

Body Of Young Woman Found In Burning House

NEW BOSTON—(AP)—Police Monday sought to identify a young woman whose body was found Sunday, stuffed in the second-floor closet of a burning, unused house on the Greiner Air Force Base bombing range.

County Solicitor Conrad Danals said "It looks like murder." State police added the abandoned house evidently was set afire to cover up a crime.

Acting Medical Referee Oscar Burns said after a preliminary examination that the woman was dead before her body was brought to the house.

He said there were no marks of violence on the head—the only part of the body not seared by flames.

Dr. Burns added, "Her body was so badly burned we couldn't tell if she had been stabbed or choked to death."

An autopsy will be performed later to determine the exact cause of death.

104 Cars Set For Pan-American Race

MEXICO CITY—(AP)—Drivers of 104 automobiles, among them some of the world's best, assembled in Tuxtla Gutierrez Monday for the start of the 1,833-mile (3,113-kilometer) second annual Pan-American Stock Car Race.

The race will be run the length of Mexico. It ends November 25 in Ciudad Juarez, opposite El Paso. The first prize is \$23,180 with others ranging down to \$1,150 for tenth place. The contest is limited to modified, closed four-seat cars.

The cards include 69 American ones and six European, including French, Italian and British. Among the drivers are Tony Bettenhausen, United States champion driver; Alberto Ascari, Italian champion, and Louis Chiron, the French champion.

Mexican highway policemen from all over the country were assembled along the line of the race, the new Pan-American Highway.

Winnie Invited To Visit Texas

LONDON—(AP)—Winston Churchill Monday had an invitation to visit Texas. It came from the ambassador in charge of pelican affairs, News Editor James Carter of the Galveston News.

Carter dropped in on No. 10 Downing Street Sunday to ask England's prime minister to come to Texas while he's in the United States in January to see President Truman.

Carter said a member of the secretariat told him Churchill would visit Galveston "if he possibly could."

Plenty Of Oil, If You Find It, Says Exploration Chief

DALLAS—(AP)—The men who find oil met here Monday with this challenge facing them:
There's enough oil in the United States to last 100 years—if they can find it.
The estimate came from Dr. Sigmund Hammer, head of the group—the Society of Exploration Geophysicists. The meeting is a regional one.

Sunday, Dr. Hammer said in an interview: "As a matter of fact, our known reserves are the greatest in history. Last year, while the nation was using two billion barrels of oil, scientists and wildcatters found three billion."
More people than ever are hunting oil, Dr. Hammer said. He estimated there are 600 teams of geophysicists at work, a 25 per cent increase since Korea.

England Reports Foot, Mouth Disease

LONDON—(AP)—A serious outbreak of foot and mouth disease in Eastern England has forced the slaughter of 1,764 farm animals in five days.

The movement of livestock has been banned in parts of 13 English Counties. Eighteen outbreaks have been reported in the area since Wednesday. Diseased animals killed include 742 cattle, 566 sheep and 446 pigs, the Ministry of Agriculture reported Saturday.

CAMP BRECKENRIDGE, KY.—(AP)—A slightly puzzled Army Monday pondered the problem of where to imprison six WAC sergeants sentenced to serve time for beating a fellow WAC.

