Baumann Discovery Flows 226 BOPD On Potential Test

Official completion has been reported to the Railroad Commission of Texas for Moore Exploration Company No. 1 A. R. Baumann, Midland County's newest petroleum discovery.

The wildcat flowed 226 barrels of 48 gravity oil in 24 hours on the potential test. The flow was through an 8/64th inch tubing choke and was natural.

Gas-oil ratio was 1,821-1. Minimum open flowing tubing pressure was 1,050 pounds.

Nine Feet Of Pay No water was produced with the oil. Operator reports that the top of the pay in the Pennsylvania is at 11,284 feet. Total depth is 11,283 feet.

The 7-inch casing is cemented at 11,246 feet. Definite age of the zone which is making the oil has not been officially established. It is a time in the lower Pennsylvania.

This new field opener is three miles south of the southeast side of the city of Midland. It is 467 feet from west and 660 feet from south lines of the east 200 acres in the southeast part of section 14, block 38, T-3-S, T&P survey.

Moore To Dig Long Stepout To Opener In N-C Midland Area

Operations are to start at once at a new 11,300-foot wildcat in North-Central Midland County.

It will be Moore Exploration Company No. 1 Dowlen-Houpt. Location is 660 feet from north and east lines of section 24, block 39, T-2-S, T&P survey.

That makes it two and one-half miles south of the southeast side of the city of Midland. The new prospector is one-quarter of a mile south and three-quarters of a mile west of the same operator No. 1 Baumann, flowing discovery from a Pennsylvania line.

The No. 1 Dowlen-Houpt will try for production from the same zone from which No. 1 Baumann is getting its production.

Sohio Wildcat Is Seen As Link For Fields In Midland

Sohio Petroleum Company No. 1 H. T. Boone estate, wildcat in the undeveloped area between the Tex-Harvey and Germania fields of East Midland County, has given more proof that the two fields will join.

The project is now at total depth of 7,096 feet in the Spraberry with 3,500 feet of clean oil in the hole. Operator cemented seven-inch casing at 7,005 feet. The Spraberry was topped at 7,038 feet.

Operator is now preparing to swab and test open hole natural.

The project is one and three-quarter miles north of the closest completed well in the Tex-Harvey field and three and one-half miles south of the Germania field proper.

However, it is only one and three-quarter miles southeast of James H. Snowden and Associates No. 1-9 McClintic, recently completed Spraberry producer.

Exact location is 660 feet from north and west lines of section 42, block 36, T-3-S, T&P survey.

Slight Shows Of Oil, Gas Logged By CSOC 1 Reed

Cities Service Oil Company No. 1 Reed, Central - North Andrews County wildcat found some slight shows of oil and gas in a drillstem test in the top of the Devonian line and is to drill deeper into that formation in search of a more porous zone.

The drillstem test was at 10,814-870 feet. The tool was open two hours.

Recovery was the 1,044-foot water blanket, with the top part of that fluid being cut with gas and carrying a rainbow show of oil, and 180 feet of heavily oil and gas cut drilling mud.

There were no signs of formation water. Operator plans to make about 50 feet more hole and if any signs of porosity are logged another drillstem test will be run.

Devonian Top Called Top of the Devonian by samples is at 10,820 feet. That is on a datum of minus 7,704 feet.

This wildcat had previously flowed oil and water from the Pennsylvania line at 9,766-9,170 feet. Some observers think the water section in that formation could be plugged off and an oil well completed from the zone above it.

21 Reds Are Indicted For Plotting

Hurley Slaps At State Department

WASHINGTON—(P)—Maj. Gen. Patrick J. Hurley accused the State Department Wednesday of a policy of "appeasement" both to communism and "imperialism." He called it a "cowardly surrender" of the principles for which World War II was fought.

Denouncing the secret concessions to Russia at the 1945 Yalta Conference, the former ambassador to China declared:

"The postwar success of Russia is not due to Russia's strength but to the weakness of American foreign policy."

Hurley was testifying at the Senate Armed Services and Foreign Relations Committees with a long prepared statement which lambasted U. S. foreign policy in general and Secretary of State Acheson individually. At one point, he spoke of Acheson as expressing "both moral and physical fear."

The white-haired general had little more than completed his statement when the committees recessed until 9 a. m. (EST) Thursday. But he already had thrown so much harsh language that it was plain he would be in for a vigorous session with Administration senators when he returns to the witness chair for the question-and-answer phase of his testimony.

Other Developments Aside from Hurley's appearance, there were these other principal developments in the inquiry:

1. MacArthur advised the senators he does not care to return before them for rebuttal to the testimony from Administration officials. His letter said President Truman had silenced "pertinent witnesses" and kept the inquiry panel from getting the "full facts" on his relief from his Far Eastern commands.

2. Senator Knowland (R-Calif.) made a request that the panel seek such portions of a diary kept by the late Secretary of Defense Forrestal as might be pertinent to the inquiry. He said he understood, a part of the diary "is still being held at the White House" and that other parts have been turned over to Forrestal's heir. Forrestal plunged to his death from a tower at the Bethesda, Md., hospital in 1949 after resigning his cabinet post.

Aide Hopes To Iron Out Default Ruling Against Liquor Board

An assistant state attorney general was in Midland Wednesday in an attempt to iron out a default judgment against the Texas Liquor Control Board which grew out of the board's three-day suspension order directed at a Midland retail beer dealer under provisions of a new law.

The contest began when a temporary injunction suit was filed in 70th District Court by Albert B. Cole, Jr., operator of Bert's Drive-In at 301 North Big Spring Street.

Judge R. W. Hamilton issued a temporary injunction against enforcement of the three-day suspension order of April 17. Named as defendant in the suit was Coke R. Stevenson, Jr., administrator of the board.

The petition filed by Cole charged the suspension order, based on a new state law banning the sale of beer by wholesalers on a credit basis, was issued after one of his checks given in payment for a beer purchase had "by error" been dishonored at a bank.

Cole's petition said, "he had sufficient funds arranged in said bank to pay said check . . . but through error said check was returned unpaid."

Falls To Appear Judge Hamilton then set June 4 as the appointed time for a hearing in the case, but because defendant Coke R. Stevenson, Jr., did not appear nor was he represented by counsel" the court held the temporary injunction against the suspension order should be made final and permanent.

NMU-Manned Ship Leaves Texas Port

GALVESTON—(P)—The first ship manned by National Maritime Union workers to sail from this port since the NMU walkout began last week sailed Tuesday night.

It had a cargo of grain for India. It was cleared by the NMU under an agreement permitting ships carrying military cargoes and relief shipments to sail.

The ship was the William Patterson, operated by the Blitzberg and Rothschild Line.

Three other ships have been cleared for sailing, one of them the Edward N. Hurley, a Grace Line ship, loading grain for India also.

Mac Rejects Bid To Testify Again, Hits Action Of President

WASHINGTON—(P)—Gen. Douglas MacArthur declared Wednesday President Truman's orders "silencing pertinent witnesses" have denied a Senate inquiry the "full facts" on his dismissal. But MacArthur said he doesn't care to testify again himself.

MacArthur rapped at the President in rejecting by letter an invitation to appear again before the Senate Armed Services and Foreign Relations Committees investigating his ouster.

He contended, too, some of the documentary evidence submitted to the senators had been lifted out of context so that it was "misleading," and said there was "lack of accuracy" in paraphrasing.

Many of the documents given to the senators in connection with the inquiry have been "paraphrased"—that is submitted in a rewritten, summary form rather than as the original documents.

