OUR FAMILY did its part in the effort to boycott European vacations. We even went a step further, and did an all-Texas vacation this year. That way, we kept our travel dollars in our own state.

Our 1986 trip was not so much in response to the terrorist acts and other failures to cooperate with America as it was the fact that our youngest, Richard, studied Texas history this past school year, and had never seen the points of interest involving the Texas Revolution.

So, last week we tried to remedy that situation, with a trip to the San Antonio area. There are a number of things to see and do in San Antonio, and this time we decided to spend six of our allotted ten days in the Alamo City.

It had been ten years since we had been to San Antonio, and we discovered that some things have been added since our last visit. For one thing, you can now take a horse-carriage ride in the downtown area. This is one of the few cities in the U.S. where you can get a carriage ride.

In addition, you can take a trolley ride for a dime. There aren't many places left with trolleys, and there sure aren't many tourist attractions that only cost a dime.

Besides the Alamo, San Antonio has long been famous for its river walk, featuring sidewalk cafes and shops. New shops have been added to this area, some of which are tied in with the luxury hotels on the river.

Richard commented that when you're down on the river walk, it's hard to believe there is a big city, complete with bustling traffic, just above you. A riverboat ride is also a "must" while there, and is another of the city's bargain attractions. The ride was compared by some to be as interesting as a trip through the canals of Venice on a gondola.

If you are a history buff, you know that the Alamo is just one of the missions established by the Spaniards during the 16th century. And, although the Alamo is best known due to its historical significance, others of the missions are more beautiful, and should be seen during one's visit to San Antonio.

The Noche Del Rio musical show is presented three nights a week on the river bank, and in its 29th year is the longest continuous running show in America. This is a good experience, and can be combined with supper at one of the river restaurants.

La Villita, a historical area, makes a nice tour. It's a free attraction, except that inside the restored adobe buildings are shops with art, antiques, etc. So the tour may or may not be free.

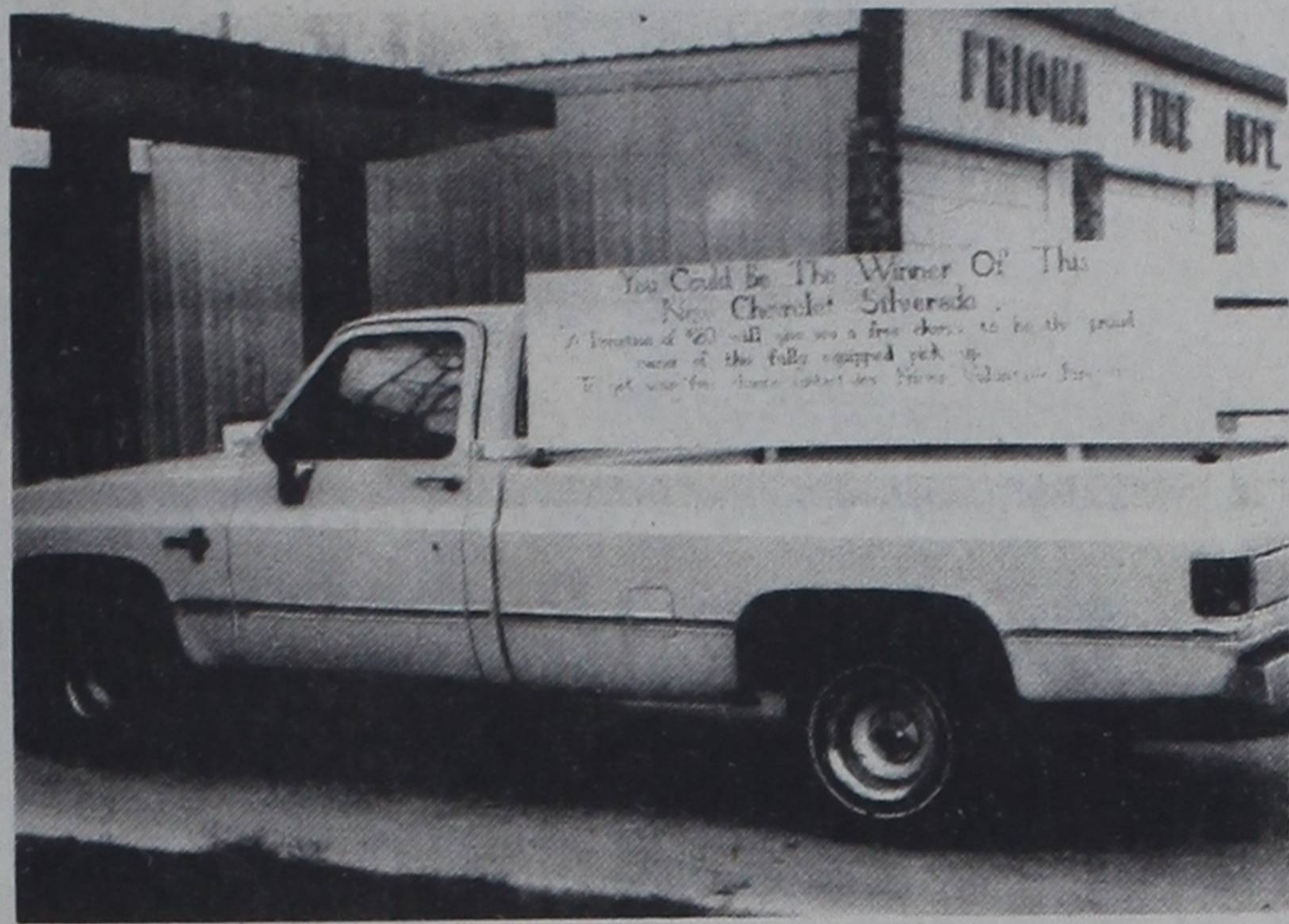
Longtime visitors to San Antonio may remember the old Buckhorn Saloon and Museum, which at one time was near the Alamo, downtown. The horn and mounted animal collections have been relocated to the grounds of the Lone Star Brewery. A Hall of Fins and Feathers and the O. Henry home are also featured. This is another free attraction, and definitely worth the time and trouble.