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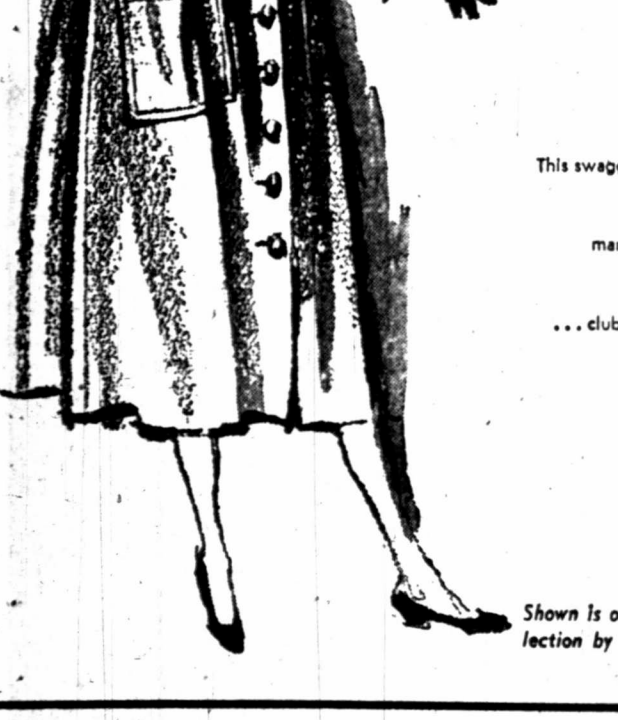

oped some clean oil and some oil and gas cut mud on drillstem tests. Water Zone Found
The zone at 8,071-93 feet was drilled for 20 minutes and that was where the water was found. There was a recovery of 90 feet of drilling mud and 2,070 feet of salt water during the test.

There were no shows of oil or gas. Operator is now circulating while waiting on orders.
The project may be plugged back to 3,300 feet and a production test may be run in the San Andres-Permian line above that point.
Had Slight Shows
That section logged some slight shows of petroleum when it was drilled through.
If it fails to make an oil well in that zone it likely will be plugged and abandoned.

Location is 662.2 feet from south and 658.2 feet from east lines of section 37, block 32, T&P survey, T-4-N. It is eight miles southwest of Gail.

Ellenburger Wildcat Is To Be Drilled In SE Schleicher Area

Taylor Refining Company is to start operations at once on its No. 1 Tissue Wardlaw, a scheduled 6,000-foot Ellenburger wildcat in Southeast Schleicher County.

The prospector will be 20 miles southeast of Eldorado and 690 feet from north and 1,980 feet from east lines of section 18, block K, OH&A survey.

That puts it one and one-half miles southeast of Gray-Wolfe Drilling Company No. 1 Edmiston, recently abandoned 4,888-foot dry hole.

Taylor No. 1 Wardlaw is to be spud and set surface casing with cable tools and it will then move in rotary to drill to the contract depth.

Murray To Explore To 4,000-Foot Zone At SW Runnels Site

Murray Petroleum Company of San Angelo No. 1 P. G. Strum is to be a 4,000-foot wildcat in Southwest Runnels County. It is five and one-half miles southwest of Hatchel.

Drillite is 990 feet from south and 330 feet from west lines of the H. C. Wylie survey No. 166. That puts it one and one-quarter miles south of Rowan Oil Company and associates No. 1 H. F. Busher, a 4,961-foot dry hole which was abandoned in July of this year.

Drilling to approximately 12,400 feet to try for production in the Ellenburger is to start at once.

Inside Proven Area
Magnolia Petroleum Company No. 10 Roy Glass is the Pegasus exploration. It is inside the proven area of the field and 660 feet from south and west lines of section 30, block 40, T&P survey, T-4-S.

Operations are to begin soon and it is to dig to 10,600 feet to try for production in the Pennsylvanian line.

C-E Concho Due For 2,250-Foot Venture

Lamb & Ford Drilling Company of Wichita Falls No. 1 Jim Rice is to be a 2,250-foot rotary wildcat in East-Central Concho County, three and one-half miles northwest of Melvin.

It will be 330 feet from north and west lines of section 18, R. W. Hoskins survey No. 18. Operations are to begin soon.

The venture is one-third of a mile north of a 2,000-foot duster.

tracks at Baird Street as she failed to make a turn.
Her automobile was pulled from the tracks by a passing truck, police reported, just a few seconds before a freight train rumbled by.
The three fatalities Sunday night brought Midland's traffic death toll within the last week to five. Two persons were killed last Sunday night when their automobile crashed over a dirt barricade of a dead-end street and plunged down a 10-foot embankment.

