Texaco Opens New Ellenburger Field In SW Reagan Area

The Texas Company has opened a new Ellenburger field in Southwest Reagan County with the completion of its No. 1-AC State for a daily potential of 273 barrels of 49.1-gravity oil.

Production is coming from perforations in five and one-half-inch casing at 9,410-9,500 feet. That set had been washed with 500 gallons of mud acid and treated with 1,500 gallons of regular acid.

The flow was gauged through an 18-64-inch choke.

Gas-oil ratio was 1,724-1.

This new discovery is three miles west and slightly north of the town of Big Lake and 1,980 feet from north and 660 feet from west lines of section 9, block 11, University Lands survey.

Clear Fork Opener Is Assured At Test In North Pecos Area

G. D. Putman & Company of Midland No. 1 Hart and others, has been assured a discovery from the upper Clear Fork in North Pecos County.

The wildcat, on latest gauge, was swabbed for 126.18 barrels of oil in eight hours through perforations at 2,895-2,901 feet. The set had been treated with 500 gallons of acid and 1,000 gallons.

The project had made from five to six barrels of oil hourly before the 500 gallon treatment and following the 1,000 gallon treatment.

After the 500 gallon treatment, the well was swabbed for 15.77 barrels of oil hourly. The above eight-hour gauge resulted.

Operator was preparing to perforate the section of the casing from 2,554 to 2,585 feet. When that is done, both sets will be tested at the same time.

Location for the new field opener is 597.1 feet from north and 737.7 feet from east lines of section 31, block 11, H&G&N survey.

Ellenburger Pool Opened By Sinclair In W-C Schleicher

Sinclair Oil & Gas Company has completed No. 1-181 University as a flowing discovery from the Ellenburger in West-Central Schleicher County.

The project was finalized for a daily potential of 242 barrels of 40.5-gravity oil through two-inch tubing and from open hole at 7,910-8,045 feet. Operator had acidized the open hole. Gas-oil ratio was 1,286-1 and tubing pressure 100 pounds. Casing pressure was 600 pounds.

No. 1-181 University is 660 feet from south and east lines of section 22, block 54, University Lands survey. It is 20 miles northwest of Eldorado.

Stanolind Gets Oil Shows From Canyon In C-N Howard Test

Stanolind Oil & Gas Company found shows of oil from the Pennsylvania Canyon reef lime at No. 1 Minnie Smith and others, wildcat exploration in Central-North Howard County.

Drillstem test was taken in the interval from 7,769 to 7,782 feet. Tool was open two hours and eight minutes. Gas surfaced in 39 minutes. Recovery was 90 feet of 45-gravity oil and 333 feet of mud-cut oil, estimated to be 75 per cent oil. Flowing pressure was 90 pounds and shut-in bottomhole pressure was 3,250 pounds after 15 minutes.

Operator was coming ahead. The reef lime was topped at 7,787 feet, minus datum point of 5,142 feet. Location is 1,980 feet from south and west lines of section 45, block 31, T-3-N, T&P survey.

Rich And Gresh Of Midland Get Sand Opener In Coleman

Kenneth Rich and Marty Gresh, both of Midland, have a flowing discovery from the Fry sand at their No. 1 Pettway, Southeast Coleman County wildcat, 10 miles southeast of the town of Santa Anna.

The new pay find flowed at the average rate of 20 barrels of oil per hour, naturally, through 5 1/2-inch casing.

Colorado Governor Proves Better With Quip Than Mop

SALT LAKE CITY—(AP)—As a junior, Utahns agreed Friday, Colorado Gov. Dan Thornton is a good actor.

Thornton came to Salt Lake City Thursday to pay off an election bet with Utah Gov. J. Bracken Lee. Utah had a better turnout at the polls for the last general election, so Thornton had to serve as Lee's janitor for a day.

Despite the fact Thornton was supplied with the most modern janitorial tools and a caddy to carry them, he was scolded by Utah's first lady, Mrs. Lee, for sweeping dirt under the carpet in Governor Lee's office.

And he left behind a woefully unmade bed in his hotel room and a pile of burning trash near the Capitol.

But the tall Coloradan proved to be master with a quip.

At a Kiwanis Club dinner, where he was principal speaker, Thornton said, "Here's old flintheart Lee. Not only is he against all federal grants and aid, but I understand he's about to outlaw all federal currency." (Lee has established a national reputation as a budget trimmer).

Then, chiding Lee for some past trouble at the Utah Prison, Thornton presented the Utah governor with a sign which read: "Danger: Convicts Escaping."

Thornton arrived on a special train. He brought a bag of Colorado air, which he said was for use in the "Utah smog." He also brought Colorado-made mops.

When asked about his ready insults to his neighboring state, Thornton said, "We Republicans haven't had anything else to do the past 20 years but insult people."

Eisenhower Kills Wage Controls

Curbs Lifted From Meats, Other Goods

WASHINGTON—(AP)—President Eisenhower Friday ended all wage and salary controls. He also ordered price controls lifted from a wide range of consumer goods, including all meat products.

A White House statement said the President took the actions in a move "toward eliminating in an orderly fashion the price and wage controls under which the American economy has been required to operate for the last two years."

Oil Heiress' Love Letters Read To Jury

WICHITA FALLS—(AP)—The prosecution Friday introduced Mary Jean Parsons' love letters in its attempt to picture the Tulsa socialite as a normal, happy bride-to-be during her engagement to the young soldier she shot to death six weeks after their marriage.

