Commodity Program Is In Jeopardy

SEN. BILL SARPALIUS sends us a weekly column, which always contains things of interest to residents and voters of this area. But due to our space limitations, we hardly ever are able to present the senator's column.

However, this week we decided to give Sen. Sarpalius our space for his comments regarding House Bill 72:

AUSTIN - Almost two years have passed since the Texas Legislature passed House Bill 72, the controversial education reform package, and the turmoil that surrounds the bill still has not subsided.

Teachers are angry because H.B. 72 required them to take a competency test. Administrators are angry because they feel the bill stripped them of some local control. Parents are angry because their children are being excluded from certain school activities because of failing grades.

The anger the bill has generated has manifested itself in many ways - lawsuits, protests, increased political involvement among educators. The list is endless.

With education reform so much in the news, it occurred to us that the time is right to review just what H.B. 72 did and what the future holds for the reform movement.

H.B. 72 essentially did four things. It restructured the way Texas allocates money to local school districts, granted teachers a pay raise while at the same time placing new requirements on them, changed subtly the way elementary students are educated and raised the standards expected of Texas school children.

While the new requirements of teachers and expectations of students have caused the most controversy, it is the restructuring of school finance that may be H.B. 72's biggest contribution to Texas education.

H.B. 72 recognized once and for all that some school districts have a larger property tax base than others and can generate more money locally. The bill created a new fund allocation system that gives the poorer school districts more money. That extra money means the poorer districts now can offer the same quality education given students in the wealthier districts.

District 31 had enjoyed the benefits of that new system as much as any area of the state. We recently reviewed Texas Education Agency and Legislative Budget Board figures that indicated a majority of our 89 school districts have received more money as a result of H.B. 72.

Those same figures also indicated payroll expenditures increased by more than 15 percent for a vast majority of those 89 districts. Less than 20 districts had increases of less than 10 percent and almost half the districts had payroll increases of more than 20 percent.

Teachers, it seems, did get a pay raise in the Panhandle and on the South Plains.

While those figures indicate there was quite a bit of good in H.B. 72, it's important to recognize there was bad as well. The bill created a teacher competency test that has numerous problems. It created a no-pass, no-play rule that needs to be modified if it is to be effective.

H.B. 72 also eliminated needed discipline options for school administrators and left teachers saddled with too much paperwork.

We've recognized those problems, and we've worked hard to correct them. During the last legislative session, we worked with our fellow senators to pass a bill that would have corrected the discipline and paperwork problems created by H.B. 72. That bill unfortunately was killed in the House.

At the same time, we introduced legislation that potentially would have shortened the no-pass, no-play suspension period. We came within a few votes of having our no-pass, no-play plan adopted by the Senate.

Obviously, we were disappointed our attempts to reform the reforms fell short, but we haven't given up. We're determined to address discipline, paperwork and no-pass, no-play again next session. And, after we took the competency test last

Parmer County's participation in the free commodities program is up in the air, after action by the County Commissioners Court at their regular meeting this past Monday.

Judge Porter Roberts had received a letter from the Panhandle Community Services concerning the handling charge on the commodities. The charge was to increase from 25 cents per case to two cents per pound. The increase was due to the agency's loss of funds.

Because of the difficulty in storing the commodities during the summer months, a motion was passed that Parmer County drop out of the commodity distribution program for June and August, and then see what the program is like in September, at which time it will be reconsidered.

A motion was passed unanimously to pay the boarding care bills for the county's foster children, in the amount of \$3,710.00, which amount will be reimbursed the county.

The court voted to grant permission to Farwell's Bordertown Days Committee for the use of the Courthouse lawn, north parking lot and the unused yard north of the parking lot for the annual Bordertown Days celebration.

In other business, the next regularly scheduled meeting date was changed from May 26 to Tuesday, May 27, due to Memorial Day.

Soil conservation work was approved for the farms of A.L. Glasscock and Dickie Clayton in Precinct 2 and Marlon Inman and Percy Merritt in Precinct 3. The work is performed by county machinery when the machinery is not otherwise in demand, and cost of such work is paid by the farmers.

