Helmerich & Payne To Drill Wildcat In C-S King Area

Helmerich & Payne, Inc. of Tulsa filed application with the Railroad Commission of Texas requesting permission to start drilling at once on a 6,800-foot wildcat in Central-South King County.

The rank wildcat will be dug 330 feet from south and west lines of section 113, block F, H&TC survey and 10 miles south and three miles west of the town Guthrie.

The project is No. 1 Guy M. Gillespie.

West Pecos Tester To Be Deepened To Clear Fork Section

Stanolind Oil & Gas Company filed application with the Railroad Commission of Texas requesting a new destination for No. 1 Pryor, wildcat in West Pecos County.

Now drilling below 4,955 feet in sand and shale, the tester is slated to continue drilling to 7,000 feet for tests of the Clear Fork.

Originally slated for a 3,700-foot bottom, the project was amended to 4,700 feet. After that depth was reached without commercial production being developed, operator decided to continue to 7,000 feet.

Location is 1,980 feet from west and 690 feet from south lines of section 100, block OW, GC&SF survey and eight miles southwest of Fort Stockton.

Skelly Makes Oil In San Andres DST In Central Yoakum

Skelly Oil Company No. 1 Webb, wildcat in Central Yoakum County, developed oil on a drillstem test in the San Andres from 5,168 to 5,250 feet.

Test was open five hours. Gas surfaced in 45 minutes. No gauges or estimates were made on the volume. Recovery was 138 feet of oil, 140 feet of gas-out mud and 150 feet of drilling water.

No formation water developed.

Open flowing bottomhole pressure was 280 pounds. Shut-in pressure after 20 minutes was 2,800 pounds.

More hole was being made.

Location is 330 feet from south and 2,818 feet from east lines of section 475, block D, J. E. Gibson survey and four miles southwest of the town of Plains.

Sharples Wildcat In E-C Andrew Gets More Oil In Strawn

Sharples Oil Corporation and associates No. 1-A Sharples-Means, East-Central Andrews County wildcat has found more oil and gas in the Strawn lime of the Pennsylvanian.

The latest show came during a three-hour drillstem test at 11,000-11,660 feet. Gas surfaced in 40 minutes. Maximum gas volume was at the rate of 41,700 cubic feet per day. Minimum gas volume was at the rate of 35,300 cubic feet per day.

Recovery was 120 feet of oil and gas cut drilling mud which was 20 per cent oil; 90 feet of mud cut which was from 20 to 90 per cent oil, and 270 feet of clean 45.5 gravity oil.

No Signs Of Water

Open flowing bottom hole pressure was between 110 pounds and 160 pounds. Shut-in bottom hole pressure, after 30 minutes was 1,810 pounds. There were no signs of formation water.

The prospect, which is contracted to 14,500 feet to explore the Ellenburger, was drilling below 11,079 feet in lime at last report. This wildcat had topped the Strawn at 10,982 feet at an elevation of 2,089 feet.

On the top of the Strawn it is 51 feet high to the same marker in the discovery well of the Magrutz (Ellenburger) field; four miles to the east.

It ran a drillstem test at 10,962-11,010 feet. The tool was open three hours. Gas surfaced in 27 minutes. The gas volume was at the rate of 50,000 cubic feet per day.

On Previous Test

Recovery was 340 feet of heavily oil and gas cut drilling mud and 20 feet of 43.7 gravity oil.

Open flowing bottom hole pressure was between 100 pounds and 175 pounds. Shut-in bottom hole pressure, after 15 minutes was 670 pounds.

Stay Of Spraberry Shut-In Asked

Oil Man Files Suit In Austin District Court

AUSTIN—(P)—An injunction suit challenging the Railroad Commission's order shutting down the huge Spraberry oil producing area has been filed in 98th District Court.

Arch Rowan, Fort Worth, independent oil operator in the West Texas area, brought suit alleging the commission order is invalid because it discriminates against producers in the area.

Judge Charles O. Betts set hearing on the temporary restraining order asked by Rowan for 9 a.m. Tuesday.

The commission last week ordered Spraberry oil and gas wells shut down to halt what it called wasteful flaring of natural gas.

Rowan said in his petition seeking a temporary restraining order that he has average oil production of 500 barrels daily in the field.

To Last 10 Days

The shutdown was to have become effective April 1. If the temporary restraining order is granted, it would have the effect of nullifying the shutdown order until the lawsuit is resolved.

Temporary restraining orders ordinarily remain in effect 10 days pending further injunction proceedings.

The commission order was written to stop all production in the Spraberry trend area in Midland, Glasscock, Reagan, Upton and Martin Counties. It would have dropped the April oil allowable an additional 85,000 barrels a day. It already had been reduced 119,500 barrels daily.