The state quoted from a thick packet of letters, trying to refute testimony of a prominent psychiatrist who described Mrs. Parsons as "definitely insane" in the "very bizarre . . . ghoulish" murder of her bridegroom.

Dr. Joe E. Tyler, Tulsa, Okla., testified Thursday in the 22-year-old blonde's murder trial that she did not know right from wrong.

Friday, the defense launched an extended cross-examination and quoted from the letters, written while Lt. Richard O. Parsons, 24, Pleasantville, N. Y., was attending Officer Candidate School at Fort Sill, Okla. Mrs. Parsons is on trial for murder in the fatal shooting of her bridegroom in El Paso Feb. 16, 1952.

The letters were written while the defendant attended the University of Oklahoma and after she quit school in October, 1951.

One, to Parsons October 16 from Norman, said:

"Dearest: This is what the Oklahomans call a quicke. Everyone is looking like the last rose of Summer after being in Dallas for the Oklahoma-Texas football game . . ."

Clayton asked Dr. Tyler, "Anything in that letter, doctor, that would lead you to believe she is ill?" The psychiatrist answered, "No," but said that from his knowledge of the girl's background he was certain she was mentally ill at the time.

Death Of Curbs Finds Beef Prices Under Pre-War Level

CHICAGO—(AP)—Government controls on beef were removed Friday but, a survey indicated, prices generally are below pre-Korean War levels in most parts of the country.

The spot survey was designed to show prices this week as compared with a year ago and the week prior to the outbreak of the war in Korea on June 25, 1950.

Slaughtering centers and strictly consuming areas, big and small cities, in coastal, border, plains and mountain regions were included in the 15-city survey.

Choice sirloin generally is selling within a range of 75 to 79 cents a pound. But Los Angeles is paying \$1.29, far ahead both of a year ago and the week before June 25, 1950. Atlanta is paying 95 cents, Boston \$1.00, and Washington 83 in the test sampling of shopper advertisements.

(It was advertised in Thursday's edition of The Reporter-Telegram at 69 cents.)

A year ago consumers in most of the cities were paying 95 cents to \$1.08 a pound for the same grade of sirloin. Mrs. Parsons, however, was down to 85 cents while Memphis was up to \$1.20.

For those more interested in hamburger, the all-beef kind is running 10 to 20 cents a pound below a year ago and from about even with a dime below the 1950 week.

Ground beef is selling from 39 to 49 cents in the 15 cities. A year ago most cities fell within a range of 58 to 65 cents and in 1950 within a range of 49 to 59.

Dulles, Stassen Inspect Flood-Torn Holland; Promise Renewed U. S. Aid

On his arrival, Dulles was quick to assure the stricken Dutch of American aid for their recovery from the week's flood disaster, Western Europe's worst since the Middle Ages.

In a formal statement at the airport, the new U. S. secretary of State said:

"May we extend again on behalf of our government and the American people our most heartfelt sympathy for your plight. We also renew our pledge to assist in relieving the suffering of your people. I am glad to know that our armed forces in Europe have already been able to give substantial aid."

Enroute here, the two U. S. officials flew over part of Holland's flooded Southwest, where more than one million people are in distress, a fourth of the nation's arable lands are ruined by salt water, and damage has been estimated in the neighborhood of a billion dollars.

Dulles described the situation there as "terrible" and said, "We feel very badly about it."

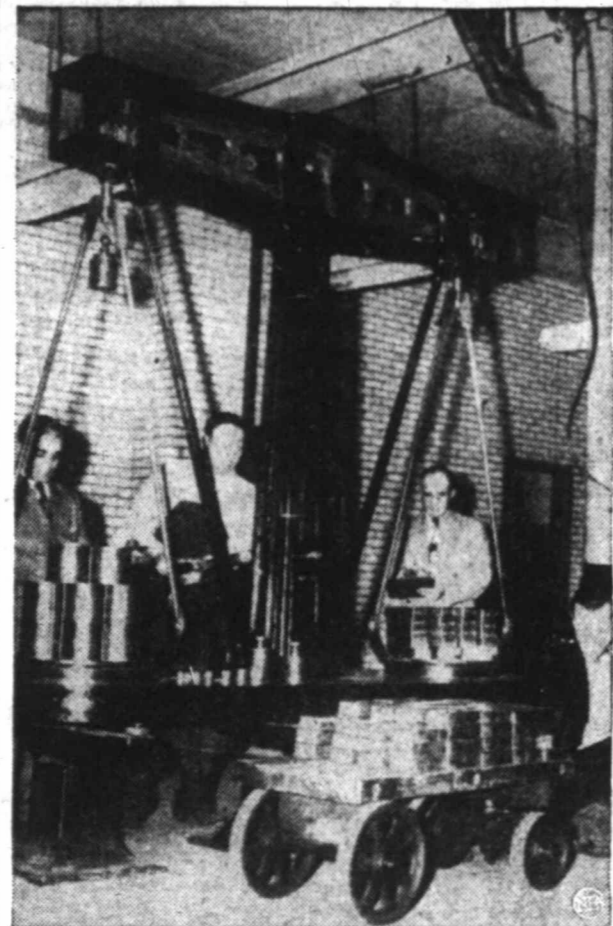
Although only last month the Dutch announced they had regained sufficient economic strength to do without further direct U. S. economic aid this year, the storm drastically altered this situation.

