

Pecos Prospect Sets Pipe; Is Due To Test Wolfcamp Pay Zone

Nelson Hunter Hunt trust estate of Dallas, No. 1 W. A. Stroman, Central Pecos County wildcat is due to take production tests and try to complete as an oil well and the discovery of a new field.

This project is reported by unofficial sources to have drilled to a total depth of 9,644 feet in an unidentified formation.

It has now plugged back to 8,000 feet and has set and cemented 5 1/2-inch casing at that point with 800 sacks.

It appears that the operator plans to test the pay section in the Wolfcamp above 8,000 feet through perforations in the pipe and try to complete the project as a commercial producer.

The No. 1 Stroman is credited with having flowed oil at the estimated rate of 10 barrels per hour during a drillstem test at 7,718-46 feet.

Shows in Lower Zone It is also reported to have recovered some oil and gas out drilling fluid in a test of the interval at 7,761-7,815 feet.

No official information has been released on this prospect. It is seven miles east of the town of Fort Stockton and 1,230 feet from north and west lines of the lease in section 526, Comanche Creek Irrigation Company survey.

Permian Discovery In NW Crockett Is Set For Completion

Otto Engle and C&E Drilling Company No. 1 Half, wildcat in Northwest Crockett County is to be completed as a discovery from a Permian lime above plugged back total depth of 1,735 feet.

Operator set, five and one-half inch casing at 1,633 feet and shot open hole from 1,679 to 1,731 feet with 140 quarts of nitro glycerin.

After cleaning out, it is now being tested on the pump. During the first three and one-half hours of pumping, the discovery made 33 1/2 barrels of oil and 600 water.

Potential test will be taken soon. Location is 320 feet from south and east lines of section 52, block 1, I&G survey and five and one-half miles east of Sheffield.

C&E Lea Wildcat Sprays Distillate On Wolfcamp DST

A Wolfcamp discovery is in prospect six and one-half miles west of Lovington and seventeen miles southwest of the Denton-multiphase field of Central-East Lea County, N. M.

Wilshire Oil Company, Inc. No. 1 Townsend, 660 feet from south and east lines of section 4-184-35e, was drilled from 10,183 to 10,210 feet. Tool was opened at 4 p. m. Thursday and left open until 7 a. m. Friday. Gas surfaced in 19 minutes and distillate started spraying at the top in 30 minutes. It was still spraying when the tool was closed.

Snow Extends Into Heart Of Texas

Two Persons Die In Early Winter Blast

Chill north winds drove an early season snow into the heart of Texas Friday. Two persons died in accidents blamed on the weather. One man was killed Thursday night in a traffic accident on an ice-slick highway during a snow flurry in the Panhandle. A negro baby died at Midland Friday in a fire which destroyed the house where he had been left alone. Firemen said the wind blew a curtain against a small gas heater, causing the blaze.

Cold Brings Baby's Death In Home Fire

Winter blasted its way into Midland Friday and, accompanied by flurries of snow, pushed the temperature down to a sub-freezing 27 degrees. A five-month-old negro boy burned to death when his home was destroyed by a fire about 8 a. m. Friday. The fire victim was identified by police as Willie Kohn Kinnebrew, son of Mattie D. Kinnebrew. The infant's charred body was found in the ruins of the home at 200 South Adams Street after the fire quickly had razed the small frame dwelling. The snow, unprecedented for this early in the season at many points, ranged from a cake-frosting cover on houses and cars in Central Texas to more than four inches along the Oklahoma border at the top of the Panhandle. The snow area included most cities north of the line formed by Texarkana, Tyler, Corsicana, Waco, San Angelo and Marfa. Snow still (Continued On Page Seven)

Air War Tempo Increases

EIGHTH ARMY, KOREA—(P)—Allied airmen shot down one Red jet and damaged four in nine separate dogfights Friday—a record number of air battles for a single day in the Korean war.

The Fifth Air Force said all United Nations planes "involved in these encounters returned safely to their bases." The blazing air war contrasted with cold quiet on the snow-covered ground fronts. The one Red jet sent spiraling down in flames was the 100th MIG-15 reported down by the Fifth Air Force. B-29 gunners are credited with blasting 33 others out of the skies.

