Well, that's a common fault of housewives. They are much too hard on themselves.
They aren't content to do a few things exceptionally well, most things reasonably well, and to admit that some things just aren't their dish.
They figure they've got to shine at everything. To look as carefully groomed as Mrs. A. To cook as well as Mrs. B. To entertain as effortlessly as Mrs. C. To have as well-mannered children as Mrs. D. To sew as professionally as Mrs. E. and so on.
And all the while Mrs. A. B. C. D. and E are envying each other's talents. They feel frustrated because in this ability or that they fall short of a friend who excels at it.
That sort of envy and low-rating of self isn't just a waste of good time. It's downright destructive. Time To Call A Halt.

Women can't specialize to that extent, if their career is homemaking. But they can take pride in the things they ARE specialists in instead of frustrating themselves by the feeling that they ought to be able to win a specialist's rating on any number of jobs.

France Will Get Emergency Dollar Aid From U. S. A.

PARIS—(AP)—The U. S. will rush emergency dollar aid to France to forestall a lowering economic crisis, but the exact amount of it won't be known for at least two weeks.
This became known here Friday as reports circulated that help was on the way. The figure of \$200,000,000 was mentioned frequently, but American officials on the scene said it was only a guess.
The money likely will come in an emergency transfer from a \$5,788,000,000 congressional appropriation to send military help to European partners in the Western defense program. The congressional act provides that 10 per cent of this fund can be transferred from military to financial aid if necessary.
W. Averell Harriman, director of the Mutual Security Agency, which is to parcel out the fund, has been conducting a country-by-country survey of the needs and capabilities of the Atlantic community nations, aided by British and French delegates to the North Atlantic Treaty Organization Committee.
Harriman is to appear before the NATO Council of Ministers in Rome Monday with a report on his findings, including his estimate of what France and other countries need in cash.
After that, Harriman and his committee are to draft a final report of their findings, which President Truman will see before recommending whether or not to advance dollar aid and if so, how much. This final report is due about December 1.