Officials now say losses of property, crops and future agricultural earnings, plus the cost of rebuilding the nation's dike system, are beyond the capacity of the Dutch people.

Dulles and Stassen came here for the fifth stop on their seven-nation tour of key Western European capitals to spur action on the leading European army plan.

High American officials in West Germany reported Dulles left Bonn "very encouraged" that his tour was infusing new life into the scheme for a unified European army to include 500,000 German troops.

They said he would tell President Eisenhower on his return to the United States that, despite severe parliamentary opposition to ratification of the treaty by both Germany and France, marked progress can be expected in the next two or three months.

Court Rule Halts Jelke Vice Trial

NEW YORK—(AP)—The vice trial of playboy Minot (Mickey) Jelke was adjourned at noon Friday until Monday when the defense vehemently protested the exclusion of press and public during testimony by red-haired Pat Ward.

NEW YORK—(AP)—The press and public were barred Friday from the trial of Minot (Mickey) Jelke during the testimony of the state's first witness—19-year-old Pat Ward. General Sessions Judge Louis J. Valente issued the barring order "because of the age" of red-haired Miss Ward.

The order was issued after the state and defense had completed their opening statements in the trial of the 23-year-old playboy.

Judge Valente told a reporter in his chambers that "because of her age I felt it would be best to exclude everybody from the courtroom."

When told his action was unprecedented, the judge snapped, "The whole case is unprecedented."

Says Will Name Men

In his opening statement the prosecutor, Assistant District Attorney Anthony J. Liebler, told the all-male jury:

"It is with deep regret that I am forced to bring out the names of men. But this case cannot be properly prosecuted unless names are named."

And, he added, there were quite a few names involved.

The judge's decision followed a conference at the bench between Valente and J. Roland Sala, Miss Ward's counsel, with the prosecution listening.

Miss Ward, simply dressed and obviously tense, watched silently, her hands clasped tightly.

"Not A Vice Lord"

Liebler said in his opening statement:

"Mickey Jelke is not a vice lord. He is just a pimp in a society which is known in this city as cafe society."

"We'll show you he surrounded himself with pimps and prostitutes and procurers and madams. We'll show you the type of life he lived. We'll show you he never did a lick of work, but day after day drank and ate at the finest and most expensive night clubs and restaurants in New York."

Specifically the heir to an oleomargarine fortune is accused of forcing three comely young women into prostitution and living off the earnings of one.

Love For Jelke Told

The whole situation came to light, Liebler said, when Miss Ward fell in love with Jelke.

Jelke told her he loved her and wanted to marry her, Liebler said. Then there developed this unhappy twist, said Liebler:

Jelke and an unemployed press agent named Ray Russell Davioni persuaded Miss Ward Jelke was broke. Claiming money was necessary for marriage, they persuaded her to have dates with other men, give them a "hard fuck story" and obtain money from them.

Miss Ward was paid so well that in February, 1952, Jelke got a new car and decided to take a vacation in Florida, Liebler said.

Solons Urge File Looters Be Punished

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Two senators urged the new Administration Friday to crack down on persons responsible for the reported strange disappearance of embarrassing letters from State Department files.

Senators Dirksen (R-Ill.) and Mundt (R-S.D.) called for disciplinary action as the Senate Investigations subcommittee headed by Senator McCarthy (R-Wis.) called more witnesses in its public inquiry into the way the files have been handled.

More Sessions Later

McCarthy said this may be the last day of hearings "in this phase" of the inquiry, but that there will be other sessions in a week or so.

McCarthy contends officials of the State Department in the Truman Administration condoned "looting" of the files.

His group heard Thursday that documents which disappeared under strange circumstances were a report on a suspected Communist in the U. S. Embassy in Ecuador and others on male employees of "unusual morals."

Mundt said he thought two days of testimony have shown that "pinks and punks" were protected either through "incredible negligence" or design in handling of the files.

Houston Champion Steer Nets Owner Record \$18,800

An all time high price of \$18,800 was paid by Bill Williams, Houston restaurant man, to Jimmy Wigley, 13, of Goldthwaite Friday for his 1,205-pound Hereford grand champion Houston Fat Stock Show steer.

The previous high was \$16,600, also paid by Williams for last year's grand champion steer.

It was Les Tarrant, wholesale drug man, who made the \$18,700 bid which shoved the price to the new high bracket.

It is the fifth grand champion purchase made by Williams at the show, and the \$18,800 he bid is the highest price ever paid by any individual for a fat steer in the nation, stock show officials said.

The reserve grand champion was owned by Eugene Mote, 19, Tulsa. Edgar Brown, Orange cattleman, bought it for \$6,000—\$1,000 higher than the reserve brought last year. The reserve grand champion record is \$4,400.

Sue White Gets \$6,000

At Fort Worth, the grand champion steer of the 1953 Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock show sold Friday for \$6,000.

Big Spring Special II, owned by Sue White of Big Spring, went to the Amon G. Carter Foundation at this price, which equaled past records. The steer was donated to the Lena Pope Home.

Bidding on the 1,020-pound Hereford champ started at \$500 on a bid by Hotel Texas' Manager Andy Anderson.

The reserve champion steer, also a Hereford, owned by Billy and David Bridgford, Colorado City, sold to Leonard's Department Store for \$3,850.

Nine other champions and reserve champions sold immediately afterward brought a total of \$14,500.

