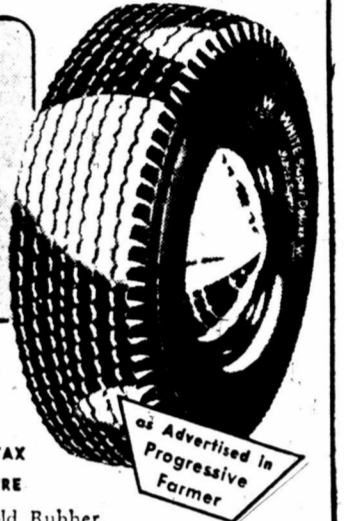

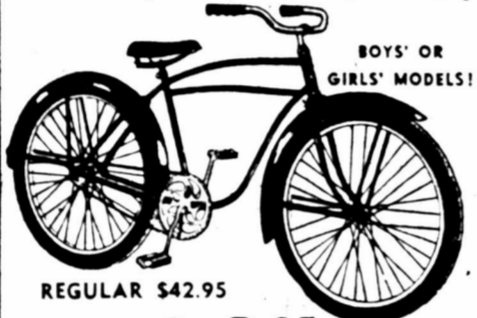

MHS Bulldogs To Hold Weight Bulge In Lamesa Contest

Midland will have the weight, Lamesa the speed when the two high school elevens meet in the kickoff of the District 1-AA conference season at 8 p.m. Friday in Memorial Stadium.

The Bulldog line will average just over 182 pounds, while the Tornados' forward wall will go into battle at slightly over 167 pounds—a 15-pound-per-man weight advantage for the Bulldogs.

Lamesa's pony backs will average 154 pounds each. Coach Tubgen Jones has not announced a Midland starting backfield. His quartet probably will average about 161 pounds.

Two of the finest ends in West Texas will man the terminal posts against Midland Friday night. They are Ray Taylor and Marshall Crawford, who last year caught Millsaps' passes in the defeat of Midland. Taylor also does the Lamesa punting.

Alvin Smith, a 170-pound tackle, is the line standout for the Lamesa club.

Jones Thursday said his team was in "good shape mentally and fair shape physically." Ralph Brooks and Bill Leonard are nursing bruised legs, while Larry Friday is handicapped by a bruised shoulder. All, however, expect to be able to see action against the Tornados. Friday and Leonard have been named captains for the contest.

Speculation Thursday was that the air would be filled with passes during the game. Lamesa depends on the passing of Millsaps in the main, although he can and does run along with other Tornado backs. Jones has not indicated if the Bulldogs will pass or run against Lamesa, but workouts the last two weeks have been evenly divided among both offensive maneuvers.

At least, a high-scoring game is in the making, if past records of the two teams mean anything.

Midland has scored an average of 17 points per game while winning three, dropping one and getting one tie. Lamesa, in winning three and losing a pair, has averaged a bit more than 30 points per contest.

An interesting experiment in the art of fisticuffs will take place in Madison Square Garden Friday night. It's a contest between old (but not the old) Joe Louis and young, salty Rocky Marciano.

Two factors make the fight especially interesting. First, a lot of experts who had been advising a slow, plodding Louis to quit before some youngster hacked his ears off, now are picking Louis to whip the most promising, hardest-hitting youngster now in sight.

Second, the guys who are picking Louis to win are doing it because of his style.

Some ring experts feel that a fighter of Marciano's style is just duck soup for Joe.

Marciano, a short-armed, wild-swinging belter moves in tossing punches from all angles.

Some of the wise boys say he'll walk into nothing but trouble, getting himself hacked to pieces by Louis' jabs as he does nothing more than try to land a mighty right. Rocky can't fight any other way, they say, and Joe will jab and loop him with a devastating assortment of clever punches.

Too be sure, Marciano's record is spotless, but who, really, has the youngster defeated? Roland LaStarza, Abe Celstic and Rex Layne are about the most imposing names on Marciano's victim-list of 37 clouters.

Still, he's knocked out 75 per cent of the guys who fought him, and that's good clouting in any league.