Three Nations Involved Airmen from three United Nations forces were involved in Friday's fights, ranging over Northwest Korea as much as 100 miles from the Manchurian border. About 200 MIG's and more than 100 UN planes were involved as the Communist fliers stepped up efforts to halt Allied raids on air fields and supply routes. U.S. Sabre jets made the lone kill. Australian Meteor jets and American Thunderjets each accounted for two of the damaged MIG's. The biggest dogfight was a 25-minute scrap between 35 Sabres and 80 MIG's. No casualties were reported. The fiercest engagement was between 24 F-86 Sabres and 44 MIG's. One MIG went down in flames. Sixteen Royal Australian Air Force Meteors took on 25 Red jets and damaged two. South African pilots in propeller-driven Mustangs came through unscathed, the Fifth Air Force said, when a flight of MIG's attacked them just north of Pyongyang. The North Korean capital is 100 miles from the Yalu River boundary between Korea and Manchuria. The Red jets seldom are seen that far from their base. Forty MIG's swept down on an escort flight of Sabre jets, but quickly turned tail and headed for the Yalu River.

Both Parties May Whisper With Ike

WASHINGTON—(P)—Democrats may vie with Republicans for the political ear of Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower on his return to Washington next week. An announcement by Senator Duff (R-Pa.) that he expects to talk to Eisenhower during his visit about the 1952 Republican presidential nomination brought a statement by Senator Olin D. Johnston (D-SC) that he would like to discuss the Democratic nomination with the general. And all this prompted Senator Kefauver (D-Tenn.) to tell a reporter he thinks Eisenhower's name might go before both conventions unless the general makes some direct statement on his political affiliations in the interim. Johnston said in an interview that previous conferences he has held with the general have left the impression with him that Eisenhower "is more of a Democrat than a Republican." Eisenhower Booster Before the 1948 Democratic convention, Johnston boomed Eisenhower for the party nomination over President Truman, although after the election, he hurried back to Washington to welcome Truman on his return to the capital. The South Carolina senator indicated he is not likely to be in the President's corner next year. Gov. James F. Byrnes of South Carolina and others who are opposing Truman's nomination haven't said so publicly but there are signs (Continued On Page Seven)

Mr. One Million Sails Friday Noon For Midland Home

BREMERHAVEN, GERMANY—(P)—The one millionth displaced person to be resettled in a new home by the International Refugee Organization sailed from here at noon (CST) Friday for the United States. He is Alexander Ranezey, 47-year-old Czech, who fled from the advancing Russian Army in early 1945 and has been living as a refugee in Austria ever since. Ranezey, his wife and two daughters will go to Midland, Texas, where he has found a job as gardener and handyman at the home of William Y. Penn, a consulting geologist. They sailed aboard the USS General Mur with 1,200 other Displaced Persons, bound for resettlement in the "new world."

Former Midlander Dies At Georgetown

Relative here were notified of the death of W. M. Pyle, 79, long-time Midland resident, at Georgetown Friday morning. Pyle died after a short illness. Among survivors are four sons of Midland—John, Lester, Milton and Pete Pyle. Funeral services had not been set Friday morning. Relatives said they probably would be held in Midland.

GI's To Feast On Turkey, Trimmings

YOKOHAMA—(P)—It will be turkey, as usual, for U. S. soldiers in Korea Thanksgiving. The Logistic Command quartermaster is ready to distribute more than 1,000,000 pounds of turkey, candy, fruit cake, olives, shrimp cocktail, mixed nuts and cranberry sauce. Survival is the daughter, Thelma White of Tularosa.

Mrs. J. Tom White Dies In New Mexico; Rites Here Saturday

Mrs. J. Tom White, 72, member of a pioneer Midland family, died Thursday at Tularosa, N.M. Funeral services will be held at 10 a. m. Saturday in the Newnie W. Ellis Chapel here with the Rev. Luther Kirk, pastor of First Methodist Church, officiating. Interment will be in Fairview Cemetery. Pallbearers will be Aldredge Estes, Sr., Charles Klapproth, Harvey Sloan, J. L. Crump, Charles Goldsmith, Glenn Brunson, Joe Youngblood and E. B. Dickenson. Mrs. White lived in Midland many years but moved to New Mexico in 1932 to live with her daughter, Thelma White. The late J. Tom White was an early-day Midland rancher, having come here in 1895. Mrs. White was born July 6, 1879, in Collin County, Texas. She came here with her husband in the early days of Midland. She was an active member of the First Methodist Church here for many years and was a prominent clubwoman.

Two Million Men Over 26 Still Are Subject To Draft

WASHINGTON—(P)—Selective Service Friday estimated that some 2,000,000 men between the ages of 26 and 35 are subject to the draft under a provision in the Draft-Universal Military Training Law. A spokesman for the agency said, however, that unless world conditions take a serious turn for the worse, there is little likelihood of widespread drafting of men in their 30's.