The reason is that the original documents were transmitted by radio in code. Release of the actual texts might help a potential enemy to decipher the U. S. codes.

Invited To Reply MacArthur testified for three days when the inquiry began last May 3. The committees had invited him to reply, if he wished, to the testimony received then, most of it from Truman Administration officials.

The five-star general wrote Chairman Russell (D-Ga.) that because "my known personal views already are in the record in great detail, I (Continued on Page Nine)

It Isn't Hot Yet, Summer Won't Be Here Till Thursday

By The Associated Press Low clouds and fog spotted the Gulf Coast and East Texas Wednesday, but elsewhere skies were partly cloudy to clear.

Summer doesn't get to Texas officially until 11:25 p. m. (CST) Thursday, but 100-degree maximums already have arrived.

Presidio blistered with 114 degrees Tuesday. Big Spring, Wink, Salt Flat, Laredo, Del Rio, Midland, Marfa, Alice and San Angelo all had maximums more than 100 degrees.

The forecast called for cooler weather in the Panhandle Thursday.

But the Weather Bureau said you could add a "slightly" to that. A feeble cold front is coming down across the plains, might bring more rain, but won't affect temperatures much.

Scattered thunderstorms were predicted again Wednesday evening for the north portion of East Texas and in the Panhandle and South Plains.

Court Turns Down Emma Oliver Plea

AUSTIN—(P)—The Court of Criminal Appeals Wednesday turned down another plea of Emma Oliver in her fight to escape the electric chair.

The high court overruled a motion for rehearing on her application for a writ of habeas corpus, which would have led to a new trial.

The 170-pound San Antonio negro woman was sentenced to die for the 1950 knife slaying of Herman Cohn, negro truck driver from Comroe, in a San Antonio bedroom.

Allied Guns Dominate Buildup Area

TOKYO—(P)—Ten Red planes were shot down or damaged Wednesday in the Korean war's first double-deck dogfight.

Both jet and propeller driven planes—98 of them—took part in the fourth consecutive day of air war over Northwest Korea.

On the ground North Koreans suddenly abandoned Punchbowl Valley, which they had fought for so valiantly. United Nations guns now dominate the former Red buildup area on the eastern front.

Sharp battles flared Wednesday on both sides of the valley—one near Kansong on the east coast and the other in mountains north of Yanggu.

The double air battle broke out simultaneously between low flying propeller planes and jets swirling above at 13,000 feet.

When it was over the Reds had lost three planes destroyed, one probably destroyed and six damaged.

Twenty-four UN Mustang fighters overpowered a flight of six Russian-built propeller planes. All the Reds were hit. A Yak fighter and two (Continued on Page Nine)

17 Nabbed In FBI Roundup; Four Sought

WASHINGTON—(P)—Twenty-one members of the Communist Party's secondary command were indicted Wednesday on charges of plotting violent overthrow of the United States government.

Seventeen of those indicted by a federal grand jury in New York were seized in an early morning roundup by FBI agents. The four others were being sought.

Sixteen of the arrests were made in New York, the other in Pittsburgh.

The government moved against the lesser lights in the wake of this month's Supreme Court decision upholding the conviction of the party's 11 top leaders.

Attorney General McGrath and FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover said in a statement:

"Some of the individuals arrested are members of the Alternate National Committee, recently formed by the Communist Party to serve as the top policy-making body in the absence of the present national committee members, now convicted."

The 11 leaders were convicted in New York in 1949 of conspiring to teach and advocate the violent overthrow of the U. S. government.

Each of those seized was described by Hoover as "a prominent, active functionary of the Communist Party, U. S. A."

All of those taken into custody were charged under the 1940 Smith Act. The Supreme Court upheld the constitutionality of this law, providing (Continued on Page Nine)

More Low Pressure Areas Reported As Water Output Gains

Additional low water pressure areas were reported Tuesday as Midland's water production soared to a record-breaking figure for the second time in two days.

Henry Nunn, engineer for the sewage and water departments, said \$1,171,000 gallons were pumped during the day at the city's three water fields.

This was 160,000 gallons more than was pumped on Monday when the capacity production was believed reached.

Nunn said one of the pumps had been out of operation a short time Monday but was pumping at more than rated capacity Tuesday.

He said the water level at the city's 2,500,000-gallon storage reservoir had fallen from the maximum of 80 feet to 16 feet, lowering the pressure at the main leading out of the tank from 25 pounds to eight pounds.

"We had a number of complaints about low pressure from several areas, particularly on the south side," said Nunn. "Many were in neighborhoods where two-inch lines are still in use and we can't do much about it."

Meanwhile the City Council prepared to meet at 1:30 p. m. Thursday to study the water situation.

Driver Responsibility Measure Is Certified

AUSTIN—(P) The drivers financial responsibility bill was certified by the state comptroller Wednesday, clearing its way to go to the governor for signature or veto.

The bill has been hung up for several weeks on a technicality that could have meant quick death for it.

The proposed law would require car owners and drivers to prove ability to pay up to \$15,000 for injuries and property damage resulting from a traffic accident. In most cases it would force purchase of insurance.

State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert delayed approval because of uncertainty where the money would come from to finance the \$500,000 cost of administering the law for the next two years.

The bill provides a \$5 accident reporting fee that would bring in considerable revenue. The fee would be paid by insurance companies or other parties seeking reports on accidents from the department of public safety.

Each such report furnished by the department would require payment of this fee. Under the law accidents in which damage exceeds \$100 must be reported originally to the department of public safety by the drivers involved. No fee goes with these reports.

Marshall Calls For Quick Approval Of Big Building Program

WASHINGTON—(P)—Secretary of Defense Marshall asked Congress Wednesday to approve as quickly as possible a vast \$6,861,263,000 military building program he said is "dictated by the current international tension."

The Defense Department said that "in the near future" it will ask Congress to appropriate \$4,500,000,000 to start the program and rush it along toward completion hoped for within two years. The money will be sought for the fiscal year which starts July 1.

Marshall outlined the program in letters to House Speaker Rayburn and to Senator Russell (D-Ga.) and Rep. Vinson (D-Ga.), chairmen of the Senate and House Armed Services Committees. Vinson said his group will start hearings on Monday.

Marshall expressed hope Congress will authorize the program "as expeditiously as possible." He said the projects included are "urgently needed x x x under the expanding military program."

Classified Secret More than \$1,587,000,000 worth of the projects have been classified "secret." Of this \$1,071,000,000 is for the Air Force alone.

HOLLYWOOD — Will Freeman Gosden and Charles Correll of radio fame retire now that they're behind the scenes, producing a half-hour TV film comedies with a flesh-and-blood Amos, Andy, Kingfish, Lightning, Henry Van Porter, Sapphire and Madame Queen?

The airwave veterans of 23 years sat in their Beverly Hills office and admitted that the pastures of retirement looked mighty inviting.

"We'll go on doing our radio show for awhile," Correll said, "I guess you might say that we're staying young for the end of radio."

Gosden, who's been supervising the TV film productions with his partner, shrugged his shoulders.

"After being in television this short period of time, we realize that these 23 years in radio have been just make-believe.

"Television is a killer. It's big. It scares you."

The comedians searched for over a year and interviewed hundreds of applicants to find negro duplicates of the characters they created on radio. Alvin Childress and Spencer Williams play the Amos and Andy roles. Charles Barton, lured from Abbott and Costello feature comedies, is directing the TV films which have a three-day shooting schedule.

"We crowd as much production value into 30 minutes," Correll announced, "as a major studio puts into a full-length B picture."

