## 1990 Sale Hits Record High

The sale totals for the 1990 Parmer County Jr. Livestock Show hit what may be an all-time high, according to figures released this week by Dale Schueler of the Jr. Livestock Show Assn.

The grand total for the sale was \$87,314. Of this amount, \$82,303 was paid in premiums by the bidders, and another \$5,011 was paid by the buyers of "floor price" animals.

"It definitely was the best total we have had in several years, and we appreciate the support the buyers who made this possible," Dr. Schueler said.

## Judge's Race Tops Primary Ballot Here

Although the governor's race has been making all the noise, it's a county judge's race that is expected to cause a larger than normal voter turnout in Parmer County next Tuesday in the primary election.

Five candidates are seeking the nomination for the judge's position, all on the Democratic ballot, which suggests a possible runoff.

Nominees are Eva Ancira, B.K. Buske, Bonnie Clayton, Leland Gustin and Jimmie Mace.

If that isn't enough of a choice, Democratic primary voters will have the choice of seven candidates for the governor's nomination, although Ann Richards, Mark White and Jim Mattox are the front-runners.

Seven more candidates are listed in the Commissioner of Agriculture position, where six

opponents are trying to force incumbent Jim Hightower against the wall.

A smaller turnout is expected locally in the Republican primary, which itself has seven candidates for the governor's race, although one (W.N. Otwell) has officially withdrawn.

Kent Hance is expected to garner most of the local vote, although the Dimmitt native may be hard-pressed statewide against the likes of Clayton Williams, Tom Luce and Jack Rains.

## Excel Foods Division To Close

The Excel Corp. announced Friday the permanent closing of its Excel Foods further processing beef operation at 900 Millard Ave., in Friona, effective May 18.

"Company operations in other states will supply the specialty products that have been made at the Excel Foods plant. Our Friona further processing operation is closing because workers compensation costs at the plant are an average five times higher than other states where we have comparable facilities, which makes it prohibitive to continue the operation there," said William G. Fielding, president of Excel.

"Workers compensation is a major concern at all of our Texas operations; however, the 1650 employees of the company's slaughter and boxed beef processing facility west of Friona will not be affected by the closing of the Excel Foods plant," he said.

Fielding said the 200 employees affected by the plant closing will be considered for transfer to other Excel beef operations. He said employees selected for jobs at other company locations will be offered relocation/incentive program and that the company is working closely with the Texas Employment Commission office in Hereford on out-placement.

Excel has produced specialty products at the leased Excel Foods facility since May of 1986.

Coffee Memorial Blood Center supplies all of the blood and blood components to 20 hospitals encompassed within a 26-county, 100-mile radius.

Blood is available from the Center for anyone in the Panhandle Service area upon the request of a hospital or qualified physician.

