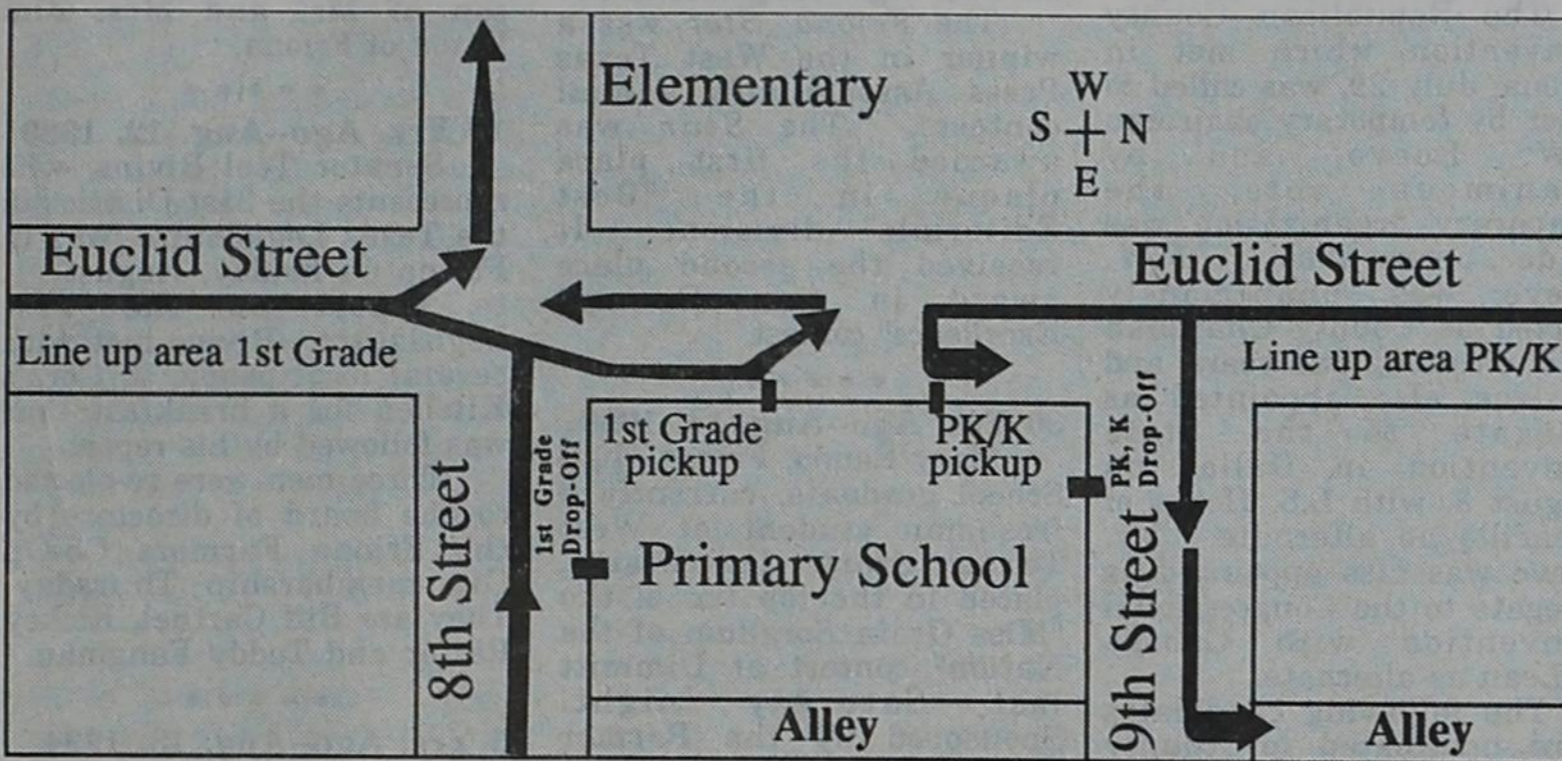

Directions Given For Picking Up Students



Drop-Off & Pick-Up Instructions Offered For PK Through Primary

Friona school officials have announced this year's instructions for dropping off and picking up school children in grades PK through primary.