Carl Wevat, 55, a Midland resident 12 years, died at 9:15 p.m. Thursday in a Midland hospital. He suffered a cerebral hemorrhage six weeks ago after being in falling health for two years.

Wevat moved to Midland from Pecos and opened the City Cleaners here. He later established Carl's men's store for tailor-made clothing.

Booster For City

Wevat was a continual Midland booster, serving on Chamber of Commerce committees. He was active in the Everyman's Bible Club, an interdenominational group, and served as its president. Wevat was a member of the American Legion, going overseas in World War I. He took part in the Meuse-Argonne and St. Mihiel offensives.

Born in Bordenstown, N. J., Wevat attended business college at Binghamton, N. Y. The Wevat home here is located at 100 Ridgely Drive.

Survivors include the widow and an uncle, Andrew Wevat, Bordenstown, N. Y.

Honorary pallbearers will include J. C. Barnes, Otto Carrs, George Woodford, George Yannaman, Col. John Perkins, John Braue and H. W. Coker.

On Lincoln's birthday in 1940, Postmaster-General James Farley reopened the replica after 104 years, this time as part of Lincoln's New Salem.

Midland's perplexing traffic situation is in for a thorough going-over, now that the city's first full-time traffic engineer is on the job.

Just what he will do or what he will recommend doing to relieve the traffic problem we do not know, but we do know the situation can be improved to a marked degree with ample thought, study, planning and action.

Surely, a well-trained, experienced and capable traffic engineer is the one to come up with a workable solution.

There are two things, however, we would like to stress. First, the job cannot be done overnight. In fact it may require weeks or even months to study the problem and to plan a workable program.

Second, such a program certainly will require the assistance and full cooperation of many individuals and organizations. Every motorist, in fact, must cooperate willingly for any plan to have a fair test.

The Chamber of Commerce and the downtown merchants also will be called upon for assistance of various kinds.

The city's parking problem must be studied in line with the overall traffic situation, and this study already has been launched.

Drew Pearson says: New Interior chief encounters White House delay re appointments; Supreme Court shows sense of humor; Why Truman named McCarran's man as U. S. attorney for Nevada.

WASHINGTON—Genial new Secretary of the Interior Douglas McKay ran into a White House delay in appointing his top assistants in the Interior Department.

Last week McKay sent a list of names to the White House for appointment as undersecretary of the Interior, assistant secretary and solicitor, etc. They remained at the White House a week, then came back.

Following this, McKay called on President Eisenhower, stood his ground, put up a fight to have his men appointed. To a considerable extent he yielded.

Reported reason for the White House opposition partly was the fact that one name on the list was that of Clarence Davis of Nebraska to be solicitor of the Interior Department.

Butler is the senator who blocked the appointment of ex-Gov. Val Peterson as secretary of the Interior, later to the Agriculture Department, and finally as ambassador to India.

In the end, Eisenhower had to give Peterson an appointment on his own White House staff where he wasn't subject to Senate confirmation.

Another name on the list was that of ex-Congressman Fred Aandahl of North Dakota. Senator Langer of North Dakota was opposed to Aandahl, who ran against him for the Senate and had been scolding in his criticism.

Following this, McKay went to the White House, got an OK of the ex-congressman from North Dakota who had tried to defeat Ike.

However, Secretary McKay was smart enough just before going to the White House to telephone Senator Langer and tactfully wangle a promise that he not oppose Aandahl.

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Reason for the rush was to get action before Congress adjourned. He was so rushed that current U. S. Attorney Miles Pike did not even know he had resigned.

But while Senator McCarran holds the State of Nevada pretty much in his hand, and while he seemed able to twist Attorney General J. Edgar Hoover around his little finger, he was not able to get the White House to produce on the new U. S. attorney for Nevada.

The struggle in most bridge hands is short and sharp, ending after one or two important tricks. In today's hand, however, the struggle continued throughout almost the entire hand.

When West opened the jack of diamonds, Alvin Landy, playing the South hand, put up dummy's ace, dropping his own king. Landy's next brilliant maneuver would not surprise anybody who knows his reputation as one of the finest players in the country.

The purpose of this move was shown clearly at the next trick. Landy led the queen of spades from dummy and discarded a club from his hand.

his own hand. West could have made it easy for declarer by taking his king of spades. It would then be easy for Landy to draw three rounds of trumps ending in dummy, after which dummy's spades would be good for all the tricks needed.

West considered the matter carefully and decided not to take his king of spades. Landy continued with the jack of spades, discarding another club from his own hand, and once again West refused to take his king.

When dummy now led the ten of spades, East threw a monkey wrench into the works by ruffing with the nine of hearts. Landy had to overruff, and now the plan to bring in dummy's spades had to be abandoned.

Another plan easily presented itself. East was now left with only two trumps, while dummy still had three trumps. Declarer could therefore draw trumps in two rounds, leaving one trump in dummy to take care of one of South's clubs.

Roberts, GOP's Oil Can Man, Makes Machine Run Smoothly

WASHINGTON—Out in Kansas where he came from, they call Charles Wesley Roberts, the new Republican National Committee chairman, "an oil can man."

But don't get this wrong. There is no evil connotation meant. What they do mean is that he's a smoothie. He gets things done without friction or fireworks or feudin', fightin' and fussin'.

He has a reputation for being able to bring two opposing political factions together and make them pull as a team. In the last presidential campaign he showed his genius for this by making the new and coltish Citizens-for-Eisenhower group of amateurs work in harness with the plodding, elephantine Old Guard, and vice versa.