Defense Department Sets January Draft Call At 59,650 Men

WASHINGTON—(P)—The Defense Department Friday asked for 59,650 draftees in January—the largest number asked for any month since last Spring. Of the total, 48,000 will go to the Army and 11,650 to the Marines. The Defense Department said "this goal compensates for the low call in December, when inductions were suspended for the holiday December 21, 1951, through January 2, 1952."

Gentlemen Of Fast Buck Crowd Prove Shy Under New Law

By The Associated Press It was hard to lay a bet Friday in many cities across the land. The numbers runners and horse race bookies were shutting up shop temporarily at least. The odds were against the professional gamblers—a tax miracle worked by Uncle Sam. A new law, effective Thursday, requires them to register, pay a \$50 annual fee to operate and 10 per cent of their gross receipts in federal taxes. And if they register, their names are available for the police to see. The boys don't like that. Which is worse, they pondered—a federal jail for failing to pay the tax or a local jail for violating state gambling laws. On top of that worry was the tax bite imposed in the new law. Reports of bookie shutdowns came from many places, among them New York, Boston, Baltimore, Los Angeles, New Orleans, Atlanta, Cleveland, St. Louis, Miami, Maine, Rhode Island.

Red Envoys Press UN For Acceptance Of Cease-Fire Line

MUNSAN, KOREA—(P)—Red truce negotiators pressed Allied delegates Friday to accept the Communist proposal for a cease-fire buffer zone across Korea—but balked at issuing an ultimatum. Brig. Gen. William P. Nickols, United Nations Command spokesman, said the Communist subcommittee at Panmunjom urged the Allies to give up their demands for Kaesong and accept the Red line. Maj. Gen. Henry I. Hodes, head of the UN subcommittee, asked the Reds if they were issuing an ultimatum. "They refused to answer directly," Nickols said, "and were evasive, saying that sincerity was necessary on both sides."

Red Feather Drive Still Far From Goal

Midland's Red Feather drive still was far below the needed funds Friday—with \$23,000 raised toward a goal of \$55,477.25. Thursday was Red Feather Day, but the effectiveness of the all-out effort was not reported fully Friday morning. Midland police, however, still were making calls at residences and accepting Community Chest contributions. The police volunteered their services to the Chest campaign. Pat Ruckman, campaign chairman, said chairmen and co-chairmen were to meet at noon Friday to report on the campaign so far. John E. Reid, coordinator of the drive, urged any person desiring to make a contribution to the Chest to telephone the headquarters, 4-6009, and the money would be picked up.

Daniel Protests Federal Leasing Of Offshore Lands
AUSTIN —(AP)— Attorney General Price Daniel Thursday protested federal leasing of Tidelands without congressional approval. He asked Texas members of Congress to join in protesting to President Truman and Secretary of the Interior Oscar Chapman.

Daniel sent letters to the Texas senators and congressmen in which he said it appeared "a brazen thing for executive officials to await the adjournment of Congress" before scheming to lease Tidelands without authority from Congress to do such leasing.

The attorney general said federal officials had testified in the past that they had no authority to grant leases on Tidelands.

Court Prohibits Nevada Divorce For Clark Gable
SANTA MONICA, CALIF.—(AP)— Clark Gable's lawyer said Friday the actor's divorce battle with Lady Sylvia Ashley will be waged in the California courts.

Gable has been forbidden from obtaining a Nevada divorce by a court injunction issued here Thursday. The injunction was ordered despite Gable's contention that he now is a legal resident of Nevada.

Mrs. Gable has filed for divorce in California. Gable has answered her suit, and recently filed an action of his own in Las Vegas. Both charge cruelty.

Superior Judge Orlando Rhodes Thursday said if Gable disregards the injunction and obtains a Nevada divorce anyway, he will be liable for contempt of court charges in California.

Gable's attorney, W. I. Gilbert, Jr., said the ruling means "We will scrap it out right here."

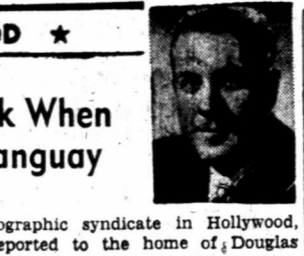

Wallace Indicted In Austip Slaying

AUSTIN —(AP)— Malcolm E. (Mac) Wallace, a war-time student president of the University of Texas, was under indictment Friday for murder in the shooting of golf course operator Douglas Kinser.