DIANA'S New Restaurant Opens Locally

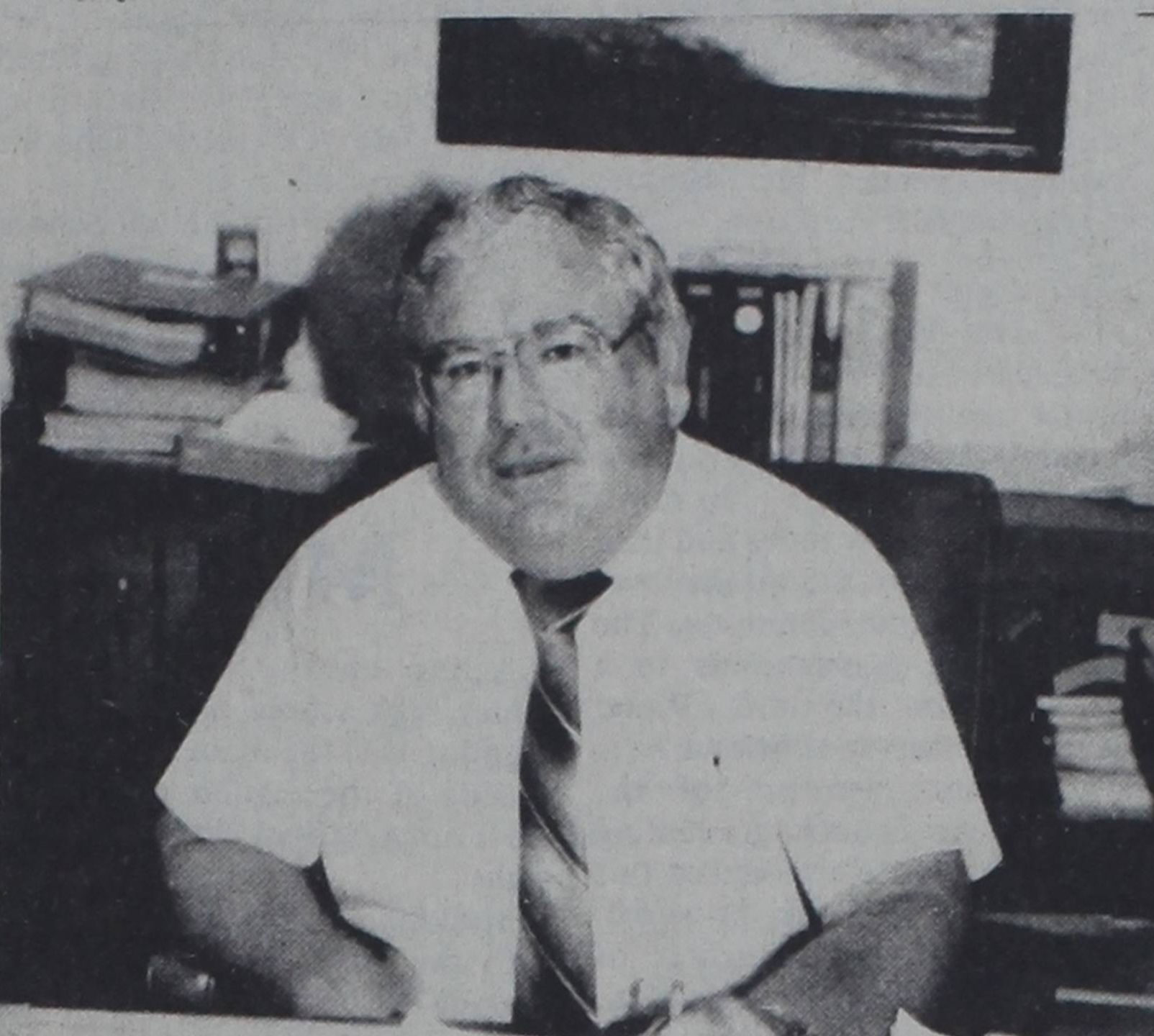
A new restaurant opened in Friona on Friday.

Cecil Maddox In Resignation

Cecil Maddox, Friona Junior High School principal, tendered his resignation to the school board this past Monday, effective at the end of the current school term, to enter private business.

Maddox is finishing his 20th year with the Friona school system, and 13th as junior high principal. He first came to Friona as head boys' basketball coach in high school and math teacher.

After three years, Maddox dropped his coaching duties for strictly classroom duties. For three years he was in charge of the Distributive Education-ICT program at Friona High School.

"I want to make it clear that my resignation has nothing whatsoever against the administra-

tion or the school system. My 20 years in Friona have been the most gratifying of my life, and we will continue to live here," Maddox said. "Friona has one of the best school systems in the state," he continued.

Maddox also said his quitting had nothing to do with the much-publicized and controversial House Bill 72, the education reform bill.

He has been working on getting into the insurance business for the past two years, and has been doing some insurance work on a part-time basis.

"But school work demands a lot of time, and it got to the point that I had to make a choice," Maddox said.

Maddox is a member of the Friona Noon Lions Club and the Friona Chamber of Commerce and has been active in civic affairs.

His wife Mary is a fourth-grade teacher in the Friona school system.

EXCEL Adds New Operation

The EXCEL Corporation will start a new phase of its business on Monday in space rented at Millard Warehouse.

EXCEL will be processing the neck bones from the beef cattle it slaughters at its main plant west of Friona. Office manager Harry Hutcheson of EXCEL says the new operation will employ 20 people to start with.

Hutcheson explained that the neck bones are "cleaned" of the edible meat they contain. The meat is packaged for further processing, and the bones then will be returned to the main plant for rendering.

Up until now, the neck-boning process has been completed at EXCEL's Omaha, Nebraska, plant. The necks have been shipped from Friona to Omaha for the operation.

