29 Paratroopers Hurt When Bazooka Shell Explodes

FORT CAMPBELL, KY. (AP)—An eight-pound armor-piercing bazooka shell exploded prematurely on a firing range Wednesday and injured 29 paratroopers. Lt. Col. Reginald Jackson, public information officer, said four of the men were considered hurt critically. All are attached to P Company, Second Battalion, 503rd Airborne Infantry Regiment, based at Fort Campbell. Jackson said the 3.5-inch shell exploded during firing practice in the Roaring Springs area, about 15 miles from the central part of the reservation.

FBI Agents Shoot Down Young Criminal After Long Manhunt

MOBILE, ALA. (AP)—Billy Davis, a 23-year-old desperado who vowed he'd never be taken alive, was blasted to death Wednesday night with a flaming pistol in his hand. FBI agents, who had tracked the Tennessee prison parolee almost a month, surprised him at a farm home and shot him to death as he grappled with a sheriff's deputy. Davis fired once from a .32 caliber target pistol before falling with two bullets in his chest and one in his left arm, the FBI said.

Search Abandoned For Pair Missing In Arizona Desert

RIVERSIDE, CALIF. (AP)—The Air Force has called off the search for a Pasadena auto salesman and his pretty young woman companion, missing three weeks in the blazing and trackless Arizona desert. Trained air rescue teams have searched relentlessly the last eight days for Klaus Martens, 26, and Marijane Walker, 23, a student nurse, who left Los Angeles July 15 in a rented airplane for Blythe, Calif. The plane was found last week in the desert about 90 miles from Yuma and 200 miles off its course.

Young Firebug Must Face Murder Charges

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Despite his mother's plea that "he is still a little boy," 17-year-old Kenneth Skinner will be tried in Superior Court for murder. He is accused of setting the apartment house fire that caused eight deaths here July 22. Juvenile Court Judge Milton D. Sapiro ruled: "Were he to be treated under juvenile law, he would be under the court's jurisdiction for only a three-year period and that is not sufficient for his rehabilitation."

Four Now Held In Dallas Bombings

DALLAS (AP)—Four men have been arrested in the bombings of South Dallas negro homes. Two were picked up Wednesday—one a former coal miner charged with making two bombs, and the other a 48-year-old construction worker accused of handling some of the dynamite. Claude T. Wright, 43, and his half-brother, Arthur Eugene Young, 63, had been charged as the actual bombers. Both are in jail. The former miner, James Pas Alvares, 50, was charged as an accomplice to an attempted arson by bombing.

Water Hearing Held At Plainview

PLAINVIEW (AP)—High Plains residents spoke out Thursday on regulating water beneath their lands. From this testimony, the State Board of Water Engineers was to decide whether to call an election for the creation of an underground water district. This district would have seven broad functions authorized by the Legislature. It also could levy a tax not exceeding 80 cents on the \$100 valuation for its administration.

## Field Operators Ask Present MER's Remain Unchanged

AUSTIN —(P)—Operators in five West Texas fields urged Wednesday that the present most efficient rates of production be unchanged.

Fields on which MER hearings were held by Railroad Commission examiners included the Jordan Connell sand, Jordan Ellenburger and Jordan Tubbs, all in Ector County, and Keystone Devonian and Keystone Ellenburger, both in Winkler.

F. D. Gromman of The Texas Company recommended, on the basis of field producing experience, that the Jordan Connell sand and Jordan Ellenburger each remain on MER's of 122 barrels daily, with limited capacity wells allowed to produce according to ability.

Murray Moffatt of Gulf Oil Corporation suggested, in view of the Jordan Tubbs field's limited history, the 102-barrel-per-day MER be continued until sufficient data can be accumulated on which to base a new determination.

K. C. Howard of Richardson and Bass recommended no change in the Keystone Devonian's well MER of 100 barrels daily and the Keystone Ellenburger's field total of 27,500 barrels per day.

The commission took the testimony under consideration.