Elmer Lincoln's idea for a Hollywood stock company of old time stars whose salaries in film jobs will be paid by the combined major studios, is gaining industry favor. It's the best plan yet for Hollywood to take care of its film pioneers.

BRITISH MISSION TO IRAN ORDERED TO RETURN HOME
LONDON — (AP) — Foreign Secretary Herbert Morrison ordered the British mission to Tehran to return home.

Morrison told a crowded silent House of Commons Britain again would appeal to the International Court of Justice at The Hague for advice on what "provisional methods" it can adopt to protect its rich Iranian oil interests.

Morrison's announcement came after the Anglo-Iranian Oil Company's negotiators in Tehran had asked an airplane be sent to return them home. The negotiating team includes one government representative.

The foreign secretary indicated Britain is not abandoning the sprawling oil fields and the giant oil refinery of the Anglo-Iranian Oil Company in Southern Iran.

But he warned that Britons in Iran may have a difficult job keeping the installations operating.

"Riots, abuses, misrepresentations and the uncertainty of the future have made conditions difficult for them," he said. He added this warning.

"The British government is not prepared to stand by idly if the lives of British nationals are in jeopardy."

Iran Officials Told To Take Authority Over Anglo-Iranian

TEHRAN, IRAN — (AP) — Premier Mohammed Mossadegh Wednesday ordered his government officials to take "full authority" over the billion-dollar Anglo-Iranian Oil Company. He promised to keep oil flowing from company installations.

Mossadegh's orders were issued at the end of a five-hour cabinet meeting.

Deputy Premier Hussein Fatmi announced Iran would not carry out threats of extreme Nationalists to "shut the valves" of AIOC's refinery at Abadan—the world's largest.

The cabinet had been summoned into emergency session. The ministers had before them an appeal from the United States to reconsider a British offer whose rejection brought to an end negotiations to resolve the oil crisis.

Gradual Process
A vaguely worded communique indicated the Mossadegh government planned to try to take over the administration of the vast oil fields gradually. It announced Iranian officials had been named to take over "Anglo-Iranian's" northernmost oil fields at Kermanshah.

The cabinet meeting, whose length indicated Iranian officials realized the enormity of the task before them, came after British-Iranian talks on a possible settlement broke down Tuesday night.

The communique said any orders of the Anglo-Iranian board of directors and its general manager would not be carried out unless countersigned by the temporary board of directors of Iran's national oil company.

The next step now is up to AIOC. Iranians apparently expect former AIOC employees and executives to continue to work under the direction of the government's oil company.

Ward County Granted Farm-Market Road

MONAHANS — A farm-to-market road, 4.4 miles in length, will soon be built in Ward County. County Judge Carl D. Estes has been notified by the State Highway Department.

The road will be built southeast of Grandfalls, with the county furnishing right-of-way and the construction to be paid by the state.

Judge Estes also announced that work was to be completed this week on a road north from Wickett for a distance of about four miles, lying into Highway 82.

He asked that these communications be sent to him at the Game Department, Walton Building, Austin. The commission will consider them at its July 6 meeting here, when it will forward its recommendations to the federal fish and wildlife service in Washington.

In the final analysis, the seasons are set by the federal government because the mourning dove is a migratory bird. Recommendations from the affected states are weighed in setting the seasons.

Last year, open season on mourning doves in the North zone of Texas was September 1-October 15, and in the South zone October 20-December 3.

The fact that she isn't being thoughtful is evidenced by her calling always at her convenience, even though she knows their schedules. She doesn't call a conservation to a halt even when she gets a hint that a

friend is in the middle of washing, has a delivery man waiting at the door, or whatever.

Charlotte feels she does many thoughtful things for other people. But real thoughtfulness is lacking because Charlotte, always by some little hint or remark, lets it be known that she is consciously doing the other person a favor. It's wanting full credit for everything she does that robs her intended kindnesses of honest-to-goodness thoughtfulness.

Mary uses too much high pressure to have her helpfulness reflect true thoughtfulness. When Mary hears a friend is doing something, she is quick with suggestions. But her friends have to take the help—or else. She is such a super-saleswoman there is no way to turn her suggestions down without hurting her feelings.

And so it goes. Each of those four women is convinced she is a thoughtful person. The intentions are fine in every case. All that is lacking is the ability to put herself in the place of the person she means to be helpful to.

Real Meaning Of Democracy

Even among those who approved General MacArthur's dismissal in April, there was widespread regret that the action removed from Japan the man who had so ably administered the occupation there.

Correspondents on the scene contributed to the general concern by voicing fears that the Japanese might react badly to the event. Some foresaw a deterioration in the situation that could wipe out some of the excellent progress Japan had made under MacArthur.

Actually, no dire results have ensued. That a calamity has not occurred does not, however, cast doubt on the judgment of those who measured MacArthur's administration so highly.

It is simply a reflection of the endlessly-demonstrated fact that in a working democracy like America's, no man is indispensable nor need be regarded as such.

General Ridgway, his talents as a field commander already well proved, now is displaying the special abilities required for an occupation administrator, as did MacArthur before him, and General Clay in Berlin.

This is not to say he has the same specific qualities, or that he sees the job in quite the same light. There are significant differences between his personality and MacArthur's, and inevitably their approach is different.

The important thing is not to make comparisons in an effort to determine whose administration is "best." For Americans, the exciting fact is that a man of MacArthur's stature can be supplanted without damaging the nation's prestige or reducing the effectiveness of its policies.

We can be gratified that in some fields, at least, we appear to have an ample reservoir of leadership and thus can give continuity to our affairs.

But probably the greatest benefit from Ridgway's excellent follow-up performance is the lesson it has given to the Japanese. There had been in their extreme regard for MacArthur something of the same worship attitude the Japs always had felt for their emperor.

To a nation being schooled by us in the ways of democracy, it therefore was valuable instruction to learn that leaders could be changed without upsetting matters. Rotation of leadership is inherent in our concept of democracy.

General Ridgway deserves our thanks, and the whole free world's, for demonstrating the human vitality of a nation living under liberty.

WASHINGTON COLUMN

Expect New DiSalle Order To Break Tool Bottleneck

WASHINGTON—Office of Price Stabilization Director Michael V. DiSalle is momentarily expected to hand down a new machine tool pricing order. When it is on the books, the last major bottleneck on machine tool production is expected to be broken.

America's 700 machine tool builders were caught in a tight jam by the OPS manufacturers' general price ceiling order. This order was issued April 24, effective May 28. It set ceiling prices at the level of the first half of 1950, on all manufacturers.

Machine tool prices in effect then were based on orders placed in 1949. There was a marked business recession on then. Orders were few and prices were comparatively low.

The machine tool shortage did not begin to develop with the outbreak of the Korean war, a defense mobilization program began to roll. By that time there were shortages of materials and soaring prices all over the place.

Most of the machine tool manufacturers are small companies. The only way they can get increased production is to put on extra shifts, pay overtime and premium wages, or subcontract for parts production.

It has taken more than a month to work out an order for the machine tool industry that will stabilize prices, stimulate production and cover increased manufacturing costs all at the same time.

Other bottlenecks that have hindered machine tool production have been or are being cleared. Giving the tool makers all the scarce materials they required was handled by a series of Defense Production Administration allocations and priorities.

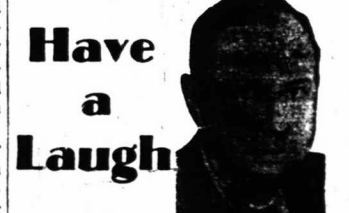
The labor supply of skilled tool makers is still tight. From 31,000 employees in 1939, the industry was built up to a peak of 123,000 in 1942. It dropped to 36,000 in December, 1949. Today it is over the 55,000 mark.