The new business will operate under EXCEL Foods, which is the processing division of EXCEL Corporation. Other work done by EXCEL Foods includes breaking the beef down into steaks and other cuts of meat.

If the new arrangement between EXCEL and Millard works out, there is a good chance there could be some further expansion later, Hutcheson said. There has been some talk by company officials about doing some other processing work, such as with livers.

The livers were formerly processed at Millard Warehouse by Prime, Inc., which no longer does the work here.

55 YEARS AGO--MAY 15, 1931

Prize winners were Joe Mimms, who received \$10 in gold, and Miss Jeannette Williams, who received a \$5 gold piece. All of the letters agreed that Friona was the logical place for the court house, and their reasons were many.

50 YEARS AGO--MAY 15, 1936

Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Roden have moved their household goods from Friona to Hereford, where they will make their home indefinitely. Ralph is connected with his brother, J.J. Roden, in the drug business here and now also at Hereford, and has been here for the past year assisting in the City Drug Store of this city.

45 YEARS AGO--MAY 16, 1941

Twenty-eight seniors will receive their diplomas on May 23 at commencement exercises at Friona High School. Leading the class of 20 girls and eight boys with an average of 94.1 is Jacquelyn Wilkison, who will deliver the valedictory. Betty Ann Taylor, with a 92.5 average, will give the salutatory.

40 YEARS AGO--MAY 17, 1946

The city, during the past week, has had a force of men at work placing caliche on the part of Main Street north of the highway through the McMillian-Fergus Addition and grading it to afford sufficient drainage. Euclid has also been opened, and is being graded from the highway on Eleventh Street, north to the city limits. Contract for the paving and curb and gutter construction on Friona streets was let Monday to the Brown and Root Construction

Company of Houston. The cost of paving some 62 blocks will be under \$215,000, Mayor Mack Bainum confirmed. Paving plans for the erection of a city hall, bonds for which were voted in the amount of \$15,000 on the same date.

30 YEARS AGO--MAY 10, 1956

Lacye Clips Record But Edged For State

Lacye Osborn clipped almost four seconds off her school record in the 800-meter run at the Region I track and field meet at Odessa, but missed by an eyelash qualifying for the state meet.

Miss Osborn ran her race in 2:18.37, but was nipped at the tape by Kimberly McEntire of Canadian. Lacye's head appeared to be across the finish line ahead of the other girl, but judges said the Canadian runner leaned forward, getting her "torso" to the finish line ahead of the Squaws' star. Miss McEntire was timed in 2:18.32.

Lacye had set the pace in the race, leading the eight-girl field until the final curve when the winner, a Decatur entry, passed her. Then, she tried to stave off the charge by Miss McEntire, which found the runners virtually in a dead heat.

As a result, Miss Osborn still has the second best time by an area performer this year, and fourth best in the entire state, but will not get to compete at Austin.

Friona's mile relay foursome, consisting of Susan Bailey, Ronda Ratcliff, Mika Maddox and Lacye Osborn, also ran its best time of the year, 4:11.85, and placed fifth in the event.

Miss Ratcliff cleared 5-2 in her

individual event, the high jump, but went out on 5-4, for fifth place. All of the performers placing ahead of her were seniors except one.

Both Misses Ratcliff and Osborn are juniors, and will have one more crack at the state meet.

The Squaws' 800-meter relay team, composed of Misses Bailey, Maddox, Ratcliff and Dara Wells, also competed, but did not make the finals.

Coach Vicki Hatton had words of praise for the girls. "Lacye knocked four seconds off her time. She ran a smart race. You couldn't ask for more than she gave. I was well pleased with everyone's performance. When you get to the regional finals, you're up against the best. I feel like we had a great year, and we're already looking forward to next year," she said.

An example of how competitive the regional meet was is seen in the fact that it took the high jump event two hours to complete, which gets to be a mental competition as well as physical.

(Editor's note: With the McEntire-Osborn "dead heat" for the state meet position, Squaw fans were reminded that earlier this year the two were on opposite ends of the court when Friona edged Canadian by a point for the bi-district basketball title.)

In the boys' competition, Rodney Britting cleared 13 feet in the pole vault, but had to settle for seventh place. Five of the six boys placing above Rodney were seniors, giving him hope for 1987.

Shy Burney cleared 6-2, but did not place in the high jump event.

Leroy Mercado was fifth in his heat of the hurdles' preliminary at 42.24. There was a photo finish for third, fourth and fifth. The top four went to the finals, and Mercado came up shy. He garnered some satisfaction, however, by beating Tulia's Todd Lacey, who had won district in the event, with Mercado second.

Mark Madrid placed first, Julia Warren second and Krista Renner third in seventh and eighth grade number sense.