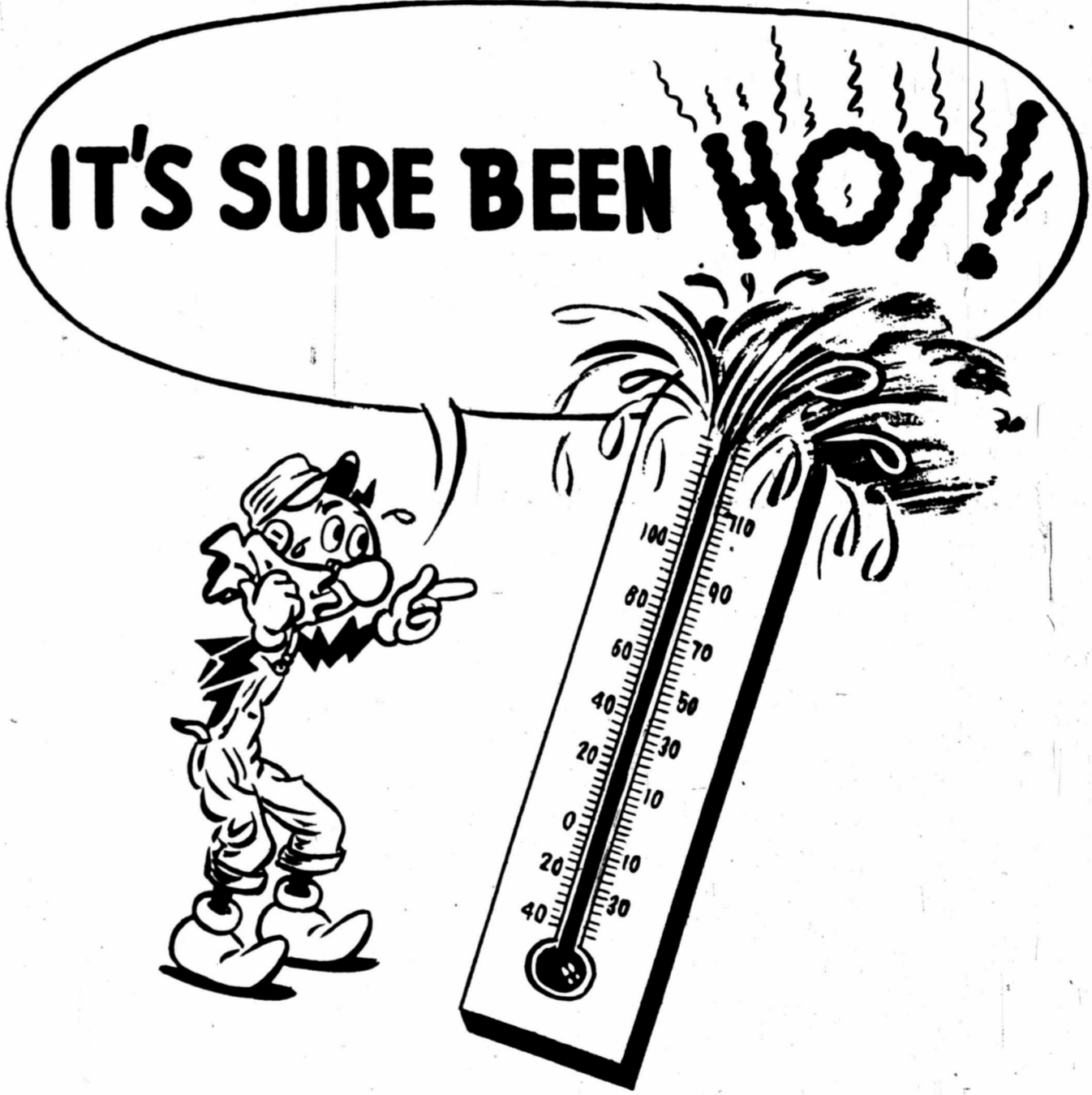

**Delicious Ham Is On Hand**

Ham is in top supply now—usually is a better value during the summer months. All the ordinary cuts of ham are good—picnics from the shoulder, shank and butt and hams, the boned rolled ham, and center slices for steaks (although these are a little high). In addition, the smoked shoulder pork butt is far less expensive, but with the smoked ham flavor.

Maybe you'd like a recipe for baking and glazing the pork butt—called by some packers a daisy, a tenderloin, or a cottage roll.

**Glazed Smoked Shoulder Butt**  
(Serves 6 to 8)

One smoked shoulder pork butt (2 to 3 1/2 pounds), 3 peppercorns, 3 whole cloves, 1 onion, whole cloves for studding, 1/2 cup prepared mustard, 1/3 cup New Orleans molasses, 1 cup ginger ale.

Place shoulder butt in water to cover. Add peppercorns, 3 whole cloves, and onion. Bring to a boil, reduce heat, and simmer about 45 minutes per pound (from 1 1/2 to 2 1/2 hours). Drain well. Score and stud with cloves. Combine mustard and molasses. Combine mustard and molasses. Add enough ginger ale to make spread easily. Place on rack on baking pan. Bake at 425 degrees F. 25 minutes or until well browned and glazed, basting with remaining ginger ale and pan drippings. Slice thin to serve.

