### Things Are Getting Tougher

In the unlikely event that you hadn't already noticed it, the cost of living has hit a new all-time high.

As reported by the Bureau of Labor Statistics, the cost of living index for average-income folk in towns and cities had risen on June 15 to 189.6 of the 1935-1939 base on which living costs are figured.

Food, rent, and some highly costly items lumped under miscellaneous goods and services largely were responsible for the new cost-of-living record.

The index for food rose to 231.5. That was two per cent higher than a year ago and 14 per cent above the figure two years ago. Meat, fish, poultry and eggs primarily were responsible for pushing up the food index.

Under miscellaneous goods and services, which also showed a big jump, were listed doctors' fees, hospital rates, street car fares, movie tickets and laundry service.

At about the same time the Labor Department made its cost-of-living announcement, the Commerce Department came forth with the news that national productionall goods and services turned out-hit \$329,000,000,000 last year. That was a 16 per cent gain over the year