The indictment was returned Thursday by a Travis County grand jury.

District Attorney Bob Long said he expected the case to go to trial before Christmas.

Wallace, 30-year-old U. S. Department of Agriculture economist from Washington, D. C., was arrested about an hour and a half after Kinser, 33, was shot to death in the clubhouse of his Pitch and Putt Golf Course, October 22. No motive for the slaying has been disclosed.

Truman Signs Last Appropriation Bills

WASHINGTON —(AP)— The last two appropriation bills for this year were signed Thursday by President Truman. They totaled \$5,822,654,084. One provides \$4,146,407,108, mainly for building of Army, Navy and Air Force installations in the U. S. and abroad.

The other, carrying \$1,676,246,976, includes \$790,000,000 for buying and storing strategic materials and \$75,000,000 for the Civil Defense Administration.

The motto on the first penny authorized by the U. S. Congress was inspired by Benjamin Franklin and said, "Mind your business."

"Spring flowering bulbs are the gardener's pot of gold," Mrs. Butler Hurley told members of the Midland Garden Club Thursday at a meeting in the home of Mrs. L. C. Link.

"No other group of flowers," she explained, "gives beauty so generously for so little care and expense."

Speaking on the topic, "Spring Flowering Bulbs," Mrs. Hurley advised the group to plant bulbs in drifts or in groups of from five to eight, in front of flowering shrubs and evergreens. The taller ones should be planted in back, she said, and medium and lower growing bulbs in front.

Most bulbs should be planted in November, she said, but tulips may be planted through December. She recommended planting at the following depths for Midland's light, sandy soil: Tulips, 12 inches; daffodils and narcissus, eight inches; hyacinths, six inches; crocus, three inches; scilla (wood hyacinths), four inches; and oxalis and grape hyacinths, two inches.

She concluded her talk with additional advice for the selection and care of bulbs and suggestions for their use in increasing the beauty of the garden.

The Washington Merry-Go-Round

 Drew Pearson says: Franco bowls out U.S. Air Force general; U.S. abandons air-base plan for Spain because of a dictator's dictatorial attitude; Piggy banks endanger U.S. supply of pennies.

WASHINGTON — The Pentagon is keeping mum about it, but, on October 13, Spanish Dictator Francisco Franco called in Maj. Gen. James V. Spry, head of the U. S. Military Mission to Spain, and staged a savage interview in which he threatened, in effect, to withhold the establishments of American bases in Spain.

The interview was so harsh, and Franco's general attitude has been so unreasonable that General Spry is returning to the United States with the almost certain recommendation that there be no U. S. air bases in Spain.

Unless Senator Pat McCarran, who heads the powerful Spanish lobby in Washington, is able to batter heads at the Pentagon, this recommendation is likely to be accepted.

What happened was that General Spry was sent to Spain as head of a joint Naval-Air Force mission to arrange for the much-publicized bases which Franco supposedly promised to the late Adm. Forrest Sherman. Although \$68,000,000 for Spanish aid was tacked onto the foreign aid bill by Senator McCarran, this was done prior to Admiral Sherman's base-deal and the two were never connected. The offer of bases was made afterward, supposedly as a gesture of friendship by Franco.

General Spry's mission to survey the best sites for bases was due to be completed by November 15, and it was agreed in advance that not until November 15, would he give the Spanish government a verbal resume of his findings.

Impatient Dictator
 Franco, however, couldn't wait that long. On October 13 he abruptly sent for Spry and demanded to know just how much he could get out of the United States and when.

Taken aback, Spry started to explain that his job was merely to evaluate Spanish bases, not discuss economic matters. He did not have a chance to say more than a few sentences. With only his first few words translated, Franco cut him short, launched into a violent har-

Force in England, France and Italy. In brief, although we could build bases, they would have to be manned largely by Spanish troops.

As a result, General Spry is returning home with the recommendation that we use the air bases now almost completed in French Morocco. These are so close to Spain they easily can defend the western Mediterranean.

A U. S. naval base at Cadiz may be recommended by Adm. Robert L. Campbell who was part of the Spry mission—provided the United States is willing to pay for the cost of building a huge commercial port for Spain which could be used as a naval base in time of war.

War On Piggy Bank
 The Bureau of the Mint privately has declared war on that trusty receptacle of America's loose change, the piggy bank. It's all because of the shortage of pennies, which in turn is due to the scarcity of defense-needed copper.