**Party Ham Loaf**  
Mix 2 pounds ground smoked ham with 1 pound ground veal, 3 cups soft enriched bread crumbs, 3 eggs, 1 cup milk, 1/4 cup minced onion, 1 teaspoon dry mustard and 1/4 teaspoon pepper.  
Shape into a loaf and place in greased pan or pack into a well-greased mold. Bake in a slow oven, 300 degrees F., 2 hours. Pour off drippings and turn loaf or mold onto a platter.  
Garnish with sliced pineapple, crabapples and parsley. Serve either hot or cold with horseradish sauce made by folding 1/4 cup horseradish into 1/2 cup whipped cream.

**OPS Office Makes West Texas Survey**

LUBBOCK—The Lubbock district Office of Price Stabilization is conducting a survey in the 69-county West Texas district to determine compliance on the part of retail dealers in apparel, furniture, household wares, radios, and related fields in the fixing of price charts under ceiling price regulation 7.

The survey is a part of a nationwide survey ordered by Edward P. Morgan, assistant OPS director in charge of enforcement. Thus far, he said, many dealers have failed to comply with the OPS regulations.

Compliance with CPR 7 is important, Morgan said, because of the large number of retailers throughout the country who come under the regulation. He noted there has been a wide variance in compliance in the various OPS regions, and that many price charts have been returned for additional information or correction of errors.

The pricing charts were to have been filed with the district office by May 31.

**Secret Of Big Ship In A Little Bottle**

LOWELL, VT. (AP)—People who know the old trick of sliding a little ship with masts folded down into the mouth of a bottle—and then pulling the masts erect with a string—are appalled when they see Bob Preston's bottled ships.

"What do you do?" demanded a Navy veteran, "split the bottle?" For the hulls of young Bob Preston's ships are far bigger in diameter than the bottle necks. Inside one five-gallon carboy with narrow mouth sits, incredibly, a very chubby tugboat model.

Bob's answer to the Navy man's bottle-splitting question was, "No, I split the ship." That's his method and it's self-taught.

Preston, a recent graduate of the engineering course at the University of Vermont, first builds his ship complete to lines and rigging. Then he takes it apart, slicing it in sections as needed.

After that, he re-assembles the sections inside, gluing them with the aid of an assortment of long, slender tools averaging two feet in length.

He had quite a time finding a jug large enough for his latest—a model of Sir Francis Drake's ship, "The Golden Hind." It kept him busy through many spare hours because it was "messy."

When the glue on a bottled ship model has dried, Preston corks the bottle. And there you have the practical side of ship-bottling, says he. For that's one ship-model that never will need dusting.

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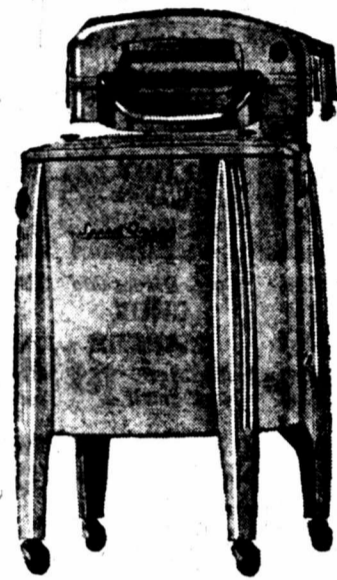

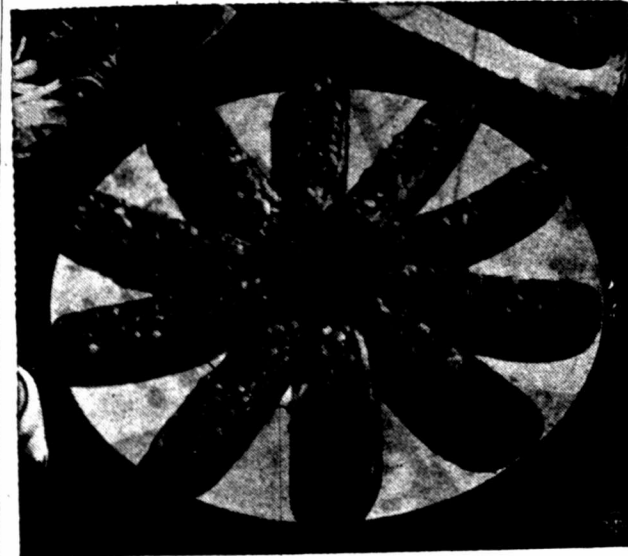

Here's a zesty variation on the old beef theme.