It takes three years to train a tool maker from apprenticeship, and more years are required for experienced experts. But the tool industry should soon be able to recruit additional workers as automobile and other civilian hard goods production is cut back.

One of the principal methods for increasing machine tool production will be to license new manufacturers. An established tool making company, for instance, will license a

company now making automobiles to make certain machines—lathes, grinders, or boring machines—in greatest demand. By this licensing system, the industry will not be over-expanded. When the emergency is over, the auto maker will go back to making autos while the tool maker will still have his regular business for normal demand.

Financing greater machine tool manufacture is being handled through government V-loans. Also, General Services Administration is giving the tool makers government pool orders. They insure production of most-needed machines. And the government guarantees to buy any unsold machines at a 17 1/2 percent discount, if the mobilization demand should end suddenly.

Fair Share Of Denials Good For Normal Child

Normal children should be treated as normal children, not as emotionally unstable children. Normal children can take denial, frustration and disappointment just as capably as they take cold weather. We shouldn't make any more effort to protect them against their fair share of "Don'ts" and "No's" than we make to protect them against the wind and rain and sun.

A fair share of denials is as good for their emotional growth as fresh air and wind are good for their physical health.

Instead of tiptoeing through parenthood as though we were attendants in a ward for the nervously ill, let's thank the Lord that our youngsters can take straight talk, straight action.

There are children who can't take them; but they're not like our Joans and Bills.

I know such a child. His name is Joe. He lives in a correctional institution, not in a home. When Joe is discovered in forbidden possession of a pocket knife, for example, nobody says to him, "Joe, give me that knife." Instead a social worker prepares Joe for the removal of that pocket knife with all the care and skill that a hospital uses to prepare a patient for a serious operation.

It may take from one to two hours to separate the pocket knife from Joe. Afterwards Joe is nursed through a period of convalescence in case of denial of something he wants might shock him into stealing again and running away.

But then, Joe has had more than his fair share of denials. He doesn't know, for instance, who his mother is. He regards kindness as something people give him because they

are being paid to give it to him. Inexperienced in love or trust of other human beings, Joe loves and trusts only things he can touch and feel, like dimes and pocket knives. As his dependence upon the pocket knife is understood, special care is taken to remove it from him. Otherwise, the loss might touch off an explosion of the hate of people Joe has been accumulating through his 12 years of life.

A sick child, Joe has no reserves of love or trust. So he must be protected against straight talk or action until he has developed trust in someone.

But our Joans and Bills are not sick children. They trust and love us. They are not dependent upon a new dress or an allowance increase the way Joe is dependent upon his pocket knife. We do not have to spend two hours arguing about the new dress or allowance. We can say, "No new dress. No increase. I can't afford it this month."

The shielding treatment given to Joe is as unwholesome for healthy Joans and Bills as a plaster cast on a leg that isn't broken.

Too many favors granted to normal youngsters weaken them for living in the world where favors have to be earned. Joans and Bills are not emotional invalids. Let's begin to credit them with strength.

East Texas Finds Trend To Deeper Oil Wells Pay Off

TENNESSEE COLONY, TEXAS—(AP)—This crossroads hamlet in East Texas is enjoying an oil boom because of the perseverance of major oil firms.

For a 10-year period beginning in 1934, a half dozen oil well drilling rigs were set up in the surrounding hills.

They all tested the Woodbine sand, a shallow formation regarded as the most dependable oil-bearing sand in East Texas. The small companies found salt water, or just plain nothing.

The new boom is the result of deeper explorations, beginning with Continental Oil Company's 10,500-foot well a quarter mile southeast of Tennessee colony in 1949.

Landowners in the area, having witnessed a lot of wildcat failures in their day, refused to get excited about the deep test, their first.

But as Fall neared an end, Continental began probing into structures previously untouched at Tennessee Colony. The results touched off a first class modern-day oil boom. A good grade oil was found in the Rodessa formation, the pettit lime yielded a promising core and some oil and gas showed up in a section cut from the Travis Peak zone.

In Two Sections Continental pulled back to the Rodessa and completed the well there in two sections of the zone. Since then, the Pettit has been found productive in other sections of the field, and is one of the leading oil-bearing formations there. Operators still have hopes of finding oil in commercial quantities in the Travis Peak.

Since October, 1949, a total of 17 producers -- 26 if you count dual completions as the Railroad Commission does -- have been brought in at Tennessee Colony. Nine others are being drilled, and two rigs are being set up. There has been one dry hole.

The 98-year old town has an oil boom, and it's because petroleum-seekers didn't give up on the deep structures.

The Opelika Field in Henderson County can tell a similar story; so can others. The trend in East Texas is toward deeper wells, and it's paying off.

Government Due For Headache As Result Of Materials Control

NEW YORK—(AP)—The government is fixing to decide how many automobiles, refrigerators, trambones, bobby pins and stew pans you can, or should, buy—and in a very practical way. Uncle Sam hopes you'll be satisfied.

He's going to dole out all the steel, copper and aluminum to all the nation's users. That will relieve metals producers of one of their biggest headaches—and probably bring on a whooper of one in Washington. Because the government is likely to find that everyone and his brother has a different idea of what is his fair share—and will be very vocal about it.

Instead of being mad at the producers, manufacturers who don't get all the metal they want, and you, when you find your favorite gadgets in short supply, will be mad at the government—a good old American custom, anyway.

Starts In Two Weeks

The Controlled Materials Plan starts in two weeks with military goods production, and by the end of the year is expected to take in all users of metal, down the list. CMP proposes to see that manufacturers of military material get all the metal they need, that companies who make goods supporting the defense efforts get metals enough to keep them operating, and that companies who make less essential consumer goods get their fair share of what's left.

Steel, copper and aluminum have been in tight supply for months. Manufacturers have scurried around trying to get enough to keep production lines going at top speed while the sellers' market lasted. Producers have tried to allocate their output among customers, only to be bitterly accused in many instances of playing favorites. Most metal producers will be glad to hand the chore over to the government.

Military demands for steel are expected to hit their peak this winter at around 10,000,000 tons a year. Steelmen estimate that defense-supporting industries will want around 40,000,000 tons. That should have at least 50,000,000 tons for the purely consumer goods industries, such as automobiles and home appliances. That's a great deal more than was available in the last war, after essential military requirements were met.

Michigan Has Prexy With Love For Grid

ANN ARBOR, MICH.—(AP)—Dr. Harlan H. Hatcher, new president of the University of Michigan, is a lover of football.

"I sat through the snowstorm in the Ohio stadium last November right to the finish," smiled the 52-year-old educator.

Football fans will remember that game which was played in a veritable blizzard. A 28-mile wind swept across Buckeye Stadium. Several inches of snow hid the yard lines. Ball handling was almost impossible. Michigan failed to make a first down but blocked two punts which enabled them to win, 9-3.

Dr. Hatcher, who succeeded Dr. Alexander G. Ruthven as U. of M. head man, was formerly vice president of Ohio State. He was such a football enthusiast there that he even watched practice sessions.

Ohio State is Dr. Hatcher's alma mater. As an undergraduate he never participated in football. He tried for the varsity tennis squad but never made it.

The county assessor, in 1949, incorrectly listed Hudson's vacant lot as having a house on it. Hudson said he didn't discover the error until after he paid \$118.71 in taxes on the property last year.

Board members held that Hudson is not entitled to a refund because he failed to file a protest before the May, 1949, deadline.