The suit also requested temporary orders to prevent the shut-down of the field.

Operators Protested

The commission order directed production to "cease completely" in the Spraberry trend until such time as necessary facilities are made available for gathering, marketing and processing of all natural gas from wells in the field. Operators in the area opposed the shutdown, saying they were trying to install gas processing plants and transmission lines as rapidly as money could be invested wisely.

The Railroad Commission said 230,000,000 cubic feet of gas was being flared every day in the Spraberry and that operators have been warned repeatedly it must stop.

Chinese Make New Overture Toward Peace

TOKYO—(P)—China Premier Chou En-Lai Monday night offered a compromise solution to the knotty problem of repatriating Korean war prisoners—the only issue blocking an armistice agreement.

It was the first break in the Reds' previously-unyielding demands that all prisoners be returned.

Chou proposed that both sides return those prisoners who insist on going home and hand over the others to a neutral state "to insure a just solution to the question of repatriation."

He did not propose a neutral state by name, presumably leaving that question to be decided at the armistice site at Panmunjom.

The United Nations walked away from Panmunjom last Fall after telling the Reds to accept the principle of giving prisoners their choice of returning home—or come up with an acceptable solution.

Chou's offer came in a broadcast heard here, over the Communist Peiping radio.

Second Overture

Gen. Mark Clark, UN Far East commander, was not available immediately for comment.

The Reds had made an earlier overture Saturday, accepting a February 22 UN proposal for exchange of sick and wounded war prisoners and asking the truce talks be resumed. The UN has not yet answered the Saturday proposal.

Chou said Monday night:

"Both parties should understand to repatriate immediately after the cessation of hostilities all those prisoners of war . . . who insist upon repatriation and to hand over the remaining prisoners of war to a neutral state so as to insure a just solution to the question of their repatriation."

However, Chou also said:

"We by no means relinquish the

Rain Clouds Ignore Area, Go Eastward

While a squall line brewed thundershowers from Abilene through East Texas Monday, Midland skies continued to be fair with high clouds, although the prospect for Monday night and Tuesday was slightly cooler.

A low temperature of 60 degrees was recorded at the Midland Air Terminal at 9 a.m. Monday with the high for Sunday being 79 degrees.

Partly cloudy and cooler was the prediction for Midland Tuesday.

A small twister hit Robert Lee, 26 miles north of San Angelo, late Sunday night. It tore the roof off a lumber warehouse, causing an estimated \$1,900 damage. There were no injuries. Three-quarters of an inch of rain fell at Robert Lee.

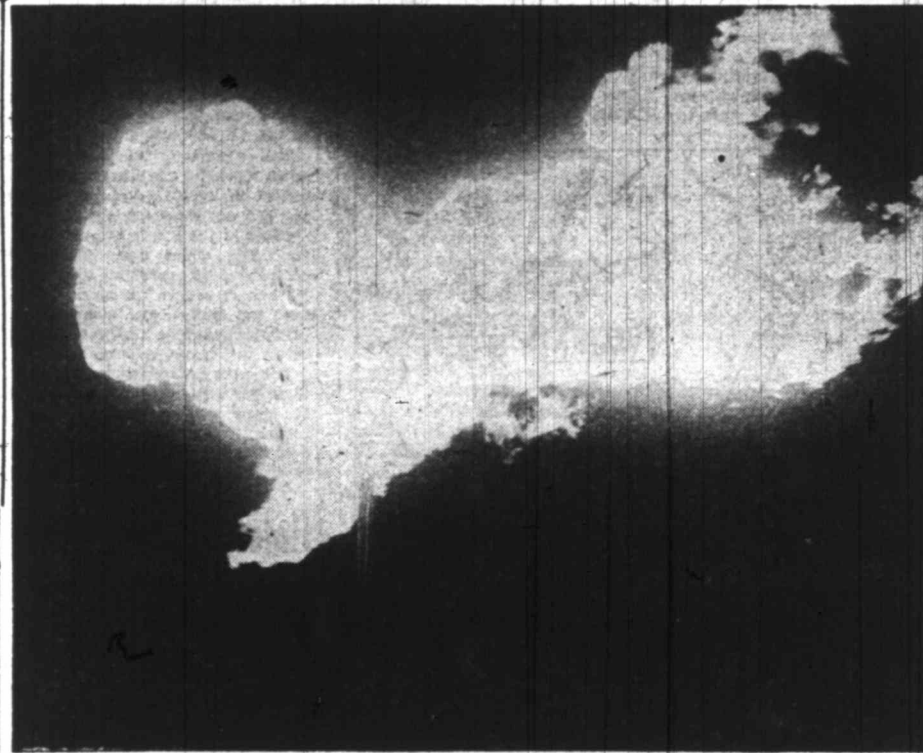
Rain burst out of low-hanging clouds over Dallas and Fort Worth Monday. Earlier thundershowers fell at Abilene and Mineral Wells.

