Mr. Rutledge had a hound puppy he had arranged to have kept on a plantation, but after driving ten miles in a buggy found there was no one at home. Rode With Pickett.

As furnishing some valuable testimony on the question as to Pickett's leading that famous charge at Gettysburg on horseback, and as to the others who rode with him, Capt. P. J. White of Richmond, Va., sends this letter from his old major, Edmund Berkeley, of the 8th Virginia Regiment, Garrett's Brigade, Pickett's Division, who wrote from Haymarket Va., under date of November 15, 1915, which says:

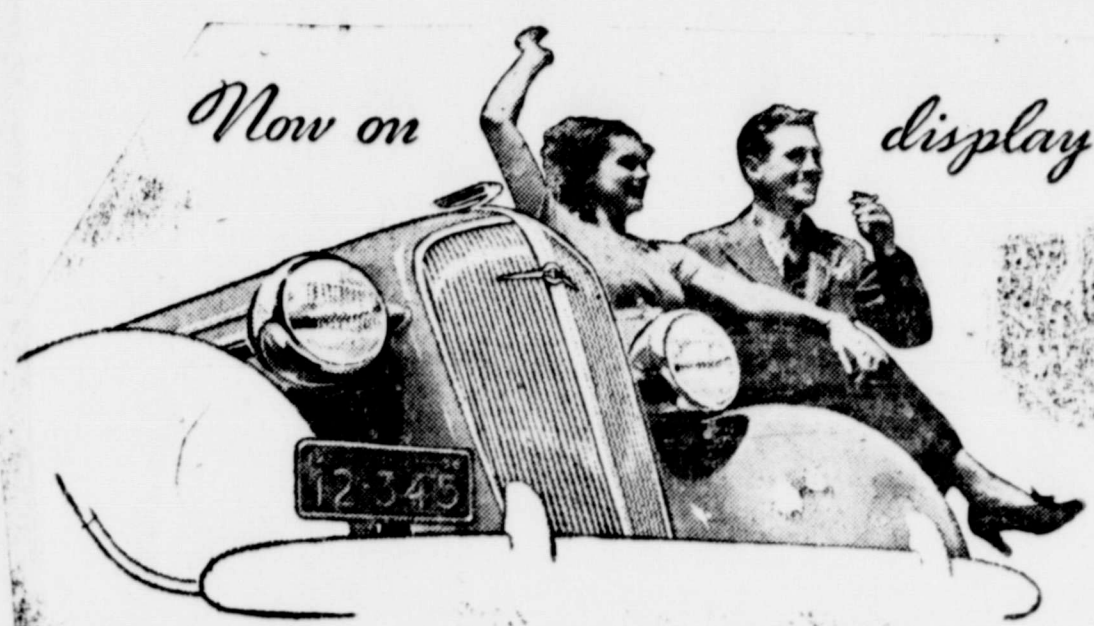
"I received yours with much pleasure informing me that Lee Camp was going to secure a portrait of my dear old friend, the magnanimous General Richard Garnett, the only general on either side who rests in an unidentified grave. My brothers and myself were perhaps on more perfect terms of intimacy with General Garnett than any other officers in the army, and my youngest brother served for a time on his staff. I buried on the Gettysburg battlefield before going into the charge, an old deck of cards that the General, Colonel Hutton, and my brothers and myself had played probably more than a hundred games with while we were near Fredericksburg. General Garnett's staff gave a supper to which none were invited except General Garnett, Colonel Hutton, my brothers and myself, and, believing that General Lee had gone up town, we were very hilarious, and Garnett being called for a story and a song, gave a song called 'The Fog and the Dew,' and a story called 'Mary Ann,' I, being called on for a song, gave 'Rum tum ta, touchie fol la.' General Garnett seemed perfectly enthused and beat time to it with his knife on the table, and at its conclusion said to me: 'Major, my dear fellow, don't you know that's the first time I have heard that song since I left West Point.' There were many other interesting occurrences in which we participated, and no more magnanimous man or one with a kinder heart fought in the war.

"The morning after our supper at Fredericksburg, General Lee said to Peyton and Baldwin, 'You had a very lively crowd in your tent last night, and when I heard of his hearing us, I was awfully afraid he might have some of the words of my song.