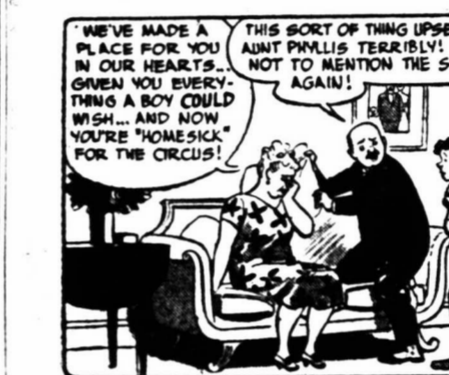

McCarthy Is Irked About Mention Of Name In Civil Suit

HOUSTON — (AP) — Oil man Glenn McCarthy says his name should never have been connected with a false imprisonment suit filed in Las Vegas, Nev., by Harry Gilman.

Gilman Monday filed a \$100,000 damage suit against Sheriff Glen E. Jones, Deputies E. B. Woodward and Pat Patsengill, the Flamingo Hotel and Moe Sedway. He claimed he was killed when he attempted to take his 17-year-old daughter from a party being given by McCarthy. McCarthy was not named a defendant in the suit.

"It wasn't my party," McCarthy said in a statement. "I didn't pay the bill."

"I don't know who asked this child to sit down and have dinner. I didn't, she wasn't my guest."

McCarthy said he was at the hotel to listen to a singer and decide whether he wanted to book the singer for the Shamrock Hotel here.

Gilman said in his complaint he learned his daughter, Tobey, was at the Flamingo last April 28; that he found her there in a phone booth and asked her to come away with him.

Gilman also said a "Mr. Wells" was identified as a bodyguard of McCarthy, intervened and said: "She's the guest of Mr. McCarthy's party and is staying."

McCarthy's statement said that wasn't true, and that "Wells isn't a bodyguard. I don't have one." He said Wells was a witness in a lawsuit against McCarthy in Los Angeles.

Truman May Seek To Put Down Revolt In Special Message

WASHINGTON—(AP)—A Democratic senator had a report Wednesday President Truman may try to put down a revolt against important elements of his economic controls program with a special message to Congress.

Senate and House Banking Committees almost finished with new bills to replace the Defense Production Act expiring June 30 gave the President plenty to write about with these blows Tuesday to the Administration's plea for tougher controls:

1. The Senate group got in line with House committee action which would forbid a further nine per cent cut in the price of live beef. It went further, virtually banning any future price rollbacks.

2. Both House and Senate committees voted to relax credit restrictions on automobile buying. The House committee extended its credit relaxation to television and radio, household appliances and house repairs.

3. The senators approved rises, where rents are under control ceilings, up to 20 per cent above 1942 levels.

4. The House committee refused to incorporate in its new bill authority for the government to license businesses as a means of cracking down on controls violators.

The decisions are all subject to final committee approval and must then be passed by Congress before being sent to the President. The Senate committee may take final action Thursday.

Stabilization directors reacted with cries of alarm.

Senators predicted one of the most vigorous fights of the session when the controls bill comes before their chamber, probably early next week.

Report Is Relayed
The Democratic senator who relayed the report that President Truman may enter the fight with a special message to Congress asked not to be named. He is an Administration supporter. He spoke to a reporter after the Senate Banking Committee took the action which apparently cut the Administration deepest.

Forgetful Hotel Guests Leave Varied Assortment Of Odds And Ends In Room

The things people leave in hotel rooms: Money, shoes, jewelry, maps, housecoats, hats, even false teeth—take it from Mrs. Gladys Warner, housekeeper of Hotel Scharbauer, guests leave a wide assortment of articles.

Mrs. Warner, who has been at the Scharbauer about three years, says razors and toothbrushes are the items left most frequently by departing guests.

Jewelry, sun glasses and shoes rate high on the lost and found list. Some items infrequently left in Scharbauer rooms include a music rack, air cushion, and, of course, the false teeth, which were found under a bed.

Books left by hotel guests range from dime thrillers to scientific periodicals on atomic energy.

The items are kept 90 days, or longer in some instances, under lock and many have been returned to the owners weeks after being lost.

Money Called For
But some of the items, especially those of little value, are never called for by the losers.

Presently in the Scharbauer's lost-item cabinet are medicines of all kinds, shaving kits, razors, shoes, boots, bottles of whiskey, maps, hats, special hangers of all kinds, books, rubber boots and a cocktail case.

Money left in hotel rooms in nine cases out of 10 is called for immediately. So are valuable jewelry, watches and expensive liquors.

"My maids are honest and so are the house boys," Mrs. Warner says with pride. "They turn in the lost items as soon as they are found."

Tooth brushes and razors always are left in the bathrooms. Shoes are found pushed back under the beds, out of sight which probably accounts for their being left.

Mrs. Warner has 17 maids and four house boys working under her supervision. Rooms are cleaned once daily and officers if there are checkouts.

The hotel housekeeper's duties are varied. She directs the maid service and supervises mending and repair of draperies, towels and other room necessities.

Mrs. Warner, who received her training as a housekeeper at the Baker Hotel in Dallas, said most people to whom lost items are returned are sincerely grateful and always say so. But some just grunt a mumbled thanks.

"To us, it is routine, because we find items every day," she said.

Unusual Watermark Shows Permian Basin

Writing paper and envelopes designed to advertise the Permian Basin Empire are being produced here by the Howard Company.

The watermark is an unusual design built into paper so that it is visible when lying on a desk or held to a light. Clearly legible is this wording: "The Permian Basin, America's Oil Reservoir," and worked into the design is a reproduction of an oil derrick with storage tanks and a faint outline of a cowboy's head.

Radiating from a star which locates Midland as the center of the area are lines which outline the Permian Basin. The entire design is superimposed on a map of West Texas. The design was selected in a contest won by Miss Sammie Huskey, a former employee of the Patrick A. Doherty Company of Midland.

Reds Still Have Big Following Despite Election Setbacks

By JAMES MARLOW
WASHINGTON—(AP)—The Communists lost more power—that is, they lost some offices or seats—in the French and Italian elections just held. And there's been some cheering here about that.

But the sober fact is that the Communists still have a huge following in both countries.

Since 1948 this country pumped, in Marshall Plan aid, \$2,400,000 into France and \$1,311,000 into Italy—the greater part in both places was a gift—to help them recover economically and so stop the growth of communism.

American experts say the plan has helped both countries tremendously, economically. But still, after three years of this help, more than 10,000,000 Frenchmen and Italians vote for or with the Communists.

In the French elections last Sunday the Communist Party, proving itself the biggest single party in the country, got around 5,000,000 votes out of a total of roughly 18,500,000 votes cast in France. (The rest of the 18,500,000 votes were spread among five other parties.)

That Communist vote was only 475,000 less than the party got in the last big French elections of 1946—they got 5,475,000 then—when France was just coming out of the war and was an economic wreck.

The French elections Sunday were national; they were for representatives in the French Assembly, similar to this country's Congress.

In Italy the elections were not national in that sense but were for offices in the provinces (similar to our states) and the towns and cities.

In both France and Italy the Communists lost seats, in spite of their big vote. But in both countries the election laws had been changed to let other parties, which outnumber the Communists when combined,

team up against the Communists. In France, for instance, the Communists, who won 180 assembly seats in the 1946 elections, got only about 89 Sunday.

But—and this is a significant but—no one here has ventured to say how many seats the Communists would have won this time if the other parties hadn't changed the rules in an effort to squeeze them out.

