Kerr-McGee Gets Big Flow Of Oil In DST At Andrews Wildcat

Kerr-McGee Oil Industries, Inc., No. 1-B-11-23 University, Central-South Andrews County wildcat, 14 miles southwest of the town of Andrews flowed oil naturally at the estimated rate of from 80 to 100 barrels per hour from an unidentified lime at 7,944-94 feet.

The flow came during a 22-minute drillstem test of that interval. Gas surfaced in three and one-half minutes and oil flowed out at the top in 15 minutes.

Closed On Account Of Fire
After flowing at the estimated rate of from 80 to 100 barrels per hour for seven minutes the tool was closed. Operator closed the tool while the oil was still flowing steadily. There was a small fire near the rig and it was decided it was unwise to allow the oil and gas to flow longer on account of the possible fire hazard.

The fluid left in the drill pipe when the tool was closed was reversed out. Recovery was 180 feet of oil and gas cut mud. There were no signs of water. The flow was through a five-eighth inch bottom hole choke and a one-inch top opening off of the drill pipe. The project is to core deeper.

Had High Shows
This wildcat has logged possibilities of small production in the San Andres, in the Fullerton section of the Clear Fork and in the Wichita-Albany. It is contracted to 11,000 feet to find and test the Ellenburger.

Location is 2,907 feet from north and 2,032.4 feet from west lines of section 23, block 11, University survey. The wildcat is in an undeveloped area between the Embarras and the Three Bar fields.

Humble Gets Free Oil In Wolfcamp At Garza Prospector

Humble Oil & Refining Company No. 1 Jeff Justice, Jr., Southeast Garza County exploration developed free oil in a test in the Wolfcamp lime of the Permian at 4,558-4,740 feet.

The tool was open one hour and 10 minutes. No fluid came to the top while the tester was open. Recovery was 210 feet of oil and gas cut drilling mud and 900 feet of free oil. There were no signs of water.

The prospector has deepened to 4,865 feet and is still in lower Permian lime. Operator is now preparing to take another drillstem test.

South Of Justiceburg.
Location is 660 feet from north and west lines of section 18, block 6, H&G survey. The project is three miles south of the town of Justiceburg.

This wildcat is one location south of the opener of the Tobe-Strawn field. That well is a small pumper from the Strawn section of the Pennsylvanian.

The Humble No. 1 Justice was started out to go to 7,500 feet to try for production in the Strawn. It probably will continue to that objective.

No free oil was developed in the Wolfcamp in the Tobe Foster and others No. 1 Justice, the discovery well of the Tobe-Strawn field.

Ellenburger Opener In E-C Scurry Flows 216 BO On Potential

R. Olsen Oil Company of Oklahoma City has completed its No. 1 J. W. Templeton as a flowing discovery from the Ellenburger in East-Central Scurry County.

The well was finished for a daily potential of 219 barrels of 42.2-gravity oil.

First hour of a full 24-hour potential test, the oil flowed 50 barrels of oil through a one-inch choke. The second hour of the test was made on a one-half-inch choke.

During that time it made 27.5 barrels. The next three hours the well made 7.5 barrels of oil per hour through a one-quarter-inch choke. 1/4-inch Choke

The last 18 hours of the potential test the discovery flowed at the rate of five barrels of oil per hour through a one-quarter-inch choke.

Gas-oil ratio was 462-1. Pressure on casing was 330 pounds and on tubing 140 pounds.

It was completed natural from open hole at 7,390-7,435 feet. The Ellenburger top and the top of the pay is at 7,397 feet, elevation 2,395 feet.

No. 1 J. W. Templeton is 4,000 feet northwest of the discovery well of the Hermleigh-Ellenburger. (Continued On Page Seven)

Civic Leaders Are Called In Crime Probe

AUSTIN (AP)—The state auditor gave the House Crime Investigating Committee a detailed breakdown Monday on the Macco interests' total income of \$3,518,318 last year. The auditor, C. H. Carness, was the first witness called as the state's spotlight on crime was swung on Galveston in public hearing.

AUSTIN (AP)—Galveston civic leaders were subpoenaed to appear at the hearing on Galveston crime because they refused to come on invitation, Rep. Fred Meridith said Monday.

Meridith, chairman of the House Crime Investigating Committee, issued the subpoena as the state spotlight on crime swung again toward Galveston and the Macco Syndicate's multi-million-dollar gambling operations.