Conditions were right for rain all across the eastern half of the state. Humidity was high and clouds sagged close to earth.

The squall line was a forerunner of a cool front that nosed into the western tip of the state.

More turbulent weather was forecast in Oklahoma. A tornado ripped farm land near Lawton Sunday night, adding to destruction wrought by flash floods and heavy downpours earlier in the evening.

The highway patrol said the twister tore down part of a barn, ripped fences and damaged buildings. No injuries were reported.

Lost Airliner Found Down In Swampland

SALISBURY, SOUTHERN RHODESIA—(P)—A missing Viking airliner with 18 persons aboard was located Monday 80 miles southwest of Dar Es Salaam in Tanganyika at the edge of a region of mangrove swamps. Fate of the 13 passengers, including two women, and the crew of five is unknown.

Information relayed here by natives did not make clear whether the Central African Airways plane had crashed or made a forced landing in the East African swamps.

The plane was enroute from Dar Es Salaam to Salisbury in Nyasaland when it went down.

The plane had been missing since Saturday. Reports received here said Louis Yuckin, stage director for the Covent Garden Opera Company and Sadler's Wells ballet in London, was among those aboard.

London offices of Central African Airways were unable to confirm that Yuckin was aboard the plane. The office said it had no passenger list.

An office spokesman said Royal Air Force planes had dropped supplies at the crash scene. The spokesman added: "There was activity about the plane so it may be presumed if there was a crash there are survivors."

Marines Hold Fast To Outpost; Chinese Launch New Attacks

SEOUL—(P)—South Korean troops threw back a Chinese Red drive on Christmas Hill on the eastern front in a driving snowfall Monday as U. S. Marines dug in firmly on Bloody Outpost Vegas in the West.

Some 300 Reds jabbed 50 yards beyond Allied advance defense lines on a 350-yard front west of Christmas Hill, which is west of Mundung Valley. South Koreans drove them back, killing or wounding 100 Chinese.

Enraptured Marines on smoldering Vegas had won back the outpost at dawn Sunday after being knocked off three times in the Red's bloody Spring feeler drive on the western front last week.

Grimy and weary, the Leathernecks smashed a three-pronged Red drive on Vegas late Sunday and broke up a Red force mauling for another attack Sunday night with a thundering curtain of artillery fire.

In the air, U. S. Sabre jet pilots reported probable destruction of one Communist MIG jet and another damaged.

Teacher Pay, Redistricting Bills Again Shunted Aside

AUSTIN—(P)—Backers of a \$600 a year pay raise to be paid entirely by the state. Another bill rearranges the plan of school financing, placing more of the burden on local districts. It provides a raise of about \$240.

A drive to speed-up congressional redistricting bills also failed by a narrow margin in the House.

Rep. Harold B. Parish, Portland, tried to get the House to instruct the redistricting committee to report in two weeks on grounds the Legislature's session is growing short.

The House voted, 82-42, with Parish, but it was just short of the two-thirds vote necessary for such motion. Redistricting is one of the session's principal issues. No new district has yet been drawn for the state's additional congressman.

Six Airmen Killed, Nine Hurt As B-29 Crashes In Azores

SAVANNAH, GA.—(P)—Six airmen were killed and nine injured in the crash of a Hunter Air Force Base plane in the Azores Sunday afternoon, the public information office of the base announced Monday.

The plane, a B-29 Air Force bomber, fell in flames on takeoff from Lajes Field. Aboard were 11 crewmen and four passengers, all military personnel.

The four-engine ship was returning to Hunter base from a training mission in North Africa and was part of the 57th Bomber Squadron of the 308th Bomb Wing. The crash occurred about 1:30 p.m.

NEW YORK—(P)—The freighter S. S. Henry Stevenson radioed in distress Monday that it was afire in the Atlantic about 530 miles east of New York.

Rutherford Offers Affidavit To Back Charges Against Cox

AUSTIN—(P)—J. T. Rutherford, Odessa, offered a notarized statement of a former State Health Department employe Monday to back up Rutherford's charge of mis-use of state equipment and personnel by Health Officer George W. Cox.

The statement, signed by Hadley Johnson, was submitted as the State Board of Health began investigation of Rutherford's charges against Dr. Cox and others in the health department.

Rutherford refused to name other health department employes who, he said, have provided him information purporting to back claims that the health department has been operated improperly by the 73-year-old Dr. Cox.

Attorney General John Ben Shepperd asked if Rutherford would be satisfied with a guarantee by the board that no retaliatory action would be taken against employes called to testify.

