They are both in their early fifties and their youngest child, a daughter, is a college student. For the most part theirs has been a good marriage. But three years ago, the husband began an affair with another woman. It is ended now and he assures his wife that his family means more to him than anything else. All he wants is a chance to make up for the past three years.

She wants to accept him on those terms but is finding that it isn't as easy to forgive and forget as it is to promise to do so. "I go along fine for a few days," she writes, "thinking everything will be all right again and then all the hurt and disillusionment seems to overwhelm me, and I wonder if I can go on living with him. I had so much faith in him that it has been a terrible shock. How can I forget and go on living as though this had never happened?" You can't. For it did happen. You can't hope to either forget or have the same kind of faith in your husband's love that you once had. But you can be happy again. If your husband is sincere about how important his family is to him, you can in time rebuild your marriage and make it strong again.

To be happy again is going to take a lot of determination and willpower. You can't forget the other woman but you can make your-

self stop brooding about her. You don't forget a serious illness once you recover. But you don't let the thought of how bad it was dominate your thoughts once the illness is conquered.

Try to take that same attitude toward the past three years. They brought you great unhappiness. They might have wrecked your marriage for good. But they didn't. So don't let yourself go on brooding about them.

Realize that though you may have been blameless in what has happened, you have got to go more than half way in rebuilding your marriage.

Show your husband that you still love and respect him, that you want to spend the rest of your life as his wife, that he is important to you. Convince him of that, not by talk, but by your attitude toward him. You will have strengthened the foundation of your marriage. Don't ever think you can't go on. You can.

Trans-Miss Finalists Fail To Qualify In Texas Amateur

CORSICANA — Match play opened Thursday in the Texas Amateur Golf Tourney with 19-year-old Wesley Ellis, Jr. of the University of Texas, at the top of the upper bracket because he led the star-studded field in the qualifying round.

Ellis laid down a two-under-par 68 over the rugged 6,350-yard Corsicana Country Club course Wednesday to capture medalist honors. He finished one stroke better than John Oliver of Dallas.

Ellis played Bobby Lee Walcott of Austin Thursday in the first round. Oliver played Harold Clark of Waco.

The course, made extremely tough because of its poor condition after freezes of the winter and no rain this summer, proved a nightmare to such stars as L. M. Crannell, Jr. and Don Addington of Dallas, finalists last Sunday in the Trans-Mississippi Tournament. Crannell, Trans-Miss champion, shot a 79 and lost out in a playoff with five others for championship flight berths. Addington had an 80 and failed to qualify.

The only player other than Ellis and Oliver to flirt with par was John Stammer of Longview. Stammer managed to equal it.

There will be two rounds of match play Thursday, two more Friday and the 36 hole finals Saturday.

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Tornado Cuts Path Through Virginia's Capital; Five Hurt

RICHMOND, VA. — More than 100 persons were homeless in this city of 230,000 Thursday as the costly aftermath to a zig-zagging tornado that produced upwards of \$1,000,000 damage.

The tornado cut across a wide section of the city late Wednesday, leaving the one-time Confederate capital in its most mangled-up condition since Grant's armies laid siege to it during the Civil War.

The twister toppled trees, ripped off roof tops, flipped automobiles over in the air and blew down scores of telephone poles.

Nobody was killed. Five persons were injured, but none was reported in serious condition.

However, the damage was extensive. City Manager Sherwood Reeder estimated it would easily exceed \$1,000,000. Robert Glover, chairman of the Red Cross Disaster Committee, guessed it might total as high as \$4,000,000.

City Building Inspector William Wharton said more than 50 and perhaps as many as 100 homes would have to be condemned as unsafe.

The tornado roared in at 4:10 p.m., hitting first a west end residential neighborhood. It then snaked across midtown, striking hard at a negro residential section, and finally dying out in the northeast end of the city.

Jury Difficulties Again Delay Trial Of Negro Sergeant

RIVERSIDE, CALIF. — The murder trial of Sgt. Lawrence J. Walker is in recess until next Tuesday when another jury panel of 40 will be sworn.