The government has something like 19,197,534,000 pennies outstanding and another 175,000,000 were minted during the month of October. However, there's still a big shortage, foreign banks can't ration their output of pennies.

Leland Howard, assistant director of the Mint, says an idea of the problem must be looked if all the nation's piggy banks were abolished. "It's a tough subject," admits Howard. "We don't like to tell people, particularly kids, not to save. But we'd like to trade a paper dollar for every 100 pennies stashed away in those piggy banks. Paper money is lighter and you can put it right back in the bank."

The penny shortage is accentuated in times like these when people have lots of money to spend and retail stores go in for odd-cent pricing to attract customers, according to Howard.



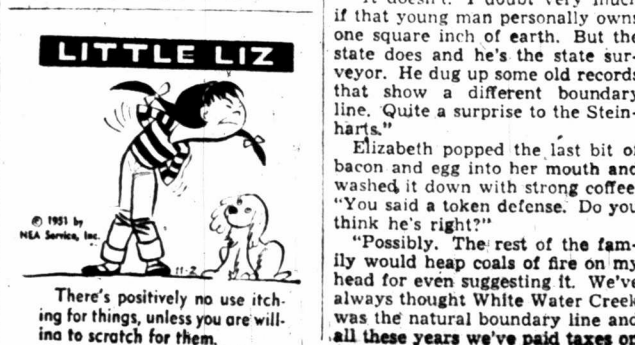

JACOBY ON BRIDGE

There's probably no such thing as a new play in bridge, but once in a great while we see something that looks startlingly original. My good friend Johnny Crawford cooked up the new idea that brought home a slam in the hand shown today. West opened the ten of hearts, and the hand looked easy for a moment. Crawford planned to win the heart with dummy's king, draw trumps in two rounds (he hoped),

cash the ace of hearts, ruff ♠ heart, cash the ace of diamonds, and ruff a diamond.

He could then take a club finesse to East in such a position that any return by East would sacrifice a trick. A club return would give declarer a free finesse, and a diamond or heart return would allow dummy to ruff while South discarded a club.

This plan came to nothing when East failed to follow on the first round of trumps. It was now impossible to draw trumps and still leave a trump in dummy.

Crawford thought this over for a minute or so, and decided that he could make the slam if he could manage to play so that North, East, and South hands came down to three clubs each. He could then lose a club finesse to East and be assured of a club return to dummy's ace-ten.

To bring this situation about, Crawford led out five rounds of trumps, discarding two low clubs from the dummy. East actually discarded five diamonds on the five trumps.

Crawford thereupon took the ace of diamonds and ruffed a diamond. East had to discard two hearts since a club discard at any time would be obviously fatal.

Now Crawford could take the ace of hearts and ruff a heart—and East was left with exactly three clubs. As planned, Johnny led the jack of clubs and let it ride; whereupon East could take one club trick but no more.

Curiously enough, East could not save himself. If he had discarded one diamond and four hearts on the five trumps, Crawford would next take the ace of hearts and ruff a heart while dummy still had the ace of diamonds. This would force East to discard two more diamonds, whereupon Crawford could take the ace of diamonds and ruff a diamond. East would be reduced to his three clubs, exactly as desired.

Belgium Leads Rest Of Europe In Gaining Democratic Ideals

BRUSSELS, BELGIUM—This prosperous and tight little country is off the beaten track of world communication. Less news comes out of Belgium for publication in the world press than perhaps any other country in Europe. Yet it is a good story.

Belgium probably has come closer to achieving the ideals of American democracy than any other country in Europe. It is strictly a free enterprise country. In this it is in marked contrast to Great Britain. Nothing is nationalized in Belgium except distribution of electric power. Belgium's great political figure, Paul Henri Spaak, frequently has declared the United States has more "socialism" in its economy than Belgium.

This in itself is something of a paradox. Belgium is constitutionally a monarchy with a king. Yet its Chamber of Deputies, corresponding to the U. S. House of Representatives, is made up of 115 Christian Socialists, 70 Socialists, 20 Liberals and seven Communists. This Communist strength, incidentally, represents a reduction from 23 Communist deputies in 1946. Belgium has done more to stamp out communism than almost any other country in Europe.

Labor in Belgium is highly organized, as in the United States. It has had its share of strikes. Labor unions won broad concessions tying wage levels to the cost of living. Labor leaders are in the process of forcing an excess-profits tax on business. Business leaders here recognize, as does enlightened management in the United States, the legitimate demands of workers. There is a high degree of paternalism on the part of Belgian employers toward their employees. The Belgian people demand and get a high standard of living.

