

Friona's July 4 Fireworks, **Park Festivities Canceled**

Blame it on El Nino or just bad luck. Either way, Friona fire and city officials had to cancel plans for the July 4 celebration in City Park.

In addition to dry conditions and fire danger from the fireworks, Lions Club members decided that the extreme heat would prohibit residents from attending. The Lions had planned to serve hamburgers beginning at 5:30 p.m.

The city-planned Health Fair and all other booths and events were also canceled. With better luck, plans for a whopping Maize Days celebration in September are underway.

Residents are also reminded that city ordinance Section 13-25 specifies a fine of not less than \$25 nor more than \$200 for shooting fireworks in the city limits.

Parents of minor children under 14-years who permit or allow their children to discharge fireworks are subject to the same fines.

The ordinance also prohibits fireworks within 5,000 feet of the city limits.

WEATHER HAS SURE been a big topic the past several months--even the past several years.

This year, there have been devastating floods in the midwest, too much rain on the West Coast, which has caused mudslides, with loss of homes and lives.

Then there have been thou-

sands of fires in Mexico, which caused smoke to drift as far north as our own area, unusually bad fires in Florida, of all places, and tornadoes, which shifted somewhat east of what has usually been known as "Tornado Alley."

Our particular area has been reeling under the throes of a bad drought, which is culminating with more back-to-back 100-degree days than has been the case for many years.

In fact, practically the entire state of Texas is suffering from lack of rain, which has already caused failure of cotton and grain crops in south-central Texas. I visited by 'phone with a publisher in Rosebud, which is just south of Waco, and he indicated that most farmers in his area would go without a harvest this year.

We would be in the same boat here, were it not for irrigation, and it's worrisome that the farmers are having to pump so much precious water just to make one year's crop.

Scientists and weather experts have attempted to explain this year's most unusual weather as a side-affect of "El Nino," which warmed the waters of the Pacific ocean to a higher degree than usual, and set most of the above-described weather phenoms in action.

They say that El Nino is moving out, but that "La Nina," its counterpart, is next. I'm not sure what kinds of things La Nina will bring. Who knows--it may be earthquakes and/or volcanoes.

It hasn't been too many years since Mt. St. Helens, which had been a dormant volcano in Washington state, came to life after hundreds of years, and caused much destruction and death in that area.

California has experienced some bad earthquakes within the last several years, none of which were as bad as the one that hit the lower Mississippi River area in the early 1800s, revamping the river's path and creating Reelfoot Lake in northwestern Tennessee. Some of my ancestors had property in an area that is now under about 40 feet of water.

In the past, when Friona has faced a prolonged drought and a pair of months with high temperatures like we've just had, residents would probably have been faced with water rationing.

However, city officials haven't had to resort to that practice so far this summer, and it's thanks to the three "new" wells that have been brought "on line" since the last big water crunch, which was in 1996. Rationing had to be invoked that time.

The three wells were added to the system in late '96. The city now has 13 wells in its system.

City fathers proved to be right on target when they bought property north of town for its water. That was in 1980, and has proven its worth considerably.

Frionans have been using from 1.5 million to two million gallons of water per day--about the highest ever.

"The only time we have been threatened was when we experienced the power outage a couple of weeks ago. Our overhead storage tower, which has a capacity of 200,000 gallons, droped to an extremely low level, and this affected water pressure. Once the power was restored, the pressure came back up," said City Manager Paula Wilson.

The city official said that the constant running of the wells has caused maintenance to be virtually a fulltime job. Cost of water production has also jumped up. The city's electric bill has made a

The month of June ended with a string of 100-degree readings--eight consecutive days--and became Friona's hottest June in at least eight years.

The highest reading was 105 degrees at the city's official weather station, and this occurred both Saturday and Sunday, June 27-28. However, this wasn't a record, since the mercury climbed to 108 on June 25, 1990. June of '90 was also a hot month locally.

However, the string of eight straight days of 100-degree temps or more eclipsed the 1990 streak, which wound up with five straight days from June 25-29. Ironically, the latest streak of eight days also ended on June 29.



We are about to enter the 21st century of our own manmade calendar, and we'd like to think we have control over our lives and property.

Truth of the matter is that our earth is a "still evolving planet." When you see news blips about bad earthquakes and volcanoes in third-world counties, you need to realize that these things have been going on for hundreds of thousands of years.

We have built cities along fault lines, or in the shadow of long-dormant volcanoes, on the cliffs of Southern California, or on the banks of the large Midwestern rivers, and when a flood, earthquake or volcano erupts, we think it's "bad luck."

As a matter of fact, these things have been happening for millions of years on this old planet. They happened before there were any structures built on top of them, and they'll probably continue to happen long into the future.

Mankind's time on planet earth is like the blink of an eye for earth's history, and we're not likely to stop, or even divert many of these continuing forces of nature.

As Oscar Madison told Felix Unger in one of the old "Odd Couple" TV episodes: "The world is a sloppy place, and it dosen't like for people to try to clean it up."