Police, who investigated the automobile-train collision, said the driver of the new automobile apparently did not see the train, an east-bound freight, approaching the Garfield Street crossing.
O. E. Baldock of Big Spring, engineer of the Texas and Pacific Railway Company train, said the passenger car did not slow its speed as it approached the tracks from the north.

Car Hurled 50 Feet
The train, reported Police Officers Johnnie Davis and Leon Williams, struck the automobile in the side, knocking it about 50 feet down the tracks and onto the sloping right-of-way.

The four occupants were hurled from the vehicle and only Mrs. Dillon was alive when the ambulance arrived.

Her condition was described Monday as critical, as she suffered a fractured pelvis, a fractured jaw and internal injuries.

A spokesman for the motor company, where Flannigan was employed, said he came to Midland about 10 days ago from Centralia, Ill., and was demonstrating the new automobile for the Dillons at the time of the tragedy.

Dillon, a native of Bradford, Ill., has been employed by the post office here since 1947.

During World War II, he served with the U.S. Army Air Corps and, after his discharge in 1945, went to Abilene, where he worked for a while as a cattle buyer and trader.

He came to Midland in 1947 and went to work for the post office as a mail carrier.

A year ago, he was injured critically when struck by an automobile as he walked along U. S. Highway 80 on the western outskirts of Midland.

After his recovery, he was assigned to a job as clerk in the Post Office Substation A on North Marlenfeld Street.

Mrs. Dillon was employed at the Fashion Cleaners here, and she and her husband were active in American Legion work.

Negro Killed Instantly
A black was killed almost instantly shortly after 11 a.m. Sunday when his automobile swerved into the path of a west-bound Burlington Lines bus, according to State Highway Patrolman B. L. Warren.

Hilton Ray Maddox, El Paso, driver of the bus, said the negro's automobile, headed toward Stanton, swerved from a line of east-bound traffic into the path of his vehicle.

The automobile was a total loss and damage to the bus was estimated at \$8,000.

Funeral arrangements for the victims of the accidents had not been completed at noon Monday. The bodies were being held at Newbie W. Ellis Chapel.