Beat Down Inflation
 Right after the war they put their country through the wringer. They beat down all the inflationary forces. They stabilized their currency. The result is that today the Belgian franc is as sound as any currency in Europe, including the Swiss franc. Belgian trade is balanced. Belgium needs no Marshall Plan aid although her unique position requires some adjustment with other economies of Europe.

Belgium today has grabbed onto the big idea of Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's European Army in an exemplary manner. Hating communism, knowing that it was incompatible with their concept of a free country, the realists of Belgium backed the North Atlantic Treaty.

In 1949 Belgium had one division at two-thirds full strength. By next July she will have three full divisions. Her Navy and Air Force

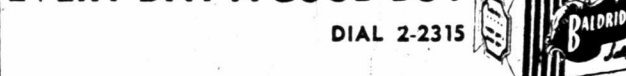

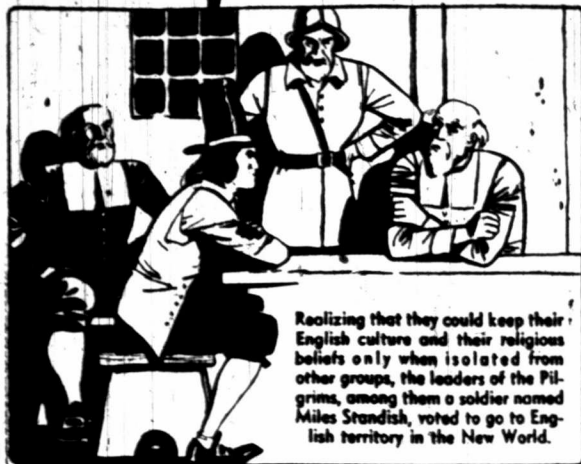

Sherman's snow was the earliest to fall in the area in many years. At nearby Denison, snow covered rooftops as the temperature touched the freezing mark.

At Tyler, where snow still was falling, the temperature at mid-morning was exactly the same as the overnight low of 34 degrees. Warning was issued in the Corpus Christi area to truck farmers to protect young vegetation against the expected low of 35 degrees there Friday night.

One Inch At Lubbock The snow which blanketed the Panhandle-South Plains was more than three weeks ahead of the average date for the first measurable snow. Lubbock recorded a minimum of 19 degrees. An inch of snow was on the ground. The sun began shining there at 8:40 a.m., but a minimum of 15 degrees was forecast for Friday night.

The State Highway Department said highways were icy and hazardous over the South Plains, except in the Lamesa vicinity. Light snow started falling in Waco about 8 a.m. and continued four hours. A forecast of clear, little wind and 60 degrees was made for Saturday's football game between Baylor and TCU.

Clear and cold was the weather forecast from Vernon Friday, as the Midland Bulldogs departed for a 1-AAA tilt with the Lions.

Light snow fell in Vernon Thursday night, but the temperature was several degrees higher than in Midland Friday morning. Weather observers said no snow was in prospect for Friday night, although it was expected to be very cold.

Coach Turboat Jones and his riders left Midland by chartered bus at 7 a.m. for the contest.

Midland ruled a slight favorite in most quarters, although Vernon has won five of six contests, compared to four wins, a loss and a tie for Midland. The Bulldogs hold a weight advantage of 182 to 172 pounds per man in the line, and a 166-to-158 bulge in the backfield.

Kickoff time for the Friday night contest—to be aired over KCBS—is 8 p.m.

Both squads were in good physical shape as kickoff time neared.

Top Elevens In Important Grid Clashes

NEW YORK—(AP)—Except for Illinois which faces a rough assignment against Michigan, virtually all the top college football teams in the country are figured to fatten their averages Saturday as the season starts into the home stretch.

The only outfit that possibly might be in for trouble other than the Illini is Baylor, which, if you want to go by the records, should have no trouble stepping on Texas Christian. But it's a Southwest Conference game and they don't go by form down that way.

Baylor is the conference leader and boasts the only undefeated record in the circuit besides being No. 8 in the last weekly Associated Press poll.

Texas A&M at Arkansas and Southern Methodist plays host to Texas in other games that will have a bearing on the race.

Illinois, out front in the Big Ten—another surprise based on preseason calculations—will have no cinch in defending champion Michigan, although Johnny Karras has not been stopped yet. The Illini ace has scored 10 touchdowns in five games, and if the Wolverines are going to win it, they'll have to think of some way to put the crimp on Karras.

