With this handicap, Europe now faced with the necessity for the greatest peace-time rearmament effort in history. If Europe had 15 years in which to rearm, it might make inroads on the job of building all the factories needed for all-out arms production. But there isn't that much time. The job must be done in three years. Even if many billions of dollars were poured into the effort, it would be impossible to get all the facilities needed for production in four years

Europe is further handicapped for fense budget is now estimated at les than \$11,000,000,000. This is only a fifth of the U. S. budget. But it is about all Europe can afford. Would Wreck Economies

If Europeans were forced to pay higher taxes, and spend more money for defense, it might wreck their civilian economies. The chances o political upsets in countries like France and Italy, if too great an increase in · defense spending is called for, has to be taken into consideration. Any government Europe can fall any day.

The 12 European countries in NATO do not have an integrated economy like that of the United States. They do not have electric power grids that permit transmission of electrical energy across national boundaries to relieve short-

ages. And the productivity per man in Europe is only about half that of the United States.

All these are factors in consid-. eration of the defense burden-sharing now being studied by groups of experts under W. Averell Harriman. U. S. Mutual Security Agency administrator and coordinator for the NATO countries.

To relieve the pressure on the Western European countries and at the same time reduce the burden for the United States, there are only limited possibilities.

One would be to take a longer time to rearm-stretching the period from three to say five years --- on the theory that a Russian aggression is not imminent or will not come at all

A second possibility would be to reduce the size of the program, on the same theory that it isn't necessary to arm as heavily as now being planned to beat off a possible Russian attack.

So far, these ane risks that few generals are willing to take.