"My brothers were near Gen. Garnett when Pickett came up and spoke to him before we went into the charge. He said: 'Dick, old fellow, I have no order to give you, but I advise you to get across those fields as quick as you can, for in my opinion, you are going to catch hell.' General Lee, knowing it would be almost certain death to go the charge on horseback, advised all who could possibly walk to go on foot, and his advice was taken by all but five of the officers. Having been appointed one of a board by General Long street some time before leaving Virginia (the board consisting of Major Deering, Captain Fairfax and myself) to appraise all the private horses in the corps, I knew all five of the horses in the charge. General Garnett had been sick and was strongly advised by the surgeons not to attempt to go in the charge, but disregarding their protests, he put on a common old blue overcoat that completely concealed his uniform, and mounting his

magnificent thoroughbred gelding Red Eye (the second highest priced horse in the corps \$1,400) he went with us to near the Red House, where both he and his horse were killed, and appearing to be a common soldier, was covered up as one. Colonel Hutton, on his orderly's little dun gelding, was the first officer wounded, a Minie ball piercing his leg and going into the horse's side, killing him, although he lived long enough to take the Colonel off the field. Capt. Simkins Jones, General Garnett's aid, had his bay mare killed under him, and was there by enabled to help bear me off the field. Gen. Kemper stopped his bay, or brown, horse by my side at the Red House, and was shot and the horse killed a few minutes afterwards. Lieutenant Colonel Williams, who, the men think got farther, than any mounted man, was killed, as was his little brown mare also, just beyond the Red House.

"I would take great pleasure in visiting your Hall and seeing the portrait of my dear old friend and commander.

On Texas Farms.

By mixing small portions of glue and crude carbolic acid with ordinary whitewash, Mr. A. E. Crutcher, San Patricio county orchardist, has found that as a result the whitewash clings to the tree much longer and the presence of carbolic acid acts as a repellent to many insects.

A profit of \$68.15 has been made by Mrs. Levi Vaughn, co-operator for the Oak Flat Home Demonstration Club in Rusk county from the sale of strawberries and wild dewberries. In April 1934, Mrs. Vaughn and her family put out 1,600 strawberry plants at a cost of \$2.85.

Mrs. Dan Becker of the Stone community in Washington county had seven acres of feed that it was impossible for her to cure. She decided to dig a trench silo and this she did at a cost of \$7, putting 54 tons of hegar in it.

W. L. Brown of Hardin in Liberty county, grows selected varieties of sweet potatoes and grades them carefully. He then puts them in a large storage house, and keeps them until

spring. He never receives less than 75 cents a bushel for his potatoes.

Hans Hanson, Jr., 15 year old member of the Falfurrias Boys 4-H Club in Brooks county, dug and filled a five ten trench silo, from which he will feed two Hereford calves and the family milk cow.

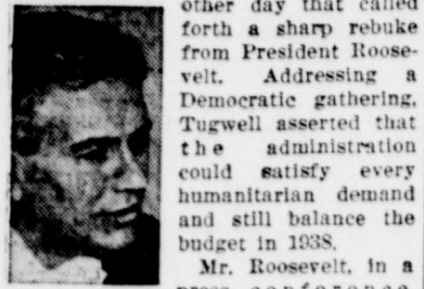

News Review of Current Events the World Over

President Raps Tugwell for Budget Prediction—WPA Job Program Moves Rapidly—Farmers Indorse Corn-Hog Control for 1936.

REXFORD G. TUGWELL, undersecretary of agriculture and once considered head man of the "brain trust," made a speech at Los Angeles the other day that called for a sharp rebuke from President Roosevelt.



Mr. Roosevelt, in a press conference, scolded the newspapers for printing what he called "crazy stories" and went on to declare that Tugwell's assertion was almost as unfounded as the predictions thrown out by many political observers that the budget probably would never be balanced again.

The President said he and his advisers were about to make a study of the financial situation, and that until the budget is finally drafted about the first of the year not even he knows what shape it will take.

