Human Treatment of Slaves in the South.

John D. Beatty of Ivanhoe, N. C., sent this interesting item after having read the article by W. E. Doyle of Teague, Texas, in the Veteran for January 1924, in regard to the treatment of slaves by some of the old "mars-halls" of the South. He says:

"I am copying from the record of Braden County, N. C., parts of the will of William H. Beatty made June 6, 1849, and probated August 1853, which may be of some interest to your readers. Mr. Beatty was a man of great property, in both lands and slaves, and after devising and bequeathing most of his property among his heirs, he devised a certain tract of about two hundred and sixty acres of land on which there was a good farm to two of his executors and uses the following words regarding it:

"But the said parcel of land shall remain and be held by my executors, to whom the same is hereby devised, until the death of my slaves, Juliet, Sally, and Billy, children of Cloe, my cook; Sabina, Will and Louisa, daughter of Will and Selly. And until the death of said slaves, my executors are soundly enjoined and directed to suffer and permit said slaves - Juliet, Sally, Billy, Sabina, Will, and Louisa - to reside on said land and cultivate the same under the care and management of my executors, who are requested to see that said slaves are usefully employed, so that they may, if practicable maintain themselves and not become a charge to my estate or a nuisance to society. But should said slaves, from old age or any infirmity, be unable to maintain themselves, my executors are further directed and required to pay over to said slaves, or such of them as may require it, respectively, the sum of twenty-five dollars per year, in such amounts and at such periods of the year as my executors may or shall deem necessary. It is my further will, and I do direct, that my man Tom be permitted to reside at Pleasant Retreat as long as he may live under the care and management of my executors, and employed, in such a way as may be most agreeable to him.

"I do not design by the foregoing provision to attempt to emancipate the aforesaid slaves Juliet, Sally, Billy, Sabina, Will, Louisa, and Tom; nor do I intend to make such a disposition of them as may be equivalent to emancipation. For their long and meritorious service it has been my intention to direct their emancipation, but am advised that such a testamentary disposition of them, being deemed contrary to the policy of our

civil institutions, would be adjudged null and void.

"Should the foregoing disposition of them, contrary to my expectations, be deemed void, I then bequeath said slaves to my son Hays and my grandson, William H. Beatty, son of my son William. This bequest is made in the confident expectation that my son Hays and grandson William, knowing my feeling toward said slaves and my wishes in regard to them, and treat them with all the humanity and kindness which may be compatible with the conditions of slavery."

"The writer is the son of Hays W. Beatty, one of the executors and remembers going with his father on some of his trips to carry supplies to those old slaves years after the War Between the States, and he looked after them as best he could as long as they lived. The last of them died about 1877."