Everybody now knows the result. And there you have perhaps the best reason as to why he was chosen unanimously Republican National Committee chairman, to succeed Arthur E. Summerfield.

Wes Roberts is something unusual for a political "boss." The cartoonists never will be able to caricature him as big and beefy, with a high silk hat on his head and a long cigar in his mouth.

Chairman Roberts is about five-feet-10, and he weighs not much more than 150 pounds wringing wet with hard-work perspiration. He is wiry, quarterback type of man. He runs to gray—gray hair, now thinning at the top as befits his 49 years. Gray-blue eyes. He likes gray clothes.

He is extremely quiet. People who worked with him all through the long campaign and the pre-convention primary fight before that say he never once lost his temper. And everyone knows there were plenty of good excuses and reasons justifying a political boss in blowing his top.

That Wes Roberts has survived this last year without a crackup is something of a miracle. He was brought to Washington last January by Kansas Senators Frank Carlson and Harry Darby, as executive director of the Citizens-for-Eisenhower movement.

He has worked day and night ever since. His immediate staff complains protectively that he sat in his office and at his telephone till two and three in the morning and was back again at eight or nine. He ate his meals off a tray at his desk. He lived in the hotels where he made his headquarters and he never left them.

Being a Kansas dry, he never touched hard liquor. But he always had a supply of soft drinks around and he chain-smoked during all his waking hours.

How To Use Faith in Healing

Chapter 11
Is religious faith a factor in healing? Important evidence indicates that it is. There was a time in my own experience when I was not convinced of this, but now I am, and that very definitely. I have seen too many evidences to believe otherwise.

We are learning that faith properly understood and applied is a powerful factor in overcoming disease and establishing health.

Present-day medicine emphasizes psychosomatic factors in healing, thus recognizing the relationship of mental states to bodily health. Modern medical practice realizes and takes into consideration the close connection between how a man thinks and how he feels. Since religion deals with thought and feeling and basic attitudes, it is in a natural way that the science of faith should be important in the healing process.

Harold Sherman, author and playwright, was asked to revise an important radio presentation with the promise that he would be contracted as the permanent writer. After some months of work, he was dismissed and his material used without credit. This resulted in financial difficulty and humiliation.

The injustice ranking in his mind developed into a growing bitterness against the radio executive who had broken faith with him. His hatred made him subject to a physical affliction in the form of mycosis, a fungus growth which attacked the membranes of his throat. The best medical attention was obtained, but something more was required. When he gave up his hate and developed a feeling of forgiveness and understanding, the condition gradually corrected itself. With the aid of medical science and a new mental attitude, he was healed of his affliction.

A Sensible Pattern
A sensible and effective pattern for health and happiness is to utilize the skills and methods of medical science to the fullest possible extent and at the same time apply the wisdom, the experience and the techniques of spiritual science. There is impressive evidence to support the belief that God works through both the practitioner of science, the doctor, and the practitioner of faith, the minister. Many physicians join in this point of view.

In the prevention of sickness and in healing mind and body, do not fail to draw upon one of the greatest resources available to you—the faith that heals. How can you do this when a loved one or you are ill? Following are eight practical suggestions:

1. Follow the advice of a prominent medical school head who said, "In sickness, send for your minister even as you send for your doctor." In other words, believe that spiritual forces as well as medical technique are important in healing.

2. Pray for the doctor. Realize that God uses a trained human instrumentality to aid His healing powers. As one doctor has put it, "We treat the patient and God heals him." Pray, therefore, that the doctor may be an open channel of God's healing grace.

3. Whatever you do, do not become panicky or filled with fear, for if you do, you will send out negative and therefore destructive thoughts to assist him.

4. Remember that God does nothing except by law. Also remember that our little materialistic laws are only fragmentary revelations of the great power flowing through the universe. Spiritual law also governs illness. God has arranged two remedies for all illness. One is healing through natural laws applicable by science, and the other brings healing by spiritual law applicable through faith.

5. Completely surrender your loved one into the hands of God. By your faith you can place him in the flow of Divine power. There is healing there, but for it to be effective the patient must be completely released to the operation of God's will. This is difficult to understand and equally difficult to perform, but it is a fact that if the great desire for the loved one to live is matched with an equally great willingness to relinquish him to God, healing powers are amazingly set in motion.

Spiritual Harmony
It is also important that harmony prevail in the family, that is, spiritual harmony. Remember the emphasis in the scripture, Matthew 18:19: "If two of you shall agree on earth as touching anything that they shall ask, it shall be done for them of my Father which is in Heaven." Apparently disharmony and disease are akin.

7. Form a picture in your mind of the loved one as being well. Visualize him in perfect health. Picture him as radiant with the love and goodness of God. The conscious mind may suggest sickness, even

death, but nine tenths of your mind is in the subconscious. Let the picture of health sink into the subconscious and this powerful part of your mind will send forth radiant health energy. What we believe in the subconscious, we usually get. Unless your faith controls the subconscious, you will never get any good thing, for the subconscious gives back only that which your real thought is. If the real thought is negative, the results will also be negative. If the real thought is positive, you will get positive and healing results.

8. Be perfectly natural. Ask God to heal your loved one. That is what you want with all your heart, so ask Him please to do it, but we suggest that you say PLEASE just once. Thereafter in your prayer, thank Him for His goodness. This affirmative being will help to release deep spiritual power and also joy through reassurance of God's loving care. This joy will sustain you, and remember that joy itself possesses healing power.

