Texas Drouth Crisis Grows More Critical

Texas' long, searing drouth took a new lease on life Friday and burned toward its third year.

Not a drop of rain fell Thursday and none had fallen Friday up to mid-morning. It was more of the same old story.

The State Board of Water Engineers said Texas streams were at their lowest rate of flows in years during one of the driest months in history in October. October rainfall in Texas, the BWE said, averaged barely one per cent of normal.

In almost every section, the same situation prevailed. . . . dry, arid pastures and cattle that were bony and shucky.

Meanwhile, lawns, shrubs and trees that were not getting watered were threatened by the freezing weather to come later in the winter.

City Settles Suits Of Quarter-Million

Settlement of more than a quarter million dollars in damage suits against the city as the result of an automobile accident here a year ago was approved Thursday afternoon by the City Council.

The council approved the payment of \$14,500 in complete settlement of the suits, growing out of the accident, which claimed the life of one person and injured several others.

Survey Indicates Vast, New Underground Water Sources

A comprehensive geological survey of areas around Midland has indicated "prolific" underground water reserves would supply the city adequately "for as long as you care to predict."

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Dagan Wildcat Is High On Ellenburger; Some Shows Logged

Cabot Carbon Company, formerly General Atlas Carbon Company and Shamrock Oil & Gas Corporation No. 1-A University, Central-South Reagan County wildcat has topped the Ellenburger high to three deep dry holes in the adjacent areas.

The prospector has penetrated from 9,498 feet; the top of the Ellenburger to 9,520 feet. The section has drilled soft and has logged shows of oil and gas.

Operators plan to drill to approximately 9,545 feet and take a drill test.

On both of those markers it was high to the dry holes in the Central-South Reagan region.

A two-hour drillstem test was taken at 9,380-9,462 feet. There was a blow of air at the surface immediately and gas came to the top in 40 minutes. No fluid came to the surface.

Recovery was 95 feet of gas cut mud. There were no signs of oil or gas. Open flowing bottom hole pressure was 25 pounds. Shut-in bottom-hole pressure after 15 minutes was 1.175 pounds.

After that test it drilled ahead and found the Ellenburger and the shows which have been encountered that formation.

The prospector is one and one-half miles southwest of the town of Big Lake and it is six and one-half miles west of the nearest Ellenburger production in the Barnhart field. Location is 690 feet from north and east lines of section 19, block 11, University survey.

Shell Wildcat In S-C Andrews Gets Shows In Devonian

Shell Oil Company No. 1-A-1 University, wildcat in South-Central Andrews County, indicated as a discovery from the Devonian on a 10,749 to 10,823 test.

Tool was open three and one-half hours. Gas surfaced in 35 minutes. After one and one-half hours, the gas blow was irregular and accompanied by a mist of oil. Recovery was 149 feet of gas-cut mud, 370 feet of oil and gas-cut mud and 150 feet of mud and gas-cut oil.

Flowing pressure was from 200 to 300 pounds and 50-minute shut-in pressure 4,350 pounds.

Location is at the center of the southeast quarter of the northeast quarter of section 18, block 1, University survey. It is eight miles south of the town of Andrews.

Gas Shows Are Logged On DST At Ector Test

Texas Gulf Producing Company No. 1 Headlee, Central-East Ector County wildcat, only a short distance west of the Midland County line, had a slight show of gas in a drillstem test at 11,287-508 feet in the Devonian. No top has been picked.

The tool was open 70 minutes. A 900-foot water blanket was used. No gas or fluid came to the surface while the tool was open.

Recovery was the 900-foot water blanket, which was slightly gas but had 15 feet of slightly gas cut drilling mud.

No shows of oil or gas formation were reported from the test.

Open flowing bottom hole pressure was 430 pounds. Shut-in bottom hole pressure after 15 minutes was 478 pounds. The prospector is drilling deeper.

It started out to drill to 14,000 feet or a test of the Ellenburger at a lesser depth. Location is 800 feet from south and west lines of section 8, block 41, T-2-S, T&P survey. It is four miles northeast of Odessa.