PREMIER MUSSOLINI defies the League of Nations and its sanctions. In a speech at the inauguration of the new university in Rome he said:

"In the face of an economic siege toward which all civilized people of the world should feel supreme shame, in the face of an experiment which they wanted to test, for the first time, against the Italian people, let it be said:

"We will oppose it with our most implacable resistance, with our most firm decision and with our most supreme contempt."

However, it was announced in Geneva that the duke was willing to negotiate for peace with Ethiopia, and there was a possibility the league would delay for 15 days the application of further penalties.

King Victor Emmanuel issued a decree putting the entire Italian merchant marine on a war basis.

Prime Minister Baldwin's reply to Mussolini's defiance was a blunt assertion that Great Britain was prepared to resort to force, if necessary, to carry out the sanctions. Said he: "We mean nothing to the league if we are not prepared in the end, and after grave and careful trial, to take action to enforce its judgments."

The British government made new protests to Italy against Italian press attacks on Britain and anti-British propaganda in Egypt, and three more destroyers were sent from Gibraltar to Malta.

WHILE the League of Nations was going forward with its plans for the imposition of sanctions against Italy, its officials asked the United States government to comment on this policy.

Secretary of State Hull replied promptly but with extreme caution, avoiding comment on the action taken by the league powers and inferentially declining to cooperate in the sanctions.

The answer, whose tenor was dictated by President Roosevelt, was sent to Minister Hugh Wilson at Bern.

It only set forth the moves made by the United States under the neutrality act and restated our government's hope for world peace. In press conferences Mr. Hull stressed the fact that this country will continue to move independently to keep free and untangled as President Roosevelt has promised.

AMERICAN citizens are not respecting the embargo on shipments to Italy and Ethiopia to an extent that satisfies the administration. Therefore the President issued this statement:

"In dealing with the conflict between Ethiopia and Italy I have carried into effect the will and intent of the neutrality resolution recently enacted by congress. We have prohibited all shipments of arms, ammunition, and implements of war to the belligerent governments. By my public statement of October 5, which was emphasized by the secretary of state on October 10, we have warned American citizens against transactions of any character with either of the belligerent nations except at their own risk.

"This government is determined not to become involved in the controversy and is anxious for the restoration and maintenance of peace.

"However, in the course of war, tempting trade opportunities may be offered to our people to supply materials which would prolong the war. I do not believe that the American people will wish for abnormally increased profits that temporarily might be secured by greatly extending our trade in such materials; nor would they wish the struggles on the battlefield to be prolonged because of profits accruing to a comparatively small number of American citizens.

"Accordingly, the American government is keeping informed as to all shipments consigned for export to both belligerents."

Secretary of State Hull issued another statement calling upon American citizens to desist from trading with either Italy or Ethiopia. Such trade, he declared, was conducted "at the expense of human lives and human misery."

EARTHQUAKE tremors that were felt in many localities all the way from Spokane and Calgary to New York and Boston were severest in Helena, where at least two persons were killed and many injured. Numerous buildings weakened by the former tremors in the Montana capital were thrown down and the property losses were considerable.

CHANCE CONSULARY of the Gulf coast act, a highly controversial measure, is to be passed on by the Supreme court. The way was opened when Justice Jesse Adkins of the District of Columbia Supreme court granted to the Carter Coal company a temporary injunction restraining government enforcement of the act.

In allowing the issuance of a temporary injunction, Justice Adkins denied another order which would have restrained the government from collecting the penalty prescribed by the act for noncompliance. He directed that the coal company post a bond of \$1,500 a day for ten days to insure stockholders of the company against a loss through imposition of the penalty should the act be held constitutional.

Regardless of the District Supreme court's decision on the constitutionality of the act, the rest case will be carried to the Supreme court for a final decision by the company or the government, attorneys said.

LIBERTY League's committee of 58 more or less eminent lawyers got into trouble by offering free legal services in anti-New Deal litigation. Some-one protested to the American Bar association and that body's grievance committee has been asked for an opinion on the ethics of the offer. It was reported that the members of the league's committee had been cited for unethical practices, but the bar association denied this had yet been done.

THERE is no lack of potential candidates for the Republican Presidential nomination. The latest boom to be informally launched is for Gov. Alf M. Landon of Kansas, often mentioned as a possibility.