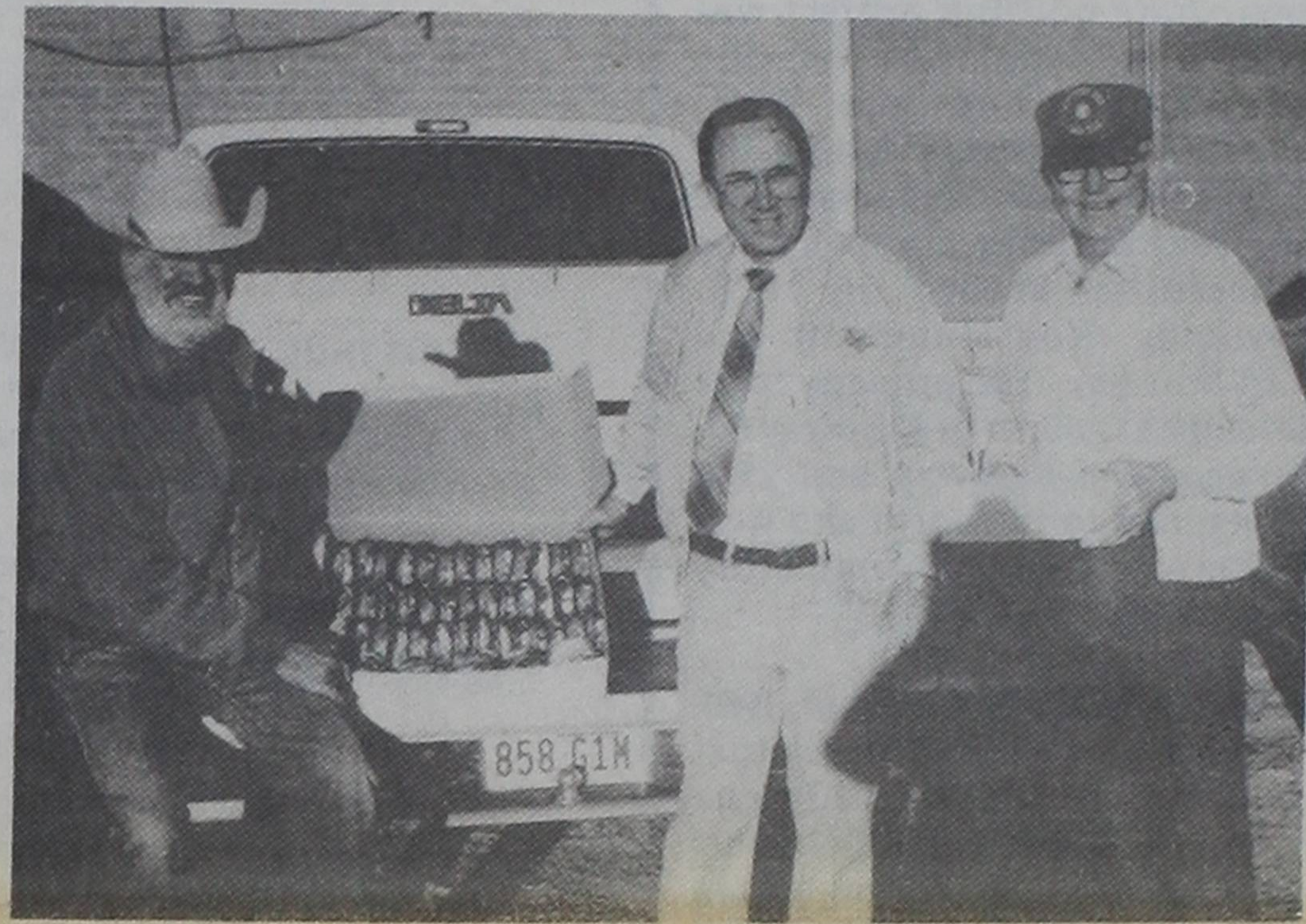
## Anti-Drug Meeting Set

Jenny Procter, a junior member of the 1989-90 Friona Squaws' basketball team, was Friona's only selection of the All-District team, announced this week.