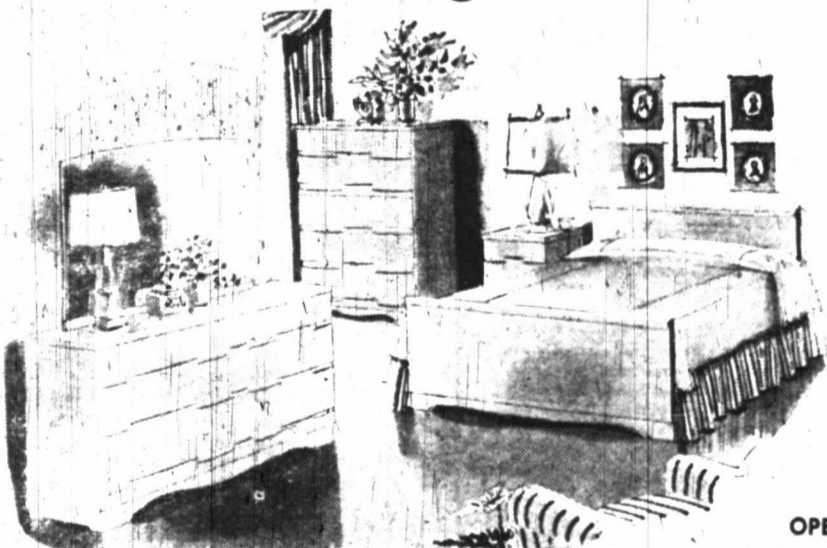

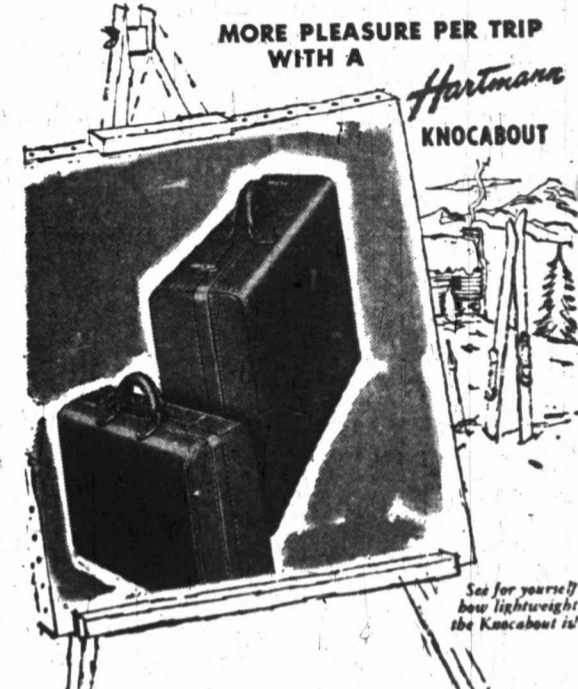

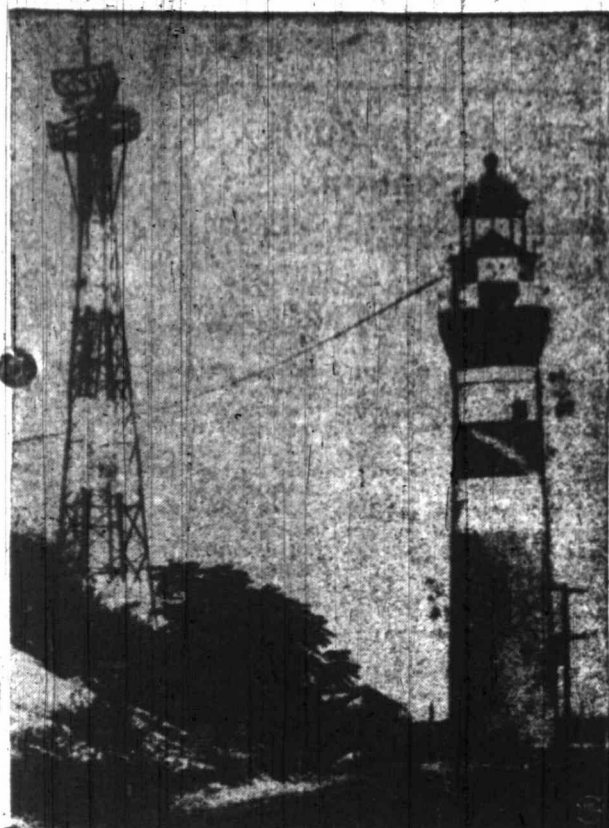

WORKMAN OPENS WRONG VALVE— Eight Engineers Risk Lives To Save Grand Coulee Dam

GRAND COULEE DAM, WASH.—(NEA)—Deep in the concrete depths of the world's fourth highest dam—Grand Coulee on the Columbia River—a sick workman threw the wrong switch.

Today eight engineers of the U. S. Bureau of Reclamation are wearing gold medals for risking their lives by drowning or electrocution to save the 550-foot-high dam from possible destruction.