Surgical Specialist Joins Staff Of Clinic-Hospital

A surgical specialist, Dr. Jake Shapira, who prefers the ample living space of Midland to the overcrowded city of Houston, joined the staff of Western Clinic-Hospital this week.

Dr. Shapira expressed unqualified optimism on the future of Midland as a West Texas medical center. He predicted that the expanding medical area in northwest Midland—near the Andrews Highway—will eventually attract patients from all parts of West Texas. Western Clinic-Hospital is already planning to move its facilities to the region soon.

He is the sixth doctor to join the staff of Western, which is undergoing an expansion program at present. Dr. Shapira said that he had always wanted to move to a smaller city. He chose Midland because of the ambitious growth and spirit of progress he saw in the people on a recent visit to the city.

He characterized Houston as "too big and too crowded." While practicing surgery in that South Texas city, he estimated that he spent more than three hours each day traveling in making his rounds to four hospitals. In Houston, he also was on the medical teaching staff of Baylor Medical College and the University of Texas post-graduate School of Medicine.

One of his reasons for moving to Midland was to give his children the benefit of healthier living conditions in a smaller city. His wife, Mildred, and the three youngsters, Julie, seven, Michael, four, and Andrew, two months, will arrive in Midland later this month. He was impressed by the advanced educational opportunities of Midland. Dr. Shapira is a native Texan,

born in Madisonville and reared in East Texas. He completed his undergraduate work at the University of Texas Medical School at Galveston, graduating in 1939.

He interned in Binghamton, New York, and saw Army service from 1942 to 1946 as an infantry surgeon and member of a surgical medical team with the 45th Division. He made five combat landings with the outfit, which traveled all over Europe during the war, including Africa, Sicily, Italy, France, and Germany.

He received two years of advanced surgical training in Boston and Houston. He has practiced surgery in Houston since 1947.

Dr. Shapira is a fellow in the American College of Surgeons and a Diplomate of the American Board of Surgery.

Cancer Ends Life Of Emma (Straight Eight) Olliver, 43

HUNTSVILLE — (P) — Emma (Straight Eight) Olliver, 43, first woman to ever occupy a death cell at the Texas penitentiary here, died early Friday of cancer.

Death came at nearby Goree Prison Farm for women about 12:15 a.m.

Prison physicians said the one-time big, strapping negro woman, who weighed 174 pounds and stood five feet, nine inches when admitted to death row in 1951, weighed only 120 pounds at death.

They said she died of cancer of the pancreas after being hospitalized six weeks.

She spent several months in death row awaiting electrocution, but her sentence was later commuted to life imprisonment. She had been convicted and sentenced to death for the slaying of a truck driver at her home town of San Antonio.

Prison authorities said her police record dated back to 1934, that she had been arrested in murder cases at least three times, had been convicted of murder twice and had been arrested on various other charges.

When the big negro woman was brought to Huntsville, she posed a problem for prison officials. No facilities for women ever had been necessary in the death house before.

The problem was solved by building a special cell for Emma, who became a favorite with prison attendants and newspapermen.

Praying Wife Slayer Dies In State's Electric Chair

HUNTSVILLE — (P) — There was speculation among state prison authorities here Friday that Roy Jack Hulien, praying wife slayer, may have cheated the state of its death penalty.

Hulien, convicted of murder for beating his estranged wife to death with a pipe, turned a deep purple early Friday when the first violent shock of electricity hit him in the state's electric chair.

Dr. C. A. Shaw, prison physician, said the Amarillo man may have fainted just before the lethal shock struck him. The purple coloring, the physician explained, was due to blood rushing to the skin.

Other prison authorities, however, believed Hulien may have died before the shock, thus cheating the state of its death penalty. But Dr. Shaw would not verify that opinion.

Hulien, 43, first man assessed the death penalty in Potter County courts, went to the death chamber excited and praying.

"Glory be to God," he shouted. "God be merciful."

Then as he was being strapped into the chair, he said in a loud voice: "I'm going to meet the Lord, my Saviour. I hold no grudges. I

love everybody. I have only joy and peace in my heart."

"May God bless everyone," the excited man said as attendants finished strapping him into the chair.

Repudiates Confession
Hulien was convicted of killing his wife, Mabel Rachel Hulien, in her Amarillo home, April 25, 1951, after he had gone there to attempt a reconciliation. She had filed a suit for divorce.

He carried his appeal of the conviction to the U. S. Supreme Court, but to no avail. He claimed he confessed bludgeoning Mrs. Hulien

with an iron pipe under pressure. State witnesses said he confessed of his own free will.

He requested that he be interred beside the body of his wife in Amarillo, but early Friday no member of his family had arranged to claim the body.

The last member of his family to visit him, he said Thursday, was a brother, J. Hulien of Lubbock, who came to see him in the death house about two weeks ago.

Two United Pentecostal Church ministers, the Revs. G. W. Hamilton, Amarillo, and C. L. Abbott, Lamesa, visited him Thursday.