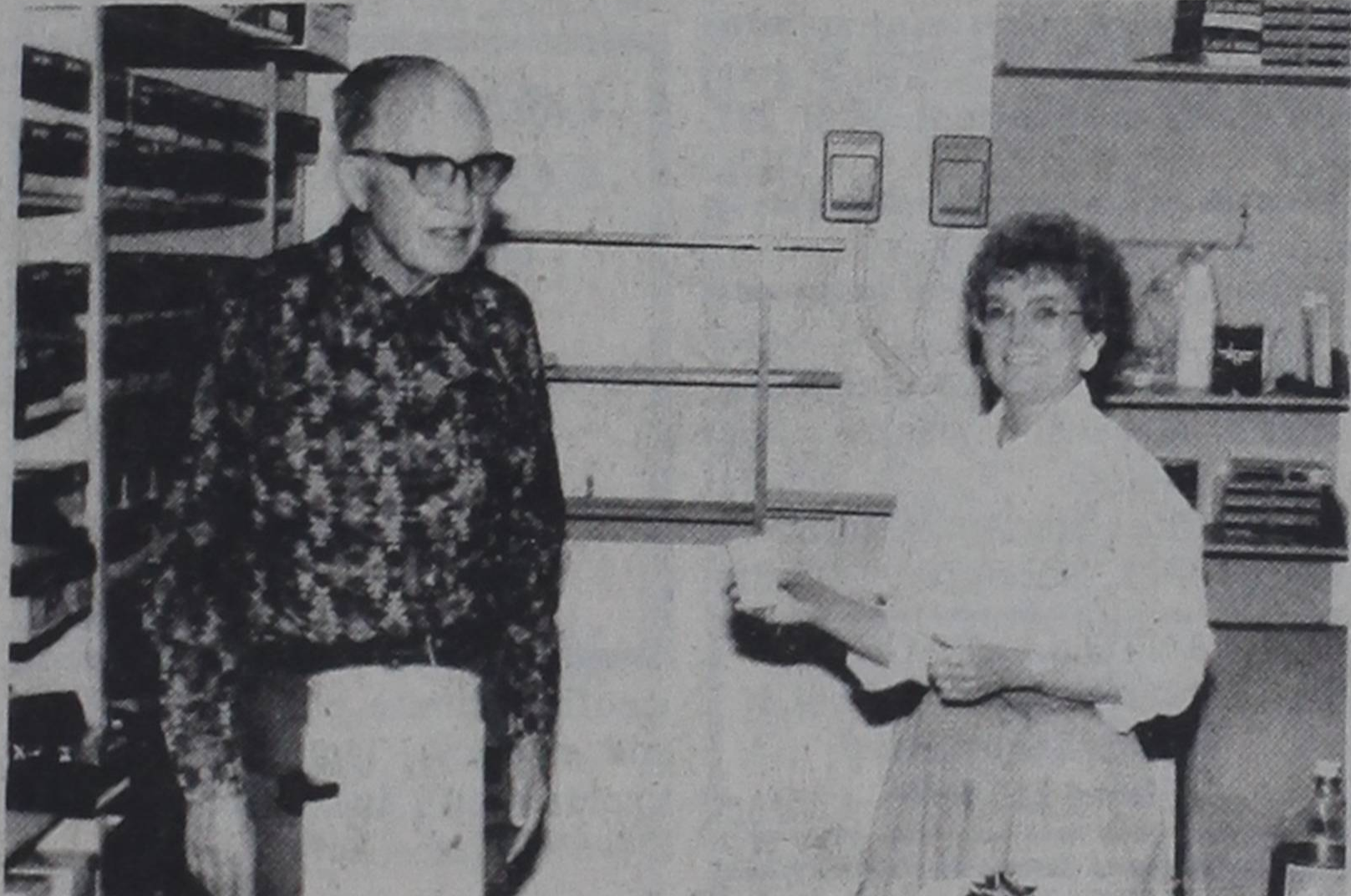
Krista Renner placed third and Nicole Potts sixth in seventh and eighth grade spelling.

