

When a new President takes office, it helps to put the slant of history upon the early events of his tenure.

Usually a White House newcomer enjoys a "honeymoon" of harmonious relations with Congress, period of grace while he settles into his arduous job. Franklin D. Roosevelt had his "Hundred Days" in 1933. Harry S. Truman experienced similar immunity in the interval between his sudden accession to power and the Japanese surrender in 1945

But, in the almost certain event that General Eisenhower, too, has his honeymoon, it would be foolish to imagine that it will last more than a few months at best. It never has, and the reason is that there are powerful factors working against it, working for conflict between the President and Congress.

A lot of people are saying these days that this conflict is not inevitable, that Congress and the White House can get along fine if each will just stick to its knitting and if there is constant consultation between the two. Eisenhower, a man of tremendous talent for bringing people together, is pictured as just the fellow to introduce sweetness and light into this age-old relationship.







Today, lobar pneumonia is almost rare disease, and when it does occur recovery is the rule. The what it used to be.

It is interesting, and even now im A typical case starts suddenly with a severe chill which may last for as

long as half an hour. Soon after the chill, the temperature begins to go up and it rises rapidly to around 104 or 105 degrees. At the same time a person coming down with pneumonia may have general aches and pains with headache. Pain in the chest or side like that

which is present in pleurisy, also is Cough which produces pain, and does not bring up much mucus, starts early. The breathing becomes rapid and each breath is

These symptoms can be confuse with other conditions, but certainly are suspicious of lobar pneumonia Examination of the chest by a physician and especially taking an X-ray film generally bring a diag-

Unless steps are taken to treat the condition promptly, the typical signs develop by the second or third day. By this time cold sores around the lips are likely to be present, the facial expression shows anxiety, the pain in the side or chest is severe and the breathing is rapid. Cough brings up a fair amount of sputum which is likely to be tinged with blood. The temperature stays high, at 104 or 105 degrees.

Penicillin and its relatives almost always bring remarkable improve ment in a short time. A quick fall in temperature and relief of the cough and pain occur promptly. The breathing becomes slow and normal and no longer is it necessary to wait for the crisis to know what the outcome will be.

Pencillin Brings Relief

Today there is only about one chance in 20 or 25 of dying from the disease instead of one chance in Lobar pneumonia has dropped from being one of the most important causes of death to being one of the least important of the major diseases.

But remember, the diagnosis must be made early and treatment started promptly, because the results are much more likely to be favorable than if pneumonia has been present for several days







Every experienced Canasta player understands how important it is to make a base at an early stage of the play. This early base puts you tion to attack or defend, as nstances may dictate.

A base consists of four or more natural cards in a single meld. For example, you may have four kings, or four queens, or four of anything You need at least four natural cards in any canasta, so those four natural cards are the base upon which you can add three more cards (either wild or natural) in order to complete the canasta.

A hand is seldom really hopeless when your side has made a base. As you and your partner accumulate wild cards, you can add them to this base to complete a canasta. Armed with that canasta you may find it possible to meld out and thus end the slaughter.

The really disastrous hand occurs when your side cannot meld a canasta and therefore cannot meld

The value of a base is chiefly defensive, but a base is useful also in the large number of hands in which both sides seem to have equal chances. At the beginning of such a hand you cannot tell whether you be attacking or defending as and progresses.

will not hinder your attack, and it will prove absolutely invaluable if you find it necessary to defend.

A base is not nearly so necessary if it is absolutely clear that your side is attacking. For example, if you happen to pick up the first large discard pile, your side can carry the attack to the enemy.

The opponents will try to meld out quickly, but your side will try to prolong the hand as long as possible. In this situation you don't need an early base, but you can bases simply because you have cards to spare.

Q-We were playing Cut-Throat Canasta, and one of the players took the discard pile. I had a score of \$500 points, and my partner had a score of 1600 points. What do we need for the initial meld?

A—It depends on the score of player who melds. Your part-with a score of 1600, needs 90 points for the initial meld. You, with a score of 3500 points, need 120 points for the initial meld. It usually doesn't matter because in this game you get so many cards that you can easily meet any minimum count requirement.

Ban Is Sought On Bull Fights

Garbage Becomes Feed For Animals

HICAGO-(P)-Garbage is now and ground into saleable anal feed in Omaha, Neb., reports the American Public Works Association here.

The work is done by a local alcohol plant which is subsidized by the city at a monthly rate of \$2,500. The sterile feed produced from the dried garbage has 12 to 14 per cent protein content and resembles tankage, the report states. Omaha officials began experimenting with the drying system after the state legislature prohibited feeding raw garbage to hogs.



It also has to be rugged enough to withstand the forces of high acceleration and to operate so that film can be exposed. The Colorado scientist said the instrument mounted in the rocket fired last month pointed directly at the sun for a considerable period and obtained a 28-degree exposure of the spectrum. Dr. Pietenpol said that scientists previously photographed the spec-

about 2,000 Angstrom units, but that in the Colorado experiment powerful ultraviolet radiation emitted by the hydrogen in the sun's atmosphere was photographed for the first time

Much of that radiation is conentrated in a spectrum line at 1,216 Angstrum units, or the socalled Lyman Alpha Line. It was what the university scientists hope to get and succeeded in photographing.

Simple As That Dr. Pietenpol explained that solar radiation is the cause of ionospheric layers in the upper atmosphere and those stratified concentrations of electrons can be observed by radio wave reflection and are an important factor in radio propagation.

The ionosphere rises from the absorption of ultraviolet radiation from the sun, Dr. Pietenpol continued, and the absorption has

great meteorological significance. The University of Colorado research is supported by the Air Force Cambridge Research Center geophysicis division. Research cooperation came from Dr. Marcus O'Day and Dr. Howard Edwards of the Cambridge laboratories.