Rutherford said he would not.

"Mr. Johnson has already been called up at night, disturbed and cursed. For me to say that some people would be fair would be stretching the truth out of shape," said Rutherford.

Names withheld

Several board members insisted employes would have nothing to fear if they testified, but Rutherford refused to reveal any names except Johnson's.

The senator said he would be willing to reveal names and have witnesses called by the attorney general, if Shepperd would keep the names confidential.

Shepperd said he was uncertain how such information could be put to use if the board, which is directing the investigation, could not have access to the witnesses' testimony.

Cox was scheduled to testify after Johnson's appearance before the board.

AUSTIN—(P)—The Senate Monday approved a measure to provide four-year terms for precinct, county and district offices.

WASHINGTON—(P)—Legislation to establish the coastal states' title to the oil-rich submerged lands off their shores was called up for House debate Monday with passage, probably on Wednesday, a virtual certainty.

MOSCOW—(P)—The British Foreign Office Monday recalled Ambassador Sir Alvary Gascoigne immediately for what was described as urgent consultation.

ROME—(P)—A Communist call for a 16-hour nationwide strike met with only scant success Monday as the Reds, already out-voted and out-slugged in a riotous weekend legislative session, sought to protest Premier Alcide De Gasperi's new election law.

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U. S. Defense Net Called Inadequate

PHILADELPHIA—(AP)—The head of the federal civil defense organization says seven out of 10 Russian planes could penetrate our defense net to drop atomic bombs.

Val Peterson, interviewed on a television show, said, "They (the Russians) can put one or more atomic bombs in every high priority industrial area in America at one time."

Peterson said U. S. civil defense probably would not be "adequate" until 1955.

Three Agencies Probe Mercy Home Fire In Which 33 Died

LARGO, FLA.—(AP)—Three agencies are investigating a wind-swept fire that destroyed a one-story frame nursing home Sunday, taking the lives of 32 elderly patients and a valiant nurse who tried to save them.

Investigations were started Monday by the state fire marshal, the State Hotel Commission and Sheriff Sid Saunders.

Twenty-five patients were saved as neighbors turned out barefooted and in night clothes to back up the rescue efforts of the owners, Mr. and Mrs. W. L. Littlefield.

The Littlefields were sleeping in the home with the patients. Littlefield said he was awakened by the screams of a woman. He tried to fight the flames with fire extinguishers, saw he was losing, and began waking up patients and trying to get them out.

Mrs. Littlefield ran outside, screaming for help, and collapsed with a heart seizure. She is in serious condition.

"One man was sound asleep and he clung to the door and fought me while I tried to get him out," said Mrs. Aletha Herrin, who lives across the road.

"They were just like children—they didn't want to be removed from their warm beds," said another neighbor, T. R. Hasty, who carried old people out till he was almost cut off by the raging flames.

Mrs. Gertrude Warnick, 55, a nurse, brought one woman out, returned to the flame-swept building and did not come out again.

Cause of the fire remained a mystery. Fire Chief Peter Treola of Clearwater said preliminary checks led him to believe the blaze started near the kitchen and supply room.

The patients ranged in age from 45 to 98, with most of them above 65. Many were old age pensioners, getting a little additional welfare help from Pinell County. Others were mental cases.

Often-Jailed Stage Author-Actor Placed In Psychiatric Ward

NEW YORK—(AP)—Author-actor-director Elliott Nugent was placed in the Bellevue Hospital psychiatric ward early Monday, a hospital spokesman said.

The 54-year-old Nugent became ill Sunday night at his club, The Lamb, and was escorted by police and his physician, Dr. Hyman Weitzman, to Roosevelt Hospital.

No diagnosis was made available immediately. The Bellevue spokesman said only that Nugent had been transferred there for observation.

Just 10 days ago Nugent was booked in Los Angeles on a charge of being intoxicated. Five days previously, on March 15, he was arrested twice in one day: once on a charge of driving while drunk and later on a charge of drinking in public view.

Nugent was co-author and star of the plays "The Poor Nut" and "The Male Animal," and co-star of the play, "The Voice of the Turtle."

Miss Booth received her third Antoinette Perry Award, known as a "Tony," Sunday night for the outstanding dramatic performance by an actress. She was honored for her role in "The Time of the Cuckoo."

NEW YORK—(AP)—Shirley Booth now has a third Broadway "Tony" award to go with the Hollywood "Oscar" she won recently.

CLIFTON, N. J.—(AP)—A tavern and hotel owner has admitted killing his five-year-old son because he could "not stand to see him suffer any longer" from cerebral palsy.

Police arrested the father, Albert J. Sell, 44, when they found him in a parked car at a deserted spot near a road Sunday. The body of the black-haired, brown-eyed boy was in the back.

