## Eight Contestants Pick 21 Grid Games

(Note: The following comments were written prior to the dramatic action late Thursday by United States warplanes, which forced the plane carrying the four terrorists to land in Sicily. The terrorists have been turned over to Italian authorities for disposition. Early reaction has been praise for the Administration for the U.S. intervention in re-claiming of the terrorists.)

ONCE AGAIN this week, terrorism has reared its ugly head, with the hijacking of an Italian cruise ship off the coast of Egypt.

Again, the lives of American citizens are at stake, along with those of several other countries. Reports say that over 400 people were on the luxury liner.

The release of Palestinian prisoners being held in Israel appears to be the motive behind the latest hijacking episode. There was also the possibility that the ship would be taken to Beirut, Lebanon, which may become known as the world's "hijacking capital."

International terrorism has grown so much in recent years that it is beginning to be a major problem for virtually every nation.

The United States' general policy in regard to such acts is that the government refuses to deal with terrorists. Yet, when lives are being threatened at the point of a gun, or explosives, sometimes the terrorists get their way.

World leaders are going to have to come together in an effort to combat this problem, which is becoming a threat to international travel of all kinds.

It is bad when a band of outlaws can hold entire nations at bay by virtue of their callous acts. The worst part is that numbers of very innocent by-standers are subjected to harrowing experiences and/or death as a result of the problems of other countries.

A solution to the problem is not readily evident, and unfortunately it may persist until such time as authorities come up with a way of dealing with the terrorists on their own level.

With eight contestants equalling the best weekly score of the season--21--even the tie-breaker system failed to separate the top two contestants in the fifth week of the Friona Star's football contest.

Graham missed SMU-Arizona, Kansas City-L.A. Raiders and Jets-Bengals. Mrs. Field missed SMU-Arizona, LSU-Florida and Washington-St. Louis.

The Parmer County 4-H Pig Sale will be held this Saturday, October 12 at the Friona Community Center-Showbarn.

The judging and sifting will begin at 5 p.m. with the sale starting at 7 p.m.

The outcome of the weekly contest completely hinged on the Washington-St. Louis Monday night game. Three of the contestants who had scores of 21 had picked St. Louis, and would have had scores of 22 if the Cardinals had won.

Posting excellent scores of 20 for the week were Tommy Moss and Patches Fleming.

Twelve other contestants had scores of 19, as the scores improved from the previous week. The "19s" were scored by Rick Castaneda of Hereford, Craig Trimm, Ron Cain, Kent Patterson, Martha Clements, Leo Escalante, Leroy Berend, Bobby Wied, Dale Milner, Patti Field of Dalhart,

Jimmy Walker and Jerry Bentley. Sixteen other contestants had scores of 18; twenty-two came up with 17s; 25 more had scores of sixteen, and 21 entrants correctly picked 15 games.

With his third consecutive good week, Graham grabbed a four-point lead in the contest standings with a score of 94. Jon Field of Dalhart is second with a 90.

Next comes Laura Field at 88, followed by Don Herbert, Tommy Moss and Martha Clements at 87.

Contestants are all vying for the grand prize of \$100, to be awarded at the close of the 13-week contest.

But the dry spell ended on Tuesday with the moisture from "Hurricane Waldo." The official measurement in Friona was 1.28 for Tuesday and Tuesday night; and 1.21 for Wednesday and Wednesday night. An additional .80 inches had been measured Friday morning as of 11 a.m. by Friona Cablevision.