One attraction we had always missed until this trip is the Witte Museum. A local and natural history museum, it's great, and will take the better part of a day to see properly.

If you are into Victorian homes, a tour of the city's King William area will transport you back into the previous century. A guided tour is available at one of the homes. This beautiful area was also "new" to us.

Then, there is Brackenridge Park, with its sunken garden, aerial skyride and zoo. The zoo has one of the largest animal collections in the United States.

Schedule Given For July 4th

Residents of the Friona area will help celebrate the nation's 210th birthday next week, during the city's annual July 4th celebration. Most of the events will be held at the Friona Community Center.

Kicking off the events will be the annual free watermelon feed at Friona State Bank on their lawn, between 10 a.m. and 3 p.m., on Thursday, July 3. Residents and customers are invited to stop by the bank anytime during the day for a free slice of watermelon.

The Friona Noon Lions Club will hold their annual barbecued beef and sausage dinner at the Community Center July 4th, with serving to begin at 11:30 a.m. Tickets for the meal are on sale from members of the Friona Lions Club. Advance tickets cost \$4.50 for adults, and the price at the door will be \$5.00.

A "splash" event at the swimming pool will feature swimming contests, beginning at 10 a.m.

The annual holiday tennis tournament will be held July 3-4. Mike Maynard is in charge of the tournament. There will be both adult and junior divisions in the tournament. To enter, call the Chamber office at 247-3491 by July 2. Entry fees will be \$3 for singles and \$5 for doubles.

The regular contests, for youths and adults, will begin after lunch at the Community Center. (Exception is the bench press competition, starting at 11 a.m. at Friona High School.)

The Super Team competition will begin at 1:30 p.m. Events include the flipper race, egg toss, spoon race and mud tug.

Beginning at 2 p.m., a demonstration of remote-control airplanes will be held.

Starting at 2:30 p.m., events will include the sack race and horseshoe pitching.

The World's Championship Turtle Race will be held at 3 p.m., and the bike races will begin at 3:30 p.m. The softball throw competition will begin at 4 p.m.

A bake sale will be conducted at the Community Center by the Women's Division of the Chamber of Commerce, starting during the barbecue meal. The Friona Young Homemakers will also sell home-made ice cream.

The annual celebration will conclude once again with the fireworks display at Reeve Lake, furnished once again by the Friona 4-H Club and the Friona Star volleyball team, with assistance from the Friona Young Homemakers.