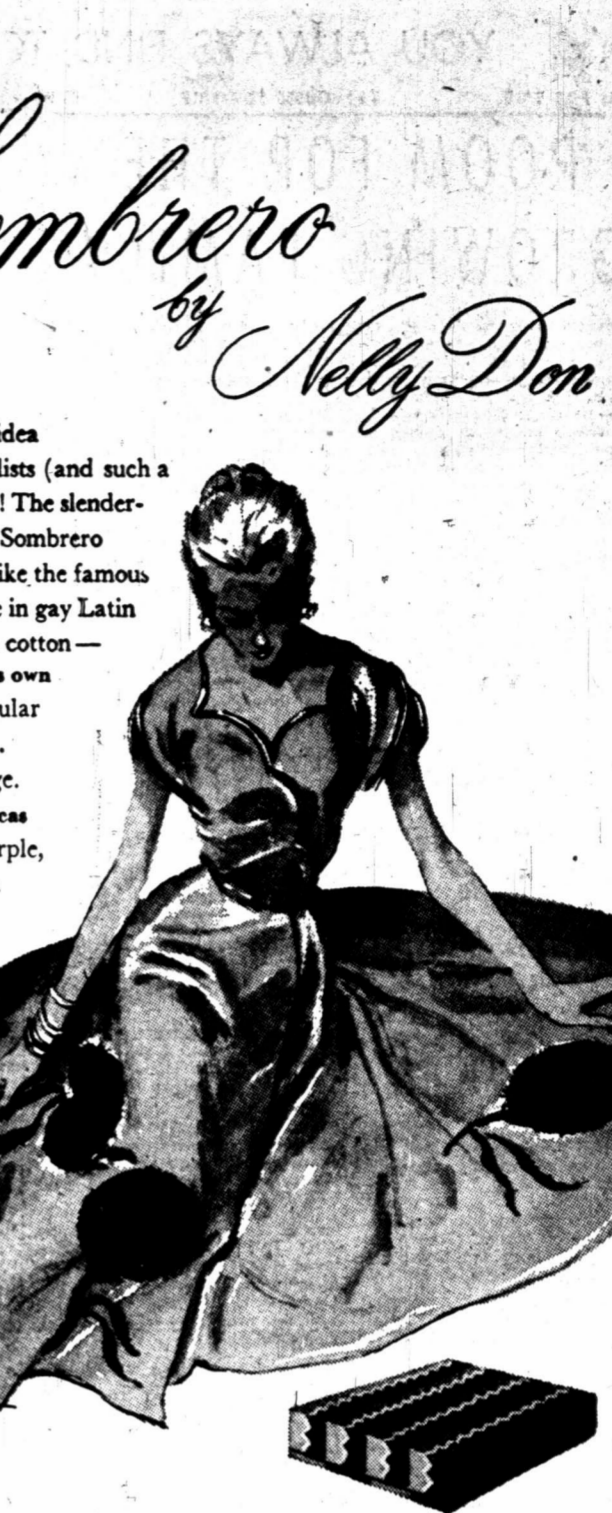

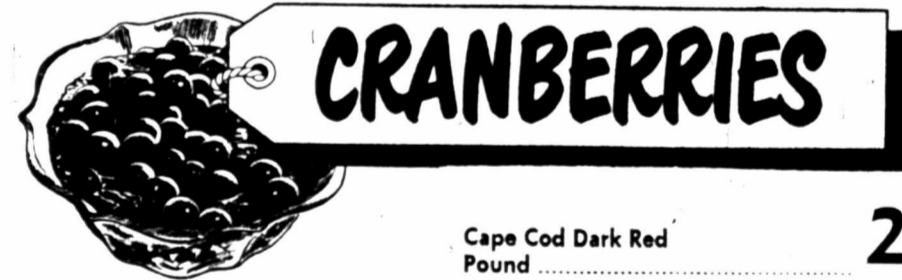

To serve: Fill glasses 1/4 to 1/2 full of cranberry liquid, then add chilled, freshly-opened carbonated beverage. Ginger ale, lemon-lime or cola carbonated soft drinks are all good—and the drinks retain their ruby cranberry color.

If you want to serve a hot version of leftover turkey, try this recipe.

Turkey Puffs

(Serves 6-8)

Two cups all purpose flour, sifted, 1 1/2 teaspoon salt, white pepper, few grains, 4 eggs, well beaten, 1 1/3 cups cold milk, 2 tablespoons melted shortening or olive oil, 2 cups cold turkey, in 1-inch cubes, hot fat.

Combine flour, salt, pepper, eggs, and milk until smooth. Then add melted shortening or olive oil. Cube turkey into one-inch squares. Roll each cube in batter and drop separately into hot deep fat about 4 inches deep. 370 degrees F. to 390 degrees F. Cook a few at a time and keep hot until served. Drain on paper towel or unglazed brown paper.

You'd know in a minute that 16-year-old Patti Murphy was half Irish, even though she looks like a full-blooded Indian—her smile and sense of humor are that big. And since cowgirls and Indians sort of go together, Patti is in New York riding Western saddle at the rodeo at Madison Square Garden.

Patti is overawed by the big city, but she's devoted to the Indian reservation at Lapwai, Idaho, where she lives. Says she:

"We do not have as many liberties as girls in the East. I was surprised to learn that girls here can stay out so late at night.

Not Many Dances
"We do not have so many dances, either, and if we do, men and boys do the dancing—not the girls. During the annual George Washington birthday celebration which lasts for a week, we dance 'The Owl Dance.' This is the dance Indians used to dance with their loved ones before they went off to war. You dance with one person all evening in a slow, sad fashion. This and the 'Swan Dance' which is similar are really prayer dances."