The full story came out the other day when the medals were awarded to the engineers by the Department of Interior.

During a routine inspection of the dam the sick workman, whose name was not disclosed and who no longer is employed there, mistakenly pulled the switch that opened the upstream valve on a drain tube, eight feet in diameter, running through the dam. He meant to open the downstream valve.

To understand what happened from then on it should be understood that a dam is by no means a solid mass of concrete. It is honeycombed with passageways to let water through for workmen to walk in, for electrical conduits for skyscraper elevators.

Ran From Scene
For instance, at Coulee there are 60 of the eight-foot-in-diameter drain tubes running through the dam at three different levels.

When the workman mistakenly opened the upstream valve in one of the tubes, water shot into the drain under tremendous pressure. So violent was its force that it flipped open a manhole cover on top of the drain, on the floor of a passageway above.

When the workman saw the water shoot up through the manhole he lost his head. Instead of flipping the switch which would have closed the valve and cut off the rushing torrent, he ran.

Something like this happening inside a big dam is like fire on a ship at sea or an airplane losing an engine. News of it spread fast from one end to the other.

Seconds after the workman fled, the inspection tunnel he was in was flooded with the ice-cold roaring waters of the Columbia River.

In Icy Water
Engineers Norman G. Holmdahl, of Seattle; Donald D. McGregor, of Wheatland, N. D.; and Milton Berg, of Howard, S. C., were the first to reach the danger spot. Taking a round-about way, holding hands to keep from being swept away by the rushing waist-deep waters, in danger of electrocution by flooded wires, and threatened with complete darkness by failure of the electrical system, they somehow made it.

Holmdahl, an electrical engineer, spotted the trouble. Then they opened the downstream gate to let some of the water drain out. Next,

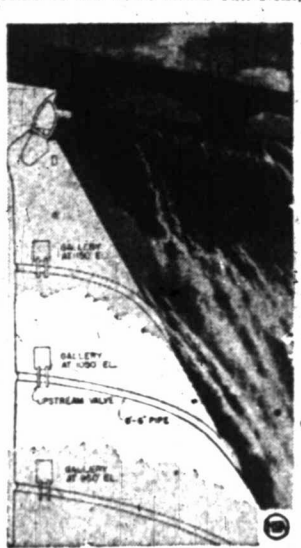


Photo-diagram of dam shows where operating error in elevation 1050 gallery threatened destruction of mighty Grand Coulee.

they managed to get the upstream gate closed.

Meantime, Operations Superintendent John S. Bates, of Yakima, Wash., and Engineer James P. Green of Malden, Wash., were battling shoulder-deep water in another passageway. Bates was nearly swept through a drain tube to his death as the two were managing to open a second downstream gate.

Kept Power Up

At the same time, in another part of the threatened dam, Assistant Chief Powerhouse Operator Harold E. Parmeter, of Portland, Ore.; and operators Irvin E. Slough, of Milford, Mich.; and Perry W. Crandall, of Bishop, Calif., got a third gate open but were beaten back by the pressure and coldness of the water in their efforts to loosen another gate.

To keep electric lights going for the men battling death deep in the dam, Roy F. Peterman, of Cove, Ore., powerhouse shift supervisor, kept maximum power flowing through the emergency. He got a silver medal for his comparatively minor role.

And anyone who wishes to find a parallel in the little Dutch boy who plugged the hole in the dike by keeping his finger in it all night, may feel perfectly free to do so.

Canadian Northland Site For New Cities

OTTAWA—(AP)—Cities of 20,000 to 30,000 and maybe more will spring up in Canada's forbidding northland within this century. That's the prediction of the Defense Department's senior authority on the Arctic.

Mining, says English-born Graham Rowley, is the factor that will carry civilization into the Arctic and sub-Arctic in the next 50 years, building cities where now there are only isolated airfields, mining camps and tiny settlements.

Canada hasn't gone as far as other countries—the United States, Russia, Denmark—in developing her northland mainly because her tiny population has been too busy taming the southern part of the country. Nor has there been any pressure on Canadians to go north to seek land because there has been plenty in less-blessed places.