Three other Big Ten games are on the card: Minnesota visits Iowa, Ohio State entertains Northwestern and Indiana plays Wisconsin at Madison.

In the Pacific Coast conference, California is figured to be a heavy choice over UCLA. Southern California makes a cross-country trip to New York to meet weak Army.

Stanford has a date with Washington State. The Indians, unbeaten and untied in six games, are the favorites.

Other top games on the coast include Oregon State at Washington and Idaho at Oregon.

Tennessee, riding along at the top of the heap, despite what has turned out to be a weak schedule—primarily because the South in general has been unusually weak this year—tangles with North Carolina. The Tarheels have lost four games, but they're capable of putting up a better battle than Tennessee Tech did last week when the Vols won, 68-0.

Maryland, Tech

Maryland and Georgia Tech, two of the other better teams in the section, entertain foes that might well have stayed home. Missouri faces the unenviable distinction of playing Maryland. The No. 4 team in the country with a record of 5-0, while Duke, beaten twice, enters the fair of the Yellow Jackets, who seem determined to give Tennessee a battle for Southeastern Conference honors.

Kentucky, which finally seems to have found itself after a miserable start, plays Miami of Florida. Alabama goes against Georgia, Mississippi State tangles with Tulane, Mississippi and Louisiana State go at it under the lights and the Citadel visits Virginia in other important Southern games.

Princeton, the toast of the Ivy League and East in general after 18 straight conquests, plays Brown, an intra-league foe in Tiger-ton. The Bears are one of the weak sisters of the loop, so all they can do is hope to hold the score down, something Cornell couldn't do last week.

Columbia journey to Cornell and Yale tackles Dartmouth in other Ivy League affairs, while among the independents, Navy, winless, hopes to stop Notre Dame's sophomore-studded powerhouse, Penn tangles with William and Mary in Philadelphia, Fordham plays Rutgers and Colgate visits Holy Cross, in other Eastern headlines.

It is the feature because it matches the two leaders in the fight for the championship—Texas Christian, with a 2-0 record and Baylor with one victory and one tie. But at Dallas, Texas and Southern Methodist will be battling to see which stays in the title race.

Battle Of Ozarks

At Fayetteville, Arkansas will be trying definitely to eliminate Texas A&M. The Aggies haven't much chance left anyway and a tie or loss to Arkansas would wipe even that out.

While the other conference members are cutting each other's throats, Rice will be playing an inter-sectional game. The Owls meet Pittsburgh at Houston and will be prohibitive favorites to take it. Pitt hasn't won a game this season, in fact has scored fewer than half as many points as the opposition.

The Texas Christian-Baylor tilt, due to be a wide open, wild offensive affair, will draw the largest crowd ever to see a football game in Waco. More than 35,000 are due to be in the stadium when these ancient rivals battle it out.

Our prediction record last week was much better than the week before but it still lacked much of the sensational—two wins, one loss and one tie. There isn't much hope of improving this week but here goes:

Texas-Southern Methodist—The Longhorns will need to score at least three times to win; we believe they will—Texas by a touchdown.

Baylor-Texas Christian at Waco—You can't figure an upset either way in this one; Baylor by the closest margin possible.

Texas A&M-Arkansas—A weak vote for the Aggies.

Rice-Pittsburgh—Rice ought to win this one with comparative ease; Rice by three touchdowns.

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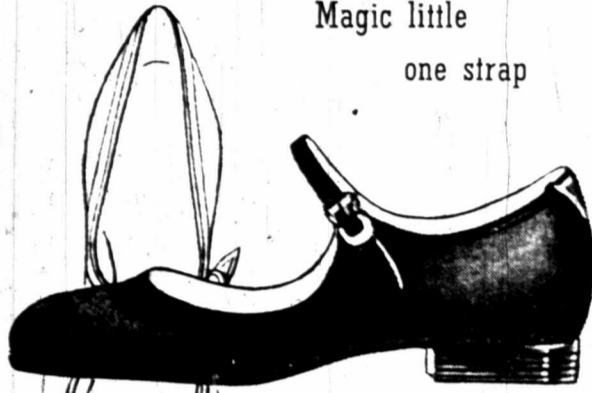


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Confession Solves Weird Trunk Murder

LOS ANGELES.—(AP)—A landlady's curiosity was credited Friday with solving the East Los Angeles trunk murder.

A slender, nervous house painter named John Kelley admitted to deputy sheriffs Thursday, they announced, that he strangled his 39-year-old wife, Margaret, during an argument last October 13 over money and another woman.