Patti's town is about 50 per cent Indian and 50 per cent white. In some respects white girls and boys follow Indian customs. Many of the white girls marry Indian boys, although Patti believes that white boys prefer white girls to Indian girls. Her father, an Irish lumberman, married her mother, a full-blooded Indian, however. Patti points out:

"It is funny, but Indian grandparents always want to pick your husband or wife—even if you are half white. If Granny has an old friend who has a grandson, particularly if he has money, she probably has promised you to his family before your eyes are really opened. It don't work in my case, however, because my father is Irish and wouldn't have it. He says I can marry whomever I like if I love him."

At the moment Patti doesn't have a real romantic interest because she knows she is too young. She divides her time between Indian and white boys and doesn't play favorites. Indian boys, she says, are more devoted to Indian girls, naturally, and since they know Indian customs, appear to be more courteous. They are never wolfish, she says. And here's a tip-off for you palefaces who think little girls are super-women. Patti says:

"White boys make dates to take girls bowling, roller-skating and other sports which really belong to men. The Indian boy thinks of us as being more delicate, and doesn't suggest an evening's entertainment that is too strenuous. They are romantic and enjoy spending the evening at home, even with the family. They like to sing soft music around the fire."

She loves sports, even if she isn't active in them herself. She loves baseball and football, and favors the New York Yankees and Notre Dame. As a matter of fact she'd like to marry an athlete, but not a professional one.

Patti, who wears one feather in her headdress to indicate that she is single (two are for married girls) is a lyric soprano and wants to be a music or dramatic teacher eventually. She'd give up her career, if she married, though.

Library Operates By Wire

LANSING, MICH. — (NEA) — Michigan's libraries now are linked together in the first state-wide teletype network of libraries in the nation. All the public libraries and some private ones are tied into the system, a direct result of a fire that almost destroyed the Michigan State Library.

The library lost some 35,000 books in the fire in the State Office Building last February. Tens of thousands of others were water-soaked and partially damaged. The rest of the 500,000-volume collection had to be dehumidified before it could be used. For a time, at least, the library was out of business.

But Mrs. Loleta D. Fyan, the state librarian, decided that a teletype network—something she had advocated—would help the crippled library and be a good thing for the state's library system as a whole. She pleaded her case before state officials and got the go-ahead.

Machine Installed
A teletype machine was hastily set up in the basement of the State Capitol. Other machines were placed in extension offices, in the University of Michigan Library, the Refer-

son Public Library in Grand Rapids, the Detroit Public Library, and industrial reference libraries like that at General Motors.

Posters reading "teletype service available here" have gone up in libraries throughout the state. Even in the most remote corners of Michigan, people have come to take the service as a matter of course.

All they have to do is go to any state library and ask for information—how many bushes of potatoes are harvested in Maine in August, for example.

Simple Matter
If the library doesn't have the information, it is a simple matter for the librarian to ask, via teletype, for the fact from a library that does. Similarly, books can be ordered from branch libraries.

At first, only unusual and emergency requests were filled. However, the tempo was stepped up as the big State Library struggled back into operation.

Now there are plans to extend the service to other cooperating libraries. Eventually, almost any Michigan resident will be able to get almost any question answered "while you wait."

Blind U. S. Newspaperwoman Interviews General Eisenhower

PARIS—Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower granted an exclusive interview the other day to an American newspaper woman who was almost as much news as the supreme commander himself.

Paris newspapers printed lengthy accounts of the meeting and carried pictures on their front pages of the General and the reporter.

She is Kathryn Smith of the Buffalo Courier-Express, a successful columnist and newspaperwoman, despite the fact she has been blind all her life.

Miss Smith, a Phi Beta Kappa graduate of Vassar College, is making a tour of Europe alone, accompanied only by her Seeing-Eye dog, "Quinta." So far she has met Queen Juliana of The Netherlands, some of the leading personalities of Spain, and top political and intellectual figures in France.