"I shot my boy. He's in the back seat there. I knew the police would find me," Sell was quoted as saying to the officers. Sell was arraigned Monday on a murder charge.

The boy, Albert, Jr., had been shot through the head. A victim of cerebral palsy since birth, the boy never had been able to talk and had difficulty walking.

Sell, according to police, said he didn't want to see his son suffer. He also was quoted as saying he believed his himself was in bad health and didn't have much longer to live—and that he didn't want his wife, herself in a delicate health, to be burdened with the boy's care.

He kept an all-night vigil with his son's body in the car.

Passaic County Prosecutor Donald Collier said the boy apparently was killed Saturday night with one shot through the head. An Army carbine was found in the car.

Film Actress Tells Of Jewel Robbery

LONDON—(AP)—Hollywood actress Yvonne de Carlo says a burglar took a \$10,000 emerald necklace, other jewels and travelers checks from her apartment Sunday afternoon.

She told police she returned to her third-floor flat after a brief absence and found her jewel case missing from her dressing table.

Nothing else was disturbed and there was no indication how the intruder entered. Total value of the missing gems was not announced.

The Washington Merry-Go-Round

Drew Pearson says: GOP Justice Department will prosecute GOP congressman; California justice chief rules against California Congressman Bramblett; Kickback charges were revealed by this column last year.

WASHINGTON—The new Republican Justice Department has started out by not pulling any punches regarding the prosecution of Republicans, including Republican congressmen.

As a result, Congressman Ernest Bramblett, Republican of Pacific Grove, 11th District of California, faces grand jury action on charges made by this column last fall of taking kickbacks from his office staff.

The grand jury action is being ordered by another California Republican, Warren Olney, now assistant attorney general in charge of the criminal division, who as counsel for the California Crime Commission did more than any other man to clean up crime in that state.

Ordinarily, Justice Department attorneys do not like to tangle with congressmen, let alone prosecute them. This writer supplied most of the evidence to the Justice Department in the case of ex-Congressman Farnell Thomas of New Jersey before it prosecuted, also part of the evidence regarding ex-Congressman Andrew May of Kentucky, and published the original kickback information regarding Congressman Walter Brehm of Ohio. All were convicted.

In the case of Bramblett, this column reported last fall that Mrs. Margaret Swanson, listed as working on the congressman's payroll from September, 1949, to January, 1951, never worked in his office. She drew the top salary in his office, \$4,700, but did not work for the congressman either in Washington or in his home district in California.

Pauley's Private Island
There's a political paradox that Harry Truman may not realize the fact that he's chosen Coconut Island, the private island of Olan Ed Pauley, for his Hawaiian vacation.

Pauley always has posed as the great political promoter of Harry S. Truman. And it's true that at the Chicago convention of 1944, it was Big Ed who ran back and forth from the convention floor to a private office under the speakers' platform handling key delegates to switch from Wallace to Truman.

By dawn, almost 40,000 persons had passed the candlelit castrafaque, resplendent in its purple drapings and silver pall.

So they told Truman on the idea of appointing O'Dwyer to this key post. That's the inside story of how O'Dwyer went to Mexico—where he's been ever since—a story, incidentally, which the ex-president probably does not know even today as he vacations on Pauley's private island.

JACOBY ON BRIDGE

One of the important things to learn about bridge is that weak defensive bids seldom pay. When you enter the auction with a silent partner against two bidding opponents, you offer them a bidder's choice.

They can either double you or continue with their own bidding, whichever seems more profitable. The best you can get is an even break.

Even famous experts sometimes ignore this fundamental rule of bidding, only to discover that nobody can make tricks out of thin air. In today's hand, a member of

the British Women's Team, which won the European Championship three years in a row, learned her lesson the hard way.

When presented with the bidder's choice, Ruth Sherman doubled her spade on the West cards. Her partner, Mrs. Edith Kemp, was perfectly happy to defend against one spade, and South had to take her punishment.

Miss Sherman opened the king of clubs, and switched to the king of diamonds, forcing out dummy's ace. Declarer took a trump finesse, losing to West's queen, after which West washed the queen of diamonds and gave her partner a diamond ruff.

East now took two top hearts and gave her partner a heart ruff. After some thought, Miss Sherman now led a fourth diamond, and East ruffed with the eight.

Declarer wisely discarded her remaining club, but this did not help since East led another heart through South had to ruff with the jack to shut out an overruff. Ruth Sherman thereupon discarded, and was thus assured of two more trump tricks for a four-trick set.

East and West could have made a game at no-trump with a correct guess in diamonds, but game was not reached actually at the other table in this team match. The penalty of 700 points was therefore an important swing.