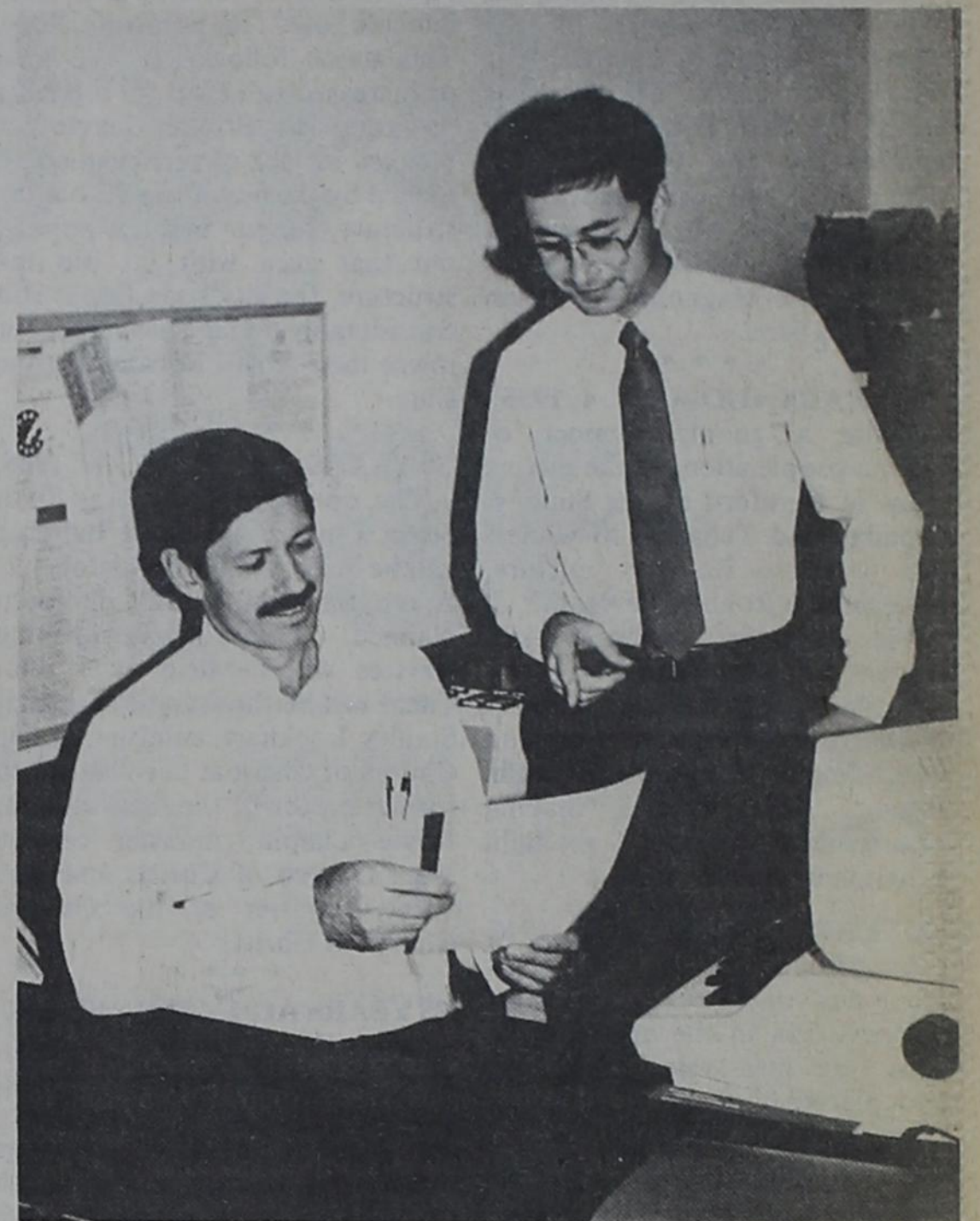
### County To Distribute Commodities

## Directors Named By Heritage Group

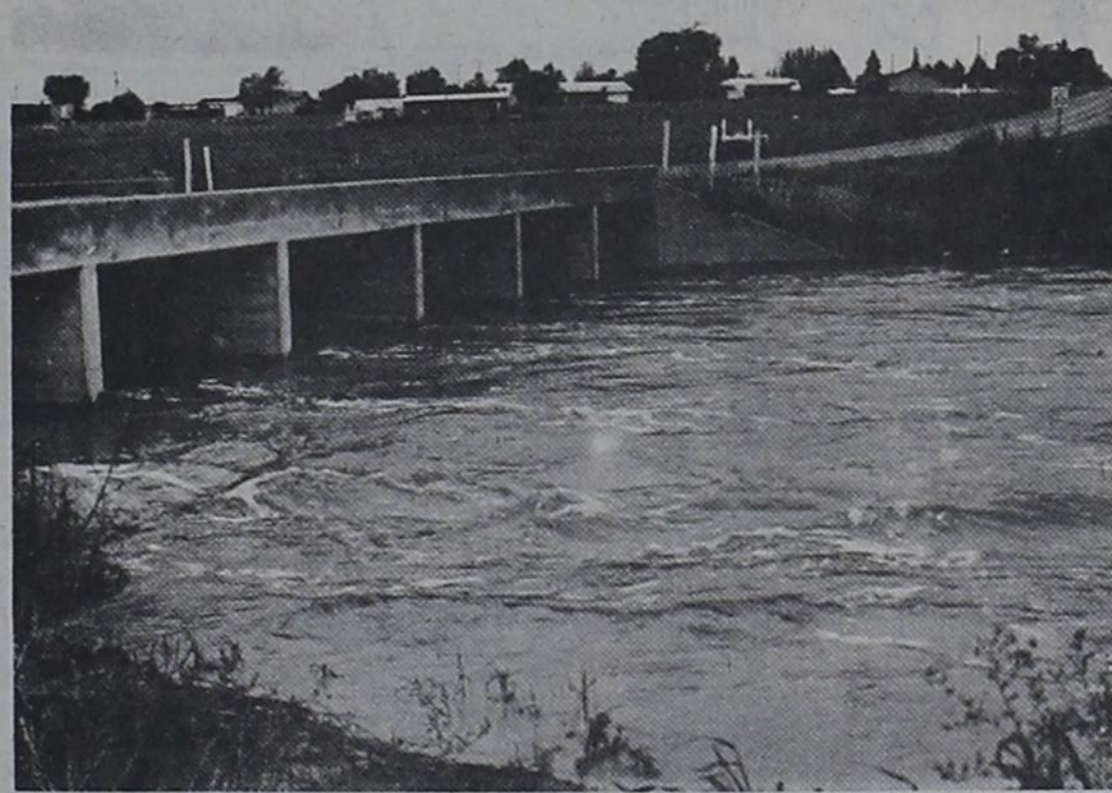

# Friona Flashbacks

**55 YEARS AGO--OCT. 3, 1930**  
J.C. Wilkison this week sold the Wilkison Chevrolet Company to J.W. Magness, owner of the Chevrolet agency at Farwell. It is reported that Mr. Magness has leased the Parr Building recently vacated by the Friona Motor Company, and will move the business into it. Mr. Wilkison will continue his business as representative of the Magnolia Petroleum Company here.