There will be a meeting for parents and teachers in the Junior High Auditorium on Tuesday evening, August 17 at 7:30 p.m.

First grade arrival will be at 8 a.m. Please proceed west on 8th Street. Form a

single line of traffic close to the curb to drop children off. **Do Not Pass. Do Not Park.** If you would like to park, please park south of the Elementary (front) or in the Primary Parking Lot.

First grade dismissal will be at 3 p.m. Proceed north up Euclid Street. When opened, proceed into the roped off area to pick up your child. Make a U-turn and

proceed south down Euclid or turn west on 8th Street in front of the Elementary.

Please Do Not come west on 8th Street. Eighth Street will be blocked off until all of the traffic is through on Euclid. Your child should be picked up in front of the building where the teachers are releasing them.

There will be no parking during dismissal time at the south end of the Primary. If you need to park, you may park on the south side of the Elementary (front) or in the Primary parking lot.

Do not pass other cars or block alley.

PK/Kindergarten student arrival will be at 8 a.m. Please proceed south down Euclid Street to 9th (north end of building). Turn east on 9th and pull close to the curb to let child out. Please **Do Not Park.** If you would like to park and come in with your child, use the parking lot east of the building.

PK/Kindergarten dismissal will be at 2:50 p.m. Mrs. Smolky, Mrs. White, Mrs. Ellis-North end of building. Proceed south on Euclid Street and turn east on 9th Street. Part of 9th Street is now one-way and you will not be able to come from the east. Pull close to the curb to pick up your child.

Kindergarten dismissal - Mrs. Smiley, Mrs. Procter, Mrs. Field-Front of building. Proceed south on Euclid Street and enter the roped off area making a U-Turn to pick up your child at the front of the building.

If you need to park and come in, you will need to park in the parking lot.

SUMMER SEEMS shorter than it used to... or is it just me? If the children are heading back to school, then it must be autumn. Calendar tells me fall is September 23 which is five and one-half weeks away. Temps are ranging in the 90s to 100s everywhere, the tomatoes haven't turned red yet, and summer flowers are still in bloom. It can't be fall until I get the first Christmas catalogue in the mail, but they seem to come earlier every year, too.

It doesn't matter if you have youngsters in school or not, once school starts, it yanks us all out of those lazy, hazy days of summer and plops us smack into the middle of all those things we said we'd think about later, "in the fall." Our lives and our activities revolve around when school is in session and/or when the kids are out for vacation. How on earth will we all arrange our lives once the "powers that be" get their way and have schools in session all year round?

Okay, I can get past the fact that the largest facilities in all our towns and cities (which are the schools) sit idle for about 10 weeks every summer. Big Whoop! Nobody complains about all those churches that are used only 52 days out of every 365.

I always hated to send my little munchkins back to school every fall. They grow up so fast and have so little time to be children, playing hide-and-seek with the neighbor kids, climbing trees, riding bikes, swimming, jumping on the trampoline. Our lives are so complicated that we now have even less opportunity these days for family activities together with the little people we have brought into this world.

I am not alone. A group known as "Texans for a Traditional School Year" has made their presence known by lobbying for a return to schools starting around Labor Day and ending the last of May. Their poll showed that 60% of Texans preferred the traditional school terms. They noted that the earlier starting date for schools prohibits teachers from taking advantage of enrolling in the full two semesters of summer college and university classes. The shortened summer allows them only one semester of higher education.

Summer jobs for youngsters are in short supply, since few firms want to hire anyone who can work only a few weeks. Three full months of summer would allow for more work experience and help young people earn more toward their future life after high school. After all, training our children to be ready for the world out there is what school is all about. Once they are in the work force, they certainly don't get one or two-week-long vacations every couple of months.

Speaking of the work force... the population of this country is about 237 million. We have 104 million retired folks, which leaves 133 million to do the work. There are 85 million in schools, which leaves 48 million to do the work. Approximately 29 million are employed by the federal government, leaving 19 million to do the work.