**Orange Pickled Beets** (Makes 4-6 servings)

One tablespoon cornstarch, 1/4 cup pickle liquid, 1 1-pound jar or can sliced beets, 1/4 cup brown sugar, 1/4 cup thinly sliced sweet gherkins, 1/2 teaspoon grated orange rind, 2 tablespoons butter or margarine, 1/2 teaspoon salt, freshly ground pepper.

Mix cornstarch and pickle liquid to a smooth paste in a 1-quart saucepan. Drain liquid from beets; measure 2/3 cup beet liquid; add to cornstarch mixture, stirring to blend. Cook over medium heat 5 minutes, or until mixture thickens. Next add brown sugar, sweet gherkins, orange rind, butter or margarine, salt, pepper and drained beets. Heat thoroughly and serve.

**Finnish Labor's Disavowal Of Red Bonds Called Triumph For Western Democracy**

MILAN, ITALY (NEA)—Leaders of the world's 53 million non-Communist union workers see a "triumph for Western democracy" in the decision of Finland's powerful labor organization to withdraw from the Cominform's World Federation of Trade Unions.

Despite strong Soviet pressure, the Finnish Trade Union Confederation decided to quit the Cominform's labor arm. This was revealed at the Second Congress of the International Confederation of Free Trade Unions, which recently concluded its sessions in Milan.

"Finland, while consistently following a good neighbor policy towards Russia, will battle unceasingly against communism in her own borders," Olavi Lindblom, general secretary of the Confederation of Finnish Trade Unions, told a correspondent. Lindblom was an observer at the ICFTU Congress.

Dubinsky, president of the International Ladies Garment Workers Union and a U. S. delegate to the Milan Congress, said:

"Communist domination of the Finnish Confederation of Trade Unions would have laid Finland open to infiltration of the sort that doomed Czechoslovakia three years ago," Dubinsky said. "But tough little Finland again proved that it is the only country on Russia's doorstep determined to remain a true democracy. Stalin will have to respect this determination unless he wants to provoke a general war."

Award Of Fact:

"The Kremlin obviously is aware that the Finns will defend their independence by force of arms, if necessary.

"The Finns are a tough people and they must be respected," Stalin is reported to have told a U. S. diplomat who saw him shortly after the end of the Russo-Finnish war.

A similar view was given by Otto Kuusinen, a Finnish-born leader of the Cominform. He recently assured a Finnish delegation in Moscow that Russia had no designs on Finland as long as the Finns continued to pay reparations and supply Russia with their industrial products.

In 1949, a Communist Prime Minister and a Russian-imposed government were defeated in Finland. This was the first case of a country unseating its Communists by the simple democratic expedient of voting them out of office. It was done without much fanfare and with little drama. As a result, Finland is today the only little country on Russia's European borders that still maintains its independence.

**East German Lawmaking System Resembles Democracy On Paper—But Action's Phoney**

BERLIN (AP)—East German Communists have devised a law-making system that looks, on paper, like democracy. But it's just as absolute as Hitler's one-man decrees ever were.

Since October, 1949, the Soviet zone has functioned with a "people's chamber" as a lower house and a "state chamber" as a sort of senate.

The Communist-controlled government submit bills to the legislature and "debate" follows. The result is somewhat different from what happens in the American Congress and the British House of Commons.

**None Votes No**

The so-called Volkskammer has met 3 times in 20 months and debated budgets, laws, resolutions and policies. None of the debate developed opposition to the government's proposals. None of the members ever has voted "no."

Fifty-one "laws" have been passed without a single dissent. Two-thirds of them were rushed through on calendar reading without the formality of committees considering them, though the committees exist.

The government has gotten all its actions rubber-stamped by the legislature in a total of 131 hours of sessions.

The delegates or deputies have been paid 500 marks a month. Each now has collected 10,000 marks, an average of 75 marks an hour for listening to the Communist bosses, then dutifully saying "yes."

The East German mark is artificially pegged at 4:2017 to the American dollar.