He has, in fact, been much more impressive as a puncher lately than has Louis, who has put but one of his last seven opponents to sleep.

That's why we pick Marciano to defeat the hollow husk of Joe Louis, once a great fighter. And by a knockout, too.

Don't believe it would take much prodding by the coaches to make us play a pretty good football game Friday night, if we were members of the Midland Bulldogs.

Lamesa won last year, knocking Midland from a title share.

The same boys are back for Lamesa this season. That in itself should spell trouble for somebody.

This will add an estimated \$672,000,000 a year to the costs of the federal payroll.

Total payments under the retroactive features of the two bills will amount to \$215,000,000.

Goode Ranks As Nation's Third Best Yard Gainer

ABILENE — (AP)—Three times Coach Warren B. Woodson has furnished the nation's leading ground gainer since he came to Hardin-Simmons University in 1941, and the Cowboys did not field a team during the World War II years.

It doesn't appear, of course, that anyone will overhaul Johnny Bright of Drake, but Woodson has come up with another left half who ranks near the top. He is Frank (Dunny) Goode, now third best yard gainer in the nation.

Goode has a net of 642 yards in five games. He trails only Bright, who has lugged the ball 821 yards in six games, and San Francisco's Matson, who has accounted for 802 yards in five tilts.

Goode, easily the top rusher in the Southwest, ranks eighteenth in total offense and has accounted for 10 of the 19 touchdowns the Cowboys have marked up this year.

The two-year letterman from Midland is approaching the all-time Hardin-Simmons mark of Doc Mobley, who crossed the goal line 16 times in 1946.

Mobley led the nation in rushing in 1942 with 1,281 yards and again in 1946 with 1,363.

Thompson Selected Recipient Of API's Gold Medal Award

NEW YORK—Lt.-Gen. Ernest O. Thompson, one of the nation's foremost petroleum conservation experts, was named Thursday as the 1961 recipient of the American Petroleum Institute's "Gold Medal For Distinguished Achievement."

The API citation, which is presented annually to some outstanding American, is regarded as one of the nation's top industrial awards. General Thompson will receive the Gold Medal in person in Chicago on November 7, during the course of the Institute's thirty-first annual meeting. It will be presented to him at a general session by W. Alton Jones, president of Cities Service Company, and chairman of the Institute's board of directors.

The 59-year-old soldier, lawyer, petroleum expert and public official will respond with a major address upon completion of the ceremony. Details of the inscription on the scroll which accompanies the Gold Medal will not be disclosed until it is read publicly to the great audience of oil men in the Stevens Hotel.

As the 1961 recipient of the Gold Medal, General Thompson will join the ranks of those outstanding Americans who received the award in past years: Walter C. Teagle, retired former president of Standard Oil Company (New Jersey); J. Howard Pew, of Sun Oil Company; Dr. Charles F. Kettering, internationally-famed scientist; Dr. William M. Burton, creator of the Burton cracking process, and Henry Ford, the late motor magnate.

General Thompson is a member of the Texas Railroad Commission, and has been since 1952. He also is an author and founder of the Interstate Oil Compact Commission, and has played a leading role in perfecting techniques to increase the amount of oil that could be extracted from nature's subterranean storehouses.

Born in Alvord, Texas, on March 24, 1902, General Thompson has been a resident of Amarillo ever since his family moved to that city in 1900. He also maintains a home at Austin, where the offices of the Railroad Commission are located.

WASHINGTON—A Senate Armed Services subcommittee Thursday reported it had found dissatisfaction and low morale among Marines—particularly recently recalled reservists—at three bases.

The three bases are El Toro and Camp Pendleton in California and Camp Lejeune in North Carolina. The subcommittee criticized the Navy and Marine Corps for what it called lavish use of men and money in a report which also covered conditions at the Marine Corps Air Station, Quantico, Va., the Navy's Amphibious Base at Little Creek, near Norfolk, Va., and the Navy's Submarine Base, New London, Conn.