Using a braille notebook to jot down her impressions, she transcribes them on a typewriter, bats out a column a week for her paper.

"I have a lot of natural curiosity," said Miss Smith, a quiet, middle-aged woman who dresses neatly.

She had studied newspaper work under Burgess Johnson of the old New York Sun while she was at Vassar.

"He made reporting fascinating for me," she said. She had heard that the Courier-Express printed an editorial praising her scintillating accomplishment in the face of heavy odds. So she dropped in to ask them for a job. They gave it to her.

For the next ten years she turned out a column called "Buffalo's Good Listener" and pulled off a number of journalistic scoops—interviews with the late President Franklin D. Roosevelt, Henry Ford and Lily Pons, the singer, among others.

Of all the personalities she has interviewed, General "Ike" impressed her the most. She says she judges people in many little ways, but particularly by the warmth of their voices and the way they talk. Of Eisenhower she said:

"I felt that when I was with him, I was with a great leader. When he talked about the future of Europe, you felt he could see what was obscure to the rest of us. He has the confidence and conviction to make others go along with him."

What she liked most about the general was his humility. "He doesn't try to set himself up as above anyone else," she said.

Miss Smith has travelled extensively before, principally to South America, but this is her first unaccompanied tour abroad. She originally had planned to come to Europe in the Spring, but her faithful "Lassie," a Seeing-Eye dog she had had for 10 years, died, forcing her to postpone.

She came by plane, landing in Holland, and soon afterwards was chatting with The Netherlands ruler, Queen Juliana. Said Miss Smith:

"She was very sweet. We sat down on a davenport together for a little chat."

Miss Smith decided early in life that blindness would not get her down. She found that doing something and making friends with lots of people helped.

One of the first things she did on arriving in Paris was to go for a walk. Crossing the street in Paris is an adventure which makes normal people blanch. But she managed it, with "Quinta's" help.

She remarked: "When I told friends here that I was going for a walk, they thought I was crazy. Before I came here from the States I was told that one of the favorite sports of the French motorist is running down innocent pedestrians. But it turns out all right."

"This trip," said Miss Smith, has been an interesting experience. Wherever I have gone I have met with a great deal of friendliness, kindness and an apparent interest in what I am doing. I have the feeling that all human beings, wherever they live, are trying for a better life, trying to be fair and kind to the people around them."

But, she added, she was returning to America more of an American than ever before. She said she had found the youth of Holland discouraged over the "future and lack of opportunity, the French besieged by the inflationary cost of living and the Spanish by poverty."

Lifting Of U. S. Embargo Is Hoped

SINGAPORE — (AP) — Hong Kong Chinese Manufacturers Union pointed out that the U.S. Embargo, aimed at preventing essential goods from flowing to Red China, has hampered Hong Kong's industrial expansion.

They escorted E. E. Schnellbacher and Eugene Braderman of the Department of Commerce around their exhibit here. The idea was to let the Americans see for themselves that goods manufactured from American raw materials were mainly intended for export to Southeast Asia.

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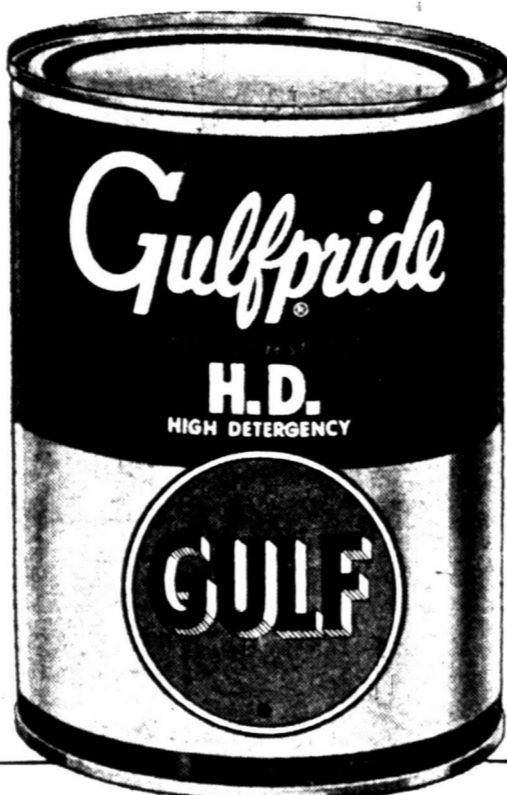