"Some sources have seen fit to criticize the fact that certain civic leaders of Galveston have been subpoenaed to appear at this hearing, rather than being invited," Meridith observed as the public hearing began.

"Let the record reflect that in each instance where this committee has invited a witness by letter to appear that we have received respectful declinations and advice that they would obey any directive order or subpoena of the committee."

Meridith's statement obviously was a reply to Galveston Mayor Herbert Y. Cartwright, Jr., who has criticized the committee for ordering civic leaders to appear. Cartwright said he was sure such citizens would appear.

Hollywood Producer Denies Membership In Communist Party

WASHINGTON (AP)—Screen Producer Robert Rossen testified Monday he is not a Communist Party member but balked at saying whether he had been in the past.

The 43-year-old Academy Award winner told the House-Un-American Activities Committee:

"I wish to state emphatically that I am not a member of the Communist party, and that I am not in sympathy with it or its aims. I don't believe in divided loyalties.

"If this country goes to war, I stand ready to bear arms as I always have against any and all of its enemies, including the Soviet Union."

But to all committee questions dealing with his activities up to the moment, Rossen refused to answer because of possible self-incrimination.

Chairman Wood (D-Ga.), announced he again had postponed the appearance of Maj. Gen. Charles A. Willoughby, Gen. Douglas MacArthur's former chief intelligence officer, who had been called to testify Thursday about Soviet espionage in the Far East.

Wood said the Willoughby hearings were sidetracked indefinitely until the general is excused from medical care. He explained Willoughby is now on sick leave.

Rossen, 43, has just completed the movie "The Brave Bulls," and previously won the picture Oscar for his production of "All the King's Men."

Few Difficulties Reported In Shift To Dial Telephones

Midland's conversion to dial telephones went off with a minimum of difficulties, a Southwestern Bell Telephone Company official reported Monday.

The change-over was completed at 12:01 a.m. Sunday.

"There were a few little unexpected troubles that came up," said District Manager Billy Yeatts, "but we are getting them ironed out satisfactorily."

"Actually, the conversion was a made with a minimum of trouble," Yeatts said the company was rushing to completion several cable projects within the city and as soon as these are placed in service, telephones will be available to everyone within the city limits.

A-Bomb Planes Kept Ready To Hit Back If U. S. Is Attacked

WASHINGTON (AP)—Maj. Gen. Emmett (Rosie) O'Donnell told senators Monday the Air Force is keeping atom-bomb-carrying planes ready to strike back swiftly if this country is attacked.

"We have streamlined our packages and equipment so that we can get out there in an absolute minimum of time and go into action," O'Donnell said.

O'Donnell, former head of the Strategic Bombing Command in the Far East, was testifying as the thirteenth, and scheduled final witness, at Senate hearings on the dismissal of Gen. Douglas MacArthur.

The senators aimed to finish with him and complete the inquiry Monday.

It was the forty-second day of hearings by the Senate Armed Services and Foreign Relations Committees.

Before O'Donnell began testifying the senators spent considerable time debating whether to call W. Averell Harriman, presidential advisor on foreign affairs, as a witness.

Nationwide Strike Called Against WU

WASHINGTON (AP)—A nationwide strike against Western Union was called Monday by the AFL Commercial Telegraphers Union for 5 a.m. (CST) Monday, July 2.

The union is demanding a 25 cent hourly wage boost for 35,000 employees.

The CTU is bargaining agent for all Western Union employees except about 4,000 in metropolitan New York City, who are represented by the American Communications Association.

U. S. Official Sees Jap Peace Treaty By September 1

TOKYO (AP)—John Allison, U. S. State Department policy expert, said Monday a Japanese peace treaty may be signed by September 1 and that it will allow Japan to rearm if she sees fit.

He said a first draft has been completed and...

"Every one of the most interested Pacific nations has either put something into it or taken something out."

"It is a joint effort and I am happy to say that there is a large measure of agreement."

He said the draft will be sent out again in a week or two for additional comments, if any, by the interested nations.

Korean War Roars Into Second Year

TOKYO (AP)—The world talked of peace, but the Korean war roared into its second year Monday.

Chinese and North Korean Reds were more aggressive all along the 100-mile battlefield.

Communist jets streaked out of their Manchurian sanctuary on another typical hit-and-run attack.

Allied warships continued to pour a hail of steel into east coast ports in North Korea.

The cease-fire and armistice proposal by Russia's Jacob Malik had put no damper on the fighting.