CARD Sense

North-South: 1 Heart 3 Spades 4 Spades Pass. East-South: 1 Heart 3 Spades 4 Spades Pass. You, South, hold: Spades J-7-6-3-2, Hearts K-J-3, Diamonds A-6-3, Clubs A-5. What do you do?

A—Bid six spades. You are surely interested in a slam. You are not concerned about ace, since you have two yourself and your partner's bidding surely shows at least one. There is little value in using the Blackwood Convention, since you will never be sure enough about absolutely solid trumps to bid a grand slam.

With a big smile, Wilson said: "If I was sure of that, I might be in favor of knocking it off."

Seriously, however, Wilson seems to be in love with his job. It is a challenge for the engineer in him to build something new. He is at it early and late—from before 8 o'clock in the morning sometimes, to after 8 o'clock at night.

Also, he and Mrs. Wilson seem to be getting their names and faces in the society columns more regularly than any of the other Cabinet members. Write in, black tie or come as you are in your business clothes, "Engine Charley" manages to his and enjoy a lot of Washington functions. Detroit never could have been like this.

"What—about ours?" he said, knowing that she was sheltering him still, his fear suddenly dimming.

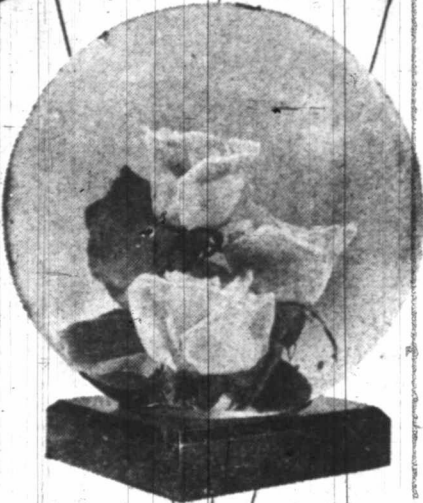


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Woman Head Of Cowmen's Group Once Produced Near-Riot In Eastern College

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M. —(AP)— A woman of the West who slept at an Eastern women's college with a pistol under her pillow took over Monday as boss of a tough, realistic cowman's organization.

Mrs. Linda Mitchell Lambert was elected president of the New Mexico Hereford Growers Association, a group devoted to the production of registered cattle.

New Mexico ranchmen say that never before to their knowledge has a woman headed such an organization.

Mrs. Lambert, of Mosquero, N. M., heads an association which, with 250 members, is one of the nation's largest organizations of pure-bred cattle growers.

She insists it's corny but true that she learned to ride about the time she learned to walk and started shooting a pistol almost as soon.

Born and reared on the famous Tequesquite Ranch in Northwestern New Mexico, Mrs. Lambert says

she is 45 and "not ashamed of it."

"For years she operated by herself—and later with her son-in-law and daughter—her own spread, the Triangle Ranch of some 8,000 acres."

Her father was T. E. Mitchell, himself widely known in ranching circles. Her brother, Albert, is New Mexico Republican national committeeman and a member of the Department of Agriculture Advisory Committee.

Floyd Hill Marked On FBI List Of 10 Most Wanted Men

WASHINGTON —(AP)— The FBI Monday put Floyd Allen Hill, Southwestern bad man, on its list of 10 most wanted fugitives.

Hill, 40, twice an inmate of Alcatraz, currently is wanted for paroled participation in a \$248,000 robbery, carried out in a fashionable Fort Worth motel last October.

Arrested and indicted after that robbery, Hill helped to lead a violent mass break of prisoners from Fort Worth's Tarrant County jail on February 18. Ten men fought their way out of the jail.

In the motel robbery, the victims were two representatives of the deposed regime in Cuba. The FBI said the Cubans were in Fort Worth with a quarter million dollars in cash to negotiate an arms purchase, and were tricked into an interview with the robbers, one of whom posed as a spokesman for a group desiring to supply the weapons.

The Cubans were tied up in their hotel room at machine-gun point and the bandits departed with virtually all their cash.

Half Of Loot
A few weeks later, Fort Worth police arrested Hill in a wooded ravine near Azle, Texas. The officers found nearby a buried gallon vacuum jug holding \$128,000.

A native of Fort Worth, Hill has a criminal record dating back to age 19 and has done time in numerous prisons in the Southwest.

He has a large build, weighs around 192 pounds and is six feet two inches tall. His dark brown hair is turning grey, and he has a cut scar in the center of his forehead.

He was put on the "most wanted" list as a replacement for Robert Benton Methus, southeastern states robber who was caught at Dason, La., March 19.