The young negro's attorneys declared in a statement that the prosecution is thwarting the court's efforts to give him a fair trial by exercising peremptory challenges against negro and Mexican American members of a special panel.

District Attorney William O. MacCree has exercised nine of his 20 peremptory challenges, two against negroes, two against Mexican Americans. Defense lawyers Crispus Wright, Leon Branton and Everett Porter issued a statement saying these four prospective jurors were "excellently qualified to serve as unbiased jurors."

The special panel, requested by Walker's negro counsel, was just about exhausted when court adjourned Wednesday. The original panel was discharged because the defense contended it did not constitute a representative cross section of Riverside County residents.

Walker, who has been stationed at March Air Force Base, is accused of slaying Richard Cook, 19, and his wife, Doris, also 19, near here last March 26.

Old Timer To Trade Old-Time Olds For Brand New Version

BEDFORD, PA. — An 81-year-old Virginia real estate man halted momentarily here Wednesday, cleaned the lone sparkplug in his 1902 Oldsmobile and then rolled on his way again toward Lansing, Mich.

William A. Worth of Petersburg is jaunting over plains and rugged mountain terrain to Michigan to make an even swap of his antique automobile for a brand new one promised by General Motors.

The company offered Worth the same trade in 1947 but he turned it down.

Deadlock On Japanese Peace Treaty Broken

LONDON — Britain and the United States are reported agreed to let the Japanese decide for themselves whether to sign a peace treaty with the Chinese Communists, Nationalists or neither government.

Informed sources said this was the basis of an agreement reached Wednesday which apparently solves the British-American deadlock over which Chinese regime should participate in the Japanese treaty.

The decision still is subject to approval by the British cabinet.