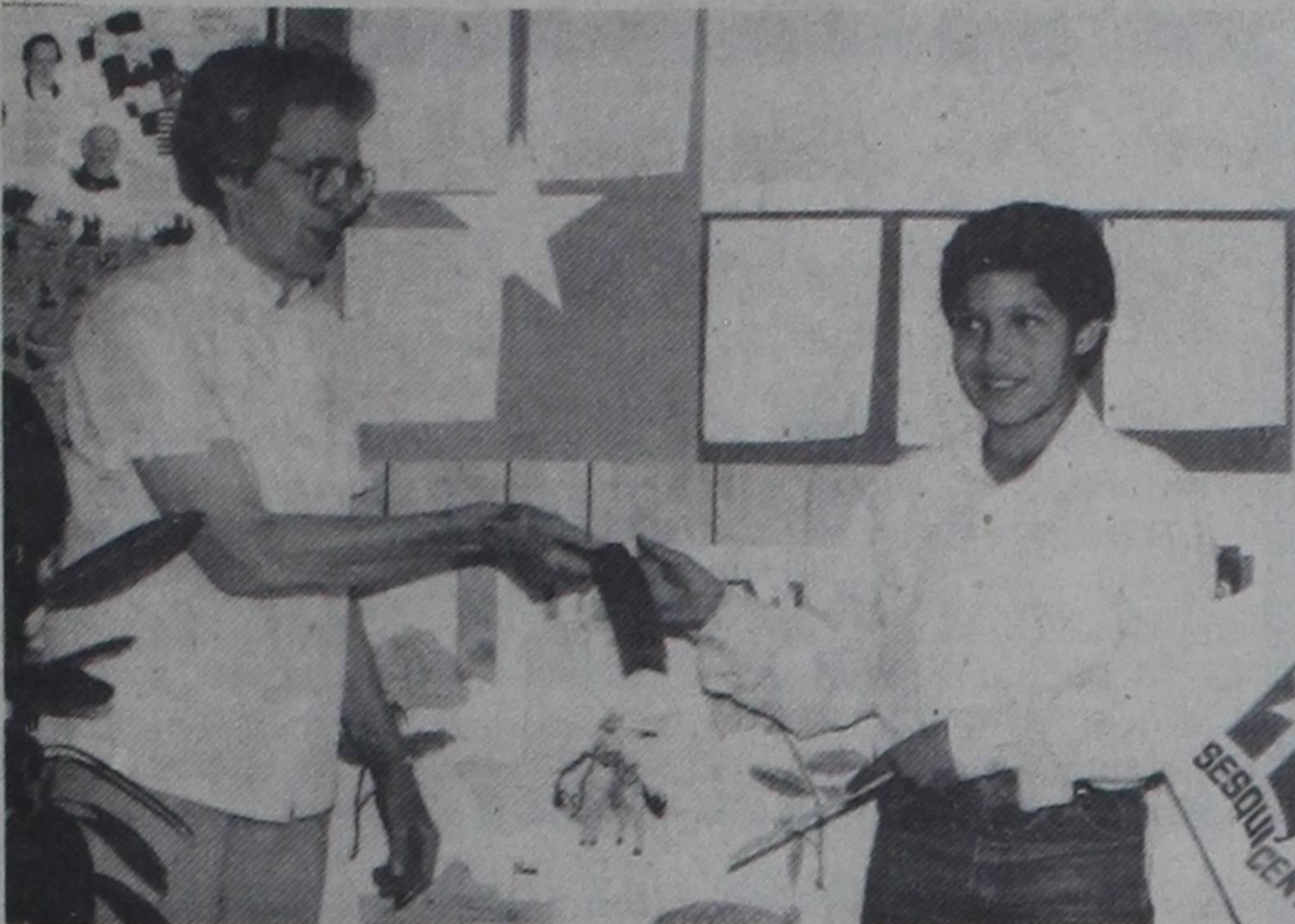

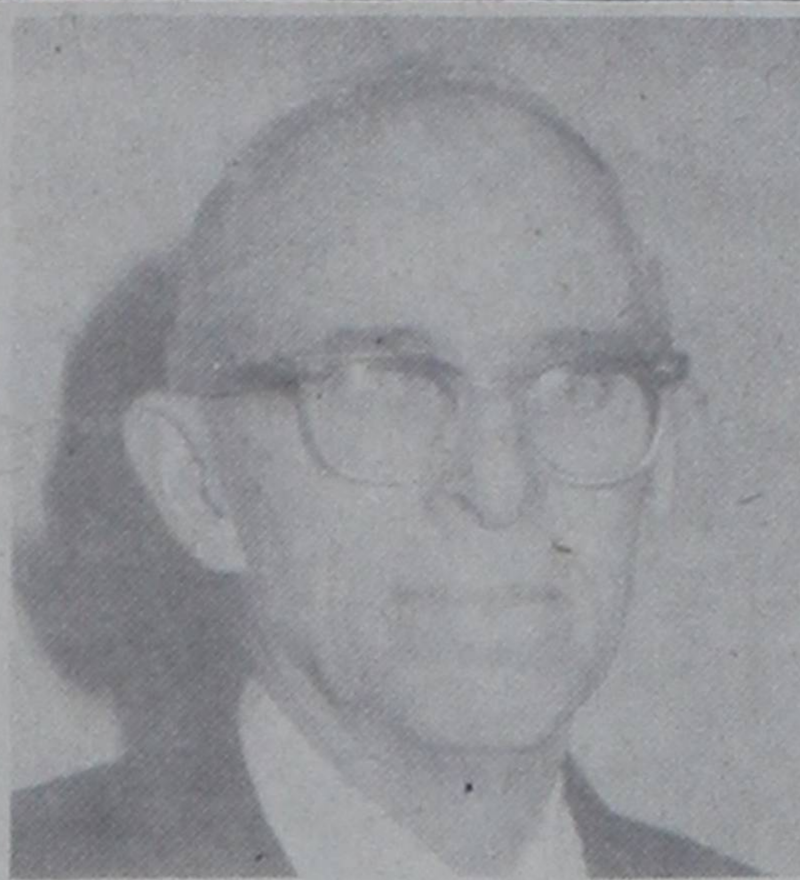


Tononi's Rites Set In Arizona

One of Farwell's oldest homes will be dedicated as a Texas Historical Landmark on Sunday, May 25.

