine.

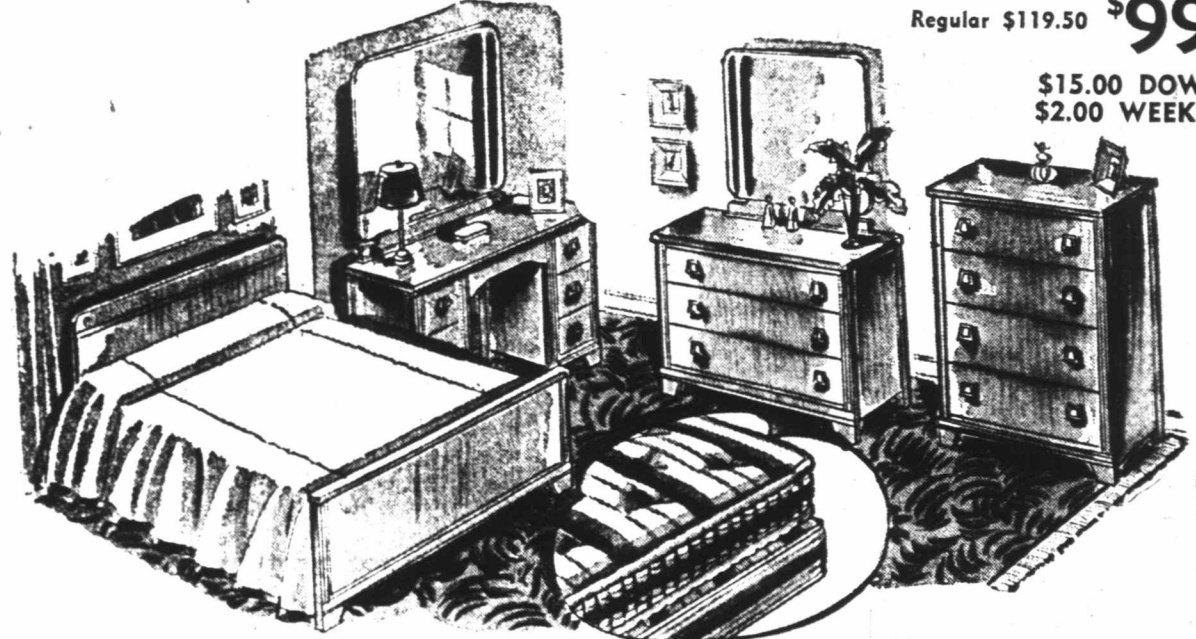

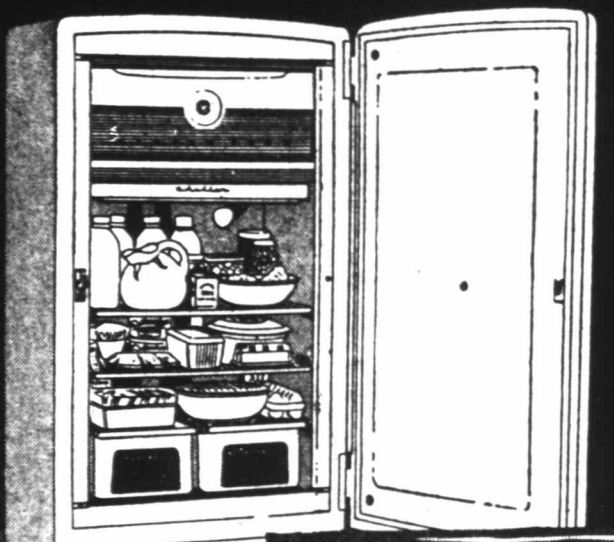