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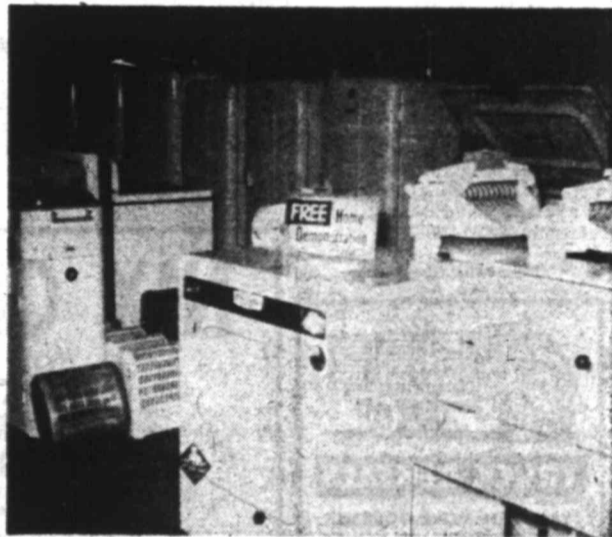
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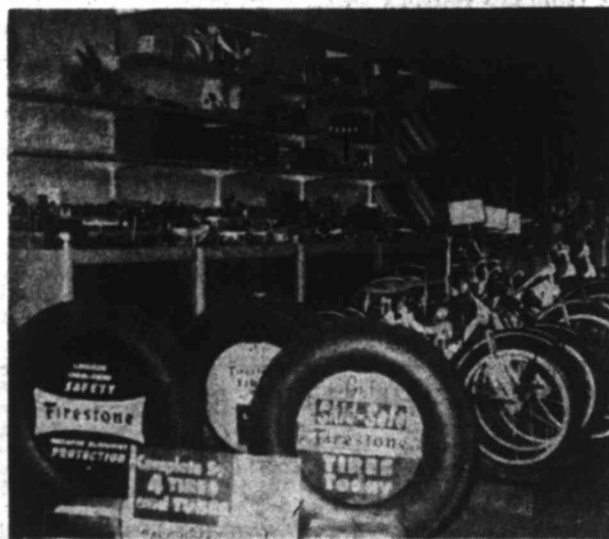

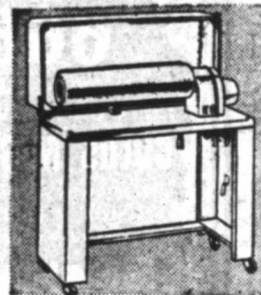

The witness testified that while the two couples ate at the Country Club, Mary Jean excused herself. When she returned, "she had a different expression on her face—one of pleasure and held on tightly to her purse," Mrs. Fleeger said.

The witness said she didn't see whether there was a gun in the purse, but later that night the Fleegers couldn't find the pistol, which Mrs. Fleeger said she'd placed under the car seat after Mary Jean twisted it earlier.

Earlier testimony had established that what appeared as bullet holes were found in the apartment from which the Parsons had moved a week before the shooting.

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CLEAN THE SLATE BY '98—Radical Cure For National Debt Recommended: Pay It

By ED CREECH
WASHINGTON—(AP)—The public debt, it sometimes seems, is like the weather—everybody talks about it but nobody does anything about it. It is, to be sure, a big thing to tackle. It's more than 265 billion dollars now. Before many months, as President Eisenhower cautioned in Monday's State of the Union message, it may push through the present legal limit of 275 billion dollars.

That means you, your wife or husband and even a baby born this morning each owe, on the average, about \$1,766. And the interest keeps piling up all the time.

Eisenhower has proposed one corrective step. Too much of the debt, he said in his message, comes due in too short a time. So the Treasury will spread part of it over longer periods—put more of it in the hands of long-term investors.

Also, he said, by strict economy his Administration will try to keep the debt from going any higher than is absolutely necessary.

Now comes a congressman who would go somewhat farther. Rep. E. Y. Berry of South Dakota says Eisenhower's proposals are fine—but why not go the whole hog? Why not, in fact, take the practically revolutionary steps of paying off the national debt?

In 45 Years
Berry figures the taxpayers could swing it in 45 years, and so he has adopted the slogan: "Clean the slate by '98."

"South Dakota," he told his fellow lawmakers via the Congressional Record, "has demonstrated that such a program is feasible by setting up an amortized debt retirement program, which has now seen a heavy burden of state debt com-

pletely retired."

So Berry, a Republican, a lawyer and newspaper publisher, introduced a resolution calling for the establishment of a federal debt retirement commission to look into the question. Congress' GOP leadership is giving the matter thought.

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CLEAN THE SLATE BY '98—Radical Cure For National Debt Recommended: Pay It

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The public debt, it sometimes seems, is like the weather—everybody talks about it but nobody does anything about it. It is, to be sure, a big thing to tackle. It's more than 265 billion dollars now. Before many months, as President Eisenhower cautioned in Monday's State of the Union message, it may push through the present legal limit of 275 billion dollars.

That means you, your wife or husband and even a baby born this morning each owe, on the average, about \$1,766. And the interest keeps piling up all the time.

Eisenhower has proposed one corrective step. Too much of the debt, he said in his message, comes due in too short a time. So the Treasury will spread part of it over longer periods—put more of it in the hands of long-term investors.

Also, he said, by strict economy his Administration will try to keep the debt from going any higher than is absolutely necessary.

Now comes a congressman who would go somewhat farther. Rep. E. Y. Berry of South Dakota says Eisenhower's proposals are fine—but why not go the whole hog? Why not, in fact, take the practically revolutionary steps of paying off the national debt?

In 45 Years
Berry figures the taxpayers could swing it in 45 years, and so he has adopted the slogan: "Clean the slate by '98."