For the 18th consecutive year, the Friona Volunteer Fire Department members will put on the fireworks display. "We have been able to purchase more fireworks this year, and we should have a bigger and better display," says Fire Chief Ralph Shirley.

A 4th of July dance for both youths and adults will be held at the Congregational Church starting at 10 p.m. and lasting until 1 a.m. The dance will be presented by Daryl and Bobbie Stevens of Clovis.

Dave Hutson is chairman of the Chamber's 1986 July 4th celebration committee. Assistants are Ted Procter and John Baxter.

Surgeon Will Join Hospital's Staff

Dr. Luis Alfredo Barrios, M.D., has signed a contract to practice medicine at the Parmer County Community Hospital, it was announced this week.

Dr. Barrios, who is currently practicing at Clinton, Oklahoma, will move to Friona as soon as he can secure his license to practice medicine in Texas.

The new addition to Parmer County Community Hospital's staff is 43 years old. He is a native of Guatemala, and has practiced medicine in this country since 1972.

Dr. Barrios has served at the Clinton Regional Hospital for the past nine years. He served as chief of staff at the Clinton hospital, 1981-83, as chairman of the medical staff's Continuing Education Committee, 1983-85, and served as chairman of the hospital's surgery committee from June, 1984 through June, 1985.

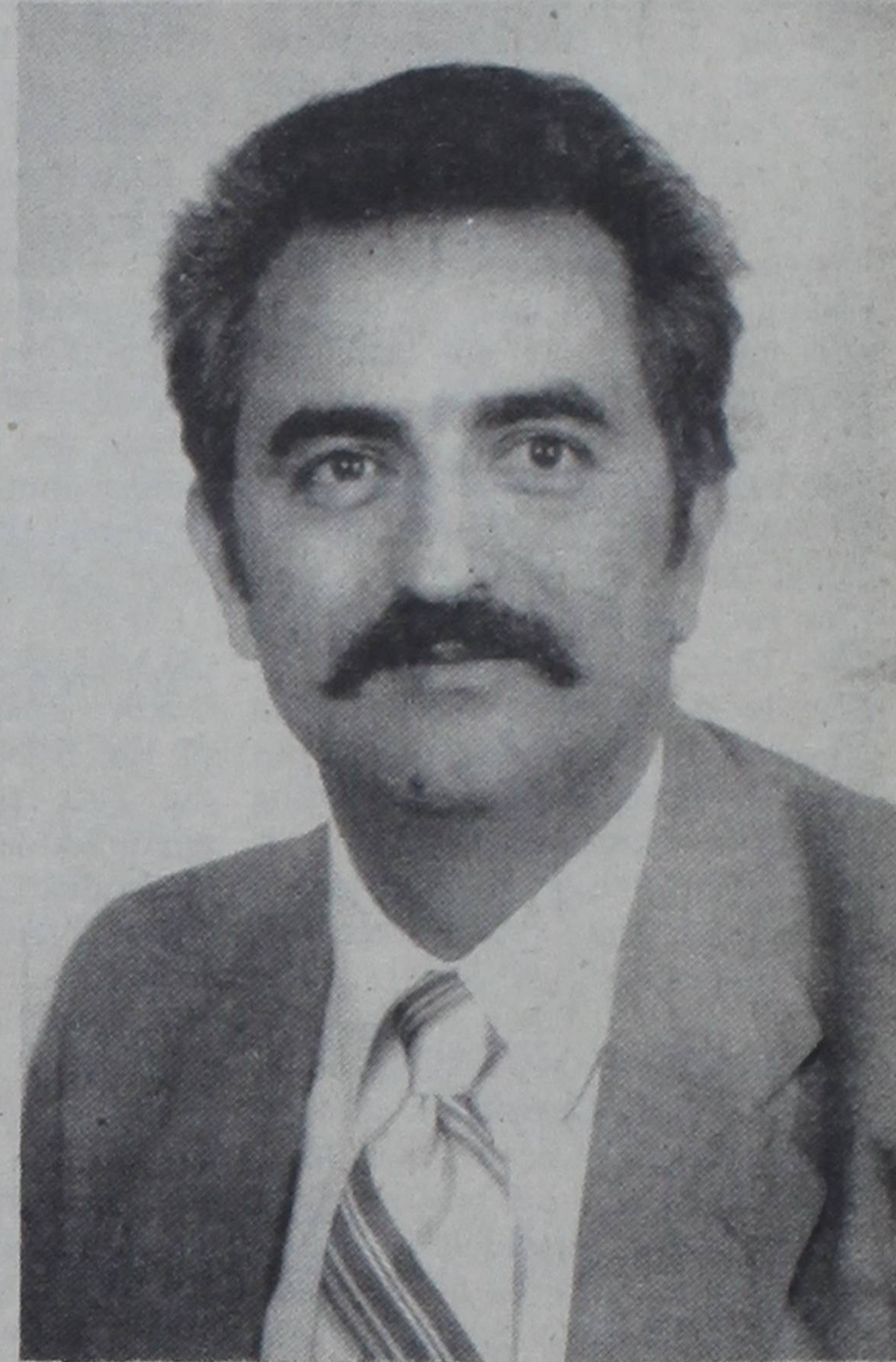
The physician obtained his B.S. degree in science in 1964 at the University of San Carlos, Guatemala City, Guatemala. He obtained his M.D. degree in 1970 at the University of San Carlos.