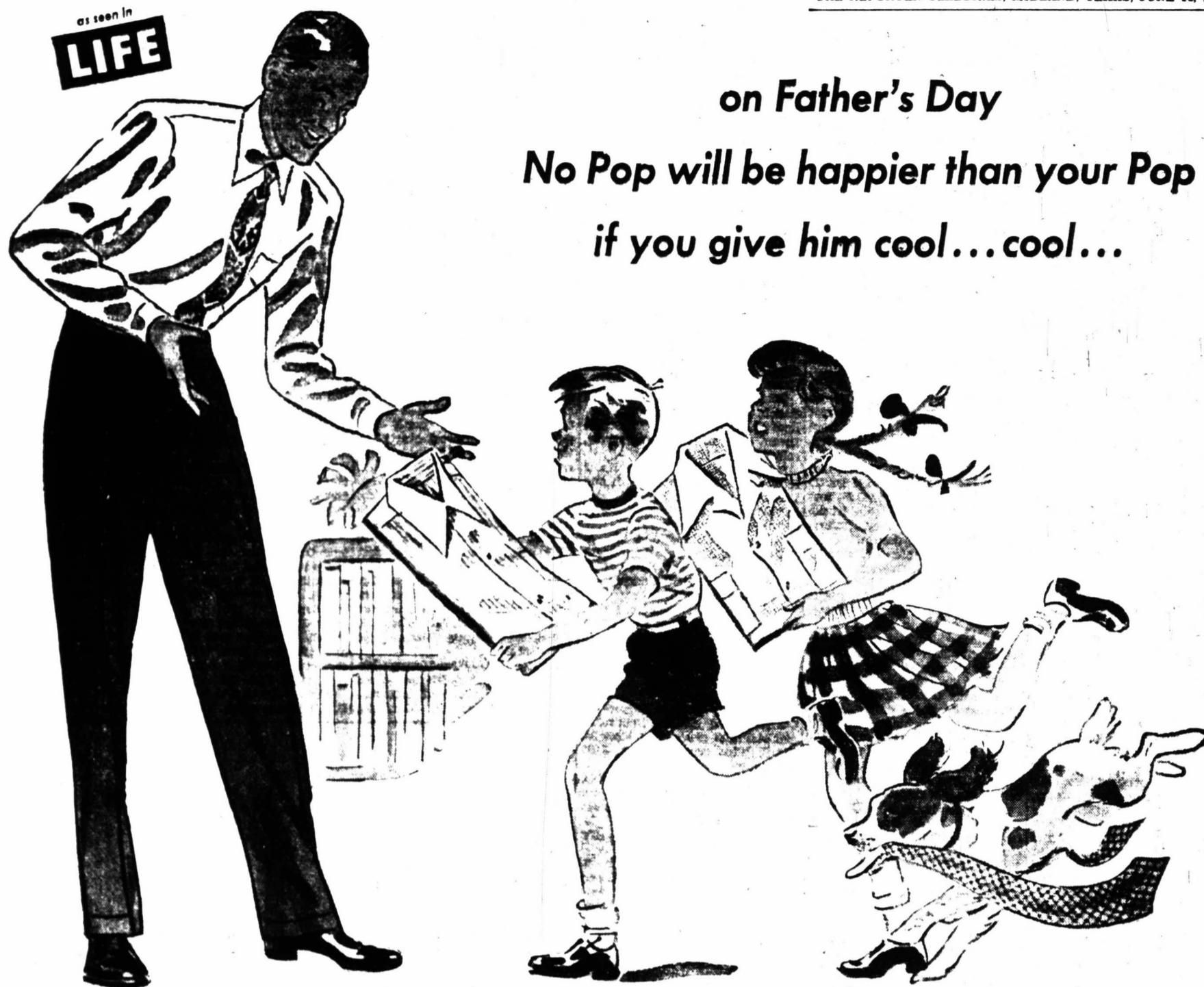

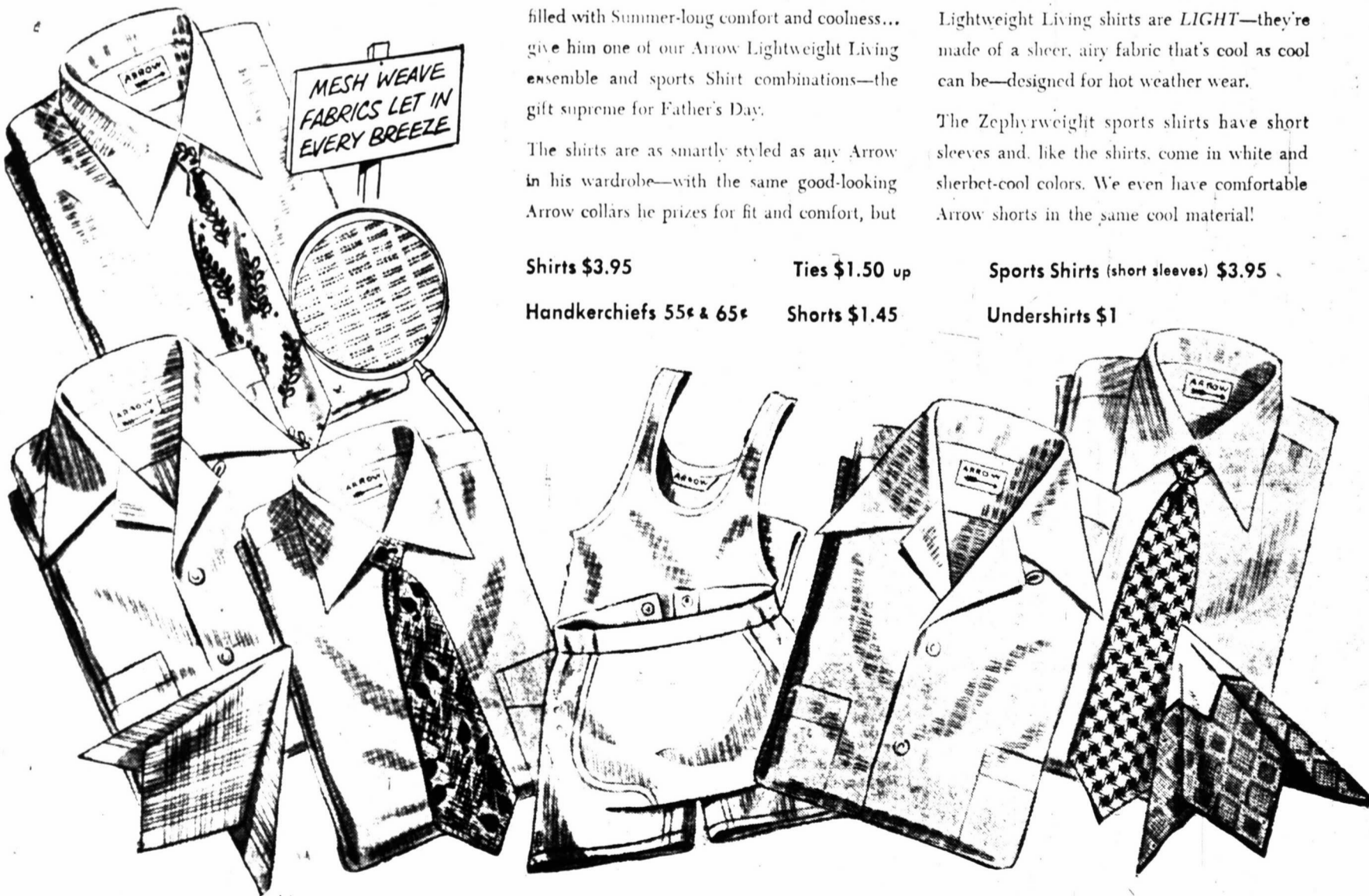

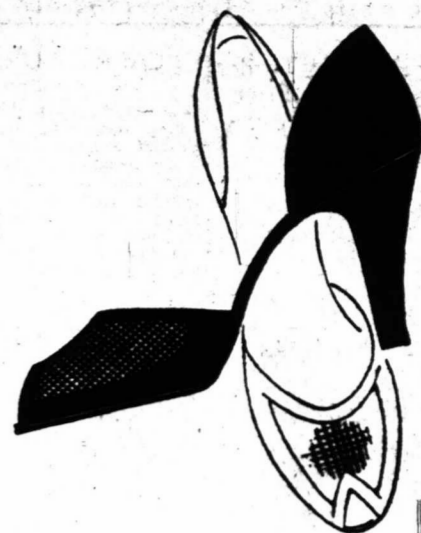

The occasional person who gets such a reaction but it does seem to be a sort of individual poisoning. Recovery usually takes place. Agranulocytosis is also a condition in which the number of white cells is lessened and this usually is ushered in with a sore throat.

So far as is known neither granulocytopenia or agranulocytosis is related to leukemia. In the latter some of the white cells grow wild; they generally are increased in number—sometimes enormously—and appear in the blood in immature and abnormal forms.

The acuteness of the process and the special kinds of cells present determine the particular name attached to the leukemia and influence to some extent the outlook.

This is by no means a complete discussion of the questions asked, but perhaps it will help the inquirers to know why they were confused.

Easy To Make Bride's Cake

Will there be a June bride in your home? Are you wondering how to cut expenses a little? Then here's a beautiful answer—make the bride's cake yourself. How? It's simpler than you think. Here are short-cuts to a wedding cake that will do you and the bride proud.

Start with plain cake layers bought at your favorite baked goods counter. If you prefer to do the complete job yourself, then simplify it by using an instant white cake mix for the layers. Let coconut take over the major portion of the decorating. Drifts of snowy lacy coconut on the top and bottom layers set off effectively the in-between layer. Here you can concentrate with frosting festoons and flowers. Instead of the usual bride and groom, top your wedding cake with a double-ring decoration for an original and charming touch.

Wedding Cake Frosting

One cup uncolored fortified margarine, 8 cups sifted confectioner's sugar, 3 1/4 cup milk (about), 4 teaspoons vanilla, 1 1/2 teaspoon salt, 2 packages (3 cups) shredded coconut.