"South Dakota," he told his fellow lawmakers via the Congressional Record, "has demonstrated that such a program is feasible by setting up an amortized debt retirement program, which has now seen a heavy burden of state debt com-

pletely retired."

So Berry, a Republican, a lawyer and newspaper publisher, introduced a resolution calling for the establishment of a federal debt retirement commission to look into the question. Congress' GOP leadership is giving the matter thought.

Gov. Allan Shivers' plan to rearrange school financing dies not meet TSTA approval.

Shivers' proposal "will seriously handicap" plans to ease the critical classroom shortage, declared TSTA Executive Secretary Charles A. Tennyson.

The governor wants local school districts to pay a bigger share of the minimum foundation program cost than they now are. The minimum program does not include cost of school construction.

"Many plans for new school construction may have to be scrapped if local contributions to the Minimum Foundation Fund are increased," said Tennyson.

His prepared statement was an apparent answer to the first of four articles prepared by Shivers and offered to Texas newspapers. Shivers said he believed the old ratio of 75-25 state-local support of the minimum foundation program ought to be reinstated. That was the percentage when the Glimmer-Alkin School Laws were passed in 1949, but the fixed amount of local contributions—45 million dollars a year—now is only some 21 per cent of the state-and-local total.

Disputes Figures
Tennyson said, "Those who want to rearrange the school financing pattern cite only the figure showing the local schools pay about 20 per cent of the minimum foundation program cost. They fail to cite the cost of current operations and repayment of bonded indebtedness."

When all costs are considered, local schools pay more than 40 per cent of the cost of public education in Texas, he said.

Tennyson also said Shivers' implied fear that local control cannot be maintained unless proper local support of schools is maintained. The governor has said: "I don't want to see any weakening of local control of our public schools. The school is too close to the home to be controlled by anyone besides the homefolks."</

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

Ike's Orders To Navy Open U. S. Psycho-War Offensive

WASHINGTON—(AP)—President Eisenhower already has opened his promised campaign of psychological warfare against the Communists. The first move has been to keep the Reds guessing about the precise mission of the U. S. Seventh Fleet in Far Eastern waters. And in the future, it was learned Friday on good authority, the President can be expected to try to develop psychological warfare into a major part of the hot and cold war against the Communists. "We're not going to telegraph all our punches to the enemy," one source asking anonymity said. "The Reds have held the initiative for years in psychological warfare—and we intend to take it from them." Eisenhower told Congress in his State of the Union message Monday he was issuing instructions which would remove the Seventh Fleet as a "shield" for the Communists of Red China. One effect of such a move would be to clear the way for Chiang Kai-shek's Chinese Nationalist troops to raid the China mainland from Formosa. "But even though Eisenhower said 'I am issuing instructions' to the fleet, not one official word has been said as to whether the order already has been issued or just that the fleet may have been directed to do.

FBI Chief Hoover Blasts 'Cut-Rate Law Enforcement'

WASHINGTON—(AP)—J. Edgar Hoover spoke up Friday for better pay for policemen, saying "cut-rate law enforcement will not work." The FBI director, in an article in the bureau's monthly law enforcement bulletin, said: "One factor which undoubtedly contributes to the prosperity of the criminal element is a police pay scale too low to maintain law enforcement forces at full strength. . . . Unwillingness to provide proper remuneration for the intelligence and effort required in the performance of modern police duties is a form of cut-rate law enforcement and it will not work. "The logical result is a bigger crime bill in the form of murders, robberies and all the other manifold ways in which crime can be expensive. . . ."

Laborer Welded Inside Pipe, Dies

STERLINGTON, LA.—(AP)—Coroner J. T. French of Ouachita Parish returned a preliminary verdict of asphyxiation in the death of a negro laborer who was welded inside a gas pipeline. The body of Ernie Young was found far down the line, indicating he had crawled along the pipe before being overcome. Young went into the pipe Wednesday night to clean it and workers who did not know he was inside sealed the end.

Truman Says Homecoming Greatest Experience Yet

INDEPENDENCE, MO.—(AP)—Harry S. Truman, who spent eight experience-packed years as president, choked with emotion Thursday night at the end of a talk to a home-town audience and said: "There never is and never can be anything like coming back home." The former President spoke at a family-style homecoming dinner attended by 650 neighbors and friends. Truman expressed thanks for the warmth with which he had been received since his return. Until his concluding remark, the ex-President had devoted most of his brief talk to a folksy review of his 30 years in politics and early life in this Western Missouri town of 40,000. He mentioned his decision, which was announced in March of 1952, not to seek reelection. "My mind was made up in 1950," he said. "I don't believe there has been any president or presidential candidate, outside of Lincoln, that has been as thoroughly vilified as I have. But I came through it all without any scars." The 68-year-old former President said that on his train trip home last month after turning over the presidency on January 20 to Republican Dwight D. Eisenhower, he and Mrs. Truman were surprised at the size and good will of the crowds along the way. Like Whistle-Stop Tour "The people turned out to greet us as enthusiastically as if I had been on a whistle-stop tour," he recalled. "And then when we got here at the Missouri Pacific depot there were 8,000 or 10,000 people to meet us. That was the climax. "I want to tell you, no ex-president ever had a homecoming reception like that." Mrs. Truman and daughter, Margaret, also were honored at the dinner. Truman, in mentioning his return to Independence last month, said Mrs. Truman expressed his feelings as well as anyone could. She said of their welcome home: "This is the payoff. This makes it worth everything we have been through."