Then take off the 2.8 million who are in the Armed Forces, which leaves 16.2 million to do the work. Take from that total the 14,800,000 people who work for state and city governments, and that leaves 1.4 million to do the work. At any given time there are 188,000 people in hospitals, which leaves 1,212,000 to do the work. And now there are 1,211,998 people in prisons.

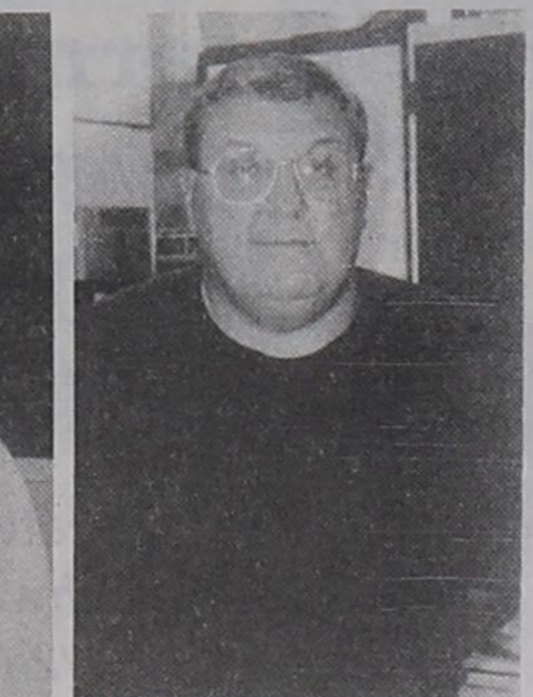
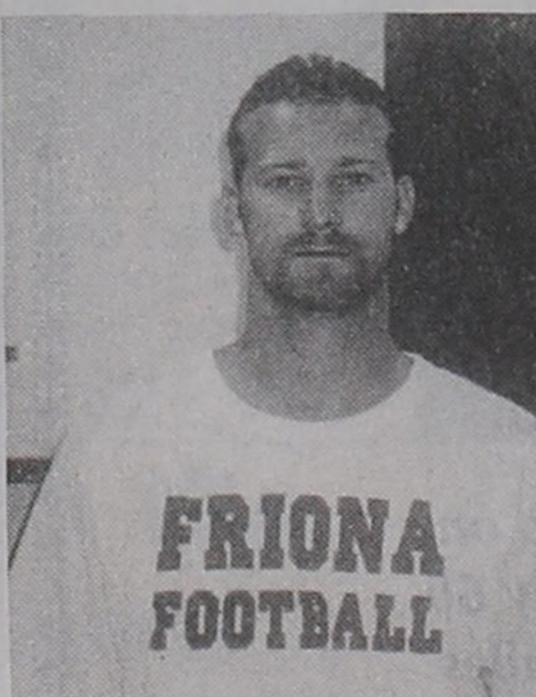
So that leaves just two people left to do the work... you and me, and you're sitting there reading this newspaper!!!

Clinic Set Sept. 8, 29

The Women's Center of the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and Baptist/St. Anthony's Health System will conduct Breast Cancer Screening Clinics at Parmer County Hospital, 1307 Cleveland Avenue in Friona on September 8 and September 29.

Breast cancer affects one in eight women. The key to winning the battle against cancer is early detection by having an annual breast exam, mammogram and performing breast self-exam each month.

Participants will receive a low-cost screening that includes a mammogram and instruction in self-examination by a Registered Nurse. The total cost is \$75. A minimum of fifteen women need to register in order for the mobile mammography clinic to come to area towns.

Funding is available through the Texas Department of Health for Texas residents who qualify for assistance. All exams are done by appointments only. Call (806) 356-1905 or 1-800-377-4673 for more information.

Letter To The Editor

Dear Editor:

I wanted to take the opportunity to write to you for some clarification of information about the Friona Police Department's Police Canine Program and our new dog, "Arno." This project is on-going with the police department as this is our fourth year to support a canine program.

Prior to Arno, "Molly," a black Labrador Retriever, was with the department for three years. Molly was purchased with donations and served area law enforcement as needed and was instrumental in the discovery of narcotics in many cases. Molly's age caused us to retire her and a new dog was sought.