He completed his internship in general surgery at the Brooklyn Cumberland Medical Center, Brooklyn, N.Y., in 1971.

Dr. Barrios did his residencies in general surgery at the Brooklyn Cumberland Medical Center, where he served as first, second, third and chief resident. He performed colon-rectal surgery from July, 1976, to June, 1977 at the Sacred Heart Hospital, Allentown, Pennsylvania.

He has served as a full staff member at the Clinton hospital, plus serving on the courtesy staffs of the Cordell Memorial Hospital in Cordell, Okla., and the Seiling Municipal Hospital, Seiling, Okla.

Dr. Barrios holds memberships in the American Medical Assn., the Oklahoma State Medical Assn., the Custer County Medical Assn., the American Society of

Colon-Rectal Surgeons and the American Society of Abdominal Surgeons.

Also, the American Society of Conemporary Surgeons, the American Society for Gastrointestinal Endoscopy, the Arkansas-Oklahoma Society for Gastrointestinal Endoscopy, and the Southern Medical Association.

He is a member of Kiwanis, International; has served on the board of directors at the Clinton YMCA, and was on the St. Mary's Catholic Church Counsel three years in charge of youth programs. He also is a member of the Knights of Columbus, and is the volunteer medical director for Opportunities, Inc., a detox unit.

Dr. Barrios served as organizer of adult sports activities in Clinton, and participated as a sponsor, manager and player.

He is fluent in both English and Spanish.

Co. Audit Approved By Court

Approval of the annual audit of county finances was the highlight of the Commissioners Court meeting on June 23.

Accountant Bernie Gowens gave the report. He told the court that in general the county finances are in good shape. A motion was passed to accept the report and pay the bill for the audit.

Seth Halbert gave the annual report from the Central Plains Mental Health/Mental Retardation Center, giving the number of people treated at the center and the dollar value of the treatment. Halbert requested that the commissioners consider a payment of \$3,050 to the center when considering their new budget. This is the same figure the county paid the past year.

A discussion was held with a representative from Blue Cross-Blue Shield on the company's rate increase and added coverage.

Judge Roberts told the court of a letter he had received from Justice of the Peace Frances Euler of Friona. In the letter, Mrs. Euler told of the number of cases she has handled and the amount of money her office has generated, and asked consideration for a raise in salary. A motion was passed to thank Mrs. Euler for her letter and assure her she will receive the same consideration as the other county employees with respect to salary increases.

55 YEARS AGO--JUNE 19, 1931

The 18-month-old infant son of Mr. and Mrs. Calvin Russ of the Black Community spent last Sunday night lost in a wheat field, with apparently no serious discomfort.

50 YEARS AGO--JUNE 19, 1936

Curtis Douglass, attorney from Panhandle and candidate for state senator from the 31st senatorial district, will make three addresses in Parmer County on Saturday. His first address will be at Friona at 1:30 p.m. He will also speak at Bovina and Farwell. His car is equipped with a loud speaker, so his audiences will not have any difficulty in hearing him.

45 YEARS AGO--JUNE 20, 1941

Harley Sadler and his all-new stage show will appear in Friona for two nights only, June 23 and 24. They are being sponsored by the local Fire Department, who respectfully urge the people of this area to attend. Besides outstanding plays, a marvelous orchestra is carried and vaudeville features that consist of many radio, stage and recording stars.