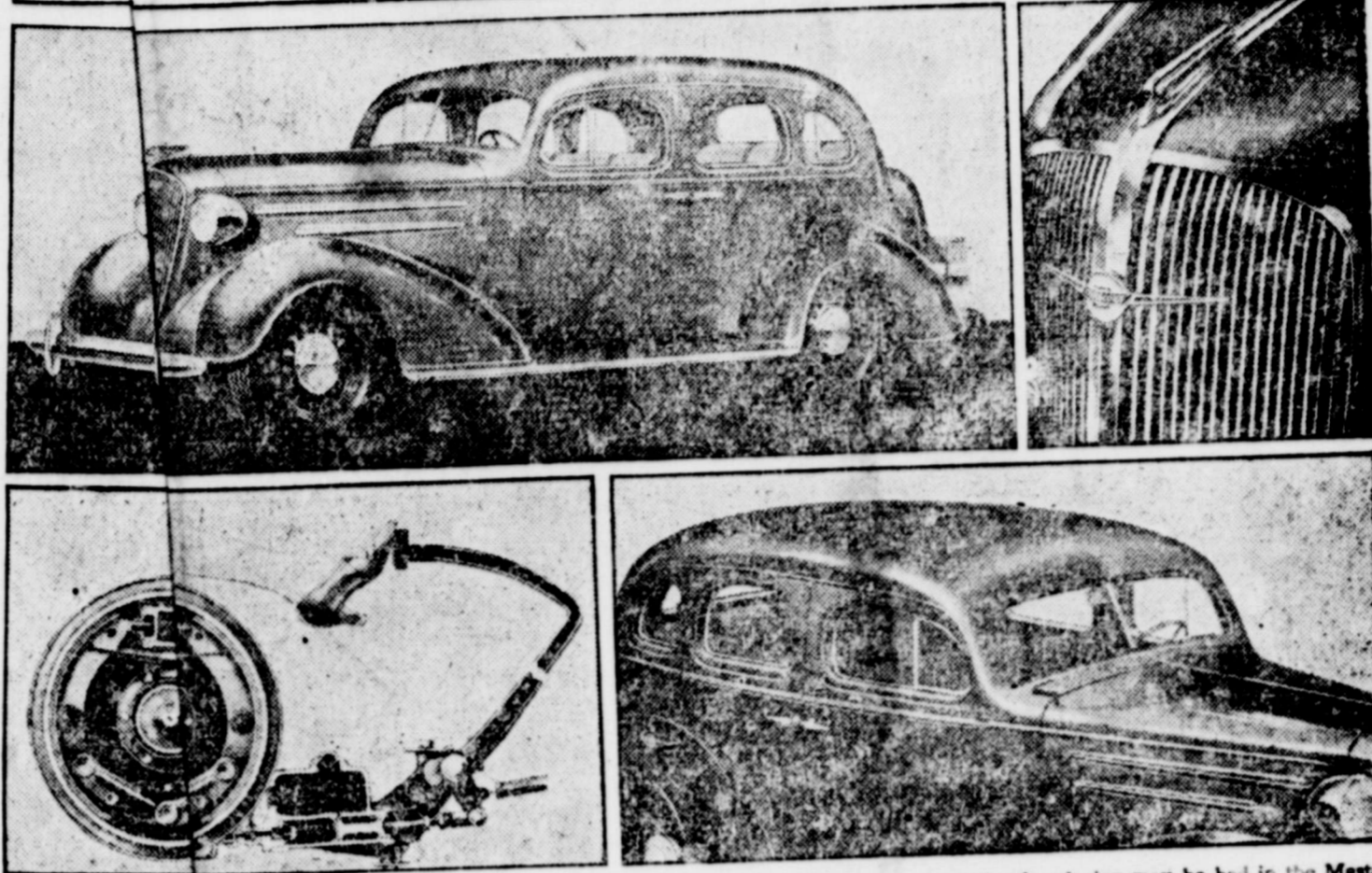

OCEANS AND HILLS SLOW DOWN EARTH: DAYS LENGTHENING

French astro-physicists are completing a series of calculations which prove this world of ours is slowing down, like a wobbling top, as it spins around its polar axis.

The loss of speed is estimated by scientists at the Meudon observatory, near Paris, at one-tenth thousandth of a second a month at the present time, which means that in 1,000,000 years our 24-hour day will be lengthened to a 41-hour day.

This phenomenon is caused partly by the fact that the earth is losing the perfect streamlined curves of its early days and is becoming wrinkled with mountains and volcanoes which impede its whirling.

The main factor, however, is stated to be found in tidal movements. Working under the combined influence of sun and moon, oceans bulge out and act as brakes on the rotation of the earth.

Calculations to date show this loss of speed increases progressively so that 100 years hence the earth's rotation will have suffered a loss of 18 seconds, and within two centuries, one minute and 12 seconds.

This clocking of the speed of the globe's rotation is entirely apart from computations regarding the changes in time that it takes the earth to revolve around the sun every year.—Detroit News.