The subcommittee reported that the three Marine bases, it said, had lost touch with the realities of the front lines. The report, it said, was set up shortly after fighting broke out in Korea to keep an eye on the mobilization program. This was the thirty-first report; others have dealt with a wide variety of mobilization problems.

In general, the latest report praised the food, clothing supplies, instruction, medical care, housing and recreation facilities at the six training centers. But in addition to reporting low morale at the three Marine bases, the subcommittee was critical of what it called a "lack of cost consciousness" among officers at the six centers.

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A-Plane Is Feasible But Makers Face Big Problems

CINCINNATI, Ohio (AP)—The basic research in an atomic engine for an airplane has been completed, proving its feasibility and determining its general design. But there are still some vital, complex problems which have to be worked out before such an engine can be made that will actually put a plane into the air.

Solving these problems, and then manufacturing the first nuclear aircraft engine, is the big job which General Electric Co. has now begun to tackle at its huge Lockheed jet engine plant in Cincinnati.

An unusual statement of what these immediate problems are, plus a new summary of what has been accomplished on the nuclear engine, has just been cleared for public release by the Atomic Energy Commission and the Air Force. The information has been compiled and presented by Dr. Miles G. Leverett, a top atomic scientist who has been working on the project from the start.

The reactor itself, as Dr. Leverett describes it, will be cylindrical. Throughout it is distributed the actual fuel, uranium-235 or plutonium-239. The reactor also contains tubes or pipes for the flow of the coolant which captures the reactor's heat, its usable form of energy.

Controlled By Rods
The reactor is controlled by absorbing rods. He explains: "The absorbing rods can be inserted into the reactor or withdrawn from it. If, in their original position, the rods were absorbing that number of neutrons which made the reactor most critical (that is, neither rising nor falling in power) then withdrawal of the rods will create a slight excess of neutrons in the reactor and the power will begin to increase.

"If it is desired to decrease the power of the reactor, inserting the rods more deeply than the original position will enable them to absorb more neutrons than before and the chain reaction will gradually die."

Extremely exact control of the reactor action is vital, first because there is a remote possibility of its becoming a low-grade atomic bomb, but more important because it could heat up and just melt or disintegrate.

Another Item
How to use the reactor heat to fly the plane is another item to be solved by GE engineers.

One method being considered is to have propellers driven by turbines, run by expanding through them vapor such as steam, generated in the reactor.

Another consideration is that the reactor should directly or indirectly take the place of the combustion chamber of a conventional turbo-jet engine.

Variations of one of these two basic ideas for using the reactor heat will probably be used in the final nuclear engine.

In addition to giving off heat, the reactor also produces fatal gamma and beta rays. Shielding the crew from these rays is one of the big problems to be worked out, Dr. Leverett explains:

Top Requirements
"The basic requirements of the shield are dictated by the two basic radiations which it is desired to stop. The neutrons are slowed down most effectively by light atoms. For this reason an effective shield will contain light atoms such as hydrogen.

"Gamma rays, on the other hand, are degraded and stopped best by heavy elements such as lead. It is clear that a mixture of light and heavy elements arranged in the most strategic fashion will be desired. Solution of the problem is very complicated."

Radiation damage other than to

the human anatomy is another major headache of the project.

Some substances which might be used as a coolant lose their ability to conduct heat under constant exposure to radiation, and some just decompose. Even outside the area of the most intense radiation, ordinary oil or grease becomes like tar or solidifies. Electrical insulation also breaks down and disintegrates on long exposure to radiation.

In Various Stages
It is desirable to keep the amount of fissionable fuel used, in the re-

actor to a minimum for various obvious reasons, including the fact that the amount of uranium investment is not simply the amount of uranium carried aboard the aircraft, but also that which is on the ground in various stages of preparation for use.

Dr. Leverett explains the limitation on this: "The chain reaction will go on in the reactor only so long as there is present a certain minimum quantity of fissionable material called the critical mass. As soon as the re-

action has consumed so much fissionable material that the mass drops very slightly below the critical mass, the chain reaction dies and cannot be started again without adding more fissionable material. This makes it necessary to remove the remaining fuel from the reactor, purify it and prepare it for reuse."