Cream margarine; add part of the sugar gradually, blending after each addition. Add remaining sugar, alternating with milk, until of right consistency to spread. Beat after each addition until smooth. Add vanilla and salt and blend. Frost cake and decorate with coconut.

To Frost the Cake:

Prepare wedding cake frosting as directed above. Use 2 oblong or square layers of baker's cake. However, trim off some of the second layer to make it a little smaller than the bottom layer. To make top layer, frost together the strips cut off the second layer. Place first cake layer on flat oblong serving plate or tray. Spread top generously with frosting, sides thinly. Top with second layer, centering evenly; frost top generously, sides thinly. Top with third layer, centering evenly. Frost top generously, sides thinly. Spread frosting generously on sides of cake. Sprinkle coconut on top and bottom tiers, leaving center tier uncovered. Use remaining frosting with cake dec-

orator tube to garnish middle tier with roses, leaves and garlands.

To Make Double Wedding Rings: Cut two small rings of cardboard. Cover these rings with frosting. Then carefully place silver dragees around top half of one ring to resemble diamonds in the bride's ring. Place rings on top of cake.

NOTE: Butter may be substituted for the uncolored margarine in the frosting recipe, but this will give a cream-colored frosting. An all-white appearance will be obtained if uncolored margarine is used.

Grandpa Bruhnke Looks Forward To Birthday No. 102

MCHENRY, ILL.—(AP)—Julius Carl (Grandpa) Bruhnke will be 102 years old Sunday.

Long Trek Into Desert Is Taken By Soldiers

TRIPOLI.—(AP)—Three officers and 15 men from the British First Infantry Division are back home after a 3,000 mile trek into the Sahara Desert.

Travelling in jeeps and accompanied by a recovery vehicle and two three-ton trucks, the party visited the French Foreign Legion stationed in the remote Fezzan area. The combined party held a memorial ceremony at Murzuk in the Fezzan, honoring French Colonel d'Ornana and New Zealand Sergeant Hewson, who were killed in a raid on Murzuk in January, 1941. This was the first operation of the Free French from Lake Chad.