The MATURE PARENT

To A Little Girl Whose 'Daddy Drinks A Lot'

She writes: "My father drinks a lot. My mother has done everything she can. I would like to know what else she can do."
Then, on the notepaper bordered with gay pictures of square dancing children, she adds: "If people knew that my daddy drank, would it make any difference in them toward me?"

Since the letter ends with the word love, I assume that my correspondent is a girl child. I judge her to be around 12 or 13 years old.

I am going to try to answer her for two reasons:
First, because I think she is a loving, brave child to put concern for her mother before concern for herself and to be able to formulate her own fear in such concise, objective terms.

Second, because I believe she is speaking for uncoupled thousands of children whose homes are darkened by a parent's alcoholism. If we are struggling with this family problem, my correspondent's questions should give us better insight into the need of our own children for special guidance and reassurance.

It always is difficult to suggest a point of view to someone with a problem like this because I know how easy it is to talk—and how hard it is to act.

I know how easy it is for me to urge this mother to surrender her false sense of responsibility for her afflicted husband and look to her own peace. Yet, I believe this is exactly what we have to do when we are involved in the problem of someone who is not ready to receive the help we have to offer.

If all our human efforts to persuade an alcoholic man to give up drinking fail, it is time for us to halt our efforts. It is time for us to look to the oil in our own lamps in case all the light in our home goes out.

This is not defeatism, but wisdom and true love. Psychiatrists long have known they can do very little to improve patients who do not wish to work at improving themselves. They regard well-meaning attempts to reshape people who do not want to be reshaped as a waste of precious time that belongs to those who can use it to better advantage.

Like the father of the prodigal son in the Bible story, who refrained from all pleading with his child to reject his life among the swine, our modern experts know that to give strength to the heart and the mind must be opened to receive it. If the mother of my correspondent can control her false sense of responsibility for the husband she loves, she and his child may well work out their problem in a way that will command, not the pity or curiosity of their neighbors, but their respect and admiration.

When we try to force a change of conduct on someone else, we are less likely to change it than to excite our own sense of outrage and frustration.

This mother is far more likely to help her husband to discover his own desire for help if she strives to work out her own peace than she is by threatening or pleading with him.

If she has done all she can to help him, she has won her right to develop the serenity she owes his child. Unless she sees this, she, like her husband, can become so preoccupied with discouragement and despair that there is no time or strength to reassure her daughter.

The wives and husbands of alcoholics are apt to forget what their constant talk of "disgrace" can do to the children who so much need realistic, loving help in working out their thoughts about their sick parent. (All Rights Reserved, NEA Service, Inc.)

 1 1/2 teaspoons salt
 8 cups bread crumbs
 2 medium onions
 1 small bunch celery
 1 large green pepper
 1/2 cup butter or margarine
 1 cup stuffed olives
 8 sprigs parsley
 1/2 teaspoon monosodium glutamate
 1/2 teaspoon poultry seasoning
 1/2 teaspoon marjoram
 1/2 teaspoon ground cloves
 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
 Salt and pepper

Crush garlic with salt in a bowl to form a good mashing job. Thoroughly spread crumbs on a large tray and heat in a 300F or crisp.

Meanwhile, chop onions, green pepper and celery fine (use the chopped vegetable and cook the heat, add sliced olives and chopped parsley and mix all the vegetables with the bread crumbs. Add herbs, salt and pepper and mix thoroughly. This makes enough for a 15-pound bird.