In Italy the Communist vote so far has been truly impressive. In the national elections there in 1948 the total vote for all parties was 26,800,000, of which the Communists and left-wing Socialists, who joined with them, got 8,137,000, or 30 per cent of the total.

The total vote in the recent Italian elections—covering two-thirds of the country—was 17,000,000, of which the Communists and left-wing Socialists got 6,000,000, or about 35 per cent of the vote.

In short, even though the Communists lost offices, their total following increased. Percentage-wise, they got more votes this year than they did in 1948, when Marshall Plan help was just starting.

Two facts stand out from these elections:

1. In Italy and France the Communists lost seats. By losing representation, they've lost some power to block and tangle up the government.

2. But in both countries the Communists have an enormous following.

In this country the fact that the Communists have lost some positions of power has been greeted as a heartening sign in the fight against communism.

One official here took this view: "When the Communists aren't making progress, they're losing badly. They have to grow to survive."

That may be, even though he overlooked the fact the Communist following in Italy has shown an increase. But there is another view: It is worth serious thought that the Communists can rally so many people to their side in Italy and France after all the Marshall Plan help, plus the fact that both countries now have had six years in which to try to recover from the war.

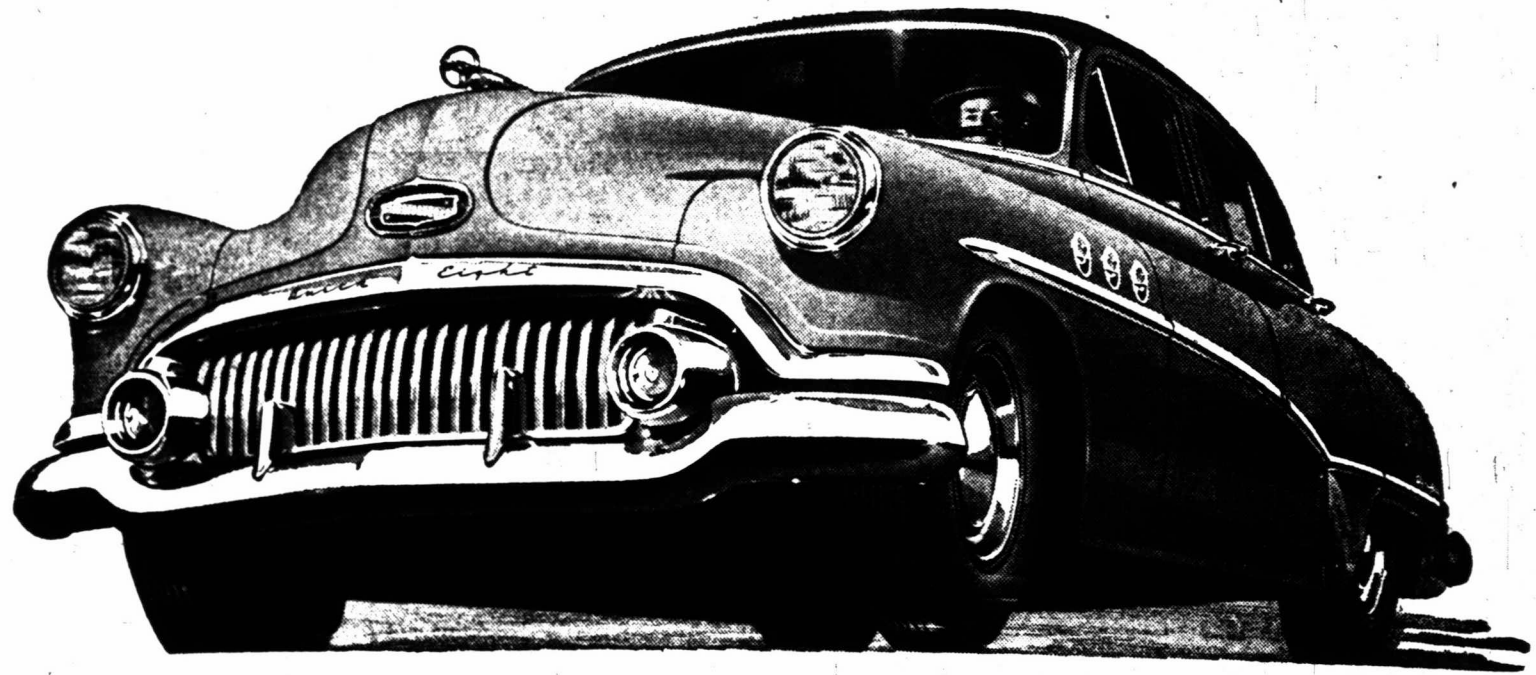

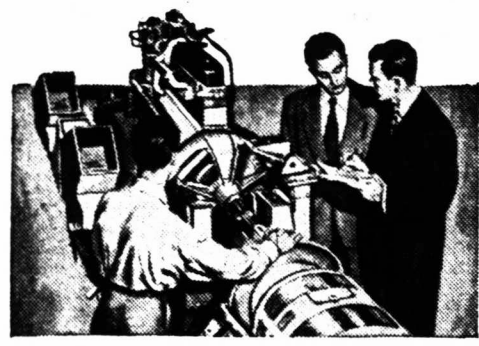

Language Barrier Makes It Tough For Allied Fighters

WITH THE GREEK BATTALION IN KOREA—(AP)—There were two stretchers.

In one, a Greek infantryman lay critically wounded.

"There's where the language barrier hurts," said Lt. Edwin Watkins of Burlington, Mich., forward artillery observer with the Greek battalion.

The two Greeks had been hit by fire from an American tank.

"The Greeks were out on patrol and the tanks were out on patrol and they just crossed paths," Watkins said.

"If we had known there was a tank patrol out there we would have been on the radio channel with them and this wouldn't have happened."

The Greeks said the tanks that shot at them were American Sherman tanks.

A third Greek was hit in the leg. Still able to walk, he was not considered wounded.

Will Be Back

"That kid will be back in his fox-hole in a minute," said Watkins. "In an American unit he would have been sent to the hospital."

A Greek medic was bandaging one of the wounded men, who was unconscious.

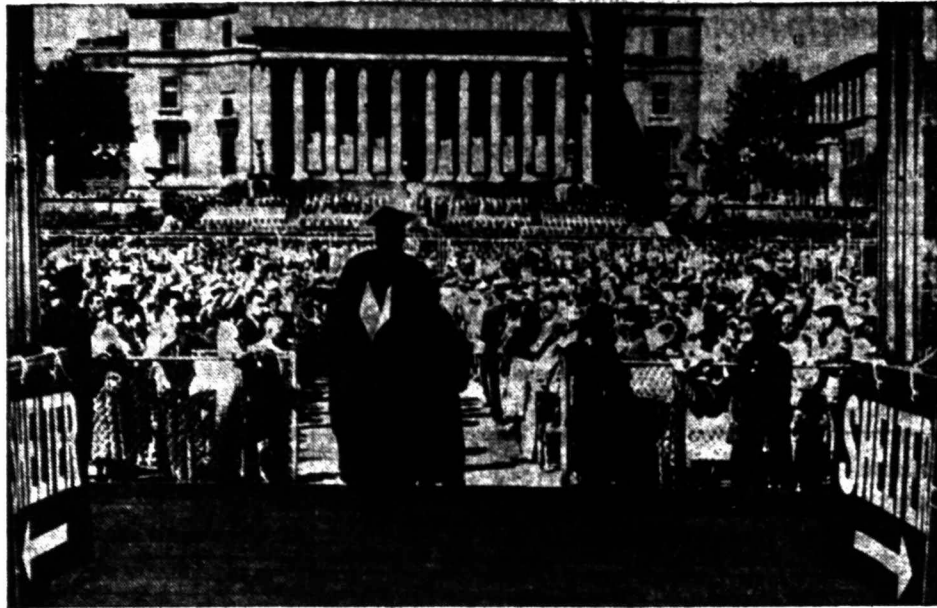
"I don't know whether he will live or not," Watkins said.