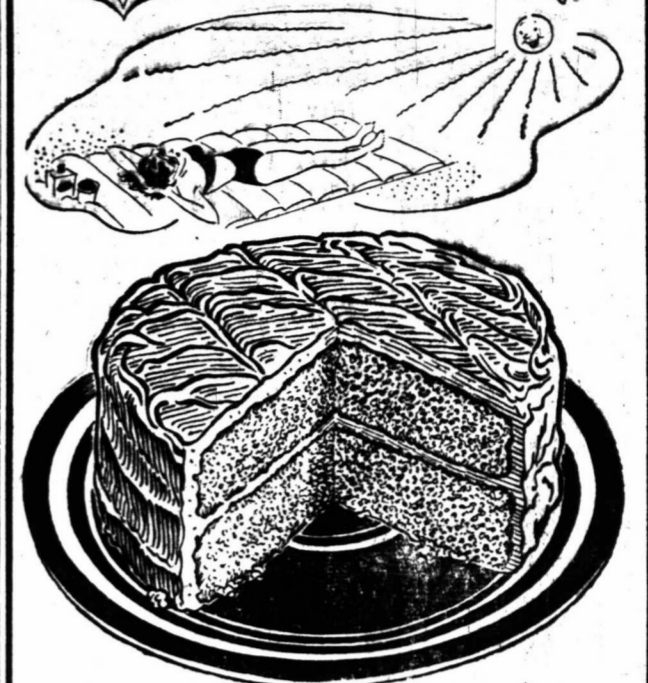

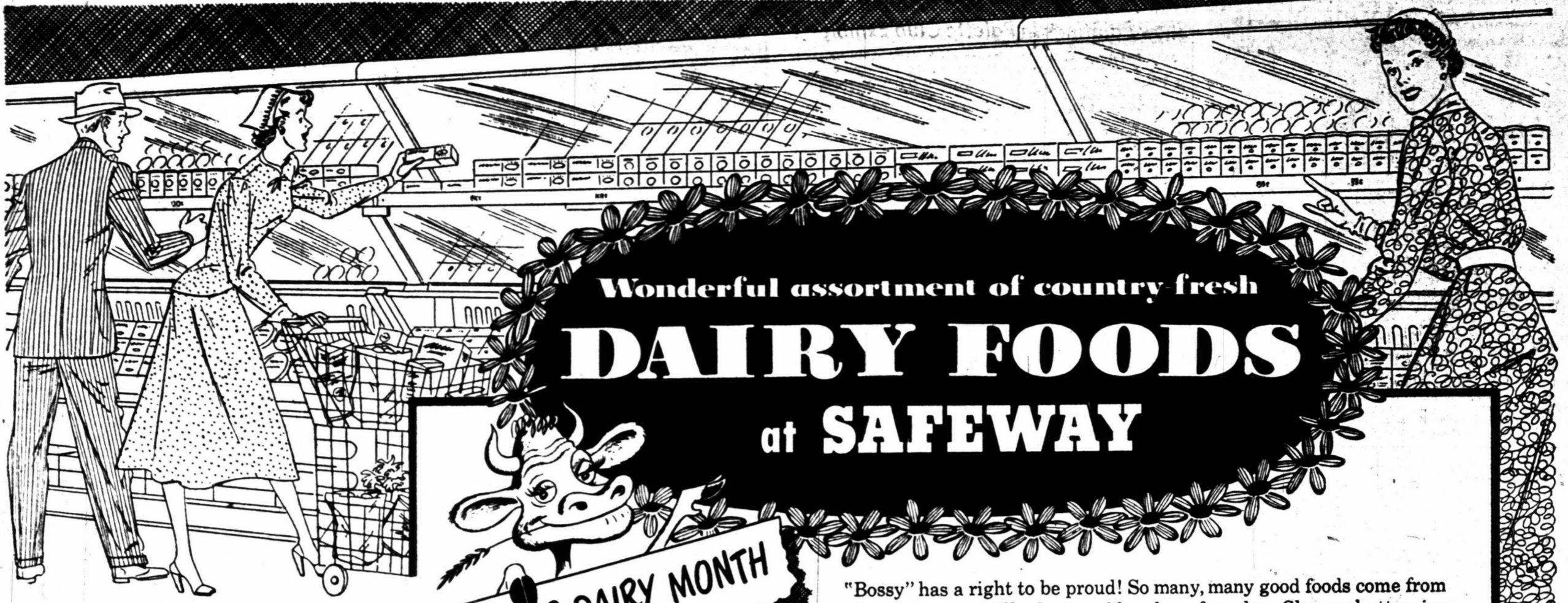

Picnic Fare: Baked Lima Beans

Planning a picnic on the porch, in the back yard or in the country? Well, for a very good eating time without any fuss, try this combination. Carry the two dishes, hot, wrapped in many thicknesses of newspaper to the eating place—unwrap and enjoy hefty, delicious warm food. Bake both dishes in the oven at the same time.

Round Brown Bread
(about 8 servings)

One and one-quarter cups sifted flour, 2 teaspoons baking soda, 1 1/4 teaspoons salt, 1 1/2 cups dry bread crumbs, 1/4 cup shortening, 2 eggs, 1 1/2 cups buttermilk or sour milk, 3/4 cup molasses, 3/4 cup seedless raisins.

Sift together flour, soda and salt. Mix in dry bread crumbs. Cut in shortening with pastry blender. Beat eggs well and combine with buttermilk, molasses and raisins; stir into flour mixture. Turn batter into well greased 1 1/2-quart heat-resistant glass bowl. Bake in slow oven (300 degrees F.) for 1 1/4 hours.

Picnic Baked Limas

Two and one-half cups dried lima beans, 7 cups water, 2 1/2 cups tomatoes (No. 2 can), 1/4 cup diced green pepper, 1/4 cup minced celery, 1/4 cup minced onion, 1/4 cup molasses, 1/4 cup dark brown sugar, 1 tablespoon prepared mustard, 1 teaspoon salt, 3/8 pound salt pork.