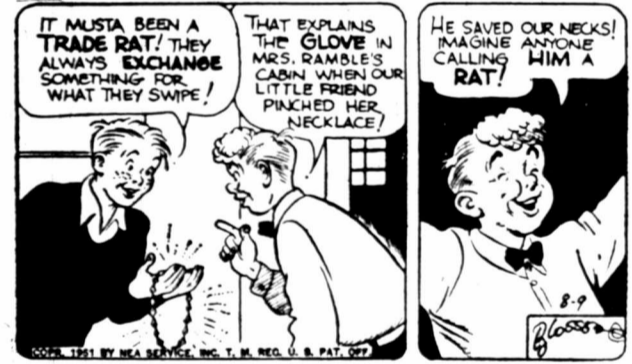

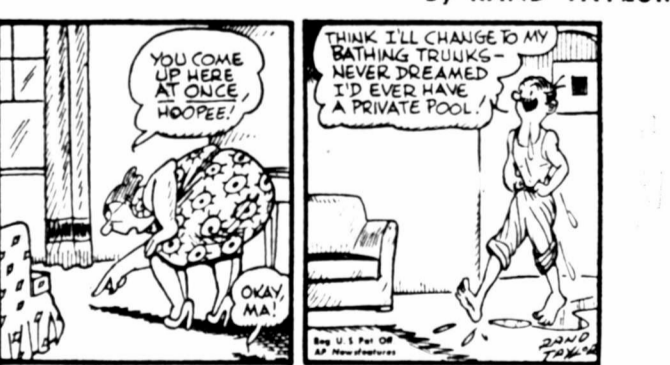

# Increase Of 50 Projects Listed For West Texas RRC District

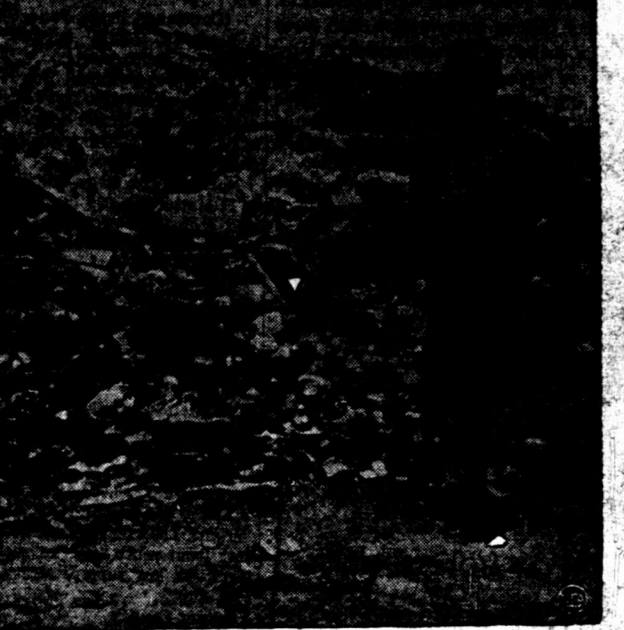

### Peritonitis, Once A Killer Now Controlled By Medicine

A woman has written for a column on peritonitis. This is a pleasure, because peritonitis, which in the past caused so many doctors and patients to hold their breaths, is today a vanishing condition. The credit for this goes largely to the germ killers of the sulfa and penicillin families and partly to safer methods of surgery.

Peritonitis gets its name from the delicate tissue which lines the abdominal cavity, that cavity which contains the stomach, intestines, liver and other organs dealing principally with digestion.

This lining is called the peritoneum. Most cases of peritonitis or inflammation of this lining result from the escape of germs into the abdominal cavity from the stomach, intestines, or appendix.

There are many ways in which peritonitis can arise. One of the common ones is the result of the rupture of an inflamed appendix; this is the main reason why it is so dangerous to let appendicitis run on without removing the organ.

Indeed the rupture of any digestive organ which spills material into the abdominal cavity is likely to produce peritonitis. For example, a stomach ulcer which eats all the way through the lining will allow germ laden material to enter the abdomen and may cause peritonitis.

Twenty years ago the appearance of peritonitis, regardless of the exact cause, was considered a desperate risk for the patient; some recovered but a great many did not. It isn't good to develop peritonitis now, but the chances of recovery are enormously better. Infection Stopped.

Most of the germs which cause peritonitis yield to the sulfa drugs or penicillin or its relatives. This also gives the surgeon time to investigate the exact cause and repair the damage which is usually the escape of infected material from the intestinal tract.

Only those who have lost a dear one from this condition can fully realize what this improved outlook for peritonitis really means. It is hard to imagine what might have happened to us and doesn't, and yet prevention of illness is one of the big reasons why our chances for long life and good health are so much better now than in the past.