**50 YEARS AGO--OCT. 4, 1935**  
Quite a goodly number of Friona people attended the picture show at Hereford during Sunday, Monday and Tuesday, to witness the Will Rogers picture, "Steamboat Round The Bend." Mr. Loomis, manager and owner of the Allerita Loomis Players, a tent comedy show of considerable fame for its clean and interesting entertainment, was in Friona Tuesday making arrangements for a six-night program here next week.

**40 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 28, 1945**  
On Monday, the Friona Locker Company opened its doors for business and in the afternoon at least four hogs were slaughtered and placed in the cooling room, preparatory to processing and conversion into bacon, cured hams and sausage, etc. The operative work of the company is in charge of Wilmet Crow, one of the proprietors of the business, and he is ably assisted by A.L. Talley and T.B. Whitfield.

**35 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 28, 1950**  
Friona city commissioners and mayor met Tuesday and

unanimously framed ordinances setting the city tax rate at \$1.25 representing a twenty-five cent increase over the previous levy. This action followed on the heels of increased agitation for a paving program for Friona, heretofore blocked by lack of sufficient credit earned by the city under its old tax structure. Mayor Bainum pointed out that even with the old tax structure, the city's tax rate is still considerably under the average for towns the size of Friona across the state.

**30 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 30, 1955**  
The opening of the new Sixth Street Church of Christ building will be held on Sunday, October 2. A program for the day has been planned. The formal opening services will be held at 3 p.m. There will be three guest speakers, Stanley Lockhart, minister of the Church of Christ at Levelland, and former pastor of the local church; Doyle Chapin, minister of the Vega Church of Christ, and Bob Wear, minister of the Canyon Church of Christ.

**25 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 29, 1960**  
The Friona City Council, meeting in a special session Monday afternoon at the City Hall, spent about three hours discussing a budget under which the city of Friona will operate during the tax year, October 1, 1960 to September 30, 1961. This is the first year that the city has operated under a budget set up on a tax year; as previous budgets were based on calendar years. The budget just ended was based on a nine-month period.

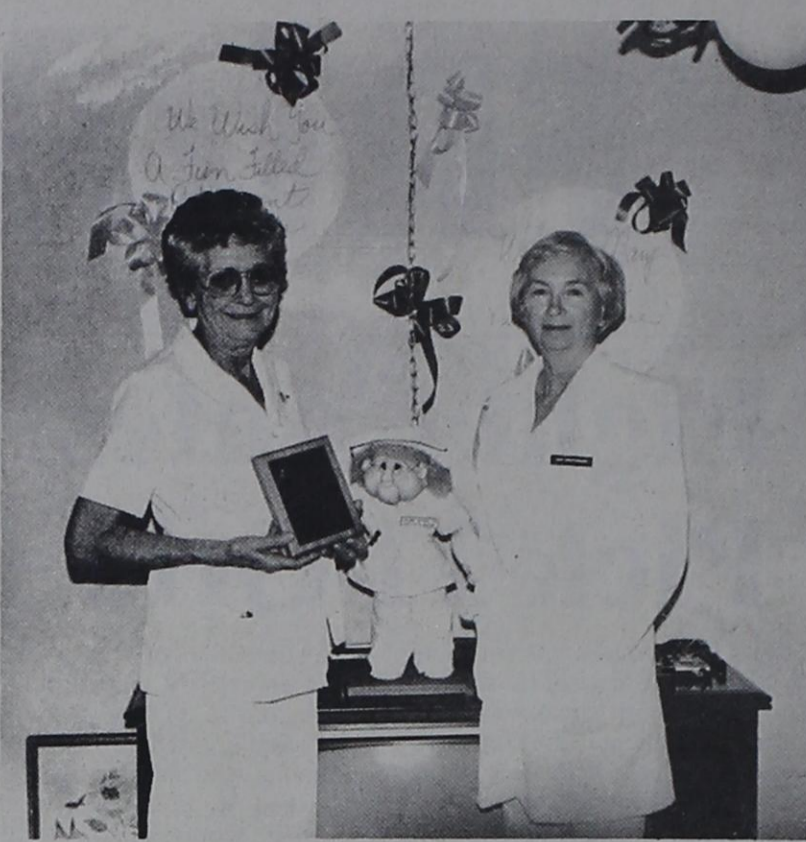
**20 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 30, 1965**  
The enrollment in Friona Public Schools is up almost nine per cent over last year, it was revealed this week by Superintendent Alton Farr. Current enrollment was listed the past week at 1367, which was an increase of 111 students over the 1256 total at the end of the 1964-65 school year.

**15 YEARS AGO--OCT. 1, 1970**  
Business places in the city of Friona will begin collecting the one-cent city sales tax on all purchases starting Thursday, October 1. City Manager Jake Outland reminded merchants that the city sales tax will be collected on everything that currently is taxable. Merchants will simply add the extra penny to each \$1 purchase.

**10 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 28, 1975**  
"This project actually had its beginning back in the 1920s, when people living to the south of Friona had problems crossing the draw at times when they needed to come to Friona," said Mayor R.L. Fleming during his remarks at dedication ceremonies at the new overpass into the city Tuesday. Also speaking on the program was George C. Wall, Jr., district engineer for the highway department's Lubbock district.

**5 YEARS AGO--OCT. 19, 1980**  
Friona Chieftain Band's marching percussion section came home with top honors from the Drum Corp competition held last Saturday at Texas Tech. Members of the corp are Sandy Spring, Sheri Dodson, Jessica Maurer, Patti Hinton, Reese Fleming, Stanley Ellis, Andrew Fleming, Richie Malouf, Judy McLellan, Kristi Britting, Lynn Koelzer, Wade Davenport and Diane Johnston.