In 1998, we sought the assistance of our community in the purchase of Molly's replacement. The community support was outstanding and money came in from the Friona area, all over Parmer County and the City of Farwell. Due to our county's population, we promoted the dogs use county wide. Our canine program is available to all law enforcement in our county.

We have assisted in Muleshoe, Dimmitt and in Hereford. We have also as-

sisted the Highway Patrol as they have needed us on different roads throughout the county. This is how the program was promoted when donations were sought and this is how we continue to make available the canine as promised.

Arno, a three year old Dutch Shepherd, was ordered in October 1998 and delivery was made in February of this year. Sgt. Michael Howard is Arno's handler and has had extensive training with the program and maintains a continuing education program with the dog as well as other handlers in the Panhandle. Arno is trained in the detection of narcotics, tracking and article search. Arno is also trained in handler protection and offender apprehension. Arno is not "attack trained." Arno is used in our schools in prevention programs.

I would like to thank everyone again who assisted our community with this program and made donations toward Arno's purchase. As promoted, Arno will continue to be available to assist all our area law enforcement. Any organization wanting a demonstration or more information, please contact the police department.

FRIONA FLASHBACKS

...from the files of The Friona Star

65 Yrs. Ago--Aug. 13, 1934

Information from the president of the local board of school trustees, states that the Friona Schools will open for the term on Monday, August 3. A complete faculty of teachers has been secured, which includes practically all who were here last year, with at least one additional teacher, the instructor of vocational agriculture. The fleet of eight new school buses has already arrived and the long garage or shed for their protection has been erected on the newly acquired school property.

60 Yrs. Ago--Aug. 18, 1939

This territory and much of the surrounding counties were visited Sunday night by a good and much needed rain, which gave a fall of from three-fourths of an inch to an estimated inch and a half, as reported from various sections of the territory from a few miles north and west, to the southern limits of the county.

55 Yrs. Ago--Aug. 11, 1944

The Republican County Convention which met in Friona, July 29, was called to order by temporary chairman F.W. Reeve, and by unanimous vote, the temporary organization was made permanent. F.W. Reeve was unanimously elected as County Chairman for the coming two years, and he was also appointed as delegate to the State Convention in Dallas on August 8, with L.S. Hobbs of Amarillo as alternate. Mr. Reeve was also appointed as delegate to the Congressional Convention with George McLean as alternate.

The following candidates were nominated for county officers: Marvin Todd of Friona Precinct, for County Judge; Carl Schlenker of Bovina Precinct, for Sheriff-Assessor-Collector; and Thomas Hartwell of Bovina Precinct, for County and District Clerk.

45 Yrs. Ago--Aug. 12, 1954
Gubernatorial candidate

Ralph Yarborough made a brief stop Tuesday evening at the Friona airport, being met by a local delegation and one from Hereford. Though scheduled to speak at Hereford, Yarborough was forced by delay in plane flights to omit the Hereford visit.

40 Yrs. Ago--Aug. 13, 1959

A.T. Eiland, 81, of Olton Route, Plainview, was reported to be improving at Parmer County Community Hospital, Tuesday, following a collision Thursday about noon at the Hub corner.

Eiland was driving a 1955 Oldsmobile toward Dimmitt when his auto was struck by a 1953 Mack diesel truck loaded with potatoes which was going south toward Muleshoe as the vehicles met in the Hub intersection. The truck, which was driven by J.I. Reames of Amarillo had loaded with potatoes in Hereford and was headed to Midland.

35 Yrs. Ago--Aug. 13, 1964

The Friona Star was a winner in the West Texas Press Association's annual contests. The Star was awarded the first place plaque in the "Best Editorials" division. It received the second place award in the "General Excellence" contest.

30 Yrs. Ago--Aug. 14, 1969

Mary Rando, Friona High School graduate, currently a freshman student at West Texas State University, placed in the top ten of the "Miss Grain Sorghum of the Nation" contest at Dimmitt last Saturday night. Sponsored by the Parmer County Farm Bureau, Miss Rando presented a reading of "Freedom-My Responsibility."