Despite all the problems in connection with the nuclear aircraft engine, Dr. Leverett is convinced that the project is possible and will be a success.

The MATURE PARENT

Protecting Children Against Degenerates

In 1948, newspaper readers were shocked by the brutal murder of a little girl by a 68-year-old psychopath, the friendly old grandfather of one of her playmates.

Howard Whitman, a reporter who knows social problems, recently visited the dead child's home. In his book, "Terror in the Streets," he relays a message from her father to those of us who do not know the statistics on the molesting of little boys and girls by sex degenerates.

"Says the dead girl's father, 'We must be honest and forthright enough to let children know what to guard against.'"

"Can we teach a child to guard against the advances of sexually diseased people without mentioning the fact that there are such people? No, we can't. So we should stop trying to. A warning against 'strangers' with mysteriously evil intentions did not protect the little girl who thought it was quite proper to accept candy and favors from her friend's kind old grandfather. Unless we are clear and specific about sex abnormality, we do not do a thorough protective job. All we do is arouse fear and unwholesome speculation.

"If we have given Johnny and Mary honest information on the function of healthy sex, we should not find it difficult to enlighten them on the function of unhealthy sex. If healthy sex has been presented as an expression of creative love, sick sex can be presented as the expression of destructive hate.

"We should have no trouble at all in saying, 'The sexual urge is not different from any other urge. For example, the desire to succeed is normal. It, like the sex urge, can bless the person who feels it. But sometimes the desire to succeed, like sex desire, gets sick. Then it drives the person who feels it to seek

power over others. Like a sick sex urge, it destroys instead of blessing others. People with a sick sex urge sometimes seek to express it with little boys and girls instead of with other grown-up people whom they love. It is just another form of hate that we have to learn to recognize."

Ignorance And Ignorance

Our reluctance to discuss the subject of sex perversion with children derives from our desire to preserve what we think of as their "innocence." We are, of course, not preserving their innocence, but their ignorance.

The more we live, the more we realize that good attitudes in human beings grow stronger as we become aware of them consciously. The child who is conscious of his own truthfulness, honesty and independence is a self-confident child. Unconscious innocence is no safeguard of innocence. Conscious innocence is the safeguard—a purity of heart that knows evil and rejects it, deliberately and intelligently.

With the shedding of baby teeth, children should be set upon the road of conscious awareness of their own honesty, truthfulness and purity of heart. To fear that our briefing on sex perversion will despoil them of their purity of heart is a tragic mistake. There is a great difference between stagnant ignorance that accepts evil and active innocence that rejects it.

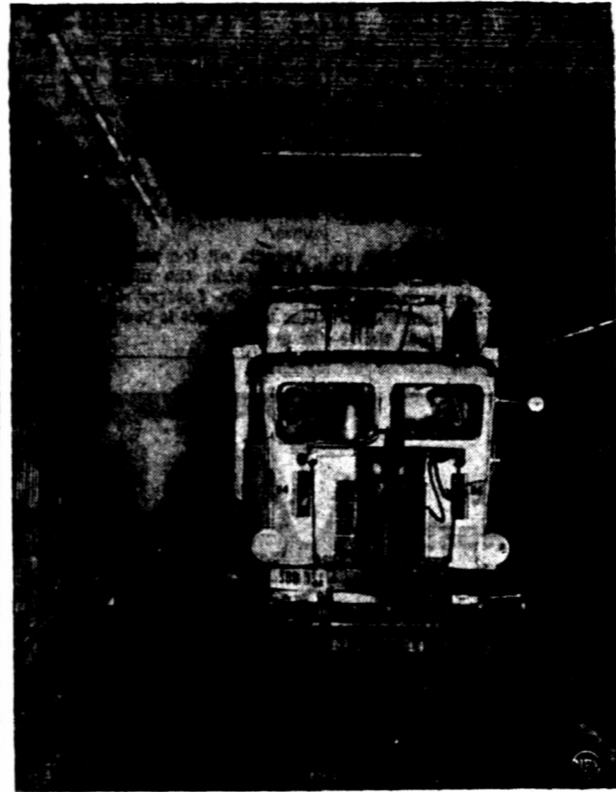

Cook together about seven minutes until the syrup threads or forms a firm ball when tested in cold water (244-248 F. on candy thermometer.) Spread buttered 8" cake pans or a large flat pan to harden. Break into manageable pieces when cold.