According to Hugh Moseley, chairman of the Parmer County Historical Commission, the dedication ceremony for the Hopping-Aldridge house will begin at 2 p.m. (CDT) and house tours will follow until 4 p.m. The public is invited.

Located at 710 Fourth Street, this house is the first residence in Parmer County to receive a state medallion.

The house was built at this site between 1915-1917 for R.C. "Coke" Hopping, Parmer County's sheriff from 1910-1918. It was purchased by James and Minnie Aldridge in 1918. Aldridge succeeded Hopping as the sheriff, with his term starting in 1919.

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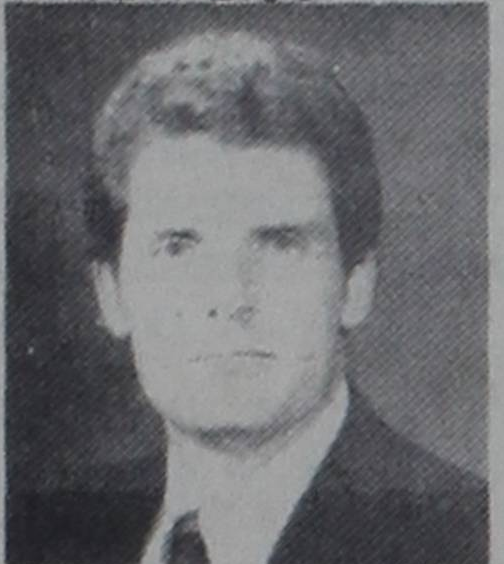
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Town Talk

The event I've seen recently that I would have chosen to share with all my grandchildren was the arrival of the Texas Sesquicentennial Wagon Train in Dimmitt Wednesday afternoon.

I've never before seen so many different kinds of wagons with such a variety of teams pulling them as there was in that procession. Contrary to what I had expected, not all of them had rubber tires. Many of the wagons were old and had wheels like they came from the factory with or reasonable facsimiles.

One was pulled by a small team of perfectly matched mules and another was pulled by a five horse team with three hooked near the wagon and two out front. There were teams of black and white paint horses, matched appaloosas, big mules, saddle horses, small mules and large draft horses, which I presumed were Belgians.

Doubt that there were identical sets of harnesses on any two teams, but all of them were very interesting. There were lots of saddle horses and they were different, too. A few riders were riding mules. The only rider I recognized was Ernest Anthony,

who had joined the Wagon Train at Springlake.

Many of the wagons had wash tubs, lanterns and other early day necessities hanging from them, but I only saw one that looked as if the riders slept in it. It must have taken more parking space for the recreation vehicles, pickups, trailers and trucks, which accompanied the tourists and hauled provisions from water to hay, than it did for the actual wagons in the train.

Even though today's Wagon Train participants had many more of the comforts of life than did their early American predecessors, making such a trip would require a lot of pioneer spirit and fortitude. Several couples in the entourage were older people, but I didn't visit with any who had actually made such a trip earlier.

Dimmitt and its Castro County neighbors, Hart, Easter and Sunnyside, did a fantastic job welcoming the Wagon Train members and other visitors and served a delicious Mexican Fiesta meal to a large crowd in spite of a minor sand storm about serving time.

It was interesting to listen to the comments of Wagon Train travellers, who were from other states or other parts of Texas. One man remarked, "If this is a sample of what the weather in the Panhandle of Texas is like, I wouldn't want to be here for the real thing."