25 Yrs. Ago--Aug. 11, 1974

Fran Dodd Tucker, a native of Friona, was among the 316 students who received their degrees from Eastern New Mexico University in summer

commencement exercises at the university on August 2.

Donnette Carlton, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A.L. Carlton, Sr. of Friona, attended the Texas Farm Bureau Citizenship Seminar recently at Baylor University, Waco, Texas.

20 Yrs. Ago--Aug. 12, 1979

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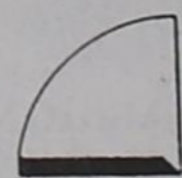
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Out Here

NOTICE OF PROPOSED GAS RATE CHANGE

On August 4, 1999, Energas Company filed Statements of Intent to change its gas rates with each incorporated city listed below. The proposed changes will take effect no sooner than 35 days after filing. Each city may suspend the proposed effective date for an additional 90 days.

The Company proposes to increase rates to General Service (residential and commercial), Small Industrial Service, Large Gas Air Conditioning and/or Electric Generating Gas Service, and the Air Conditioning Rate Rider. The company may implement a different rate design than proposed provided the increased revenue does not exceed that specified herein.

The proposed changes are expected to increase the company's annual revenues by approximately 8.8 percent or \$9.8 million. The proposed changes to the rates are unrelated to gas cost which the company will continue to charge only cost paid to its supplier. The proposed changes could affect approximately 200,000 gas consumers in the following communities:

National School Lunch/ Free Breakfast Program Letter to Households

Parent/Guardian:

The Friona school serves meals each school day. Children may buy lunch for \$1.40-\$1.55 and breakfast for \$0.75-\$1.25. Children may also get meals free or at a reduced price.

If you now get food stamps or TANF for your children, your children can get free meals. If your total household income is the same or less than the amounts on the Income Chart below, your children can get free meals or reduced-price meals. A foster child may get free or reduced-price meals regardless of your income. The reduced price is 40c for lunch, 30c for breakfast, and NA for after school snack. TO GET FREE OR REDUCED-PRICE MEALS FOR YOUR CHILDREN, YOU MUST COMPLETE AN APPLICATION AND RETURN IT TO THE SCHOOL. WE CANNOT APPROVE AN APPLICATION THAT IS NOT COMPLETE.

HOW TO APPLY

If you now get food stamps or TANF for the children you are applying for, the application must have the children's names, a food stamp or TANF case number for each child, and the signature of an adult household member. If you are applying for a foster child, the application must have the child's name, the child's "personal use" income, and an adult signature. If you do not list a food stamp or TANF case number for all children you are applying for, then the application must have the children's names, the names of all household members, the amount of income each person got last month and where it came from, the signature of an adult household member, and that adult's social security number or the word "none" if the adult does not have a social security number.

Verification: Your eligibility may be checked at any time during the school year. School officials may ask you to send papers showing that your children should get free or reduced-price meals.

Fair Hearing: You may talk to school officials if you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the results of verification. You may also ask for a fair hearing. You may do this by calling or writing:

Reporting Changes: If your children get free or reduced-price meals because of your income, you must tell the school if your household size decreases or your income increases by more than \$50 per month or \$600 per year. If your children get meals because you get food stamps or TANF, you must tell the school when you are not getting TANF or food stamps for them. You may then fill out another application giving income information.

Confidentiality: School officials use the information on the application only to decide if your children should get free or reduced-price meals. Free and reduced-price eligibility information may be subject to release to other federal, state and local education, health, or other means-tested programs. Some programs already identified are the National Assessment of Educational Progress and officials collecting data for Title I allocation and evaluation purposes.

Reapplication: You may apply for meals anytime during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a change in status, like a decrease in household income, an increase in household size, become unemployed or get food stamps or TANF for your children, you may then complete an application.

Handicapped: Meal substitutions at no additional cost for children who meet the definition of "handicapped" will be served, provided a physician has submitted a statement attesting to this fact and prescribing a substitute.