Wash beans well, boil in the seven cups of water for two minutes. Let soak for one hour in same water. Cook beans for one hour in same water. Drain beans and combine them with all other ingredients, except salt pork, in a 2 1/2-quart heat-resistant glass bowl. Cut salt pork into small squares and place them on top of the bean mixture. Bake for two hours in a slow oven (300 degrees F.)

Our Growing Children Can't Be High-Pressured

A troubled young mother writes: "My husband does not believe in correcting our child. When I try to interfere, and sometimes laughs. Our boy is bright and behaves badly when his father is around. I love my husband but I want to discipline my boy."

There are two possible solutions to her difficulty. The first is to present the case for discipline to her husband as carefully and confidently as she can.

She should point out that her husband is under discipline himself every time he goes to work. She might say to him: "Every time you stop at a red light, you are under discipline. Every time you pass a jewelry store without breaking the window and snatching me a handful of diamonds, you are under it."

rejected discipline, our home would collapse like a house of straw. It is intact, a shelter for us only because countless people have decided that nobody in this world can have everything he wants."

He might be reminded that he likes order in his home. "It just doesn't happen," his wife might say. "I'm not mad about dishwashing. When I wash dishes anyway, I am under discipline. My acceptance of discipline makes your home clean and pleasant to live in."

"This, then, is the world to which we have brought our child," she would tell him. "If we deny him training in control of his impulses, we're giving him the false lift of an oxygen tent. When he is thrust into the world where common air is breathed, he will suffer shock, hurt and possible emotional illness."

Angry Children
She should tell him why he must not laugh at their little boy's tantrum antics. She should say, "Angry children aren't happy children. You are much older than our son. And you know how you feel if I laugh at you when you're angry."

If her case does not make sense to her husband, then she should persuade him to seek skilled counsel on his training responsibilities.

Most of the cities and towns of our country support child and family welfare agencies well equipped to brief this young father on the hazards of neglecting his little boy's social education.

He should accept help, whether it be from his wife or from professional guidance. For his little son already has discovered how to divide his parents and conquer resistance. He already has learned the primary strategy of tyranny.

He should unlearn it quickly. For tyrants, big or little, are probably the loneliest people in the world. (All Rights Reserved, NEA Service, Inc.)

Shooting Matches Will Be Resumed

WASHINGTON, D. C.—For the first time since 1940 a full program of national rifle and pistol championships, including 30 caliber championships will be held in California from September 28 to October 6.

The national 30 caliber championships will be held at Camp Matthews, San Diego, Calif., from September 28 to September 30. The national pistol and smallbore rifle championships will be staged in San Francisco.

The pistol title-race will take place September 29 to October 6 and the small-bore rifles will crack from October 3 to October 6.

The 30 caliber rifle championships return to the American shooting scene for the first time in 11 years. They were last staged at Camp Perry, Ohio, in 1940. The 1951 championships will be hosted by the U. S. Marine Corps at its famous west coast base and will return to competition many of the world famous trophies and matches.

For Three Cups
Among the shooting cups that will be put back into contention are the Wimbledon, the Leech and Navy trophies. The President's Match, which is usually rewarded with a letter of commendation by the President of the United States, also will be fired.

The pistol field in San Francisco from September 29 to October 6 will have 700 pistoliers shooting to dethrone the present American pistol champion, Sergeant Huelet Benner of Ft. Knox, Ky.

Robert McMains, the present national smallbore rifle champion, of Dallas, Texas, will defend his national title against a field of 800 marksmen from October 3 to 6.

Army 'Behavior' Stressed Overseas

FRANKFURT, GERMANY —(AP)—"Behave like you would in your own home town."
This is the U. S. Army's advice to the American soldier in Germany on how to win friends and influence Germans. "Act like professional soldiers" is another precept being drilled into the GI here.
"Perhaps no other country in the world has such an inherent regard for military excellence as Germany," says the Army bulletin used as a guide for soldier instruction classes. "It is not suggested that appeals be made to inspire militarism on

their part," the bulletin hastens to add. "But the fact that we are here in military status overrides any other factor that can influence the armed forces' relations with the German people."
Even this recognition of German law for soldiering is a long step from the original postwar attitude of the American occupation. In those days everything possible was done to discourage any sign or symptom of militarism in Germans.