40 YEARS AGO--JUNE 14, 1946

Mrs. Henry Lewis has had as her guests this week her mother, Mrs. R.B. Jones, and her brother, Billy Jones, both of Greenville, Texas.

35 YEARS AGO--JUNE 14, 1951

30 YEARS AGO--JUNE 14, 1956

Sam Whitlow of the Farmer-Stockman magazine will be in the Black Community Monday night of next week to present citizens with district and state awards won in a recent "rural neighborhood progress" contest. This Saturday, Black will receive publicity from the cameras of KGNC-TV when "Cotton John" Smith will feature the community. Included in the awards will be a check for \$500 for placing second statewide in the contest.

25 YEARS AGO--JUNE 15, 1961

At a business meeting of stockholders of Friona Wheat Growers, Inc. Tuesday night, it was announced that dividends to be paid this year total \$540,068.13.

First load of wheat delivered to Friona was by John Renner, who farms southwest of town. He delivered the wheat on Monday noon to Friona Wheat Growers.

20 YEARS AGO--JUNE 16, 1966

Rev. Russell McAnally, pastor of the Friona Methodist Church the past four years, has been appointed as pastor of the Trinity Methodist Church in Plainview, it has been announced.

15 YEARS AGO--JUNE 17, 1971

Missouri Beef Packers was probably the hardest-hit single concern in last Friday's "big blow," which caused damage locally that will probably top \$500,000. The packing plant, three miles southwest of town, sustained heavy damage to the roof of its building, which in turn caused water leakage and a loss of insulation, making it hard to maintain the temperature constant in the new fabricating portion of the plant. Damage will top \$50,000 at MBP, according to manager Dave LaFleur. Other businesses sustaining heavy losses included Friona Wheat Growers, which had a grain dryer completely destroyed. Friona Motors had extensive damage to its roof, and

some new cars were affected. Rockwell Brothers Lumber Company lost 72 feet of roofing on one of its warehouse buildings. The municipal swimming pool had its roof partially torn off, and some damage to the building structure. Six trailer homes were damaged, one of which was picked up and tossed about 20 feet, landing on its top and being crushed.

10 YEARS AGO--JUNE 13, 1976

Work has begun this week on the cemetery road which is in the process of being paved.

The Friona City Council held their regular meeting June 7, at the City Hall. Among the many items under discussion was a name for the new Friona Nursing Home. Percy Parsons and the board of directors submitted the name "Prairie Acres." The council accepted the name after some discussion.

5 YEARS AGO--JUNE 14, 1981

Construction work is in full swing at the Friona Junior High School, where a new lunchroom is being built. The new facility will be ready for the 1981-82 school year.

Western Gift Store will open in Friona on Monday at 607 Main Street. The new store will be a redemption center for Circle W Blue Stamps.

Residents of the Friona area got a taste of summer during the past week, with the mercury climbing to 100 degrees or better on three days.