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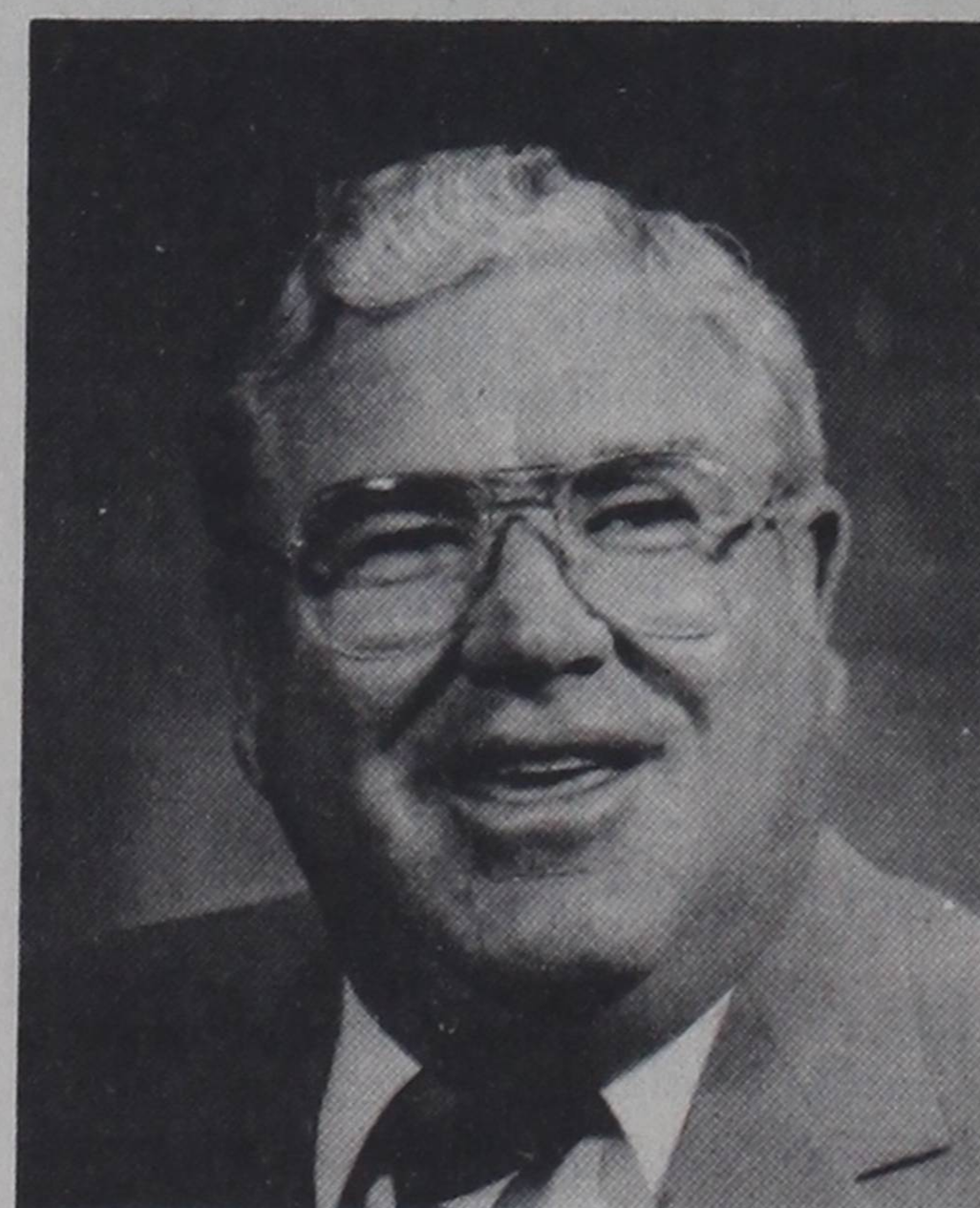
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Piano Auditions Set Here May 23

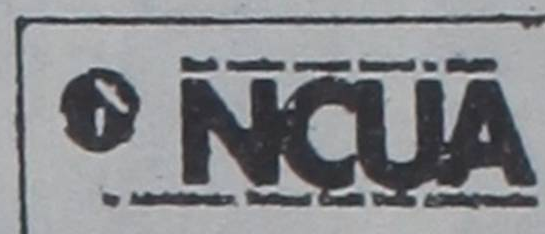

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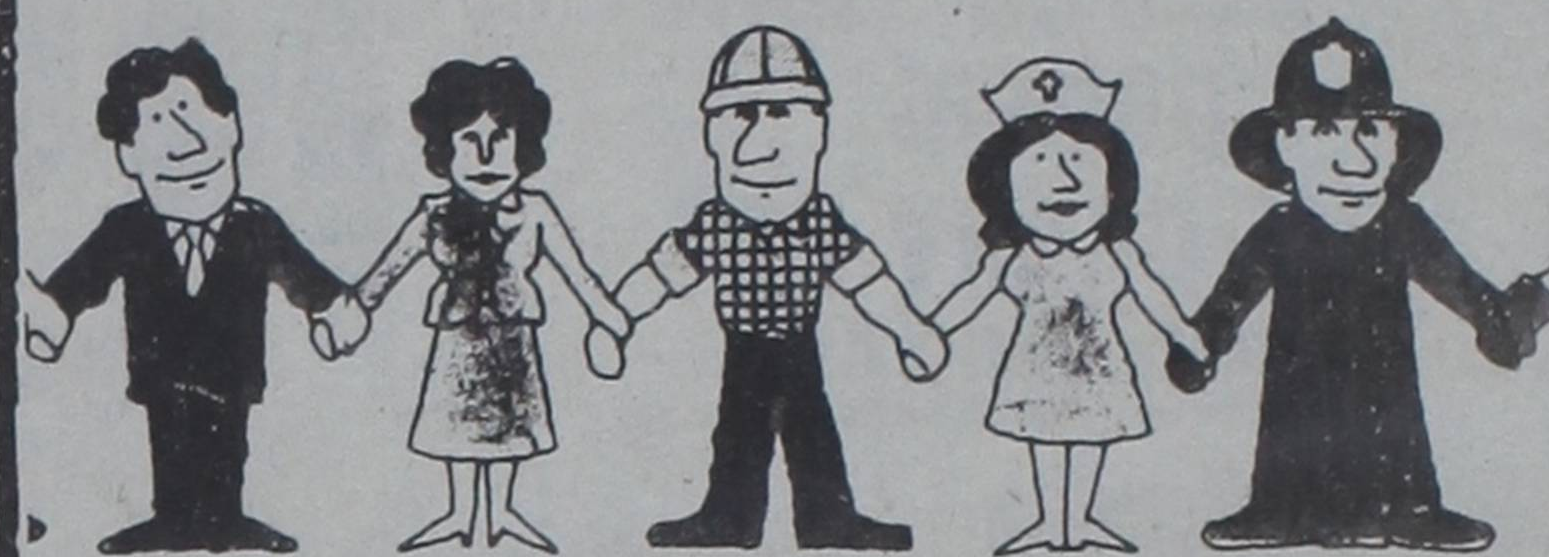
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Cowbelles Schedule Farm, Ranch Tour