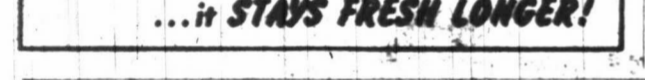

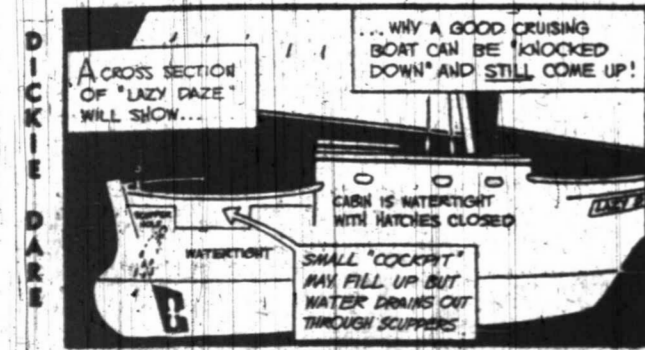

Modern Heart Surgery Gives New Hope For 'Blue' Babies

Among the most remarkable advances in medicine in recent years are the developments in heart surgery. Thanks to the extraordinary ingenuity of many patient research workers and their experiments on dogs, it now is possible to save the lives of many children and adults who formerly were doomed to early graves.
Almost everyone is familiar with the term "blue baby" which is given to pitiful infants who are born with a bluish color of the skin resulting from lack of oxygen in the blood.
In blue babies, the deficiency of oxygen is the result of a malformed heart, or malformation of the large blood vessels lying near it. Such defective structures allow the blood containing small amounts of oxygen to mix with the oxygen-laden blood from the lungs. The result, of course, is that the tissues do not receive enough life-giving oxygen.
Several kinds of malformations of the heart permit this mixing of oxygen-containing and non-oxygen-

containing blood. For several of these inborn defects of structure, it now is possible to operate successfully.
In one treatable form, the passageway between the heart and one of the large blood vessels which normally should close before birth fails to do so. This is called a patent or open ductus arteriosus. This opening now can be closed by delicate heart surgery. The operation already has been done hundreds of times with great success.
Some of the other congenital malformations of the heart also can be treated successfully by surgery, but not all of them. For this reason, careful study of each case has to be conducted individually in order to make a diagnosis and to decide whether or not surgery would be useful.
But the possibilities of helpful heart surgery are no longer restricted to the diseases present at birth. One of the common causes of heart disease is rheumatic fever, which so frequently affects the valves lying on the inside of the heart.
Although it seems almost unbelievable, the methods which recently have been devised now make it possible in many instances to repair such diseased valves and counter-effect many of the harmful and dangerous actions of such damage. Truly it can be said that the possibilities of modern heart surgery have brought new hope to thousands.

