

Citizens Will Decide

The question of whether Midland again is to have a public transportation system within the near future now rests with the City of Midland electorate.

The question for months was in the hands of the City Council, but the matter of a 20-year franchise, as requested by the prospective bus line operators, necessitated the calling of a special election. Under the City Charter, the council can grant a franchise for not more than a fiveyear period. A franchise for a longer period of time must be approved by the electorate.

The special election will be held Saturday in the City-County Auditorium. All qualified voters of the city may cast ballots.

Actually, the only thing involved in the election is to determine whether a 20-year franchise will be granted to the Midland Transportation Company, which proposes to operate a bus system in Midland.

It is one city election which does not involve office holders or money. It is the democratic way to decide a matter in which all citizens should be interested. It is femocracy in action. The people must decide the question involved.

Is Too Late He should have. When he did notify the board, it was too late. "This is the first case under this phase of the regulations to come to our attention," the state Selective Service director commented. "It's just another case where a man has slept on his rights. Congress has made it the personal responsibility of every man to notify his board of changes in his status immediately."