Red ground forces showed more fight than usual. But by late afternoon there was still no sign of their expected anniversary offensive.

Allies Note Buildups
Allied officers, noting an ominous enemy buildup in the west, had predicted a limited Communist counter-attack to celebrate the war's first birthday.

Thirty red-nosed MIG-15 jets darted back and forth across the Yalu River boundary of Manchuria Monday, jockeying for position to attack Fifth U. S. Air Force F-86 Sabre jets.

One of the Russian-made planes was shot down in flames. The Reds broke off the 10-minute battle and scurried back to safety in Manchuria.

It was the eighth day in the last nine that jet battles have swirled high over North Korea. The Reds have lost 13 planes destroyed and 29 damaged.

Eleven Planes Lost
The Allies have lost 11 planes in that period.

The Reds Sunday drove Allied troops off two important ridges south of Pyongyang, the northern apex of the old Red "Iron Triangle" assembly area.

One hill changed hands six times in 36 hours of bloody fighting. Reds and UN troops met at the top and battled with bayonets, rifles, machine guns and mortars.

The Allies withdrew, then hurled a withering hail of artillery fire on the Red positions. Pilots later spotted enemy dead littering the hillsides.

U. S. Can't Relax, Mobilizer Declares

NEW YORK (AP)—Defense Mobilization Director Charles E. Wilson said Monday America can not afford to relax its defense efforts "even if the Korean war ends tomorrow."

Wilson spoke before the National Industrial Advertisers Association on the first anniversary of the outbreak of the Korean conflict.

"The ending of controls over our economy at the present time would produce chaos and disaster," he said.

Reasons for extending the Defense Production Act—which expires next Saturday—"are even more compelling today than they were when the law was first passed," he said.

"It is senseless for the Chinese to fight on, but fight on they do," he said. "Meantime, in Iran, Malaysia, Indo-China and other parts of the world, danger points exist that could set the whole world aflame."

In the eyes of the Kremlin, he said, Korea is but a skirmish in the battle for world conquest.

Security For Koreans Held Major Point

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP)—President Truman responded to Russia's puzzling peace feeler Monday with an assurance the United States is ready to join in a Korean settlement. But he said any settlement must end the aggression and bring security to the Koreans.

The President's comment topped worldwide reaction to the suggestion of the Soviet Union's Jacob A. Malik for discussion on a cease-fire and withdrawal of all troops from the 38th parallel.

The Peiping radio broadcast Malik's proposal; Pravda and Izvestia printed it in Moscow—all without comment.

Foreign Secretary Morrison said Britain is studying ways to follow up "this possible opening," and cautioned against two much optimism. Foreign Secretary Schuman of France called the Malik move a positive element which would permit the opening of negotiations without conditions. Foreign Minister Pearson of Canada said it would be a great mistake not to follow up Malik's proposal.

Termed First Step
Australia's foreign minister, Richard Casey, said the Australian view is that restoration of the sovereignty of the (South) Korean Republic is the "essential first step."

The President assailed Republican critics for "spreading fear and slander and lies" and trying to "destroy" Dean Acheson, whom he called "one of the greatest secretaries of state in our history."

Malik made his proposal in a broadcast Saturday night. President Truman spoke Monday at a new Air Force development center at Tullahoma, Tenn. He said:

"We must build up our strength but we must always keep the door open."

A Waco man whose arm was amputated and a Midland boy with critical head injuries were among six persons hospitalized after three weekend automobile accidents near Midland.

James Carroll Smith, 36, of Waco was reported in serious condition at Midland Memorial Hospital after his left arm was cut off just above the elbow in a collision with a cement truck early Sunday morning.

Highway Patrolmen Mac Stout and Bob Bigler reported Smith's car crossed the center line of the Rankin Highway about 45 miles south of here and collided with a truck, driven by Neal S. Woodfin of Odessa. Woodfin and two men riding with Smith were uninjured.

In Critical Condition
Richard Heard, 12-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Allen G. Heard of 511 West New Jersey Street, was in critical condition at Midland Memorial Hospital Monday. He suffered a minor brain concussion and lacerations of the head and face in a two-car crash three miles west of Midland on U. S. Highway 80 shortly after midnight Saturday.

His parents were hospitalized. Heard, 33, received leg injuries and his wife, 33, suffered shock and bruises. Stout and Bigler said the accident occurred when the right front tire blew out on a car driven by George W. Galloway of Terminal.

Galloway, 18, received a broken wrist.