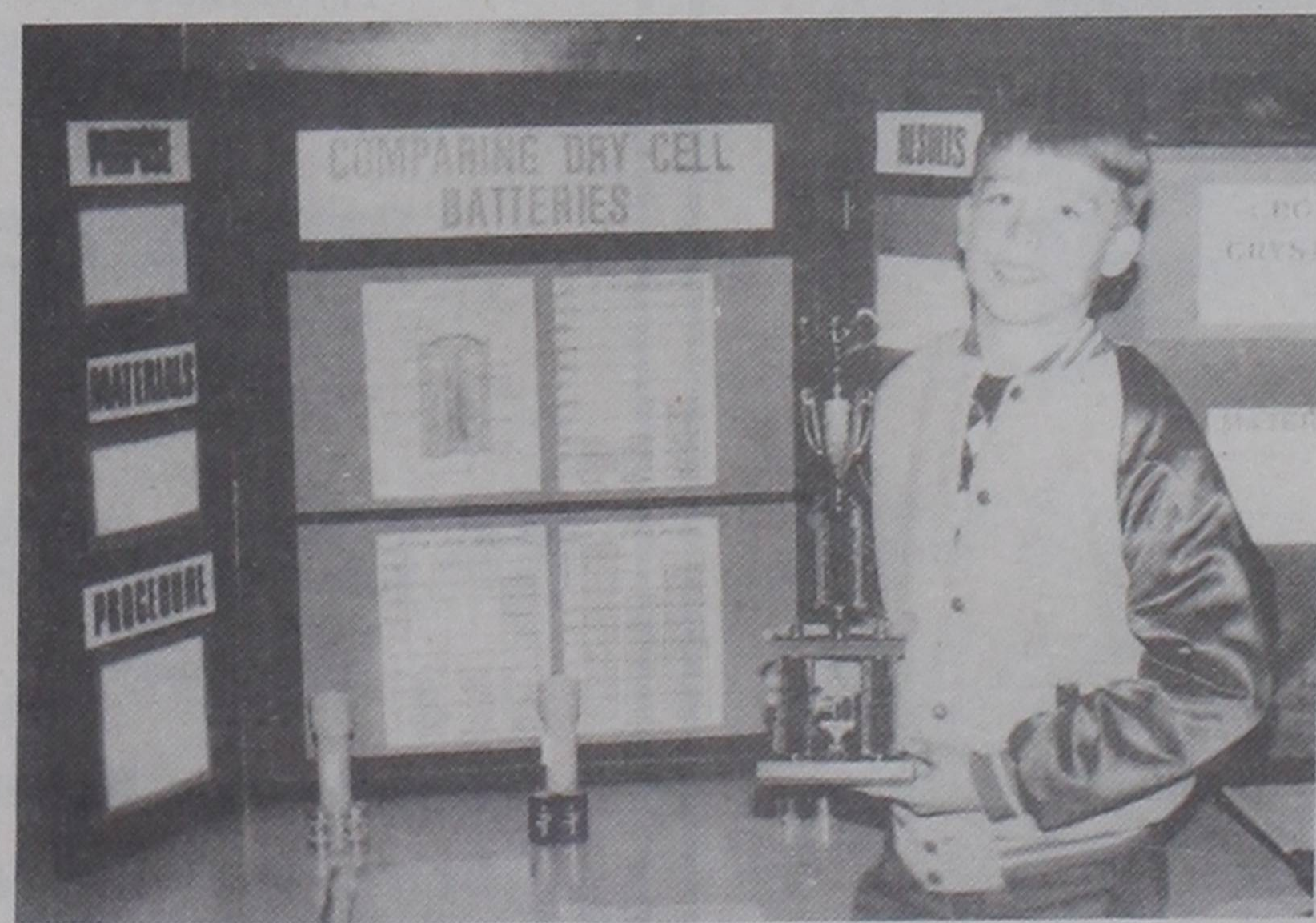
Third-place Muleshoe showed that team's potential by tying playoff reps Dimmitt and Tulia, as the three teams each landed three girls on the all-district team.

## Letter To The Editor

Dear Bill,

We appreciate the interest which the people of Friona have in our schools. Certainly, the education of our children should be one of our most important responsibilities. It has always been the intent of the Board of Trustees of the Friona Independent School District to use the resources of this district to provide the best education possible for all of our students.

As everyone knows, the Legislature is in session right now with the express purpose of creating a school financing system. If the reports in the Lubbock and Amarillo papers are correct, the systems which are being considered might not be in the best interest of the students of all of Texas.