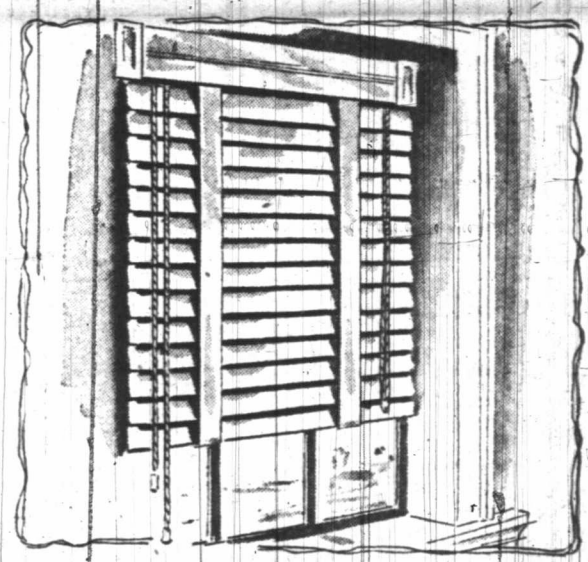

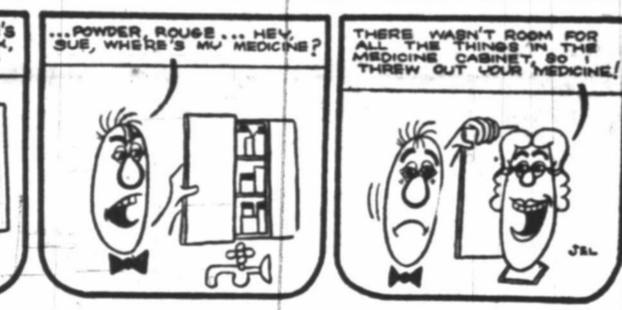

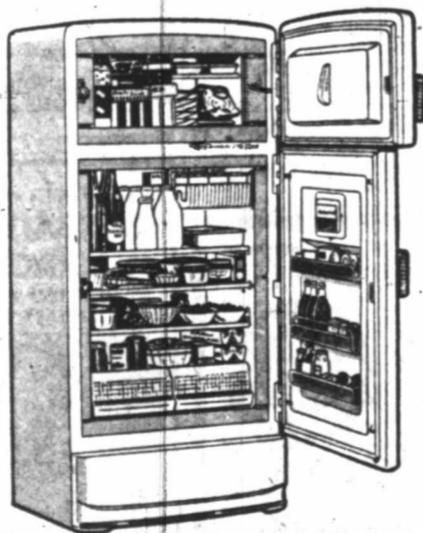

Full Moon May Lure London Sadist Into Attacking No. 8

LONDON — (AP) — Urgent new warnings went out Monday to all Britain's police that London's sex-crazed stranger may strike again at Monday night's full moon. Already investigators had found the remains of six victims—all women—and what may be the shattered skull of a seventh.
They pursued a theory that the killer at the time of the full moon goes berserk, entices the women into some secluded place, strangles them and assaults them sexually.
Baffled Scotland Yard experts ordered the nation-wide search for the killer redoubled. They also ordered a speedup in the dismantling of the dinky West London tenement house where the victims were found.
The remains of two bodies and possibly of a third were dug out of the tiny garden of the Notting Hill horror house during the weekend. Another was found under the floor boards of the ground floor apartment and three more, believed the killer's most recent victims, had been hidden in a paper-over alcove.
Police speculated that the murderer used to above as a halfway house to store the bodies until he could bury them. For that reason, they said, more corpses still may be around the house or in the garden.
One of Britain's biggest police nets was out for John Reginald Christie, 55-year-old trucking clerk who had rented the murder flat for a number of years. His wife was among the victims.
The 10-year-old youth was killed when an unidentified type of gun projectile, with which he was believed to have been playing, exploded in the garage of the Stephens residence. Visitors Say President Due To Trim Foreign Aid Budget

WASHINGTON —(AP)— President Eisenhower was reported by congressional leaders Monday to be planning a cut in foreign aid spending.

Senate Republican Leader Taft (Ohio) and House Speaker Martin (R-Mass.) said there has been no determination yet on the amount of the cut, but that there definitely will be a reduction from the \$7,500,000,000 proposed by the Truman Administration for foreign aid in the fiscal year beginning next July 1.

Taft and Martin held a news

conference immediately after their weekly meeting with Eisenhower.

Taft said Mutual Security Director Harold E. Stassen is having a study made to find out whether 10 billion dollars in foreign aid carry-over funds can be cut.

Stassen sat in with the congressional leaders at their conference with Eisenhower.

Taft and Martin also announced: 1. The President would send to Congress later in the day a special message asking—creating a commission to study federal-state relations on such matters as taxes, grants in aid and social security.

Adjournment Set 2. The President will sign later this week an executive order to strip civil services protection from several hundred federal government policy-making officials appointed by Democratic Administrations.