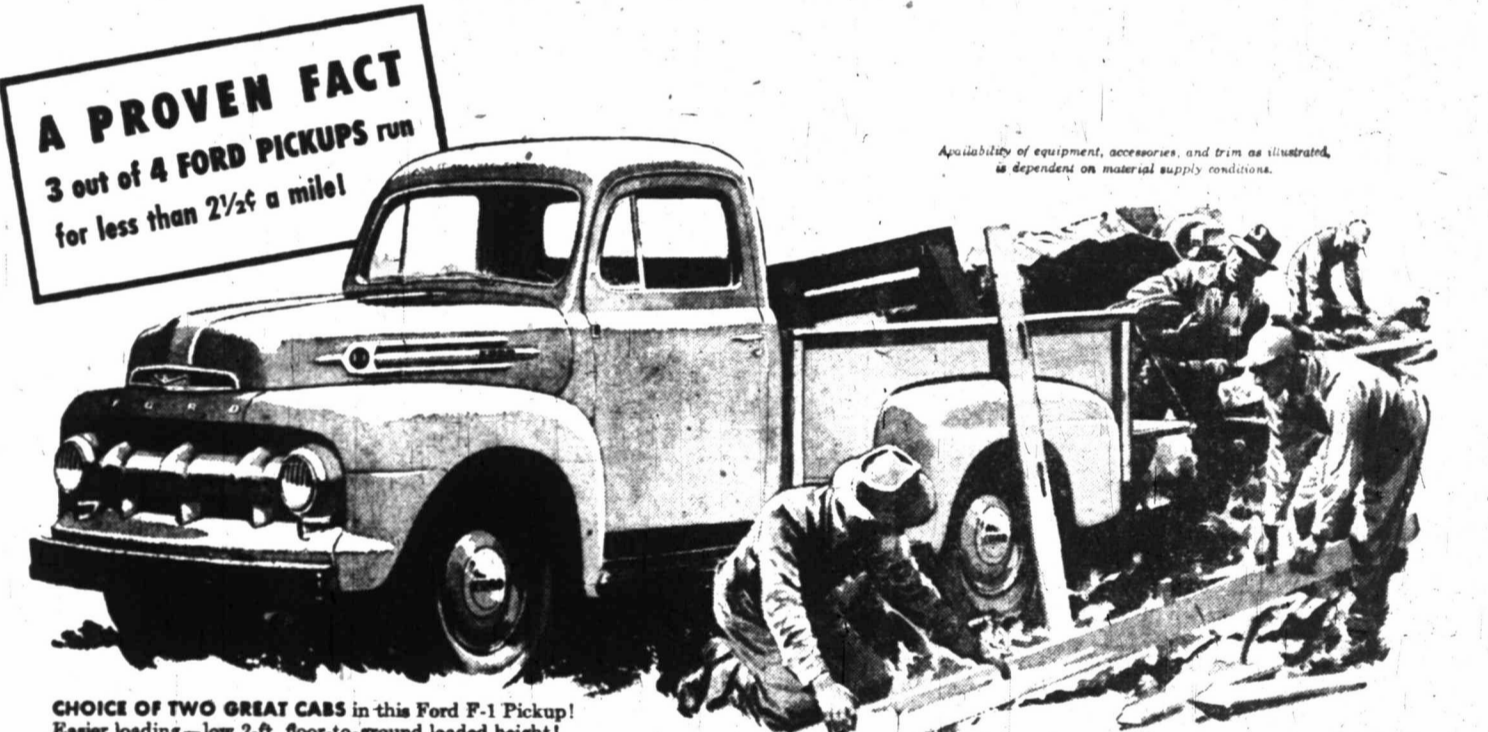

It's Elemental, Dr. Watson; Sherlock Holmes Visits U. S.

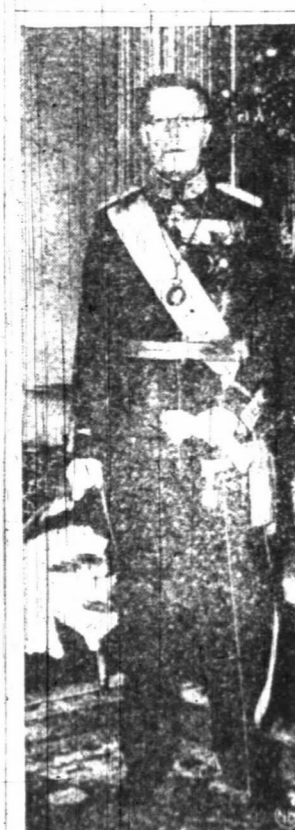
NEW YORK (NEA)—Sherlock Holmes, the famed detective in the deerstalker hat, arrived in Manhattan the other evening from London with his friend and companion, Dr. John Watson, he went straight to his lodgings at 221-B Baker Street and wouldn't say whether he was here on a case. He just said his Baker Street rooms looked exactly as he had left them.

This, of course, is a bit of fiction, just as Holmes himself is fictional—and probably the most famous character of all time in the world of detective stories.

On closer inspection, 221-B Baker Street turned out to be the Plaza Galleries on 59th Street, but that, as Holmes would say, is elemental, my dear Watson, Baker Street is inside, and it's a completely faithful and authentic reproduction of the room where it is always 1897.

The door, hangs Holmes' deerstalker and Inverness, together with Dr. Watson's tall silk hat and respectable black coat.

Beside the fireplace is the coal scuttle which Holmes kept his cigars in, in one corner the acid-stained table at which he worked out his experiments in chemistry and next to it the wax bust of Holmes, draped about with his mouse-colored dressing-gown. The latter items figured heavily in "The Empty House."

When the exhibit here opened, an elderly lady stopped in and asked for the great detective. Conan Doyle explained that Holmes just wasn't around, whereupon the lady grew indignant and red-faced. She knew quite well he was there, she said, she'd seen his picture somewhere recently.

As you stand at the railing, look into the Baker Street study, you can't help feeling that Holmes and Watson have just quit the room—bound, perhaps, for Paddington Station in a hansom cab.

It's a room of Victorian charm and clutter with Holmes' arm-chair on one side of the fireplace and Watson's on the other.

On a long deal table stands a tray with half-empty teacups, half-eaten crumpets and napkins just tossed down. In the silver butter dish are the bullets Holmes has carefully flung there they were taken from the body of a man murdered in 1895, and on the back of

The sedan signaled for a left turn as it came to a stop at the red light, so I moved in on the right side. The black cocker I had been watching from behind was half out of the window as he strained to sample the wind.

"Aren't you afraid to let him do that?" I asked the chap in the car.

"No," he said, as he displayed a heavy leather lead which prevented the dog from falling out. The light changed and off he zoomed into the traffic.