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**Two License Plates Are State Law**

Some states require only that a vehicle have a rear license plate, but Texas law requires both front and rear plates. The fine for not having both plates on your vehicle can range as high as \$200.00, according to Department of Public Safety

Major V.J. Cawthon, Regional Commander of Lubbock. The DPS considers compliance with this law important, since it enables law enforcement officers to more easily identify your vehicle if they are attempting to locate you in case of emergency. Having both

plates on a vehicle also will make it easier to locate if it has been stolen, Major Cawthon said. If a person only has one plate, a new set of plates must be obtained from the local office of the county tax assessor-collector. The fee for a new set is \$5.30.

## Around the House

By JANETTE PIERCE

Many of us have a considerable investment in the outdoor furniture we use on the deck, patio or by the pool. Whether you have expensive wrought iron or redwood outdoor furniture or less-costly aluminum and plastic webbing chairs, you can avoid the expense of replacing it with good maintenance.

Now that the time for summer barbecues has passed, it's a wise idea to clean and renovate your outdoor furniture and then store it for the winter.

Here are some suggestions for cleaning different types of outdoor furniture:

**ALUMINUM & PLASTIC:** Most outdoor furniture is constructed of tubular aluminum which tends to gray with age and accumulate dirt and grime. Wash with detergent and warm water to remove most of the soil, and rub with fine 4/9 steel wool to remove discoloration. Aluminum jelly can also be used, but not on new or anodized aluminum.

Wash the plastic seat webbing

**WOOD:** Wipe down hardwood furniture with warm water and detergent, then protect it with auto paste wax. If the finish is cracked or flaked, remove it with paint or varnish remover, sand and apply a new coat of marine or exterior-type finish. Also check any painted metal supporting framework for rust and touch up if necessary.

**WASH REDWOOD FURNITURE** with warm water and detergent. Remove soft drink stains with a solution of chlorine bleach and then rinse. Smooth all the wood surfaces with 3/0 steel wool and apply a protective coat of penetrating sealer. Redwood furniture should not be varnished and coated with shellac.

**CAST METAL:** Use a mild detergent to wash cast aluminum, cast iron and wrought iron. If the enamel surface is scratched or chipped, or if rust has appeared, smooth the area with steel wool, apply a metal primer and then touch up with matching enamel paint.

**RATTAN:** Rattan, cane, reed and willow furniture should be vacuumed and then damp washed with warm water and mild soap. After it dries, protect it with a liquid furniture wax.

**FABRICS:** Cushions and other items made of vinyl laminate, cotton duck or canvas may be damp cleaned and dried with a cloth. Dry clean, heavily soiled cotton if possible.

Wash and dry umbrellas made of vinyl laminate fabric in the open position. Check the pole for corrosion and rust and protect it with a liberal waxing of auto paste wax.

Brush hammocks to remove soil, scrub with warm water and detergent or machine wash and hang back in place to dry wrinkle-free. Wax the hammock suspension cords with paraffin to prolong their life.

**STORING OUTDOOR FURNITURE:** Indoor storage, in a garage, storage shed or the house, is ideal. You may want to use outdoor furniture to provide extra indoor seating and table surfaces during the winter. But if you do keep items in the house, keep them away from direct heat.

If you have no indoor storage space, cover the furniture with plastic, securely tie it down, and store on the porch, balcony or deck.

## DHT Working To Curb Road Deaths

Last year 107 persons were killed in the 17-county Lubbock District, according to Mel Pope, District Engineer, State Department of Highways and Public Transportation, of Lubbock.

"Alcohol, speeding, and not wearing seat belts continue to be our greatest problems," said Pope. "Here in the Lubbock district, which includes 17 counties surrounding Lubbock, we had 10,669 traffic accidents."

There were 162 accidents in Parmer County alone, four of which were fatal, with four people being killed during 1984.

The number of accidents and fatalities in this area is cited as the reason the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation (DHT) will be working more closely with local traffic officials, police departments, the schools, and education for the community as a whole.

The city of Lubbock has a grant of \$59,209.00 this year from the department for a DWI Selective Traffic Enforcement Project (STEP). These funds are used to pay the salaries for personnel at 20 specific locations in Lubbock where a DWI problem exists. There is a proposed contract for the new fiscal year, in which the state will participate in the STEP program with \$31,195.00.

Lubbock County has a grant of \$21,799.00 to assess the problem of processing DWI cases in the

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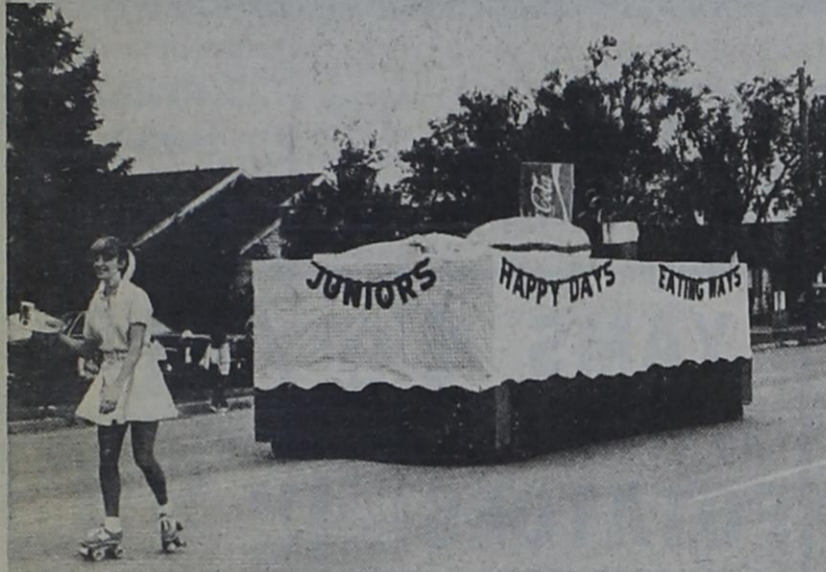