Inspector Garner Brown said Kelley, 44, wept out a story of how he stuffed the body into an old trunk and left it in the bedroom of the couple's two sons, Richard, seven, and John Jr., 10.

For five nights, Kelley related, the boys slept in the room with their mother's body, never knowing it was there. He said he told them she had gone to Boston, where their grandfather was dying.

In his statement, taken down by a stenographer, Kelley said he finally dumped the trunk at night in a nearby vacant lot after the children "complained of a strange odor."

Mrs. Hattie Bell McFarland, 72, had read about the slaying in the newspapers. Not seeing Mrs. Kelley around the house for 10 days made her suspicious, so she called the authorities.

Dixie Democrats Flay Truman, Offer No Specific Plan

SELMA, ALA.—(AP)—Rebellious Dixie Democrats tested the anti-Truman winds here Thursday but failed to come up with any specific plan to keep him from heading the party ticket again.

Even the keynote speaker, Virginia's Senator Harry Byrd, caustic critic of the Truman Administration, had nothing concrete to suggest as to what course the South should take.

Almost nothing was decided in the well advertised "strategy caucus" of States' Righters, passed up by most of the top brass among Southern Democrats.

Sentiment of many present was sounded by Gov. Herman Talmadge of Georgia, who gave this explanation of why he skipped the caucus: "I want to see the whites of their eyes before I fire."

About 400 showed up for the caucus. The group adopted a broad manifesto calling for re-emphasis of local state government, restoration of the courts and Congress to their rightful place in government, and a limit of federal taxation.

The statement of principles also urged a halt to what was termed the trend toward state socialism.

Linnabary said an East Moline chemist was trying to learn the ingredients of small pills found in the candy. He said the pills, "about as big as BB shot," were embedded in marshmallow candy and coconut cakes.

Linnabary said the stricken children, all of whom have recovered, became nauseated and suffered abdominal pains.

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More Than 110,000 Soldiers Returned From Korean War

WASHINGTON.—(AP)—More than 110,000 soldiers have been returned from the Far East, the Army said Thursday, and 112,000 enlisted men and 7,300 officers have been sent to replace them and to strengthen forces in Korea.

The total number brought back as of October 31, included 30,000 men whose enlistments have expired. The Army said most enlisted reservists have already come home and those remaining will be released by December 20.

The Army said present plans call for the transfer from Korea by December 1 of almost all enlisted men in combat units who arrived before last January 1. But many combat officers and non-combat enlisted men will have to remain there through part of the winter, the Army said.

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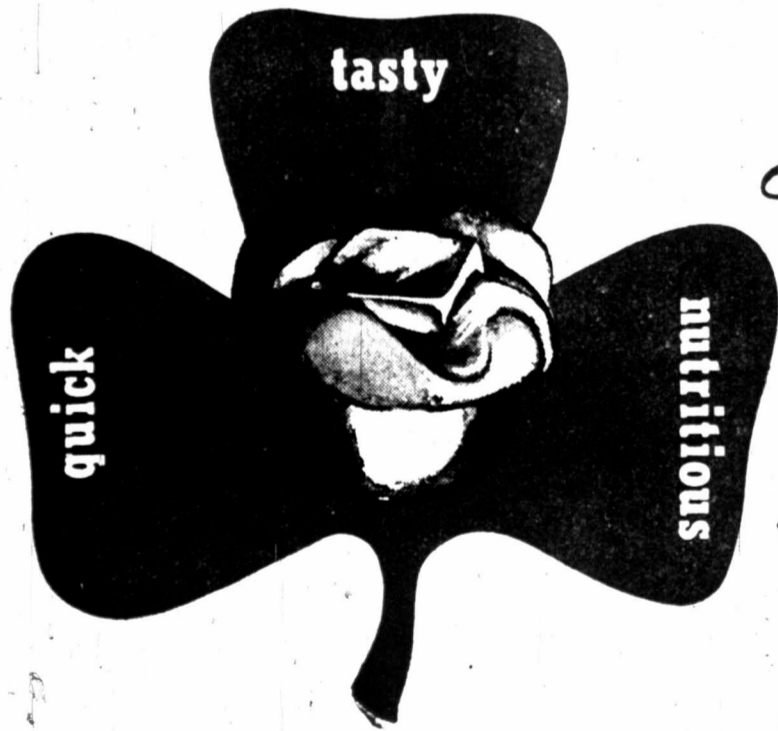
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