Two years ago we asked the citizens of Friona to support an elected School Board of Education. This issue passed very substantially statewide. However, some of the legislators were not in favor of this body being elected by the people of Texas, and are working very hard to strip this body of all authority and place the decision-making powers for our schools in the hands of a 10-member Legislative Education Board. This board is made up of Lt. Gov. Hobby, House Speaker Gib Lewis and eight other legislative leaders. This would change the decision-making group from an education board that is ELECTED from 15 districts statewide to a board that is appointed and is representative of only 10 of the 181 legislative districts.

We would urge you to write the Governor, Lt. Governor and legislators and voice your opinion on this issue. You can almost be sure that some of the legislators have very little concern about the school systems in this part of the state. Only letters and calls from "the people" will let them know how important our schools are to us. We need to have representation on the decision-making board.

## 10 YEARS AGO—MARCH 9, 1980

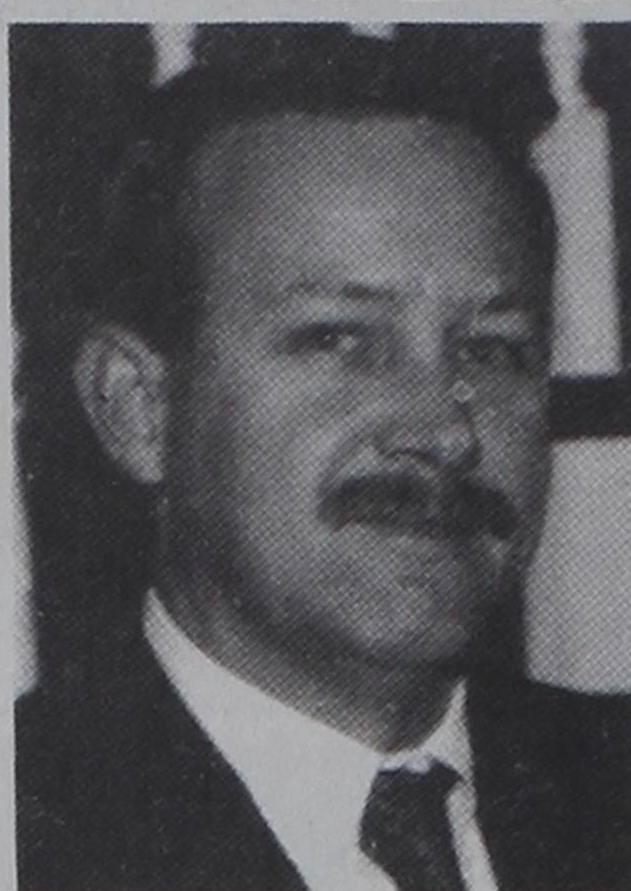

## Police Report

FEBRUARY, 1990

The Friona Police Department received 238 calls during the month of February, 1990.

Fifty-seven citations were issued. There were 23 arrests made--three for public intoxication; one D.W.I.; six out-of-town warrants; eight for possession of controlled substance; two for possession of drug paraphernalia; two burglaries and one delivery of controlled substance.

There were 27 man nights in jail. Eight offenses were reported--one criminal mischief; one hit and run; one gun shot wound; three burglaries; and two thefts.

Two juveniles were detained for disorderly conduct. They were released to parents and referred to juvenile officer.

Thirty-one vacation watches were requested and 310 security checks were made.

There were four accidents investigated with no injuries.

The team had wins from Jeff Stowers in the 300-meter intermediate hurdles and Curtis Brady in the long jump.

Stowers clocked a 40.29 in the hurdles race and Brady jumped 20½ to win the jump event.

Brian Herring placed second in the high jump, clearing 5-10, and Brady, clearing the same height, took third place. Ramon Sanchez placed second in the 3200-meter run with a time of 10:40.15.

Friona's 1600-meter relay team, composed of Stowers, Sanchez, Brady and Ismael Rocha, placed third with a time of 3:34.89.

The 400-meter relay team (Scott Houston, Bryce McMurtry, Rocha and Stowers), placed fourth with a time of 45.5.