IN THE OPERATION OF THE CHILD FEEDING PROGRAMS, NO CHILD WILL BE DISCRIMINATED AGAINST BECAUSE OF RACE, SEX, COLOR, NATIONAL ORIGIN, AGE OR HANDICAP. IF YOU BELIEVE YOU HAVE BEEN DISCRIMINATED AGAINST, WRITE IMMEDIATELY TO THE SECRETARY OF AGRICULTURE, WASHINGTON, D. C. 20250.

We will let you know when your application is approved or denied.

Friona ISD Announces Policy For Lunch Program

Friona Independent School District Food Service announced its policy for free and reduced-price meals for children unable to pay full prices for meals served under the National School Lunch Program and School Breakfast Program.

Application forms will be sent home with every child with a letter to parents or guardians. To apply for free or reduced price meals, households should fill out the application and return it to the school attended by the youngest child or for complete confidentiality, mail the application to Lanis Graham, Verifying Official, 909 E. 11th, Friona, TX 79035. Additional copies of the application can be found at each school.

The information provided on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility and may be verified at any time during the school year by school or other program officials. The application must be signed by an adult household member.

Under the provisions of the free and reduced price meal policy, only the Verifying Official will review applications and determine eligibility. Parents or guardians dissatisfied with the ruling of the official may wish to discuss the decision with the reviewing official on an informal basis.

Applications may be submitted at any time during the year, and our school district strongly encourages everyone to fill one out and sent it in. If a family qualifies for only reduced prices, it will significantly reduce the cost of meals. In the operation of the child feeding program, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age or handicap. If you believe you have been discriminated against, write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C., 20250.

Again, this year, we will be serving breakfast at no charge to all students in the Primary, Elementary, and Jr. High buildings. We thank you for your support. Please do not hesitate to contact our office at 250-2747 if you need help completing your application.