My concern wasn't limited to the fact that the dog might fall out of the car, although this is also a risk which must be guarded against. My thoughts were particularly directed toward the injury to the dog's eyes.

The eyes of dogs, just as those of humans, are not designed to be subjected to air speeds of 40 to 50 miles an hour and up. There is not only the probable injury to the cornea and the inflammation that may result in infection with serious complications, but the likelihood of entropion.

Entropion is the turning in of the lower lid. Irritation such as may be caused by the wind or by infection may cause a dog to squint in such fashion as to turn the lid under. The scraping of the eyelashes against the cornea then aggravates the situation and the condition can become permanent. Entropion is painful to say the least and can very easily affect a dog's disposition and entire outlook on life.

Entropion can result from unavoidable circumstances and it is known to be more prevalent in certain breeds or strains, but every effort should be made to reduce the probability of its occurrence and thus avoid the resulting distress.

There is only one practical way to remedy the situation once entropion is encountered and this is by surgery. A veterinarian, skilled in plastic surgery, makes an incision in the skin below the eye and removes such amount and shape of skin as he thinks is necessary to correct the situation and he then closes the incision. The lower lid is thus drawn into normal position.

Don't risk the necessity for such a procedure nor the possibility of other eye injury by allowing your dog to ride at high speeds with his head out of the car.

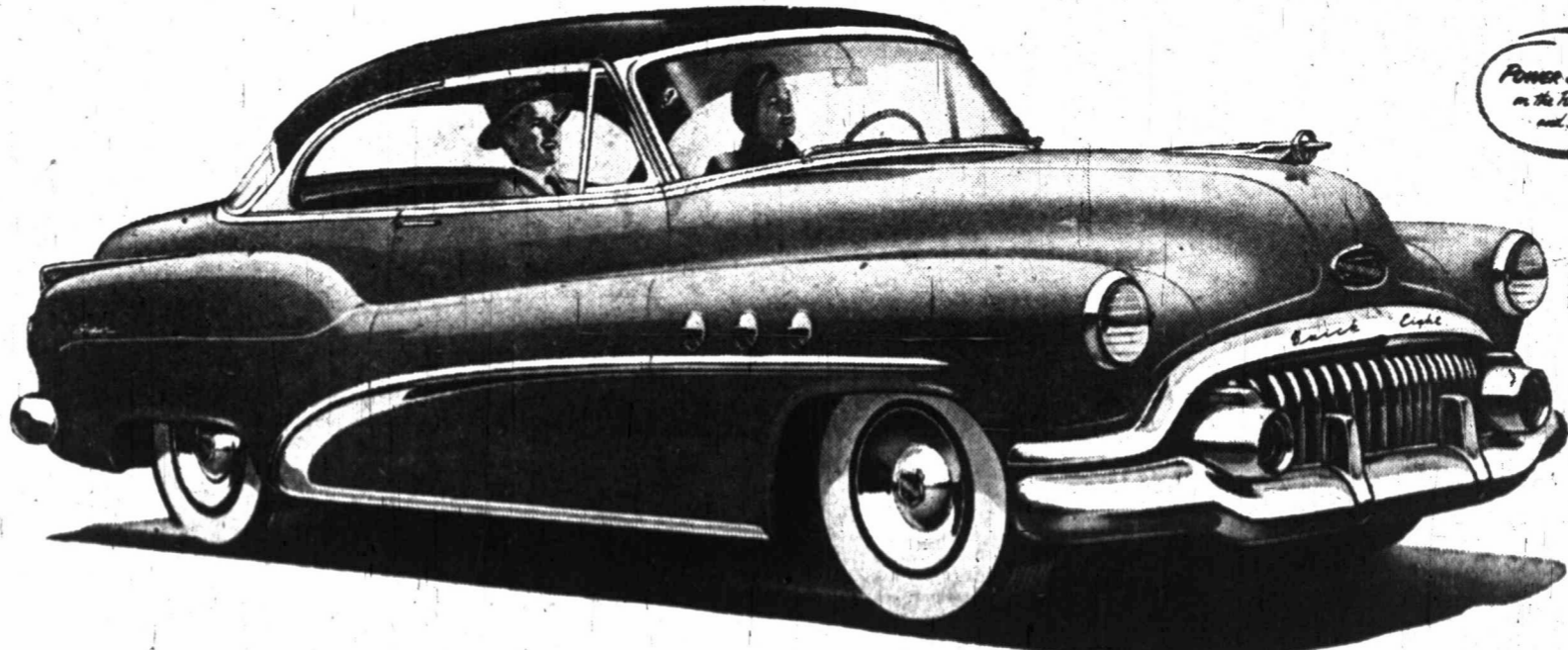

TEEN TALK

These are the days when leftovers taste juicy and made-over clothes look dreamy. Every family feels the pinch of prices and new dresses are few and far between.