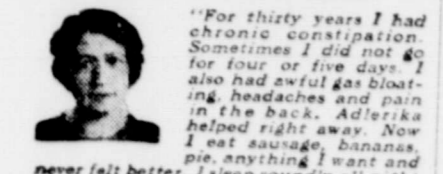

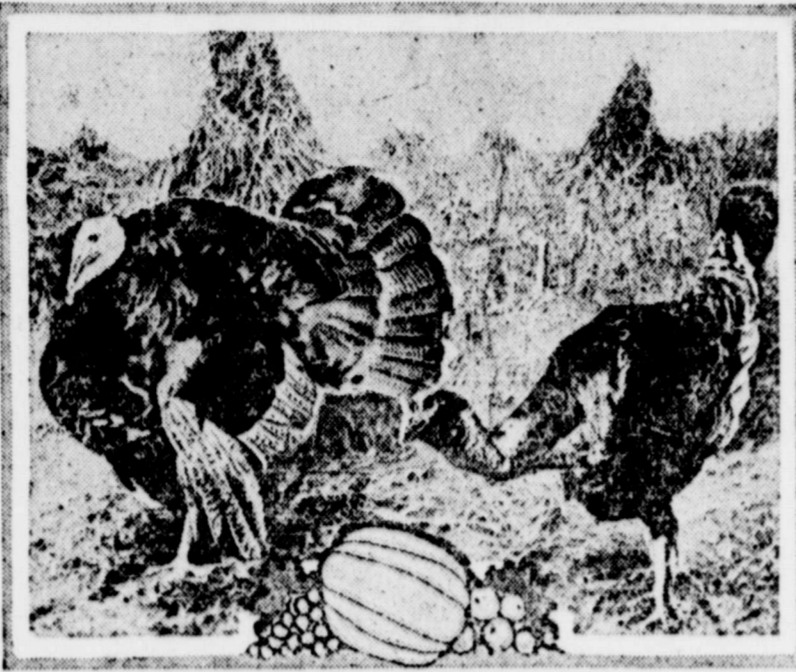

The Day Before Thanksgiving



New England Thanksgiving Busy Time



THANKSGIVING day! How those words spelled days and days of work and worry for the colonial housewife! A festive holiday it was called by proclamation, observes a writer in the Boston Herald, but actually it represented a day which demanded more preparation than most any other in the year. Our old New England traditions required it—the Puritans did, so must we—was the common understanding of the day.

In days of yore grandmother would start her Thanksgiving preparation weeks in advance. The pies must be made. Of course she wouldn't serve mince pies that hadn't "ripened." They were made in quantity and put down cellar where they frequently froze to a solidity overcome only by a hot oven just before the feast.

In passing it might be well to remind you of the custom in one New England family to have three pieces of pie for breakfast on Thanksgiving morn. Mince, apple and squash were the three dictated by tradition.

Well in advance of the traditional day one would see grandmother take down the seasoning used but a few times a year, the crackers would be ground up and gradually the stuffing for the turkey was prepared—this also went down cellar to ripen. We mustn't forget the plum pudding which was made well in advance and hung in a bag up in the attic suspended from a nail so interested mice could not approach.

Then came the days before Thanksgiving. Sons were drafted to collect and crack the butternuts, walnuts, beechnuts, etc. (and more than one finger was smashed in the process). Daughters were drafted to peel squash, turnips, carrots, potatoes, sweet and white, and of course the proverbial tear-producing onions.

The turkey must be caught, killed, plucked, singed and hung up for a day before he was brought to the kitchen. Grandmother must make her famous nut bread for William ("he does like it so when he comes home"). "Sadie, you make the fudge—Alice, you make—" and so it goes. Everyone hustles, all wanting the same dishes, the same stove cover, the mix'n' spoon, etc.

"Johnnie, Oh Johnnie! Go down to

the village and get me some more crackers—Glory me! I've run out of seasoning"—and the errands start.

These were typical New England days of preparation for the Thanksgiving feast, all of which must be executed in addition to the regular chores of making butter for market twice a week, churning the cottage cheese, collecting the eggs, etc., etc.

Then came the day—the house must be spic and span. Dozens of pictures must be dusted, the parlor must be opened up, wood brought in for the extra stove, chestnuts gathered to put on the fireplace hearth—and on went the great process of preparation.