Let's hope that a girl's parents aren't obliged to keep the boy in bread, butter, and sweetmeats every night to get him to call on daughter. After all, a girl does not find sugar plums on a candy tree any more than the boy does. Why, then, should girls do the entertaining?

But it is fun to entertain at home, and providing you do not get the boy in the habit of parking on your sofa, you should be easy on his pocketbook, occasionally, and suggest an evening at home. Here are some answers to questions most frequently asked by puzzled senioritas:

1. How shall I suggest we spend the evening at home?
2. How can I break the ice when he visits my home for the first time?
3. How shall I entertain him?
4. What time should he go home?

1. How shall I suggest we spend the evening at home?
If you have been out with a boy a few times, and he seems broke, or if your family likes to approve a boy before you go out with him, then invite the young man to the house for an evening of record playing, games or dancing. However, do not ask him the second time, unless he has made an effort to take you out even for simple entertainment.

2. How can I break the ice when he visits my home for the first time?

4. What time should he go home?
A smart girl will manage to indicate to the young man that it is time to go before Dad comes in and yawns or Mom calls down to ask if daughter is still up. (Mothers and fathers are like that.) To avoid being embarrassed by the family, but a clock on the living room table immediately after the young man arrives. Set it down on a table in full view saying something like "I've got to get to bed by 9:30 (or 10 or whatever) because I must be up early" (for an exam or to do some special chores or for another appropriate reason). Any nice boy will take the hint. If he tries to detain you, after you've given him warning, say "goodnight" abruptly, if necessary.

5. What about petting at home?
A boy should not get the impression that he is invited to your house for a necking session, which is what will happen if you permit him to get overly romantic. If you want him to be a gentleman on outside dates—such as picnics, car rides, etc.—you will have to set the example in your home. Some girls get the idea that it is fine to neck at home since they have Mom and Pop in the offing for protection. Then they wonder why a boy is so difficult to handle when they date away from home.

Chicken Fricassee Is Made Different With New Sauce



Seems we have been hearing a lot about chicken. Thrifty homemakers have been using them frequently since they have been a good "buy" on the food market. They still are, so even though chicken fricassee is an old favorite from way back, we've come up with a slightly different version. Serve your chicken with a sauce keyed to flavor, nutrition and economy. The base is margarine, with good chicken stock, egg yolk and milk. They all combine to give you a smooth delicious sauce.

You can use well-matured fowl for this economical dish. Let it simmer gently and do not boil. Allowing the bird to cool in the stock keeps it moist.

Serve the vegetable used for flavoring the stock along with the chicken. For a really concentrated chicken flavor, strain after it has cooled. Bring it to a boil and boil it uncovered until it is reduced in quantity by one half.

You'll get a smoother sauce if you add flour to the melted margarine off the heat. That way the flour cools slowly and does not have a chance to become lumpy. That egg yolk in the sauce gives it a richer flavor.