Most young girls go back to school with at least one new outfit, and after its newness has worn off, what then? We are likely to stare at our tarnished wardrobe fixedly and even the new dress begins to look shabby.

This is the time when ingenuity counts. If the allowance permits and Mom's sewing machine is handy, a skirt and blouse can be turned out with a simple stitching assignment. Two yards of fabric can make a skirt, and depending on the fabric this can mean anywhere from a \$3 to \$10 saving. Simple blouses can be teamed with it at a fabric investment of about 1 1/2 yards per blouse.

Use Odds And Ends

Odds and ends can be converted from the family scrap bag into such glamorous accessories as scarfs, collars and ties. And last fall's wardrobe can be perked up by creative stitching.

Last fall's suit can be made modish by refitting the jacket with a pinstriped lining. A matching blouse will lend a couture touch. For a professional look to this sewing project, follow the general rule of "pin, baste, stitch, remove bastings and press." Run basting thread around neck and armholes to prevent stretching fabric when assembling.

If you have a number of skirts, you can do limitless fancy touches. The zipper attachment of your sewing machine can help create amusing things with felt appliques in a few minutes. One clever teen-ager appliqued felt geometric squares, triangles and circles around the hem of a swirl-type skirt. Another girl made eyes of felt and stitched lashes on with black darning thread. Her "eyecue" was achieved by using old worn-out felt hats.

Scallops and ruffles can take the plain skirt out of the classroom and put it on the dance floor. Faced scalloped hemlines are practical for most fabrics and are easily achieved by tracing scallops on wrong side of facing. Place right side of facing and dress fabric together and baste. Stitch around scallops. Cut around scallop one-eighth inch from stitching line. Turn facing to wrong side and press and hem in place. A deep ruffle of light or printed taffeta stitched to the underside of a skirt hem is another way to brighten up an old skirt or dress.

Pockets can help perk up the dreariest looking skirt. If the skirt already has a pocket cover it with pretty artificial posies or sequins, beads or fringe. Follow the notion counter of department stores and investigate the dress-up possibilities of novelty buttons. Sew on boy pockets made of bright grosgrain ribbon.

Sweaters have endless possibilities of becoming party-wear. Beads of sequins from old cast-off gowns in slinky colors on the attic can be used to decorate the neckline and sleeves of sweaters for a pretty effect.

A jumper can be made out of an old dress by scooping out the neckline, ripping out the sleeves. The armholes may need slight altering to accommodate the blouse or sweater you'll be wearing with it.

An extra-smooth and stylish skirt can be made from scratch by using black wool jersey and raffia. Or use your old black jersey skirt as a basis for the raffia designs. Raffia, which can be bought in hobby shops if not in trimming stores, can be crocheted into small designs—pin-wheels, butterflies, small circles—and sewed to the skirt. Beige raffia is lovely with black.