## Friona's Highest Grid Scores Given

Fans attending the Friona Homecoming Game here September 20, in which the Chieftains downed neighboring Bovina, 68-0, may have wondered if the game set a scoring record in football at Friona High School.

Actually, the Chieftains would have needed two more touchdowns and conversion points to have topped the record, which is 81 points, set in an 81-0 win over Farwell 'way back in 1934.

But the Bovina game did establish a new runner-up mark on the all-time scoring list, ranking just ahead of the 65 points the

Chiefs scored in 1968 when they inaugurated the current Chieftain Field in a 65-0 rout of visiting Tucumcari, N.M.

Having followed up their Bovina win with a 49-0 win at Muleshoe last Friday, the team thus established a new record for points scored in two consecutive games, at 117. This beat the old mark of 112 points scored against Bovina and Farwell in 1951.

The points scored against Bovina and Muleshoe represent high marks the team has ever scored against those teams, and the 49-0 win against the Mules represented the most lop-sided district win for Friona since the Chiefs shut out Farwell, 60-0, in a 1951 game.

The highest-scoring game for the Chieftains came in 1952, when Friona beat Anton, 61-33—a 94-point marathon. The 1959 season produced Friona's highest score in a losing cause, when they dropped a 50-32 decision to Dalhart, in another offensive-minded game.

In 1960, the team dropped a 56-30 game to Sunray, another game in which defense took a holiday.

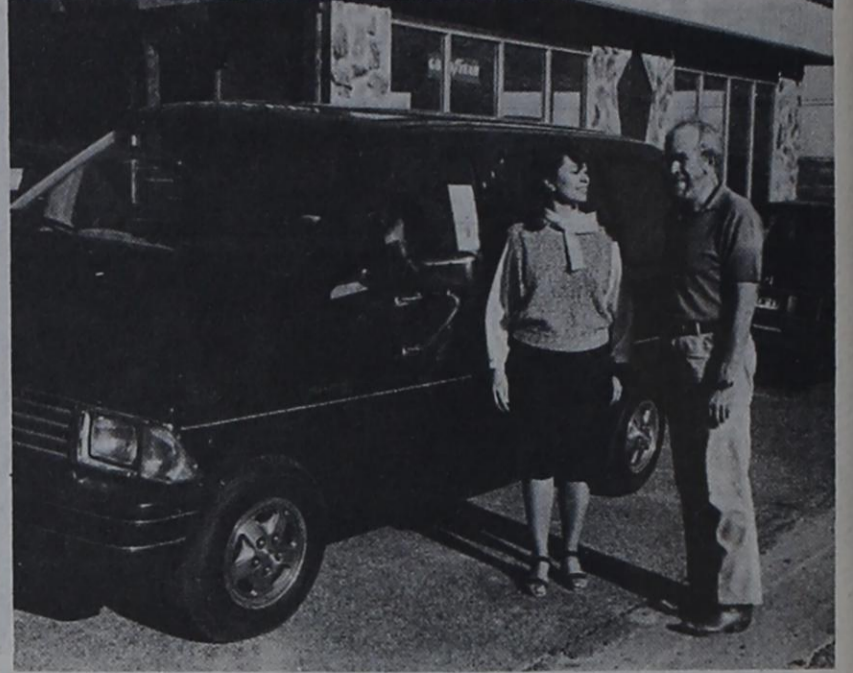

# Chieftains Win Battle; Lose War At Morton

You can play excellently on 120 of the game's 123 plays and still lose because of a pair of freak plays.

That is a sad lesson learned by the Friona Chieftains at Morton last Friday, when the Indians used a punt return and a blocked field goal return for their 20-14 win over Friona.

It was Friona's first loss of the season after four wins.

Coach Tommy Moss was free with his praise for the way the Chieftains controlled the talented Indians from the line of scrimmage, where the potent Morton attack was held for only

eight yards rushing and 87 yards for the entire game.

"I felt that our entire defense played well. The offense played well in spurts. Our backfield began to be battered up in the third quarter, and that hurt our attack," Moss said.

The Chiefs held runningback Anthony Hawkins (number 33), to a net of just 25 yards. The Morton speedster had been averaging over 100 yards per game. On one play, the Chieftains threw Hawkins for a 20-yard loss on a sweep attempt.

But in the end, it was the running of Hawkins and his brother Keith on Morton's specialty teams that proved to be the difference in the game.

Whereas Friona dominated the game on ball snaps (76-54 offensive plays), leading in first downs, 8-4 and in total yardage, 185-87, the play of Morton's special teams broke Friona's back last Friday.

One figure that isn't normally carried in a game's statistical summary is "return yardage." Morton led in that department, 210 yards to 106.