Otherwise, Brady was fourth in the 100-meter dash with a clocking of 11.72; Houston was fourth in the 110-meter hurdles in 18.2 and Rocha was fourth in the 200-meter dash at 23.75. Houston also placed fourth in the 300-meter hurdles with a time of 44.82.

Javier Correa placed fifth in the 800-meter run with a time of 2:13, and Herring was sixth at 2:15.

Correa also placed sixth in the 1600-meter run with a time of 5:10.8, and Andre Duran was sixth in the 400-meter dash at 54.8.

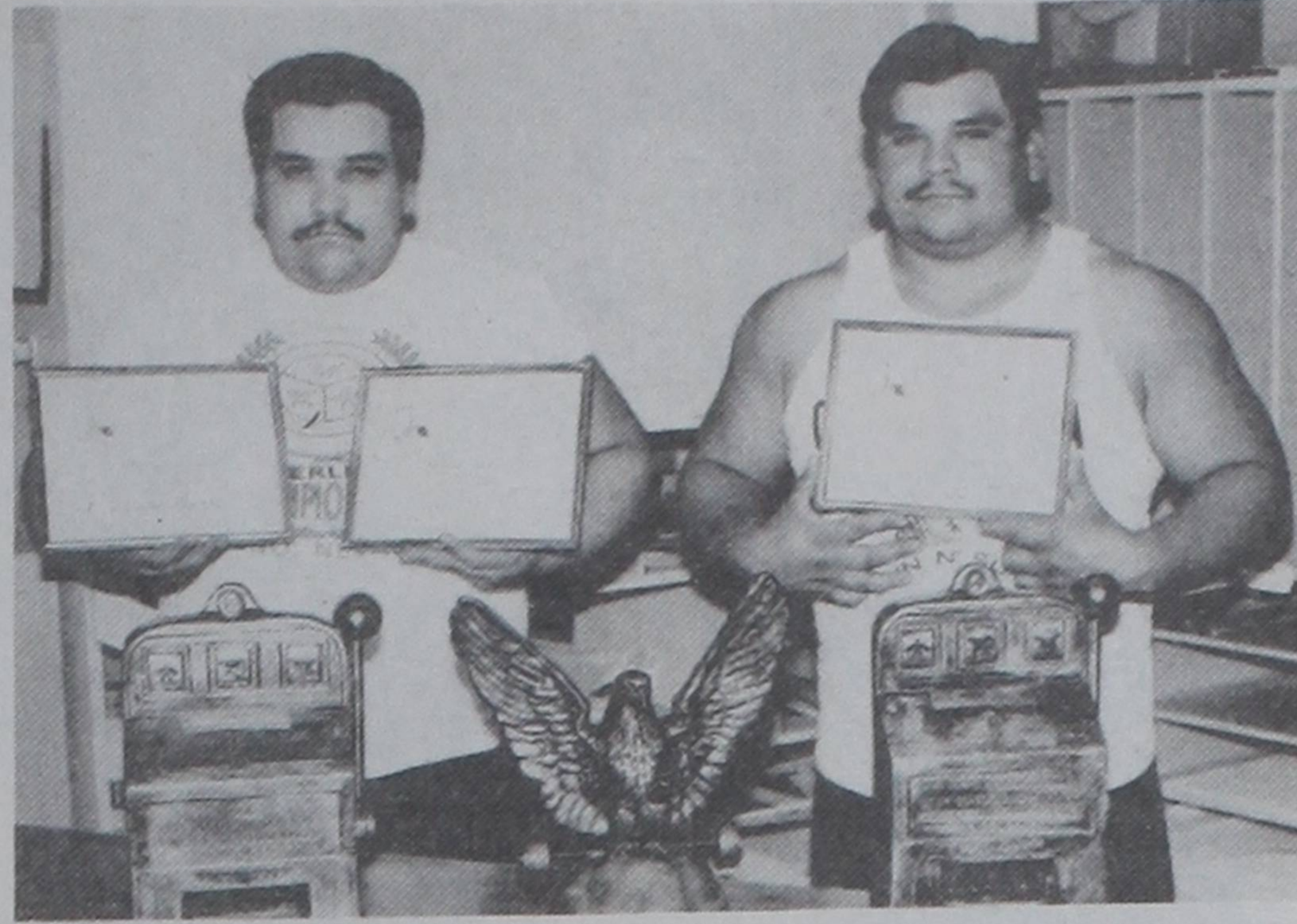

# Samarron National Lifting Champion

Two Friona power-lifters were among more than 350 lifters from across the country competing in the Natural Nationals Powerlifting competition at the Golden Nugget Hotel in Reno, Nevada February 22-25.

Richard Samarron came home with the first-place award in the teenage division, and also won an award for best lifter.

Richard also broke three national records. He set a new record in the squat by lifting 750 pounds, and one in the bench press by lifting 435 pounds. He also set a record in total pounds for three lifts, at 1800 pounds.

Samarron had also set a record in the dead lift at 615 pounds, but this mark was erased by another lifter who hoisted 620 pounds before the tournament was over.

Richard was the 1987 regional high school champion; 1987 state qualifier; 1988 regional high school champion; 1988 teenage national champion; 1989 teenage state champion; 1990 national teenage champion and 1990 world qualifier.

Richard's older brother Jose placed seventh in the Reno tournament. He lifted 600 pounds in the squat, 429 in the bench and 630 in the dead lift, for a total of 1659 pounds.

### Module XIV: Mutual Funds-- Much Has Happened Since 1924

The year was 1924. America was in the midst of an economic heyday that began three years earlier and would continue unrestrained until 1929. It was an era of energy and extremes. It was the year America's first mutual fund was introduced in Boston.

Today, 65 years later, the mutual fund industry is responsible for more than \$800 billion and influences the financial future of 27 million investors.

Here's a thumbnail history of the management group that started the first mutual fund. They're still very much in the investment business with \$23 billion currently under management for 1.3 million mutual fund and annuity/life-insurance owners.