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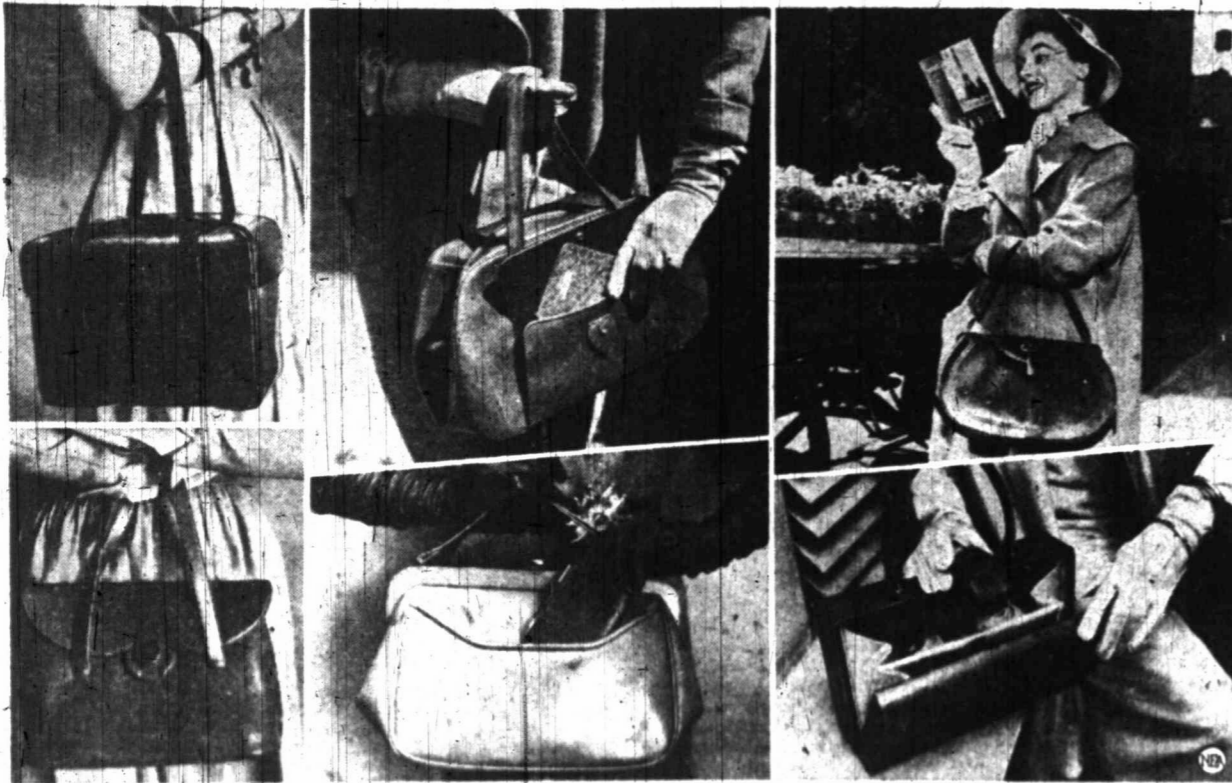

"These women," this designer says, "don't realize that they are ruining the total effect of their costumes. Almost the first thing to catch your companion's eye at a luncheon table, for instance is your handbag. If it's shabby or inappropriate to what you're wearing, you might just as well turn up in a housedress and felt slippers!"

The answer, Alan thinks, is to make women realize that a handsome handbag is not only tonic for other fashions but essential to a well turned-out look.

"Every woman needs a real handbag wardrobe. While she shouldn't attempt to match everything she owns, she should invest in good suit bags, dressy bags, travel bags, at least one cocktail and evening bag." Further, she should spend time and thought on the handbags she buys. She shouldn't think constantly in terms of basic black or that old standby, navy blue. And she should, he warns, buy the very best bag she can afford, just as she would buy the best in other fashions in order to get the most value for her money.

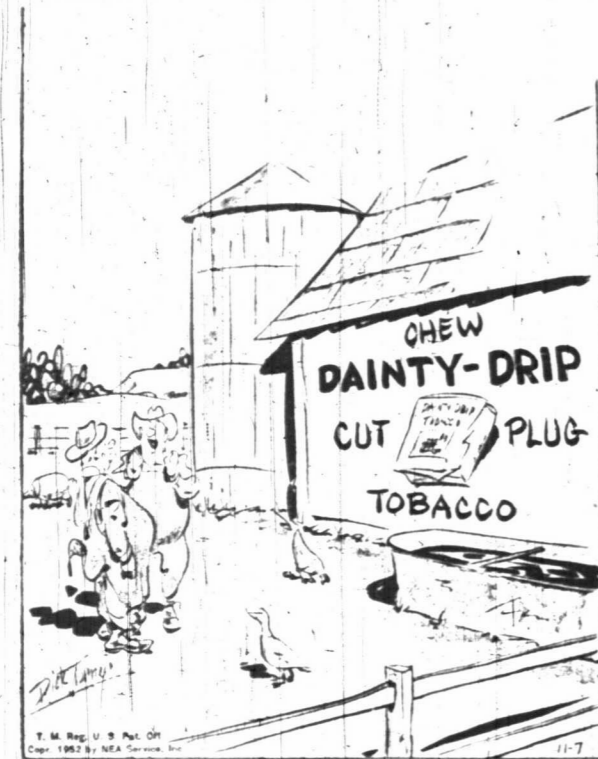
Lower Tourist Fees To Encourage Trade

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Rate Of Accidental Deaths Said Rising

NEW YORK —(P)— There were 1,946 accidental deaths in New York City in the first eight months of 1932, reports the Greater New York Safety Council. This was an increase of 103 deaths over the figure for the same period last year.

Home accidents claimed 995 victims while 382 were killed in motor vehicle accidents. The unusual heat wave in June and July caused 80 deaths from sunstroke and heat prostration, an increase of more than 60 over 1931 figures.