In the first quarter, Friona was the only team to post a first down, but the defenses of both teams were dominating, forcing the other to punt with regularity.

Sam Montoya's third punt appeared to have been a good one, but Friona was offside on the play, attempting to get their 11th man on the field. The infraction cost the Chiefs a touchdown.

After the penalty, Morton's

Anthony Hawkins caught the punt at his own 35, and weaved his way 65 yards for the score, as time expired in the first quarter. The kick gave Morton a 7-0 lead.

The Chiefs were still not able to put two first downs together, and after an excellent Morton punt had shoved the team deep in their own end of the field, the Indians called a time out trying to get the ball back before halftime. Two plays later, Friona was glad Morton had stopped the clock.

Friona was facing third and one from their own 29, and the Indians were in a tight goal-line type defense. Brad Moyer popped through the line, found himself in the clear at his own 35, and kept churning, for a 71-yard touchdown run.

Montoya's kick knotted the score at 7-all, with just 24 seconds left in the half.

The Chiefs appeared to have received a major break early in the third quarter when Morton quarterback Jimmy Moore fumbled and Lance Gatlin recovered at the Morton 20.

But three plays gained only eight yards, and on fourth down, Coach Moss sent Montoya in for what would have been the tie-breaking field goal.

Kenneth Johnson crashed through the line to block Montoya's kick, and the ball was scooped up by Keith Hawkins at about the 25. "I heard Coach Mauldin yelling 'go,' so I took off," Hawkins said.

His score stunned the Chieftains, and the excellent crowd that followed them, making the score 14-7 after the kick.

Things looked even bleaker later in the quarter when the Indians had their only legitimate drive. Anthony Hawkins gained 20 yards, and Moore passed 29 yards to Keith Hawkins for the TD. After the low kick, Morton had a 20-7 lead.

But say for the Chieftains, they exhibited a lot of character. They didn't give up and get beat badly, in spite of all the adversity.

After failing to move in their next two possessions, the team finally clicked when Jeff Brown threw a rainbow pass to Leroy Mercado. Mercado made a great catch against the Morton defender, and ran all the way to the Morton eight before being tackled. The play covered 48 yards.

After two offside penalties against Morton, Brent Gatlin crashed through from two yards out and Montoya added the point after. The score had become 20-14, with 4:17 left in the game.

Friona had two other opportunities, but Brown, rushed

considerably, couldn't find a receiver on Friona's last two possessions.

Brown was sacked by Johnson on first down of the first series, for his second defensive jewel of the game, as Morton showed they could play defense when needed. For his outstanding defensive game, which included 16 tackles, Johnson was named "Player of the Week" by the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal.

On the play where the Friona defense, led by Shane Hand, threw Hawkins for the 20-yard loss, Moss said, "We were in the right spot on that one. We had worked on that all week. He (Hawkins) had run about 95 yards for a score against Denver City by reversing his field, and we weren't going to let him do it against us."

Defensive standout Roy Flores suffered a burst blood vessel in his arm, and was questionable for the team's game against Floydada. Phillips, who suffered a sprained ankle, and Moyer, who had a bruised thigh, are expected to play, although Phillips may be limited to offense.