NEW SCAP IN ACTION—

Ridgeway Strong On Personal Contact, Regards Supreme Command As Team

TOKYO—(NEA)—In the almost two months he has been wearing the four hats of the supreme commander of the Allied Powers in Japan, Gen. Matthew B. Ridgeway has covered a lot more territory than he did in three and a half months as fighting boss in Korea.

An energetic and sometimes restless man, Ridgeway is a great believer in personal contact. He likes to see for himself what's going on. Shortly after he moved into MacArthur's old headquarters in the Dai Ichi building, Ridgeway asked Vice Admiral C. Turner Joy, commander of Naval Forces Far East, to give him a complete briefing on the naval situation.
Since the Korean war began, such briefings have been held in a big room marked "War Room—Secret" on the sixth floor of SCAP headquarters. When the Supreme Commander wanted to know something, the information was brought to him there.

Reverses Protocol
But Ridgeway discovered that it took a lot of time and trouble to pack up all the highly classified charts and reports and bring them to SCAP. Hence, he reversed the usual protocol. He traveled across town, himself, in his four-starred sedan and Admiral Joy conducted the briefing in the flag plot room at Navy Headquarters.
Like MacArthur, he believes in getting to the Korean front from time to time, and already has made three trips. As Eighth Army commander he often marched alongside the battle columns and visited practically every command post.

Ridgeway also has squeezed in one trip to Okinawa and inspected many of the installations in the Tokyo area and the Navy Base at Yokosuka.
His inspections are thorough. When he flew to a large Army installation in Northern Japan, he had his pilot circle the area three hours before landing so he'd have a

firm picture of the entire layout. Eventually he wants to visit every command activity and installation that SCAP controls.

Fierce Desk-Pounder
At the Pentagon, where he was deputy chief of staff, for administration before he went to Korea, Ridgeway is remembered as a fierce desk-pounder when confronted with an evasive answer. In Korea, staff officers recall his demands for speed and snap at his 6 a.m. briefings.

In Tokyo, he crammed 24 briefings into the first two and a half weeks so he could hear from all of the SCAP section chiefs. This was the first time many of these section chiefs had been included in a conference with the Supreme Commander.

At staff discussions Ridgeway has each officer present the various aspects of the problem involved, questions them closely, then asks them, individually, "What do you think we should do?"
If an officer parries the question

by suggesting there are several sides to the problem, Ridgeway snaps: "We have already discussed those problems. Now what do you think we should DO?"

Explains Decisions
After hearing from all hands, he says "this is what we will do," and then goes on to explain why he's making that decision. Such tactics are quite different from those of MacArthur.

To Ridgeway, who said not long ago that "war is like a football game," all this comes under the heading of teamwork. He hectors his team with what one staff officer calls "jobs that are almost impossible, but not quite impossible."

But he doesn't regard the Supreme Command as a one-man job.

"This is the result of the work of the team," he said recently, when he got his fourth star and became a full general, 34 years after graduating from West Point as "the busiest man in the place."

Sentiment Too Much For Home-Wrecker

PITTSBURGH —(AP)— Even a professional home-wrecker finds he hasn't the heart to lower the boom on what is left of the old Bank of Pittsburgh.

The facade of the old building, smudged and blackened by the roaring industries which built it, has stood alone since the 130-year-old structure behind it was razed seven years ago. And now the facade, whose owner declares it is as near perfect an example of the Corinthian order of architecture as can be found, must be sacrificed for another precious Pittsburgh commodity—parking space.

Frank J. Givens, the professional wrecker commissioned to destroy the edifice, is a hard-bitten veteran of the wrecking business. But he has offered \$1,000 to anyone willing to haul the facade away so he doesn't have to knock it down.