3. Agreement was reached with

Eisenhower to fix July 4 as the target date for adjournment of Congress. Taft said Congress in any event "positively" will adjourn by August 1.

The leaders informed the President that both the House and the Senate plan to start debate this week on legislation to give the states title to oil-rich submerged coastal lands.

Hawaiian Statehood Taft predicted the coastal lands bills will be enacted.

Taft also announced that after the Senate completes debate on the submerged lands measure it will take up a bill to extend the Defense Production Act, scheduled to expire May 1.

When that measure is out of the way, Taft said, the Senate will take up Hawaiian statehood and extension of the Reciprocal Trade Act in that order.

Stassen Accuses McCarthy in 'Deal' On Greek Shipping

WASHINGTON —(AP)— Harold E. Stassen, Mutual Security director, Monday accused Senator McCarthy (R-Wis.) and the Senate investigations subcommittee of "undermining" the work of executive agencies seeking to cut off trade between the West and Iron Curtain areas.

"You are in effect undermining and are harmful to our objective," Stassen told McCarthy to his face at a televised hearing of McCarthy's subcommittee.

There was a sharp edge in Stassen's voice as he spoke.

Stassen was referring to McCarthy's announcement Saturday that the subcommittee staff had negotiated an agreement with Greek owners of 242 ships that they would break off all trade with North Korea and Communist China.

The State Department announced Monday that Greece already has put into effect a new order prohibiting Greek-flag ships from trading with the Communists.

(Continued From Page One) principle of release and repatriation of war prisoners without delay after the cessation of hostilities. . . .

"Nor do we acknowledge the assertion of the United Nations Command that there are among the prisoners of war individuals who allegedly refuse repatriation."

Chou said the Chinese and North Korean Reds are taking this step to solve the war only because this one item blocks an armistice.

Chou's plan is similar to the Indian proposal to end the war which was submitted in the United Nations last Fall and was promptly and sharply rejected by the two warring Communist nations and Russia.

Peace in Far East

In his statement Monday night, Chou said:

"It is only because the termination of the bloody war in Korea and the peaceful settlement of the Korean question is bound up with the question of the peace and security of the people of the Far East and the world that we take this new step x x x"

He kept some sting in his words—although not as much as the usual Red invective—as he referred to "those captured personnel of our side, who under the intimidation and oppression of the opposite side, are filled with apprehensions and are afraid to return home."

He said the time is ripe for settling the POW question and ending the fighting in Korea.

Time Ripe For Settlement

The broadcast quoted Chou: "A reasonable settlement of the question of exchanging sick and injured wounded prisoners of war clearly has a very significant bearing upon the smooth settlement of the entire question of prisoners of war."

Chou said, "It is, therefore, our view that the time should be considered ripe for settling the entire question of prisoners of war in order to ensure the cessation of hostilities in Korea and to conclude the armistice agreement."

The Peiping broadcast of Chou's remarks amounted to a restatement of Saturday's mild, courteous acceptance of the February 22 UN proposal.

Chou said the opposing sides should sit down again immediately at the armistice table and try to work out an armistice.

The UN has been studying cautiously the Red acceptance and has given no indication of when it will answer.

Amateurs Enthral Bullfight Audience

JUAREZ —(AP)— Seldom has the historic old Plaza de Toros seen anything like it: The bulls were brave, the matadors likewise, and

the fans even more so. Together they staged quite a ball.

And they raised about 19,000 pesos (\$1,800) to buy windows for the Chapel of the Little Jesus, a small adobe chapel on the outskirts of this old border city.

The bulls were the usual ferocious, range-bred animals used in Juarez' colorful bullfights. They paved the ground, bellowed and charged in the best tradition.

But the five matadors from El Paso, were strictly novices. At times it appeared the bulls would be the amateurs made out all right.

And the fans were so pleased that at the end of the show, dozens jumped into the ring to bait an angry giant released as an "open bull"—fair game for all comers. One fan was knocked out.

The whole thing started when the El Paso group offered to fight for funds for the little Catholic church which they and other residents of Juarez and El Paso have been building since 1945.

Most Shakes Up

Panchito Reyes, cashier in a department store and most experienced of the bullfighters, opened the show. He killed his bull and won an ear—the mark of a good fight—but not before he was tossed into the fence surrounding the ring.

Here's how his mates made out: Al Darnell, magician: Magic wouldn't work and he was sent to the showers after trying for half an hour to kill his bull. Substitute Charles Scanlon polished off the animal after two attempts.

Enrique Ariola, clothing factory mechanic: Killed his bull with only minor trouble.

Richard Evans, negro veteran of the Navy: Got bounced about but made his kill.