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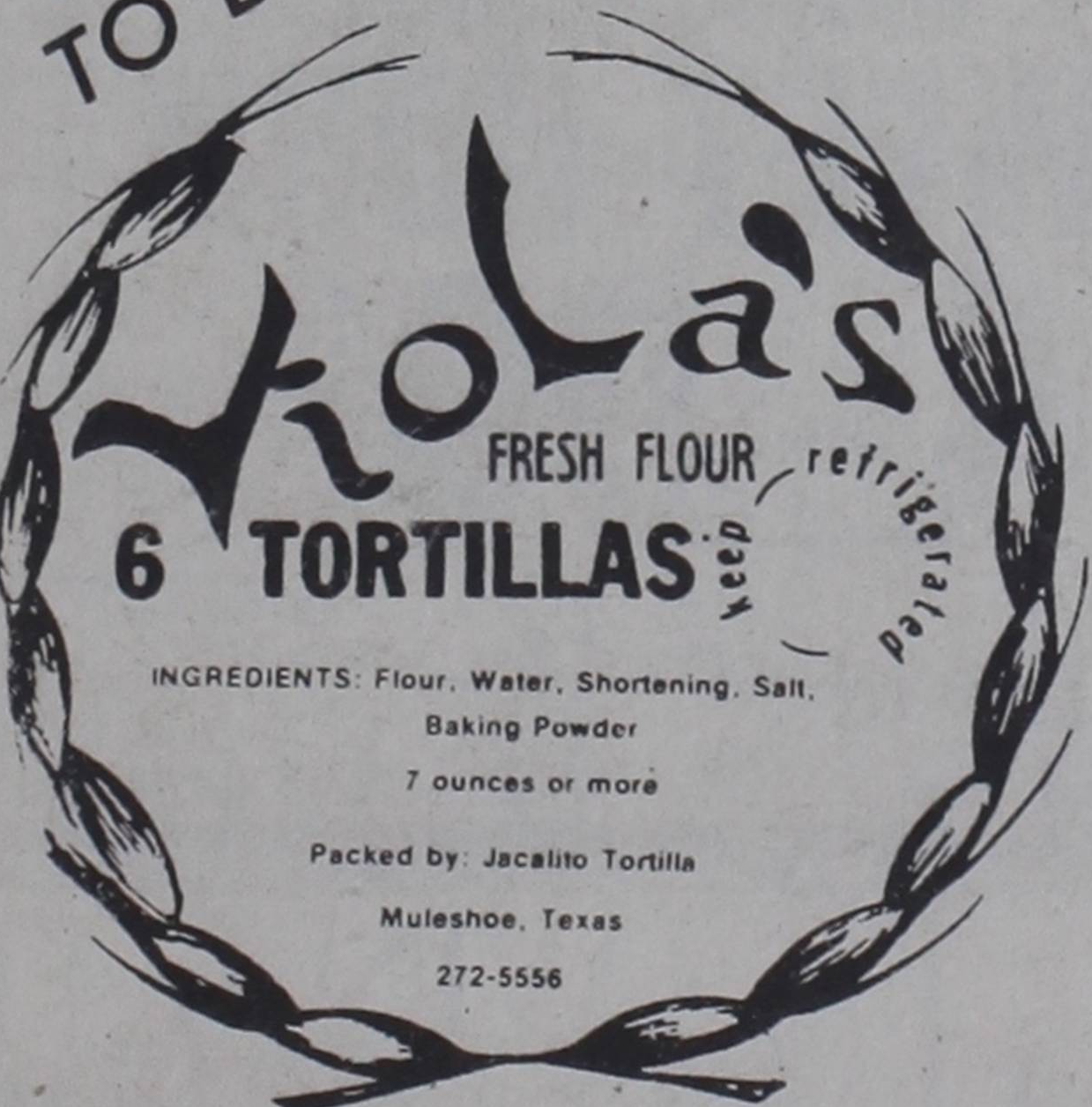
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