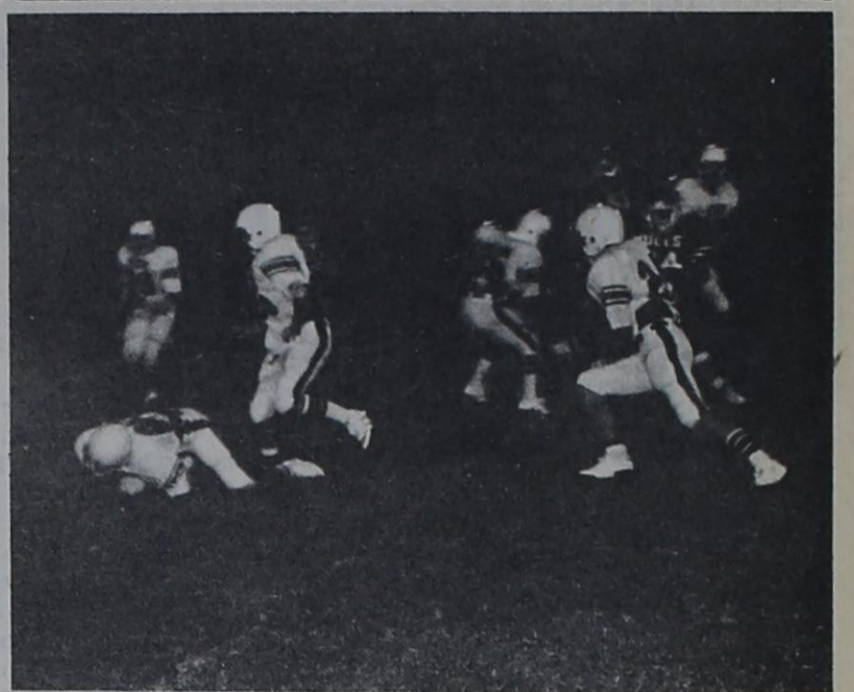

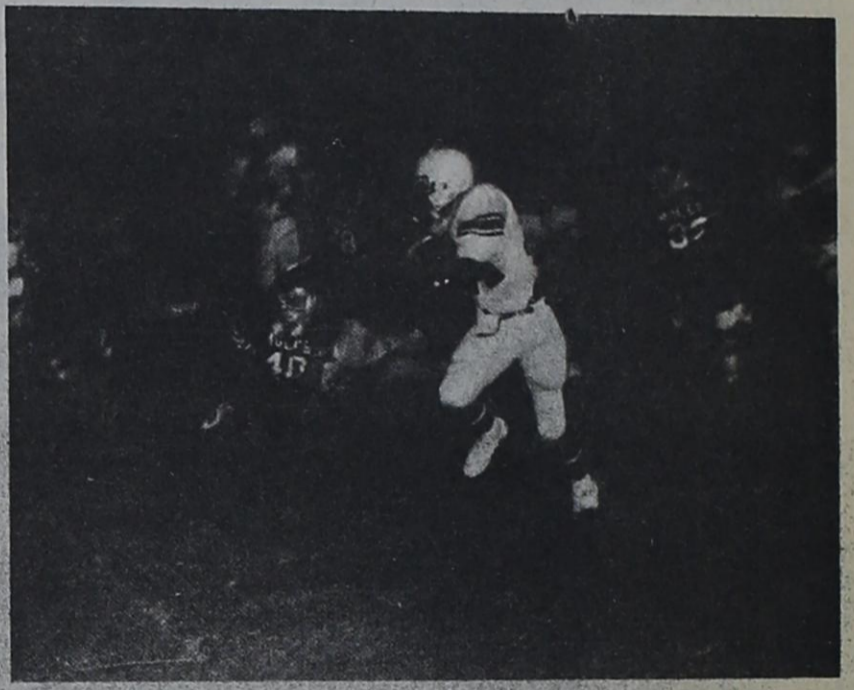

Caballero capped a drive by going eight yards for a score and also running the points, as Friona's lead became 30-0. Friona recovered another fumble, and with time for just one play, Caballero ran 30 yards to paydirt and ran the two-pointer for the 38-0 lead.

Torres returned a punt to the Morton 15, and Caballero ran 15 yards for the team's sixth TD at the 2:30 mark of the third quarter. Friona had upped its lead to 44-0. Morton got its only score with 3:46 left in the game.

Harvey Sanchez had a 44-yard scoring run nullified by a penalty. The Braves had 12 first downs. Caballero gained 128 yards, Torres had 100, and Sanchez added 39.

On defense, Caballero had seven tackles; Torres six; Anthony Padilla and Sanchez five each; Steven Dickson three and Russell White two.

## 8th Graders Lose Tilt

The Friona eighth grade Braves dropped a hard-luck, 14-12 decision to the Morton eighth graders here last Thursday.

Making matters worse for the Braves was the shoulder injury sustained by Clint Deaton, which will knock him out of action.

Andre Duran gained 196 yards on 23 carries, scoring one touchdown, and Deaton had 36 yards on seven carries and a touchdown before being hurt. Bennie Trevino had a touchdown called back by a penalty, which would have given Friona the win.

Defensively, Deaton and Bennie Trevino had nine tackles each; Brian Brogden had seven; Berny Trevino had six; Duran, Jeff Stowers and Mike Sutter had four, and Hector Perez had two. Toby Brito, David Rejino and Shannon Cochran each had one tackle.

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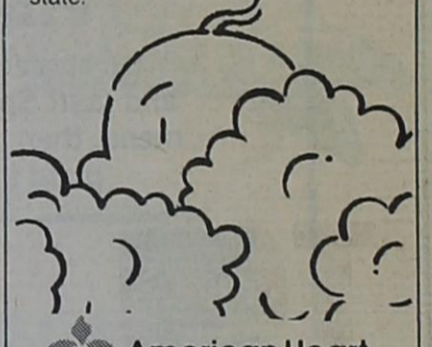
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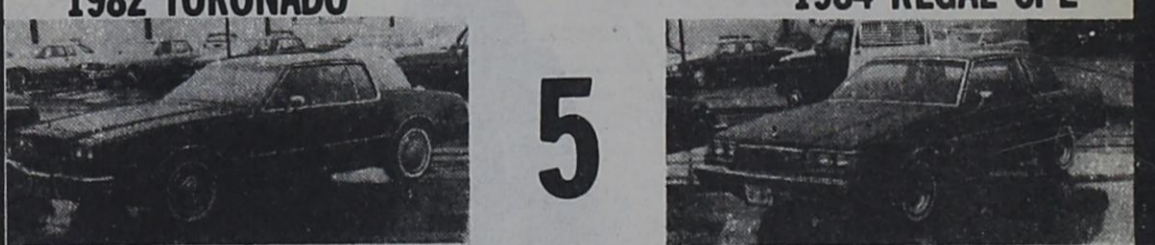

The spokesman said the shoot would probably be rescheduled for sometime in November.