Having registered a pair of 102-degree readings on June 1 and 2 gave the city ten days of the month with 100+ readings, one less day than June of 1990.


The past month's high temperatures contrasts with 1997, when the area never reached the 100-degree mark all summer. In fact, four of the years of the 10-year period ending in 1997 failed to produce a 100-degree reading.

The eight-day hot streak began with readings of 100 degrees on both June 22 and 23. The mercury escalated as follows: June 24: 101; June 25: 101; June 26: 102; June 27: 105; June 28: 105 and June 30: 100.

In June of 1990, the hot readings included June 6: 103; June 7: 101; June 8: 100; June 9: 102; June 19: 100; June 20: 101; June 25: 108; June 26: 103; June 27: 103; June 28: 101 and June 20: 100.

Of the 27 days since 1988 that have produced high temperatures of 100 degrees or over, 22 have occurred in June. Four were in July, and only one--August 19 of 1994--was in August.



Setting as good an example as we can would be a good start.






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

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Drought Conditions Affect '98 Cotton Crop

Predicting the size of the 1998 High Plains cotton crop so far, the potential exists for 1998 High Plains cotton crop has been no easy task. This year everything hinges on the amount of acreage that is eventually lost because of extreme drought conditions which have so far dictated the course of the 1998 crop. After conversations with USDA Risk Management Agency personnel. PCG

Agency personnel, PCG estimates 1.25 million acres estimates 1.25 million acres of dryland cotton planted in the region has already been released by Federal Crop Insurance as of June 26. That means as much as 35 percent of the total cotton

acreage expected to be planted on the High Plains this year has already been lost and more acres could follow. This is a big change from the 1997 High Plains

cotton crop. Final figures for the 1997 crop show total production for the area totaled a healthy 3.415 million bales from 3.3 million harvested acres. This translates to an overall average yield of 496 pounds per acre harvested. Acreage abandonment for the 1997 crop was seven percent.

Growers in a number of High Plains counties had another weapon added to their arsenal this week with the approval of Section 18 exemptions allowing the use of Pirate and Confirm for beet

armyworm control. Although no significant

problems to flare later in the season as cotton matures.

Additional information Additional information about specific aspects of the Section 18 for Pirate and Confirm can be obtained from the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.



Owners Of Pets Should Take **Extra Precautions**

With temperatures reaching past 100 degrees in the Panhandle, pet owners should take extra care in ensuring that their pets are safe from the blazing heat, according to Janice Fielding, executive director of the Amarillo Humane Society.

Providing pets with plenty of fresh water and open shade are the most important things pet owners can do to pretect their pets, she said.

"If you can keep them inside when it's really hot, that's better," Fielding said.

But for people who cannot let their pets indoors, they need to keep that water dish full and change it frequently, she said.

"A lot of people will stick out the water for two or three days," Fielding said. "On a really hot day, a small, shallow container will get hot really fast."

Pets also need access to a shaded area open to a breeze, she said. They should not be put in sheds.

Putting the water dish in the shade will help keep the water cool.

And that cool water is essential in preventing heat exhaustion and heat stroke in pets, according to Amarillo veterinarian Patricia Chase.

"Dogs and cats don't sweat. . so the only way they have to cool

She was a member of the First Baptist Church of Friona. She lived in Friona since 1954 moving from Amarillo. She was a homemaker.



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School Net Makes Its Debut Locally

unavoidable. It's something we all have in common. And it is often conversational. We all wonder what it will do next. Sometimes it's nice, but

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it can also change the next minute with little notice. Now, thanks to KVII-TV, students will be able to see students will be able to see the weather, record it, learn from it and study the weather in locations such as the Texas Panhandle, Eas-tern New Mexico, the Oklahoma Panhandle and Southern Kansas. It's all part of School Net. School Net debuted in five Amarillo/Canyon schools in early May. Now, KVII-TV brings it to Friona. So what is School Net and how does it work? Each school partici-pating receives a complete weather station that includes

weather station that includes a rain gauge, anemometer, wind vane and a temperature and humidity sensor.

Computers link the wea-ther stations to the Internet. The computer transmits the weather data from the school's weather station to KVII-TV. The Storm Search 7 WeatherCenter stores the information for use in weathercasts.

Each school receives a workbook for different teaching levels from elementary to high school students. The workbook has lessons including barometric pressure, dew point, relative humidity and many more weather related lessons for students to learn.





coating eliminates distracting reflections from streetlights and oncoming cars. But it also has some side benefits. For one, it eliminates the reflection that people see when they look at you. Instead of seeing a reflective white, shiny lens, they see clearly through to your eyes. Secondly, your vision improves because more light reaches your eye rather than bouncing off reflections -- such as TVs and computer screens. The lenses also look thinner with the anti-reflective coating

If you have a pair of glasses already that you'd like to add the antireflective coating to, you certainly can--as long as they're not too old (no more than a year).

To clean glasses with an anti-reflective coating, simply wash in fresh water with a mild liquid soap (dishwashing soap is fine) and dry with a facial tissue.