Suffers Lacerations
Cledonio P. Mendoza, 35, of Mc-Camey suffered lacerations of the scalp and face and a possible skull fracture in the third wreck. Mendoza's car overturned while it was being towed by a truck about six miles south of here on the Rankin Highway, the patrolmen said.

The car was dragged about 300 feet on its top. Three other men in the car and the driver of the truck, Eugene R. Mendoza, of Midland, were not injured.

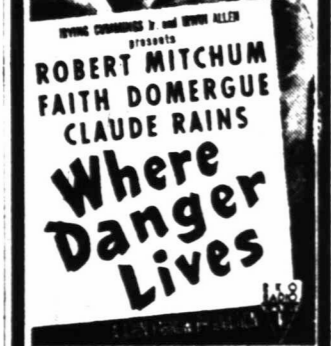

Where Do We Go From Here

A year ago this month the great American Summer exodus was getting under way. President Truman was spending a sultry Saturday afternoon back home in Missouri.

That afternoon—it was just before Sunday dawn in the Far East—a war began on Korea's 38th parallel. Nobody here exactly called it a war.

When we got into it, alone at first but almost immediately under the United Nations flag, nobody was quite sure where we were going.

Six months after the strange war-that-was-not-a-war started, it began to look almost as if we were not going anywhere. We had almost been pushed off the Korean peninsula; we had recovered and moved deep into North Korea, far beyond the arbitrary 38th parallel; and we had been shoved back again while green troops talked about "bugging out."

Now we have recovered again. Over ridges and rice fields littered with dead Chinese Communists, we have forged our way back up the peninsula to a curving line that is mostly north of the 38th. Our troops are no longer green, and morale is high.

We have taken a terrible toll of North Korean Reds and the Chinese Communists who joined them. But we have paid heavily, too; after a year of fighting, our casualties, the number of men, ships and planes in combat, and the cost in dollars is greater than in first year of war against Japan.

But in that war, our policy was clear; there was no doubt where we were going.

In this one, even our immediate victory seems indecisive. We are talking about peace—anxiously, in fact. There are reports that Russia is talking about it, too, but nobody knows how seriously. Meantime, there are plenty more Red Chinese in North Korea, still more across the Yalu River in Manchuria.

Meantime, there have been long, drawn-out hearings in Washington. There seems to be less talk about tomorrow than about yesterday, not only in Korea but in the whole Far East.

Where do we go from here? After a whole year, we have built up our defenses, taken ships and planes out of mothballs, put new men in uniform—but we have nothing that looks like a policy for Korea, which is where the fighting is going on.

It seems high time the Administration and Congress got together and made a decision. The way it shapes up at the moment, if peace were to come in Korea tomorrow, we wouldn't know what to do about that, either.

Reason No. 3 I am not so certain of. But I have a theory—which may be entirely wrong—that wars can be isolated. They don't necessarily have to spread throughout the world.

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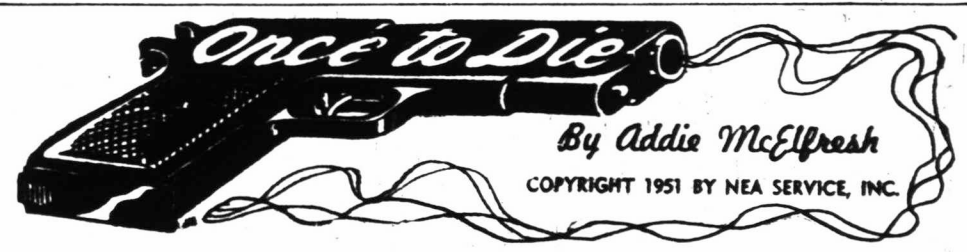

TEHRAN, IRAN —(P)— The British Embassy announced Monday the Iranian National Oil Company accused British oil men here of sabotage in refusing to authorize signing of receipts for oil pumped aboard tankers. It said Ambassador Sir Francis Shephard protested the accusation to the Iranian Foreign Ministry.

Loading of tankers has been halted in Abadan, the oil refinery port, for three days because the Iranians have been demanding receipts stating the oil being pumped aboard was the property of the Iranian National Oil Company, set up to take over AIOC properties under the nationalization law.
A dozen tankers jammed the Abadan Port because Iranians stopped their sailing with gasoline and oil cargoes from the world's largest refinery there. The ships belong to the AIOC.