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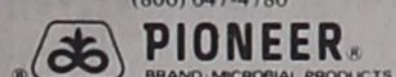

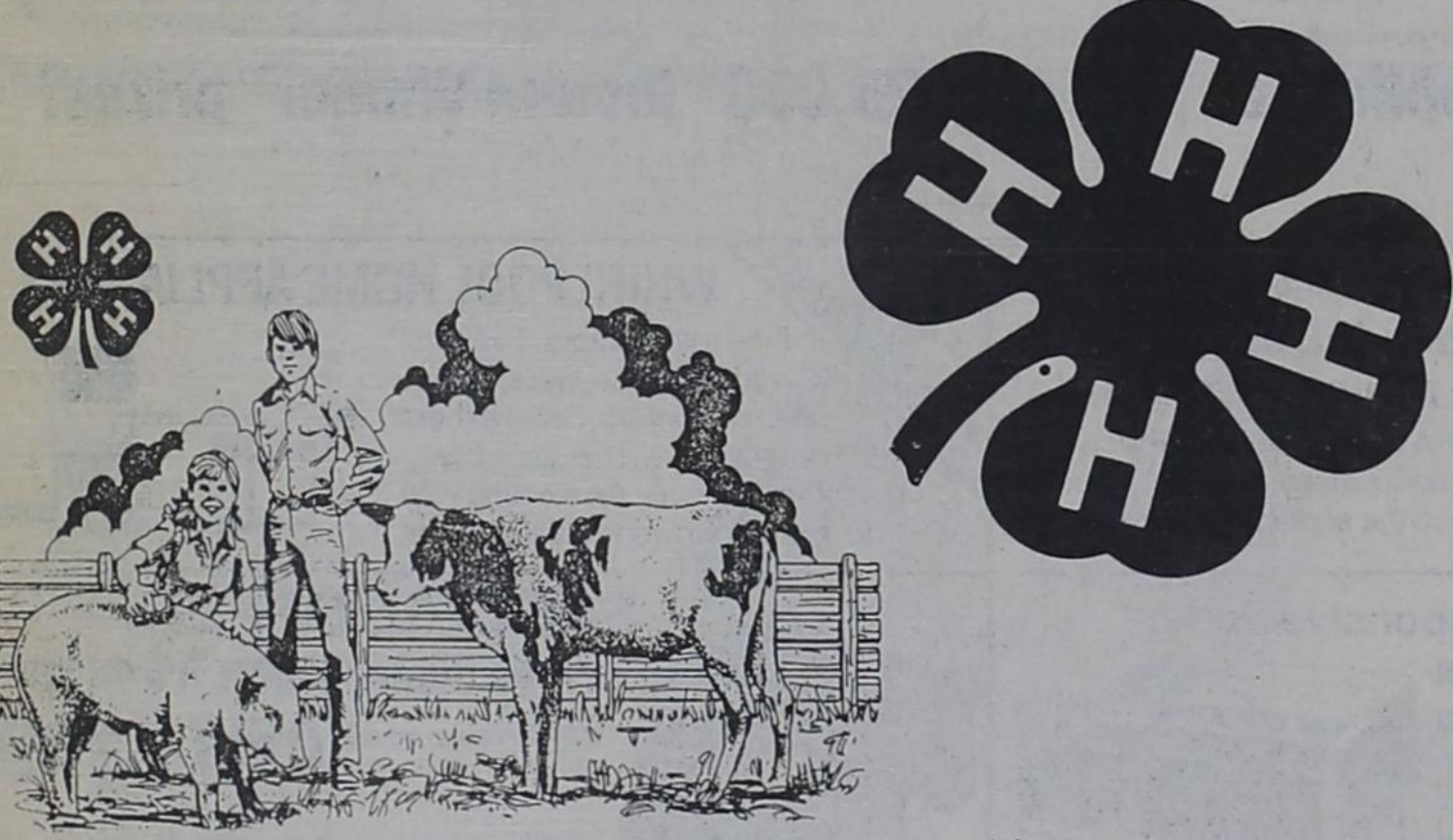

## County Spelling Bee Director Is Named

Rules state that no student who will be older than 16 by the end of the current school term or in a grade higher than the eighth may participate, beginning at the school level.

Directors choose dates for their respective county eliminations and are requested to report the best speller(s) in the county to the Amarillo Globe-News by March 29. Winners from 46 counties will meet on the WTSU campus on April 26 and name the 1986 district champion. This student will represent the area in the National Spelling Bee, sponsored by the Scripps Howard Newspapers, in Washington, D.C., during the last

week of May.

All expenses for the 1986 area champ and one parent will be provided by the Amarillo Globe-News.

Gene Parker, director of placement, WTSU, serves as bee coordinator.

"We've worked with this program for ten years and believe it serves to further our efforts in education. The young people who come to our campus as county finalists are outstanding and we encourage all schools in our four-state area to participate," Parker said. "The benefits are great."

The booklet, "Words of the Champions," containing more than 3,000 total words--an increase of 500 new words from 1985--is used in most schools and county bees. The booklet, priced at 50-cents each, is available from Jeane Bartlett, Spelling Bee Editor, Amarillo Globe-News, Box 2091, Amarillo, Texas 79166.

Interested students and school officials are encouraged to contact either Parker or Mrs. Bartlett for additional information.

A Junior Bee for young students, grades six and under, will also be conducted in each county at the discretion of the directors. All county junior winners will be special guests of the sponsors on April 26 in Canyon. Each will be given a trophy.

Texas State University with a B.S. in biology. He also graduated from Northwest Texas Hospital School of Medical Technology and is employed with Coffee Memorial Blood Center.

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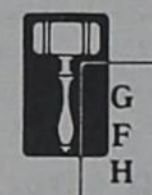
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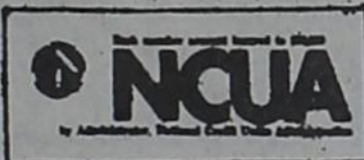
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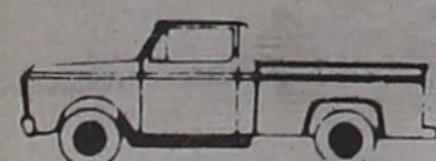
