

Area Receives Nice Rainfall

The Friona area has been the recipient of nice rain during the past week, with the best measurement in a 24hour period registered in almost a calendar year.

Friona received 1.24 inches of rain Wedensday evening in a steady shower that began about 6:15 p.m. It had rained an inch by 7 p.m., and continued until about another quarter of an inch was registered.

The Thursday shower started at about the same time, and continued for some time. The official guage had .52 inch for Thursday, consisting of nice, gentle rains. The immediate area was lucky in that it escaped hail which was received in some parts of the area, especially Wednesday evening. One report was that Tulia had 18 inches of hail stacked up at one location.

This week's rain has been more general, although the amounts have varied considerably. For example, Bovina received only .12 inch on Wednesday, but had 1.6 inches Thursday night. One report said that Farwell received two inches Wednesday, while another said 1.5 inches.

Whatever the totals, the rain has been a God-send, especially to the area around Lubbock. A report published last week in that city's newspaper said that if rain was not received immediately, up to one million acres of cotton might go unplanted, due to the lateness of the season. This week's rain should remedy the situation, although the farmers would rather have had the moisture a month earlier.

Farmers are strongly urged NOT to leave their tractors in the fields overnight as this is an open invitation to theft.



Each year over 30,000 pounds of pork are barbecued daily and served to those attending the exposition. The barbecue grill is over 250 feet

Included in the show were cooking contests, craft shows, seminars hog health of supplies, and management seminars on the health of the individuals hog managing facilities, pig races and a Children's Fun Center.

Vickie reported, "Anything you've ever seen, heard of or wished you had heard of, was on display."

She also reported that the hog auctions were different. A lot of foreigners, who did not speak English, were bidding and it was necessary for them to use translators.

She said, "It was interesting, but lack of communication made the auctions go much slower than usual."

Hogs were purchased by buyers from 35 states and seven foreign countries.



ASTIGMATISM

When the eyes work as perfectly as they should, light rays passing through the cornea meet in a single focal point. If there is a defect in the cornea so that light rays don't meet at the ideal spot, the image seen may be blurred. Headaches, squinting and fa-

tigue may follow. This is astigmatism.

But nobody's perfect, so almost everyone has a small degree of astigmatism. The less-perfectly-round the cornea is, the more the image will blur.

Astigmatism may exist as an eye defect in itself, but more generally, the condition coexists with near sightedness or far sightedness.