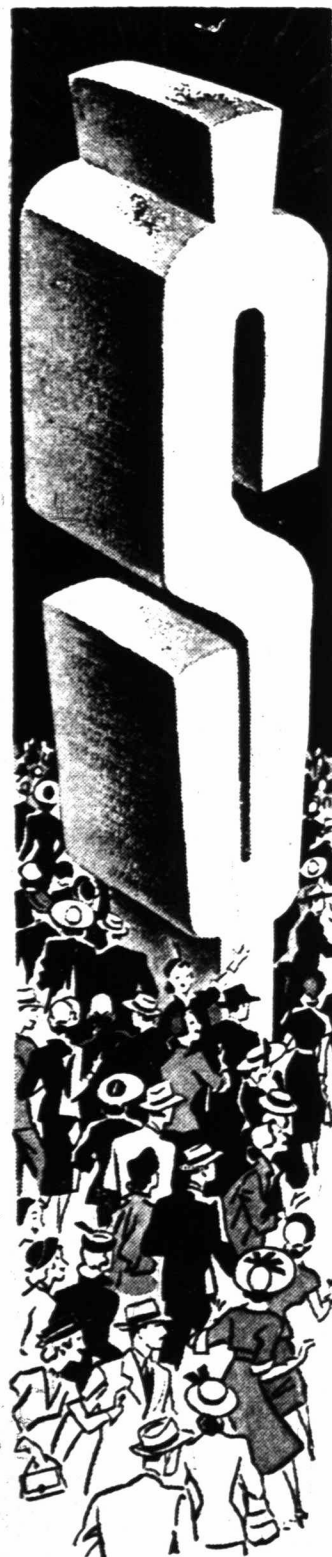

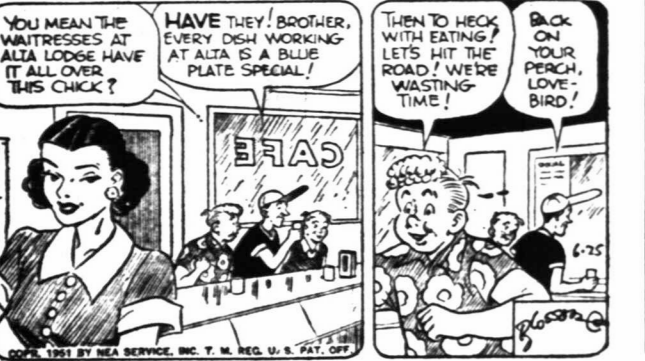

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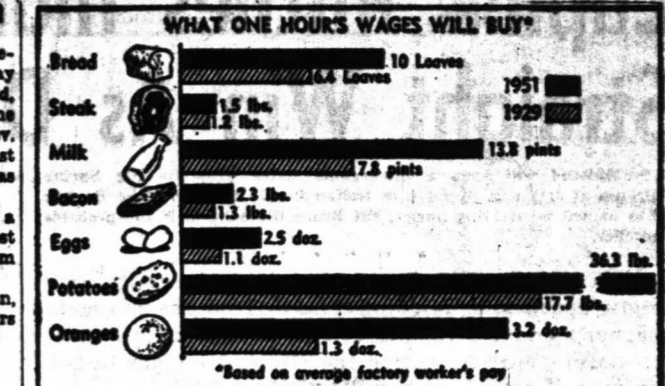

Property Damage in South Plains Caused by Hard Winds, Hail

 Heavy wind, rain, and hail struck at crops and caused property damage in parts of the South Plains Sunday.
 Six inches of rain fell in two periods at Muleshoe, Bailey County. For more than three hours the city was without lights, and wire communications were knocked out. Winds which hit 60 miles an hour destroyed an airplane and the Muleshoe Airport Hangar.
 The roof was blown off the Workman lumber company. Numerous plate glass windows were smashed. Twenty or 30 houses in a low area of town were flooded. It was feared crops in the area—some 60 miles northwest of Lubbock—took a beating.
 The Muleshoe storms came Sunday night. Earlier hail and high winds slashed heavily at harvest-heavy wheat fields of Castro County, near Hart.
 The storm hit a narrow section northwest of Hart, about 27 miles northwest of Plainview. It stripped an area eight miles long and several miles wide through the wheat fields.
High As Truck
 C. R. Bennett of Hart, landowner in the area, said he found hail piled in drifts "as high as a truck."
 Some motorists reaching Plainview said they saw hail drifts almost as high as fence posts.
 Bennett's son, Edward, said his crop of 250 to 300 acres of wheat was wiped out. It was ready for harvest.
 In many window panes were broken in Hart. Power lines were blown down and Hart was without electricity for several hours.
 The weather was generally cooler Sunday. Prusid's 108 degrees was the highest temperature. One other station reported as much as 100 degrees: Salt Flat, 104.