The other day there was a gathering in Topeka of party leaders, including members of the state committee, state office holders, congressmen and Senator Arthur Capper, and after some oratory they unanimously endorsed the governor for the nomination.

Landon had not indicated whether he would be a candidate. If he will, the movement will probably be given formal status at the annual Kansas day dinner in Topeka on January 29, the seventy-fifth anniversary of the state's admission to the Union.

TWO tragic airplane accidents marked the week in the United States. The huge Boeing bombing plane built for the army, largest land plane in the country, was being tested near Dayton, Ohio, when it fell and burst into flames. Maj. P. P. Hall, chief testing pilot, was killed and four others were injured. Lieuts. R. K. Giovannoli and L. F. Harman risked their lives to rescue those trapped in the wreck and were themselves painfully burned.

Another Boeing plane, re-built and undergoing tests by the United Air Lines, crashed against a small hill near Chesenne and the four occupants were hurled to death.

HONDURAS suffered one of the worst floods in its history. Fully 115 deaths resulted, and the property damage is estimated at \$12,000,000, half of it sustained by the United Fruit company. Reports of the disaster reaching Tegucigalpa were meager and vague, and the mortality list may be greatly increased later.

WANG CHING-WEL, premier of China, and two other officials were wounded by an assassin in Nanking. Martial law was declared there immediately. The Renzo (Japanese) News agency, crediting Chinese sources, said the assassin was a member of the central executive committee of the Kuomintang (ruling Chinese party). Chinese sources asserted he was a citizen of a foreign power. The Reuters (British) News agency reported Wang's assailant was a Japanese newspaper man.

POLITICAL gossip in Washington is that Senator Vic Donahey of Ohio may be invited by the administration to be the Democratic candidate for Vice President next year. Mr. Garner, of course, can have a re-nomination if he really wants it, but there is some reason to believe that he would prefer to retire to private life after nearly forty years of public service. Donahey's impressive victory over Simeon Fess in 1932 and his well known vetting ability lead some prominent Democrats to think it would be wise to put him on the ticket as Mr. Roosevelt's running mate.

JIMMY WALKER, former mayor of New York, has ended his three years of self-imposed exile and returned to the metropolis. Tammany Hall, which "made" him politically, took no part in the welcome accorded him, but enough others joined in the affair to fill seven or eight boats that met the liner Manhattan at quarantine. These included delegations from the Friars club, the Lambs club and the Grand Street Boys' association of which Jimmy was vice president. At the docks there was a tremendous throng to greet Walker and his wife, the former Betty Compton.

RELATED reports told of the terrific hurricane that swept across the southern peninsula of Haiti and that was followed by devastating floods. There was no way of estimating the number of fatalities, but they were believed to be as many as two thousand. Entire populations of many valley villages were wiped out.

KILLED BY FLYING SHEEP

E. C. Major of Perma, Mont., had herded his sheep across the railroad tracks, but when a train came along the flock got nervous and started back. The locomotive plowed into the middle of it, hurling the animals in all directions. Several bodies struck Major. He died.

Lesson for November 10
EZEKIEL TEACHES PERSONAL RESPONSIBILITY

LESSON TEXT—Ezekiel 33:7-14.
GOLDEN TEXT—So then every one of us shall give account of himself to God.—Romans 14:12.
PRIMARY TOPIC—A Prophet Encourages His People.
JUNIOR TOPIC—A Watchman on Duty.
INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC—Does God Care What I Do?
YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC—Individuals Accountable to God.

Ezekiel prophesied in the land of the captivity. The purpose of his ministry was threefold: (1) To show the house of Israel that they were in captivity because of their sins (14:23). (2) To show that God is righteous in his visitation of judgment upon them (7:8, 9). (3) To sustain their faith by assuring them of their national restoration, the punishment of their enemies and their final exaltation among the nations when Messiah shall reign.

I. God's Sovereign Right to the Souls of Men (18:1-4).
Every man is personally responsible to God.

II. The Moral Obligation of Sons to Their Father (Ezek. 18:14-20).
While the law of heredity gives the child a sinful nature and when the child arrives at the age of moral responsibility it begins to sin. God holds each responsible for their deeds.