Chicken Fricassee

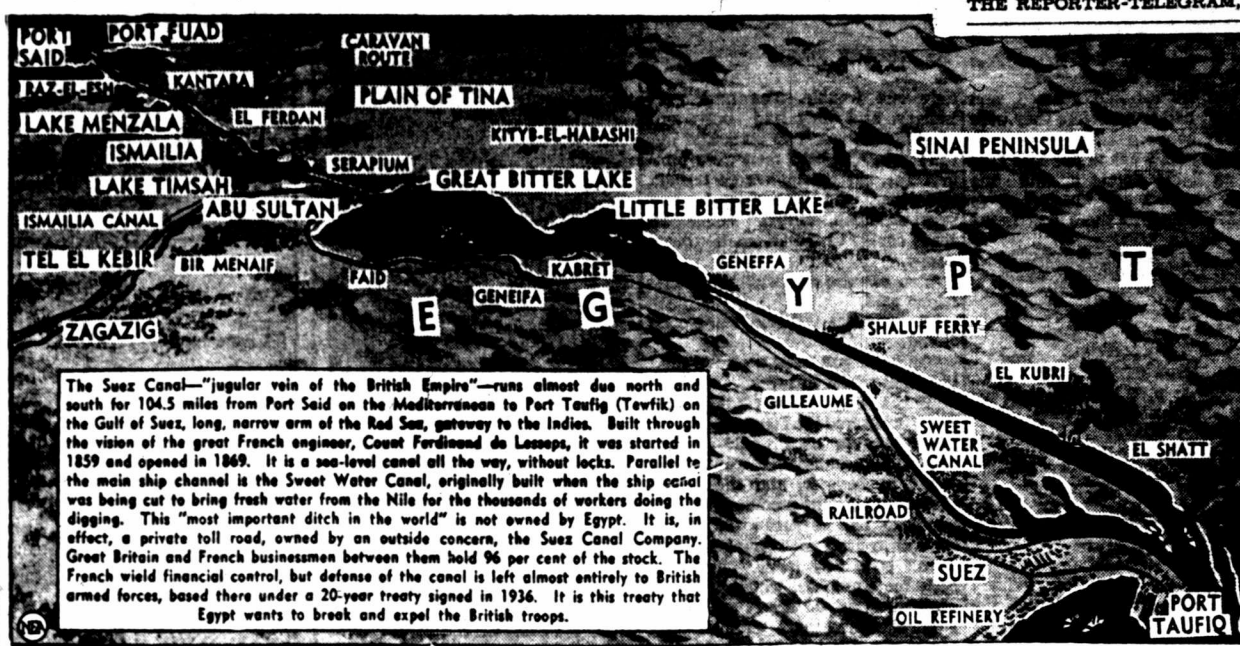
Four lb. chicken, 2 large onions, 4 carrots, sliced, 1 bay leaf, 1 teaspoon salt, 6 peppercorns, water.

Have butcher cut up chicken as for frying. Place in a large pan with sliced onions and carrots, bay leaf, salt and peppercorns. Add water just to cover. Cover pan and bring to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer gently until chicken is tender. Cool, drain chicken and remove bones. Strain one cup stock and reserve it for sauce.

Fricassee Sauce

One-fourth cup margarine, 1/4 cup enriched flour, 1/4 teaspoon salt, dash of cayenne pepper, 1 cup chicken stock, 1 tablespoon margarine, 1 egg yolk, 1 cup milk.

Melt the margarine in saucepan over low heat. Blend in flour. Add salt and cayenne pepper. Add chicken stock by thirds, blending thoroughly after each addition. Cook stirring constantly until sauce thickens and looks satiny and smooth. Remove from heat. Add margarine, one teaspoon at a time. Combine egg yolk and milk and slowly add to sauce. Reheat, stirring constantly but do not boil. Remove from heat. Pour over chicken and serve with rice. Serves 6.

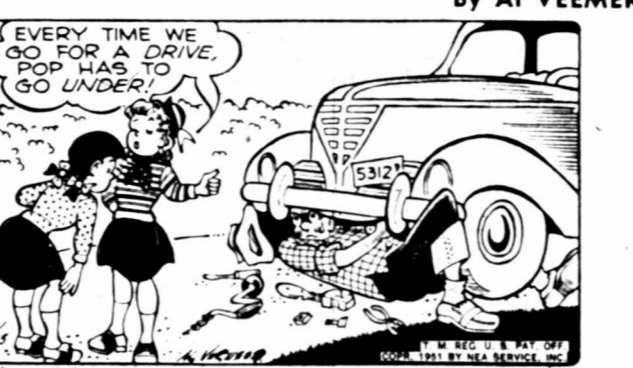

Confidence In Nature Helps Avoid Worry About Disease

I was called to task recently by a woman who wrote, "Why do you frighten us all the time about so many diseases? Every time I read about some disease I have never heard of before, I think I have it."