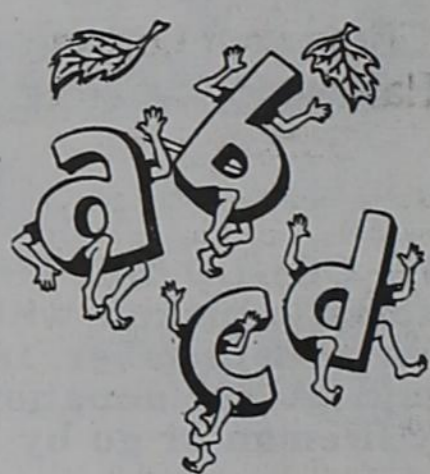

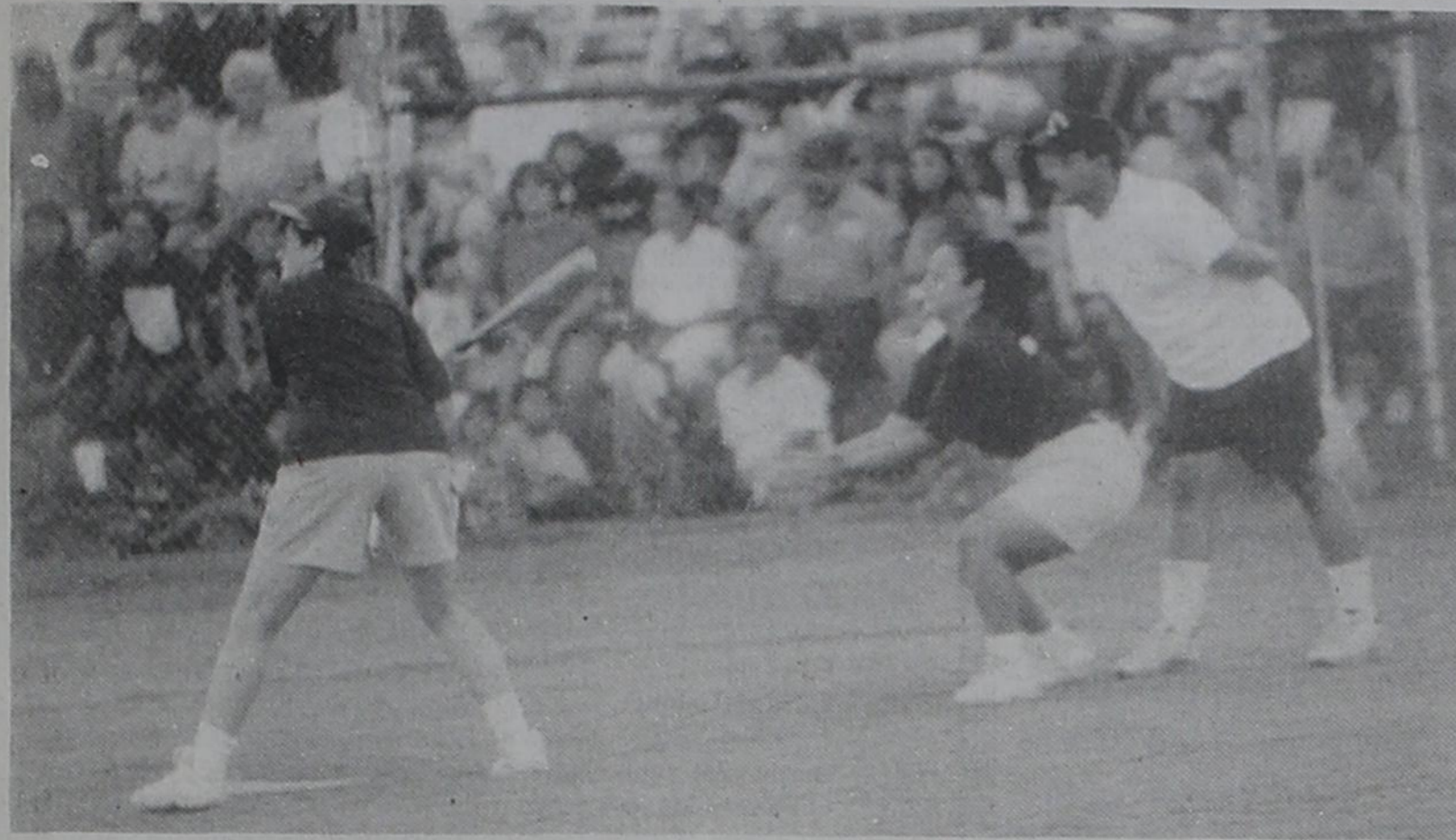

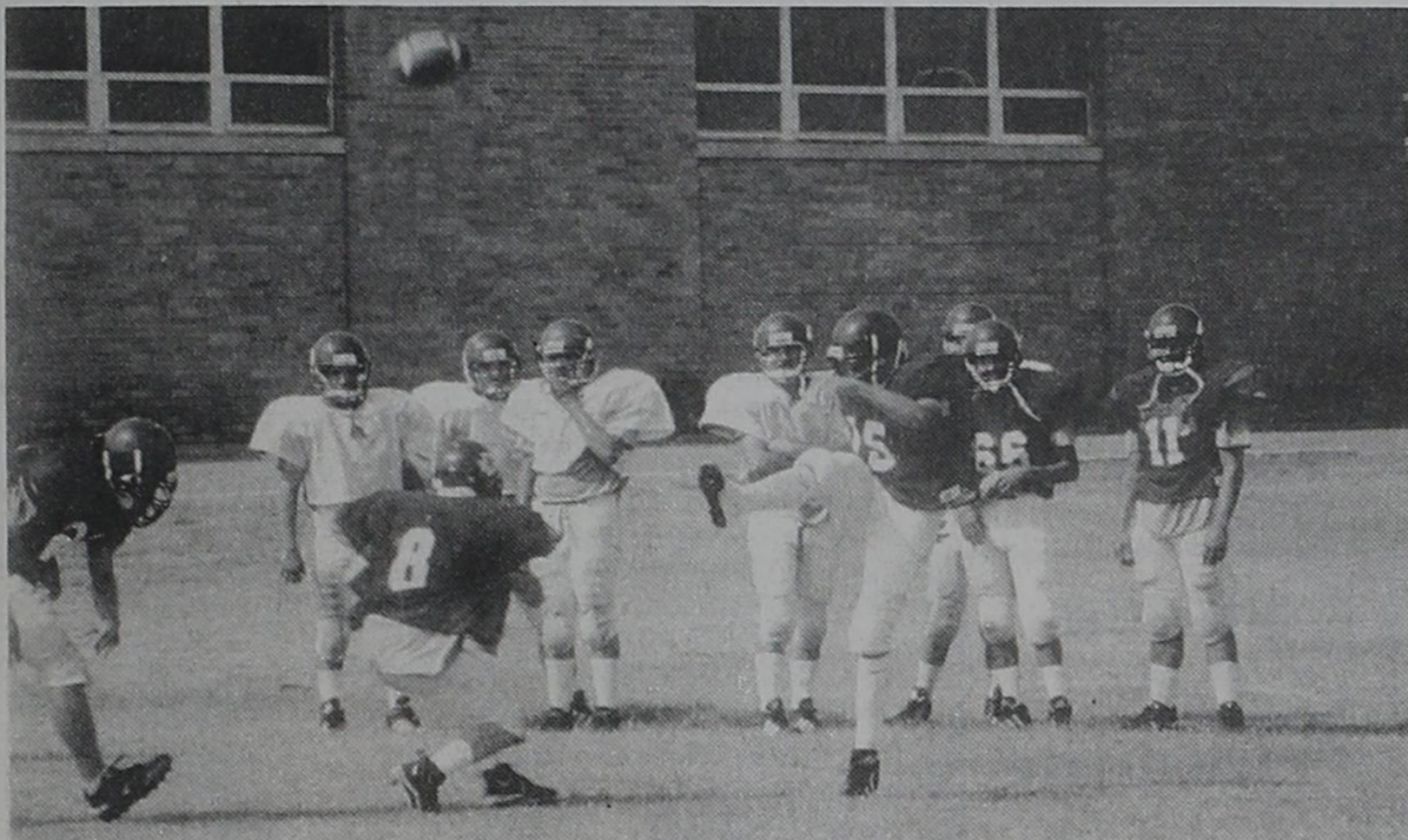

New Law Expands CRP

Across the country, two American traditions are quickly disappearing—abundant wildlife habitat and family farms. A pair of voluntary government pro-

grams promises relief for both, and current bills in the U.S. Congress could expand these programs nationwide.

The United States is losing its wetlands (some of nature's most productive ecosystems) at a rate of more than 170,000 acres a year. Grasslands, forests and other important habitats are disappearing at similarly alarming rates.

At the same time, global economic problems are forcing many farmers out of business. Last fall, Congress approved nearly \$6 billion in emergency farm aid. Federally subsidized crop insurance may cost another \$4 billion.

The Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) and Wetlands Reserve Program (WRP) are restoring wildlife habitat and, at the same time, helping save many family farms. By paying farmers to set aside land for wildlife, these programs have restored millions of acres across the country at a cost of about \$2 billion annually.

The Conservation Reserve Program was initiated in 1985 to help stem erosion on agricultural lands. The program pays farmers to retire their croplands from production for ten years, slowing erosion and providing prime cover for breeding birds and other wildlife. Today, more than 36 million acres are enrolled in CRP.

The Wetlands Reserve Program places conservation easements on marginally productive agricultural lands and restores them to wetlands. More than 800,000 acres are enrolled in this program. Many WRP lands are in the environmentally important Mississippi Delta.

Today, both CRP and WRP are becoming victims of their own success. The number of acres allowed in both programs is limited by Congress, and both are due "fill up" soon. However, many landowners are still interested in enrolling their lands, both for economic and conservation purposes. Bills recently introduced in Congress would raise the caps on acreage for both of these programs.

Officials from Ducks Unlimited the continent's largest wetlands and waterfowl conservation group, and other groups are recommending that the cap on CRP be raised from 36.4 million to 45 million acres. Likewise, they would like to

see the WRP cap raised from 975,000 to 2 million acres.

"We are encouraging our members to contact their congressmen and urge them to support the expansion of CRP and WRP," says Matt Connolly, Executive Vice President of Ducks Unlimited. "These programs are examples of government programs that work for wildlife and work for people, too."