III. Ezekiel's Responsibility (Ezek. 33:1-9).
As a prophet of God certain responsibilities were imposed upon him. There is a sense in which every disciple of Christ is a witness for him and therefore is responsible for the giving of his testimony to sinners. His responsibility is set forth under the figure of a watchman. Two things were required of a watchman.

1. To hear the words of God's mouth (v. 7). The source of the message of every minister and Sunday School teacher is God's holy Word. Just as the prophet did not originate his message but received it of God's mouth, so it should be with every minister and Sunday School teacher.

2. To sound the warning (v. 7). After hearing God's message he was to speak it out and proclaim it to the people. A watchman today is both to hear and to speak. The people are to be warned of the impending danger. Failure to sound the alarm makes the watchman guilty of the blood of the sinner.

IV. God's Attitude Toward the Sinner (vv. 10, 11).
God has declared in his Word that unfaithfulness on the part of his people would cause them to "perish among the heathen," that they would "pine away in their iniquity" (Lev. 26:38, 39). In view of this pronouncement some are disposed to say that their case is hopeless. To meet this attitude of despair the prophet assured them that God had no pleasure in the death of the wicked, but that his sincere desire was for the wicked to turn from their way and live. Regardless of what their past had been, they were given the assurance that the future was bright if they heeded God's command and plea. No one need to despair because of sin, for God's grace is greater than human sin.

V. The Sinner's Personal Responsibility (vv. 12-20).
God created the members of the race personal beings, giving them freedom of choice. They have moral discernment enabling them to distinguish between the right and the wrong. They choose, therefore, according to the quality of their being.
The following principles govern the sinner:

1. Past righteousness will not avail for present sins (v. 12). When a righteous man turns to iniquity, his past seeming righteousness will be of no avail.

2. Past sins do not make impossible present acceptance with God (vv. 12-15). By virtue of the operation of the law of habit, every sinful act makes it harder for the sinner to repent, but God's grace is such that if the sinner repents God will forgive and restore.

3. Restitution required (vv. 15, 16). The proof of penitence is that, so far as possible, the sinner makes amends for wrongs done.

4. God's ways are equal (vv. 17-20). God holds man responsible for his own deeds. The child is not condemned because of the deeds of his father, nor can it be said that the fathers have eaten sour grapes and the children's teeth are set on edge. This does not do away with the law of heredity. Regardless of what one's past life has been, God's grace in Jesus Christ blots out his record and he stands accepted in the Beloved.

PURE FOOD LAWS FIRST ENACTED 500 YEARS AGO

Proof that pure food laws are not the product of modern civilization, nor the result of an age in which the can-opener reigned supreme in the kitchen, was submitted recently by H. A. Schuette, professor of chemistry at the University of Wisconsin.

Professor Schuette described pure food laws which were enacted in Medieval Germany some 500 years ago—during the same century that saw the rise of Joan of Arc to immortal fame and the discovery of America by Columbus—which regulated the sale and production of honey, milk, and other foods in the southern German city of Nuremberg.

The old laws were especially aimed at the sale and production of honey, which then was the chief satisfier of the human "sweet tooth." The law was aimed at not only the seller, but also the buyer and user of "any honey except that which has been examined and measured by duly appointed honey inspectors." Violation was punishable by a fine.

Even though these old laws were necessary to protect the unwary consumer of honey, Professor Schuette pointed out that the adulteration of this sweetening food could not have been the problem in the Middle Ages that it was to become in later years.

Before 1906 authorities revealed that there were probably few foods in the United States more subject to adulteration than extracted honey, he explained.

Now, however, adulterated honey seldom comes to official notice, because the pure product, honestly labeled, has taken its place. Under the federal pure food act of 1906, exactly 20,725 notices of judgment reporting the action taken on foods and drugs seized in interstate commerce have been published up to the present time, and less than one out of every thousand prosecutions for some form of violation of this act concerns honey.

Death Penalty
Forty states as well as the District of Columbia and the United States federal government have a death penalty for murder. In North Dakota, Rhode Island and some other states where life imprisonment is the penalty for murder, death by hanging is inflicted if a person kills somebody else while serving a life term. In some of the capital pun-

ishment states the jury has the right to fix the penalty at life imprisonment, by recommending mercy.