This letter causes me great concern, since I certainly do not want to frighten anyone unnecessarily. Such an experience is by no means uncommon; one famous scientist said that while he was studying medicine, he thought he had everything he studied except housemaid's knee. A person such as this correspondent, who has too good an imagination, and is inclined to worry, would be better off to leave this column alone.

The number of diseases or accidents that could afflict us is almost unlimited, but it is worth remembering that most of the time the majority of us stay healthy.

Even when we do suffer from disease or accident, the powers of nature, with an assist from medicine, usually result in complete recovery. In other words, most of us are healthy a lot more than we are sick. One of the things which helps a great deal in keeping healthy is that most of us have a lot of natural resistance to disease and even when we are exposed, do not become ill. During the course of many millions of years on this earth, the people who have survived have developed great power to resist or throw off many of the disease germs and other conditions which otherwise would wipe human beings from the face of the earth. Also, most of us have good luck in avoiding accidents and illness.

Preventive Measures

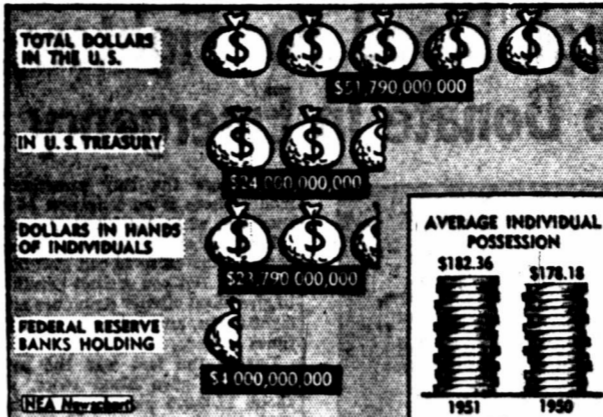
A brick falling from a roof or an automobile out of control have a great many places to go besides hitting us. Good fortune is not always present, but if it were not for this, the hospitals would be even more crowded than they now are.

Also, besides the natural resistance and good luck on which we

must all count, modern sanitary methods, public health activities, vaccinations and other preventive measures have done much to cut down on the dangers to health.

Too much worry about the chances of becoming ill or suffering an accident must be avoided. Those who worry constantly really are suffering from a mental condition which usually is called a neurosis.

This in itself is a kind of disease, but the average person can fight it off without too much difficulty. It is best to use intelligent precautions in living and then cease worrying.

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Civilians Fail To Give Enough Blood For Fighters; Servicemen Being Asked To Donate In Emergency

WASHINGTON (NEA)—Because U. S. civilians have failed to donate enough blood for the troops in Korea or even for their own disaster needs, American servicemen are being asked to donate 50 per cent of the nation's total supply in a new emergency donor program being run by the armed forces.

The military was forced to take over this program when the American Red Cross by the reduction in supply of plasma and whole blood reserves. Men fighting in Korea were dangerously short of the vital fluid in case of a new offensive there. Civilians were in a desperate situation in the event of a disaster or atomic attack at home.

Reasons for the sudden reduction of reserves include the greatly expanded use of blood and plasma

for treating battlefield wounded. This new technique is in great part responsible for the Army being able to cut death from wounds in Korea to 2.8 per 1,000; the World War II rate was four per 1,000.

Perhaps the biggest reason for the emergency was civilian apathy toward the Red Cross donor programs—through no fault of the Red Cross. It was discovered that every time a battle was won in Korea the blood donors back in the U. S. stopped giving. When the truce talks were started the number of donors suddenly dropped to one-third.

Figures Given
New goal of the Department of Defense is 2,800,000 pints to be obtained at the rate of 300,000 pints per month. During World War II U. S. civilians donated 13,000,000 pints.

The amount of blood which can be accepted is limited by the facilities for storing and processing. It takes rather elaborate equipment to turn blood into powdered plasma. And it takes a lot of cold storage space and fast transportation to get whole blood to Korea.