Must Be Ready
 "In Korea and in the rest of the world we must be ready to take any steps which truly advance us toward world peace. But we must avoid like the plague rash actions which would take unnecessary risks of world war for weak actions which would reward aggression."
 As the President spoke, sentiment was growing in the United Nations for a determined effort to smoke out the Russians and see whether Malik was talking peace or propaganda.
 The President of the UN General Assembly, Nasrallah Entezam of Iran, made reservations to come to the United Nations late Monday from Washington, perhaps for a personal conference with Malik. He will preside Tuesday at a special meeting of the General Assembly to hear President Galo Plaza Lasso of Ecuador.
 Opposition to the Russian peace feeler came from South Korea and from Nationalist China.
 A spokesman for the government of President Syngman Rhee, of the Republic of Korea, said the Russian move is a "trick."

Drilling Good Here For Next 50 Years

Members of the Kiwanis Club heard a prediction Monday the oil industry will be drilling wells in the Midland area for the next 50 years. The prediction came from James C. Watson, oil editor of The Reporter-Telegram, who appeared as the principal speaker at the weekly luncheon-meeting of the organization at the Hotel Scharbauer.
 "My opinion," said Watson, "is based on what I've been told by people who ought to know what they're talking about."
 The speaker traced the progress made in the oil industry in the Midland area to the point where "in many ways we now have the outstanding oil in the United States in the Midland basin and in Midland County."
 1942 Was Low
 Watson said Midland's population was 2,194 in 1910, slipped down to 1,795 in 1920 and climbed to 5,480 in 1930 "shortly after the oil business began moving here from San Angelo."
 "But 1942 was as low a period as we have known since we went into the oil business," continued Watson.
 Late that year the Fullerton Field was discovered in Andrews County and other production was found to produce a sweet oil.
 "From that point on," he continued, "there has been a gradual increase in development until today the Midland district of the Railroad Commission is producing more than 1,000,000 barrels of oil a day."
 During the last year oil production increased more than 50 percent in the Permian Basin, he said, compared to an average increase of 23 percent for the rest of the nation.
 "The Permian Basin alone is meeting the increasing need for oil for military and industrial needs," said Watson.

Worker Shortage Cuts Unemployed

PECOS—A shortage in skilled and unskilled workers probably has dropped the percentage of unemployed persons to a new low here.
G. W. Modeste, interviewer and farm placement representative of the Texas Employment Commission, thinks the situation is due to new industries and business expansion, along with the stepped up program at Poyote Air Force Base.
Unskilled workers and skilled workers such as clerks, secretaries and bookkeepers are at a premium. Hayes Aircraft Corporation will want approximately 50 unskilled workers July 15 to help ready planes at Poyote to fly back to their home bases.
Another call for workers is expected to come from Western Cotton Oil Company when it completes its new oil mill this fall. The company is expected to need 75 new workers, some of them unskilled.
The local TEC office is concerned about the Mexican national situation. This area would face a serious agricultural problem should Mexico decline to grant re-contract applications by the July 1 deadline.
Modeste said contracts expired June 15 for some 1,600 nationals, and as yet no word has been received on whether the applications have been approved.

Mass Voting Of Latin Americans Flayed At Meet

LAREDO — The League of United Latin American Citizens has urged U. S. citizens of Latin-American descent to follow the dictates of their conscience in voting.
Members of the league struck at "mass voting" by Latin Americans in a resolution passed Sunday at their twenty-second annual convention closed.
They also called the setback situation a "national scandal," and expressed views on the hiring of Mexican farm labor for work in the United States.
The resolution on more freedom in voting told Latin Americans they should vote for the person they felt was the best candidate. It said they should resist threats, economic pressure, strong arm actions, or other intimidations, when they go to the polls.
Mass voting by Latin Americans, said the resolution, has (1) brought shame and embarrassment to all "right thinking" Latin Americans, and (2) created the conception in other sections of the country that Latin Americans are not yet ready to participate fully and freely in governmental affairs.
George J. Garda, a member of the Laredo Junior College faculty, was elected president of the league. Corpus Christi was named the 1952 convention city.