This Greek forward observation post is atop a hill overlooking Chinese territory. The Greeks would have to carry him half a mile by stretcher to a bumpy mountain trail. From there it was two miles by jeep to a medical aid station. The patrol already had carried its two casualties four miles over mountainous terrain.

"The Greeks will be bitter for a while," Watkins said.

"Not bitter at Americans but bitter at the tanks. They won't do anything to do with tanks for a few days."

Louisiana Legislators Kill Proposal To Take Up Crime And Law Enforcement Probe

BATON ROUGE, LA.—(AP)—Louisiana lawmakers killed a proposal Tuesday night that they take up the investigation of state crime and law enforcement where the Kefauver Committee left off.

Rep. Algie Brown of Shreveport introduced a resolution asking for a House of Representatives committee to dig into Senate Crime Committee reports that some Louisiana law enforcement officers had a "deep-seated aversion" to enforcing the law.

The Louisiana House of Representatives, meeting in extraordinary session Tuesday night, voted down the resolution 60 to 20. Nineteen did not vote.

Opposition to the motion was led by Rep. Marion Valle of Jefferson Davis Parish who told his colleagues he couldn't participate in such an investigation because:

"My wife loves me too much to let me go to Bourbon Street to see who gives poison to who."

He was referring to New Orleans' gaudy, bawdy French Quarter avenue where several cases of doping by "knockout drops" have been investigated from time to time.

"We run our parish according to the laws passed by the Legislature. X X X you can't expect lawmakers to suddenly become law enforcers," Valle argued. "That's up to the local people."

Editor Flies 10,000 Miles To Present Pictures To Soldier

TOKYO—(AP)—A newspaper editor traveled 10,000 miles to present Sgt. Joe (Poppy) Finch of Toledo, Ohio, an album of pictures of Mrs. Finch and their newborn son, Paul Michael.

The album was taken to Korea by Michael Bradshaw, editor of The Toledo Blade.

Finch saw a picture of his son and exclaimed:

"He has a nose like mine!"

Finch had sent a money order to the Blade to buy a present for his wife when the child was born.

The Blade in turn sent the sergeant a \$50 war bond.

Bradshaw assigned photographers to compile a picture album of mother and son. Then he flew to Korea to present the album.

Secretary of State Acheson, when he was before the committee, said he had direct orders from Truman not to tell the committee what was said at the White House meetings.

Both Bradley and Acheson did testify as to the conclusions reached at the conferences. They said their refusal applied only to relating the actual conversations.

In his letter to Russell, MacArthur also declared that he took "sharp exception" to the interpretations some witnesses gave to events of which they had "little or no knowledge" and which took place "thousands of miles" from them.

Water Injections Help Oil Wells

BRADFORD, PA.—Hot water injections may be just the thing to pep up lagging crude oil production in almost depleted Western Pennsylvania oil fields.

This conclusion is based on a six-month field experiment recently completed here by the Pennsylvania Grade Crude Oil Association. Tests were made in a water injection well 1,200 feet deep.

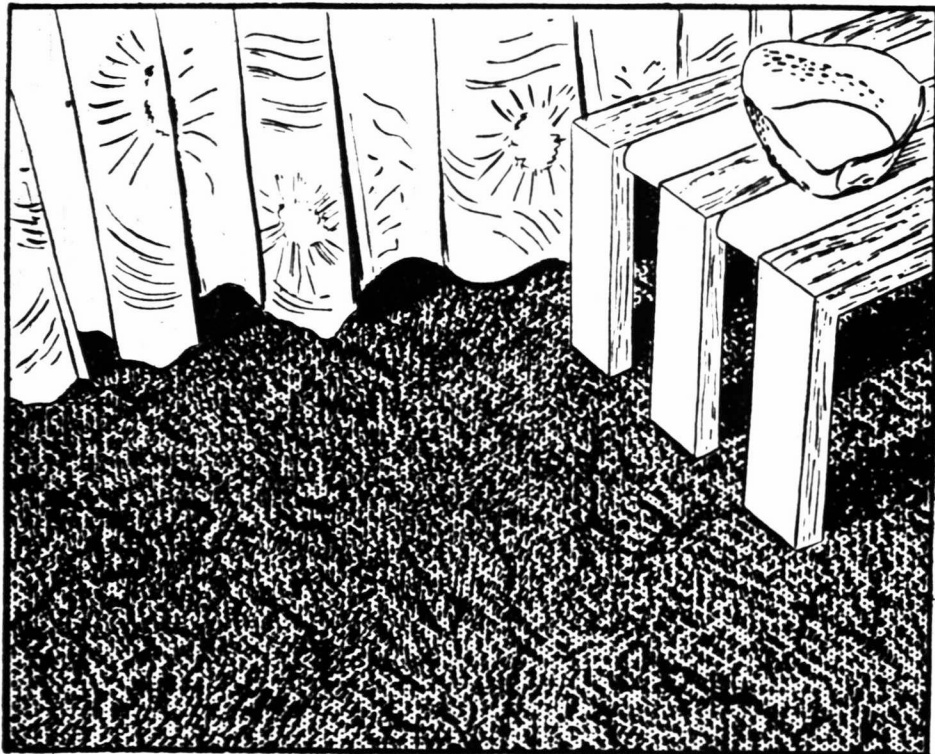
Dr. J. N. Breston, director of Penn Grade's Bradford University laboratory, explained that the rate of oil recovery by water flooding oil sands depends on the rate at which the water is injected. Hot water injections caused the test well to take one-fourth more water, Breston said. This indicates a quicker and more economical oil recovery.

In the experiment, research workers lowered a special electric heater to the bottom of the well which heated the water just as it entered the oil sand. The water's temperature was raised to 300 degrees.

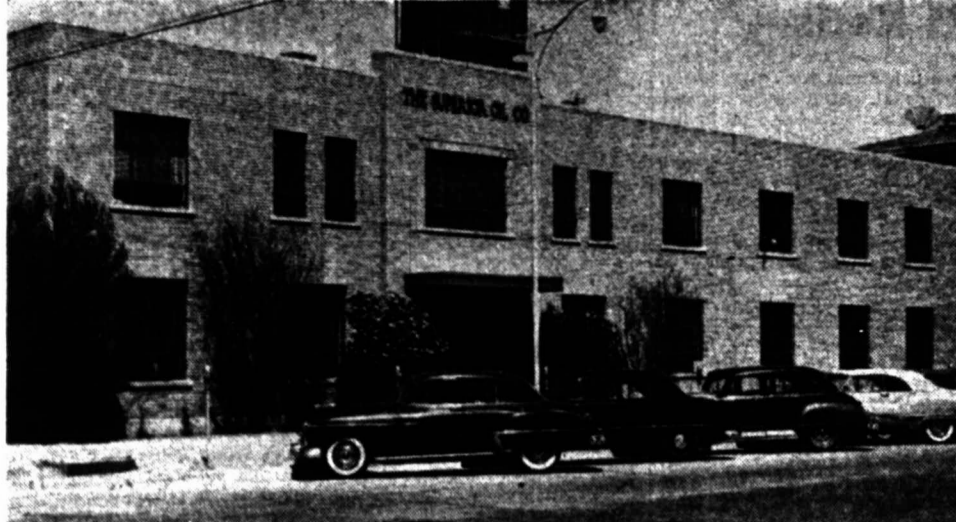

'Elmer' Leads Life Of Many Accidents But They're All Dedicated To Science

WASHINGTON — "Elmer," the rubber man, is taking a terrific bouncing around in the interests of advancing aviation.