As far as most civilians go, the program will be just the same for them as when the Red Cross was in charge. All blood donated by civilians will be taken and processed by the Red Cross; the armed forces have moved in to make the need more dramatic to the American people.

By Military
Blood taken from the men in uniform and from the civilians working on bases will be processed by the military. However, in times of crisis or catastrophe, military supplies would be made available to civilians under the new program.

The military also is supplying new processing and storage equipment to the Red Cross to increase the amount of blood it can handle. According to experts on civilian defense there is practically no limit to the amount of blood or plasma which would be needed in case of an atomic bomb attack on the U. S.

In one city alone, if the citizens had good warning—an estimated 40,000 living casualties would require 120,000 units of blood in the first three-week period. If the attack came without warning, the quantity of blood needed would be twice that, experts believe.

Emphasis on the new drive is being placed on the painlessness of giving blood. It is claimed that giving a pint of blood is no more painful than a flea bite. A skin anesthetic called procaine is rubbed on the

arm where the tiny insertion is made. There is no sensation at all, they say, when the blood is drawn. Practically any average healthy person from 18 to 60 can give blood regularly. But you are not permitted to give blood oftener than once every eight weeks, and not more than five times a year.

During the last war the average donor gave blood twice, and about 1,500,000 persons gave blood three times.

All it takes is a call to your local Red Cross office.

Lights Are Factor In Egg Production

COLUMBUS, OHIO (AP)—Although they don't have to see what they're doing, laying hens work better if they have light.

"Lights are a big help in getting increased egg production which means more profit per bird," says Emil Malinovsky, extension poultry specialist at Ohio State University. Artificial light extends the hen's working day, he said. "It makes it possible for each bird to eat more feed. Main reason for larger egg production when lights are used, however, is stimulation of the pituitary gland by light rays."

Motorists Getting Worse, Is Report

DENVER (AP)—A man who has driven a million miles on Colorado highways in 25 years says roads and automobiles are improving, but motorists are getting worse.

George C. Walker retired this year as chauffeur for Colorado's highway engineer. "Drivers have got faster cars and they get impatient," he said. "They always want to get ahead of somebody. It's no wonder they have accidents."

WANDERING FISH

A red salmon, marked in Alaskan waters by the U. S. Bureau of Fisheries, was caught in a Siberian stream 44 days later, traveling 1,300 miles in that time.

'Texans Don't Know Texas,' Midland Visitor Declares

The outspoken "tourist," who has visited newspapers, chambers of commerce and travel agencies in practically every city and section in Texas in recent months, is winding up his current tour of Texas in the interest of organizing a Texas Tourist Association. And from the reams of copy he has received in Texas newspapers, the project is meeting with widespread success.

The purpose of the association, Dr. Howard said, is to collect information on Texas, advertise Texas to the world, and to persuade Texans themselves to see the Wonders of Texas.

Dr. Howard says Texans are quick to talk Texas and to defend their ideas of Texas as a great state, but unfortunately many Texans cannot tell visitors much about the state as a whole.

"Actually, 'Texans Don't Know Texas,'" Dr. Howard said, "and we must do something to overcome this fact in order to reap the full benefits of the tourist industry, which means so much to our great state."

To aid in overcoming this handicap, Dr. Howard, writing under the pen name of Howard King, has published "Texas Tourist Travel Guide," the first and only guide, according to the author, ever written about the wonders of Texas which are of particular interest to tourists.

It is designed for the use of tourists from outside Texas as well as Texans themselves.

The 138-page guide recognizes Texas as a great empire, divides it up into sections with explanations of the attractions of each, and tells the traveler what to see as he travels over Texas.

Dr. Howard said the book was not written and is not being sold for financial gain.

The author has had more than 20 years experience in publishing tourists guides and magazines and has toured Texas more than 40 years collecting information and photographing interesting things in Texas. He is a native Texan, whose father was a well-known Texas Ranger.

Dr. Howard also writes a column, "You Auto See Texas," which is distributed by the Texas Press Association.