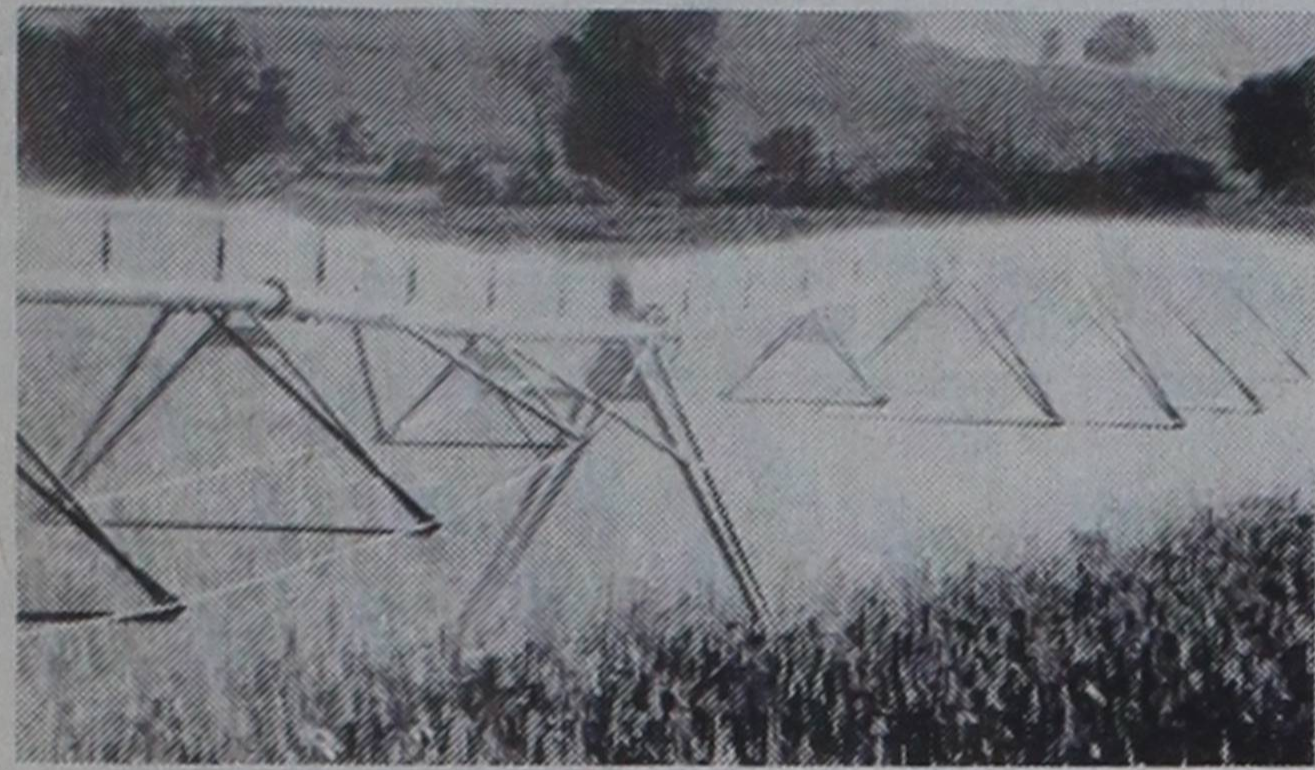

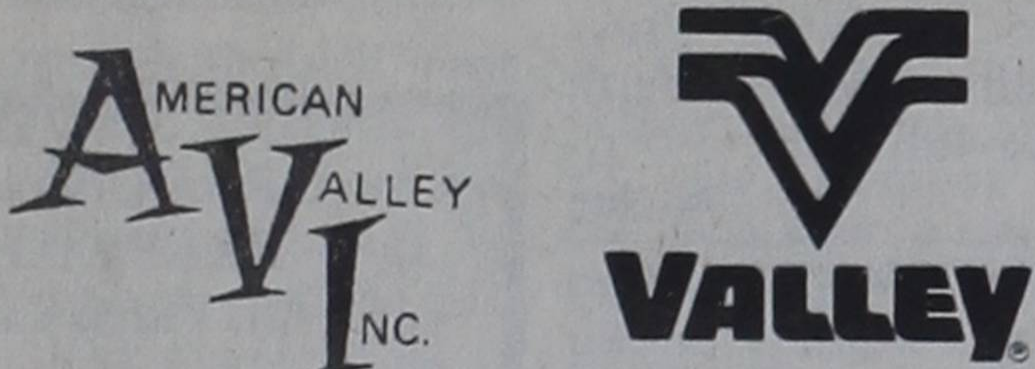

Five arrests were made: two for driving while intoxicated; and three for public intoxication.

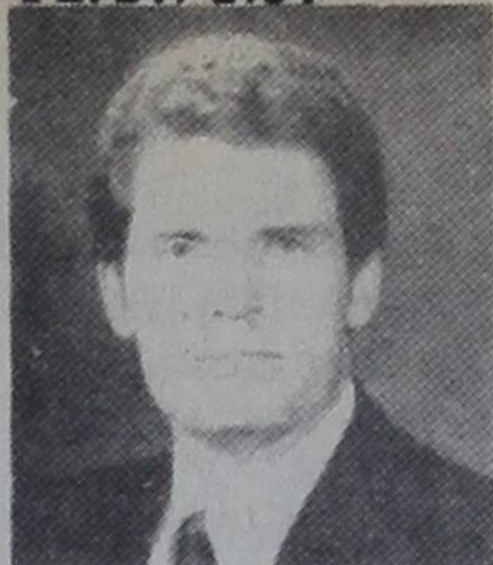