"Elmer" is a remarkable life-like model produced by the Civil Aeronautics Administration for testing various apparatus designed to insure human safety in air travel. No sooner was he "born" in the machine shop of John J. Swearingen in the Civil Aviation Medical Research Laboratories at Oklahoma City, than he was "apprenticed" to the Beech Aircraft Corporation at Wichita, Kansas, for studies in the design of improved shoulder harness for pilots. Now, having almost completed this assignment, Elmer is being loaned by the CAA to the Air Force for studies they are making in deceleration at the Muroc Lake air base.

Later, he will work at Oklahoma City where the CAA is interested in behavior of the human body under certain conditions of aircraft operation and accidents.

Head of Old Hickory

The fact that he is so near human in his compressibility, flexibility, center of gravity, muscular contraction and natural relaxation is due to the clever design by Swearingen and his assistants, and it gives Elmer a personality well-recognized around the aeronautical center. There, he is never referred to as a "crash dummy," but always as "Elmer."

Swearingen carved the head from a well-seasoned block of hickory, sawed it in half and inserted a large bolt for attachment to the neck structure. Then the sides were glued together and bolted through the eye sockets. The result is a head of satisfactory weight and center of gravity without the use of lead.

"Elmer's" neck consists of circular pieces of foam rubber, one inch thick, compressed between circular steel plates. The neck bends

naturally. Shoulders are of three sections made of wood, reinforced with steel, and the arms are held on by a steel cable with springs. Arms and legs are made of sections of pipe over angle iron with mellen lead added to stimulate exact human conditions.

Life of Accidents

Swearingen's best work, however, and probably it is unique in the making of dummies, was in the design and construction of the thorax and abdomen. The construction involves lamination of alternate sheets of steel and one-inch-thick foam rubber, strung on a steel cable at the end of which is a spring. This spring can be tightened or loosened to adjust resistance to flexion. The trunk has a small degree of rotation, and can be flexed to the side or forward. "Elmer" always returns to a sitting position without any adjustments.

He weighs 216 pounds, and his body action is so life-like that his stomach has a roll of "flesh" just above the belt when he is bent over. "Elmer's" skin and covering body tissues are foam rubber, and he is enclosed in a light canvas, skin-tight suit. This makes him easier to carry, although CAA acquaintances think Elmer would be fine practice material for policemen who have to handle unwieldy inebriates or clothes, he usually wears a plain white coverall.

"Elmer" always travels by air. He flew to Wichita. When his job there is done, he will be flown by the Air Force to Muroc. He is destined to a life of accidents, all of them intentional, and all of them happening directly to "Elmer."

Sooner Poison Ivy Is Treated The Easier It Will Be To Cure

My favorite story about poison ivy occurred several years ago when I found a city-bred woman on the beach one hot day fanning off the flies with a fine sprig of poison ivy. As expected she later had a rather unpleasant few days.

Poison ivy (and poison oak and sumach) are principally Summer troubles, not because they are poisonous at that time of the year only, but principally because more people are roaming around the countryside in warm weather and therefore more likely to come in contact with them. Actually the irritating oil which they contain can produce trouble in the dead of Winter, and sometimes difficulty has developed merely from being in the smoke of a fire in which poison ivy was being burned.

But this is really a Summer complaint and is better avoided than treated. The most important thing is that anyone who is remotely likely to go near a place where poison ivy grows should learn to recognize this plant with its shiny three pointed leaf. It then can be avoided like "poison." Not all people are equally sensitive to the oil of this plant. Some people break out even if they just walk by the plant. Others claim that they never get it, but almost every doctor has seen patients with severe skin irritations from this source who boasted and were careless once too often.

In spite of precautions there will continue to be some who come in contact with poison ivy. If this is discovered at the time the best thing to do is to wash the skin which came in contact two or three times with soap and water—and just as soon as possible.

For small skin irritations calamine lotion or crystals of potassium permanganate dissolved in water (the latter stains the skin) often are useful and will help to prevent the irritation from spreading. The spreading, incidentally, can be done by scratching or rubbing since the oil is so irritating that even a small amount carried by the hand can cause trouble elsewhere. For cases in which a large area of the skin is involved, professional attention is usually necessary.

Tommy Holmes Takes Over As Boston Braves New Manager

CHICAGO — (AP) — Tommy Holmes, lacking even half a season of minor league managerial seasoning, Wednesday took the helm of the Boston Braves abandoned by a four-time National League pennant winner nearly twice his age.

The 33-year-old Holmes, former Braves' batting hero, was due to arrive in Chicago Wednesday. He was to direct Boston against the Chicago Cubs in the third game of a four game series, only a few hours after Billy Southworth left for home after resigning his reported \$50,000-a-year job Tuesday. Southworth, 58, had a five-year contract which extended through 1952.

Holmes, Brooklyn-born Irishman who owns a batch of Braves' batting records, never directed a professional club until he took over the Boston-owned Hartford team in the Class A Eastern League this Spring.

"Don't worry about experience," commented General Manager John Quinn of the Braves. "Remember Bucky Harris, Lou Boudreau and Mel Ott all stepped into major league managerial spots without experience."

"Tommy has had a fine background in baseball (nine major league playing seasons all with the Braves) and he did a remarkable job for the short while he was at Hartford." Holmes left Hartford first in the Eastern loop race.

Quinn said the Braves reluctantly accepted the resignation of Southworth, who last Sunday told Owner Lou Perini and Quinn he felt "some one else could do a better job."

Southworth broke down when Boston sports writers said goodbye to him at a press conference Tuesday.

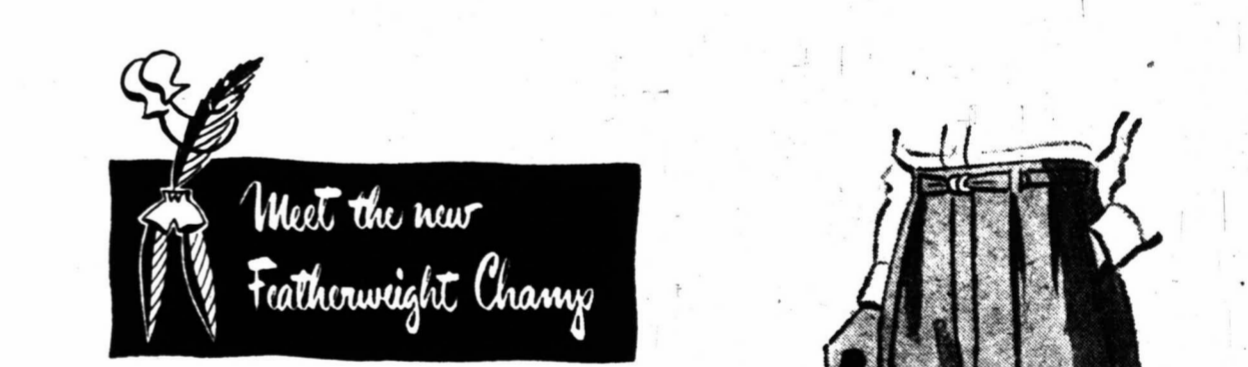
