

Tried. Convicted In 1949, McGee was tried in the 72nd District Court in Lubbock. He pleaded in his defense that he was insane at the time of the shooting and insane at the time of the trial.

The 12-man jury pondered these defenses as they examined the evi-dence and listened to the testimony, finally rejecting both these pleas and convicting McGee of murder with malice

His penalty was fixed at death in the electric chair. The state's Court of Criminal Appeals subsequently upheld the verdict and October 31 was set as the

Subsequently, Defense Attorneys declared, "my mission resulted in Burton S. Burks and E. A. Simpson filed an affidavit of insanity, and the Court of Criminal Appeals ordered the sanity trial. In Texas, the law provides that

There had been some speculation that MacArthur would mention the presidential candidacy of Senator Robert A. Taft of Ohio. But the general made no mention of Taft or the coming presidential election, although he assailed the Truman Administration policies.

Other highlights of the MacArthur address included:

1. A charge that he (MacArthur) had "unquestionably wrecked" a secret plan to let Formosa fall to the Communists and permit Red China to enter the United Nations.

2. A charge that there has been "startling and dangerous shift" in basic U.S. military policy which forces the armed forces to "soften with neither promise nor hope of victory.



The latest to bite the hand that fed him is an ex-U of Michigan tackle who picked up a neat bit of change from a national magazine for taking slams at his alma mater for paying his way through college.

Having discovered some years ago that no longer do athletes do or die just for the glory of suffering for dear ole Siwash, we don't expect collegiate athletics to be lily-pure. Neither, however, do we think they are as black as they have been painted recently since the collegiate cage scandal broke in the East. To be sure, that little incident can't be brushed off simply as

playful boys. But we regard it more as the greed of a few rather than the typical attitude of many. Nor are we sure that the younger generation is going to hell simply

because it plays football for its three squares a day while in college. The chief argument of those who would "clean up" the present

situation is this: Football takes up too much time and doesn't leave enough time for studying. While this might be true in a sense, we note many gridders at topflight "football" schools are honor students. Some, actually, take courses designed to teach them something in spite of the popular opinion that athletes aren't allowed to sign up for anything requiring

more mental poweress than drop-the-handkerchief. Many football players graduate with honors and are successful in

Too, the hulaballo about the grid game killing all the time for study is magnified out of proportion

Say an average of 100 boys per school play football-in some, more, in some less. But the 100 is an approximate average and the rest of the student body hardly is kept from its studies by the minority.

Then, how many of the boys in college to play football would have gone on to further their education without the benefit of grid scholarships? Probably a very few.

In fact, many boys continue through high school only because they can play the grid game. Sure, colleges are recruiting, trying to win and spending plenty of the folding stuff in the process—but they are making money, too, and for every kid the game hurts it will help a dozen

Show us a school which hasn't a football team, and we'll show you a school with more problems than Notre Dame or any other grid power. That's why we're tired of the hue and cry to "kill college football."

When you do, you've killed something in the colleges.

Both sides needed 90 points for the initial meld, and the player at your right melds ace-ace-joker very early in the play. The discard pile survives for a few more plays, and ou finally freeze it by discarding a deuce.

No aces have appeared except the two that were melded by your right-hand opponent at the very beginning of the hand. Only two fives have appeared, both thrown by your partner fairly early in the play. Both got by safely, of course. No eights or tens have appeared at any time. The last three discards of the player at your left have been two sevens and a deuce, in that order. No other sevens have appeared at any time.

What do you discard? Crawford knew that the ace was very unsafe. That had to be ruled out, since there were five aces still to be accounted for. His partner would have thrown aces if they seemed at all safe, so it was very likely that his partner had no more than one ace. That left too many aces for the opponents to hold.

The fives were unsafe also. Crawford's partner wasn't saving fives. by safely, thus indicating that fives were not held at his right. It was a near certainty that the player at Crawford's left did hold fives.

By elimination, Crawford knew that his discard had to be a ten, an eight, or a seven. What was

The answer was that the player at Crawford's left simply had to have another pair of sevens still in his hand. He couldn't have discarded at that late stage from fewer than four of a kind. The correct play, therefore, was to toss a mentail coin in choosing between

a ten and an eight.

As it happened, either the ten or the eight would have been safe. A seven was not.







Infection Of Middle Ear Is Usually Cause Of Running Ear

The use of the sulfa drugs and penicillin and its relatives seems to have cut down enormously on the number of people afflicted with chronic discharges from the ear. This, in turn, has greatly reduced the numbers of those with severe infections of the mastoid process just in back of the ear. This is now in their middle or later years readily can testify.

There are still a few, however, who develop a chronic discharge from the ear and have trouble get-

picture of an old man carrying is a chronic infection in the middle The usual cause of running ears | Z ear, which is a small cavity lying back of the drum membrane, and connected with the nose by a tube With an infection in the nose,

such as a severe cold, the germs pass up this tube, called the eustachian tube, into the middle ear. The eustachian tube is likely to be blocked up, pus forms in the middle ear under pressure and the drum membrane is broken, so that the pus is discharged into the outer

If the secretions become stagnant. there may be an unpleasant odor to the discharge. If drainage is interfered with while infection still is present, pain may spread to the surrounding tissues, and fever also

People who have this chronic infection particularly are susceptible to complications from colds. Too often the hearing becomes somewhat impaired, and, of course, the presence of a chronic infection always tends to create a rundown condi-

In recent years, considerable progress has been made in treatment by the use of local applications and surgical measures.

Cleanliness, including the removal of crusts and obstructions to drainage, especially is important. This is done by applying solutions or clean out the middle ear of pus

Alcohol treatments, silver nitrate. special dressings, antiseptics, and a form of electrical treatment called zinc ionization have all been tried and are useful for some, but not all, victims of a chronic running ear. Removal of lymphoid tissue in the back of the nose with locally applied radium may be helpful, especi-

Great improvements in surgical methods have taken place which make it possible to get at the source of the infection. Those patients who cannot be cured by other means may be relieved by a delicate peration. But the most important aspect of the problem is the prompt treatment of acute middle ear infections by penicillin or the sulfas so that the chronic condition is pre-