The going wasn't always easy, but the managers, dedicated to a philosophy of provided long-term conservative investment management to their shareholders, not only survived but prospered.

The first mutual fund began amid the speculative frenzy of the 1920s. Within five years the Great Depression had crippled the economy, and the new fund faced its first and most severe test. No one escaped the market collapse, but the fund with \$14.5 million in net assets in 1929 saw those assets rise to \$30.8 million at the height of the Depression in 1934.

During the 1930s, the fund continued its concept of management by diversification. They also saw the need to expand investments to include not only common stocks but also cash and fixed-income securities.

In 1932, they established the first in-house investment research department. Today, virtually every major mutual fund has a research department testifying to the need for strong fundamental research and analysis.

The mutual fund industry played a major role in much of the security legislation of the 1930s and 1940s. During a period when most businesses preferred to disclose as little as possible about their operations, mutual funds fostered an "open-book" policy of their activities. Full disclosure later

became part of the securities law that all mutual funds follow.

Favorable taxation of mutual funds was fought for by the mutual fund industry. Today, not only are shareholders relieved of much extra and unfair taxation but mutual funds are a more viable investment because of it.

Sixty-four years is not an overly impressive period of time in the overall course of history. However, during that time a tremendous amount has happened in the nation. Legendary, larger-than-life personalities, such as Charles Lindbergh, Red Grange, Babe Ruth, Louis Armstrong, Amelia Earhart, F. Scott Fitzgerald and many more--have influenced the way we live.

Mutual funds have influenced the way we invest. Today, with more than 2,000 mutual funds and more than \$800 billion in assets, the mutual fund industry is one of the largest sources of investment dollars for America's corporations and offers the markets a major means of liquidity.

That's an impressive record for an industry whose first fund began in Boston in 1924 only 65 years ago.

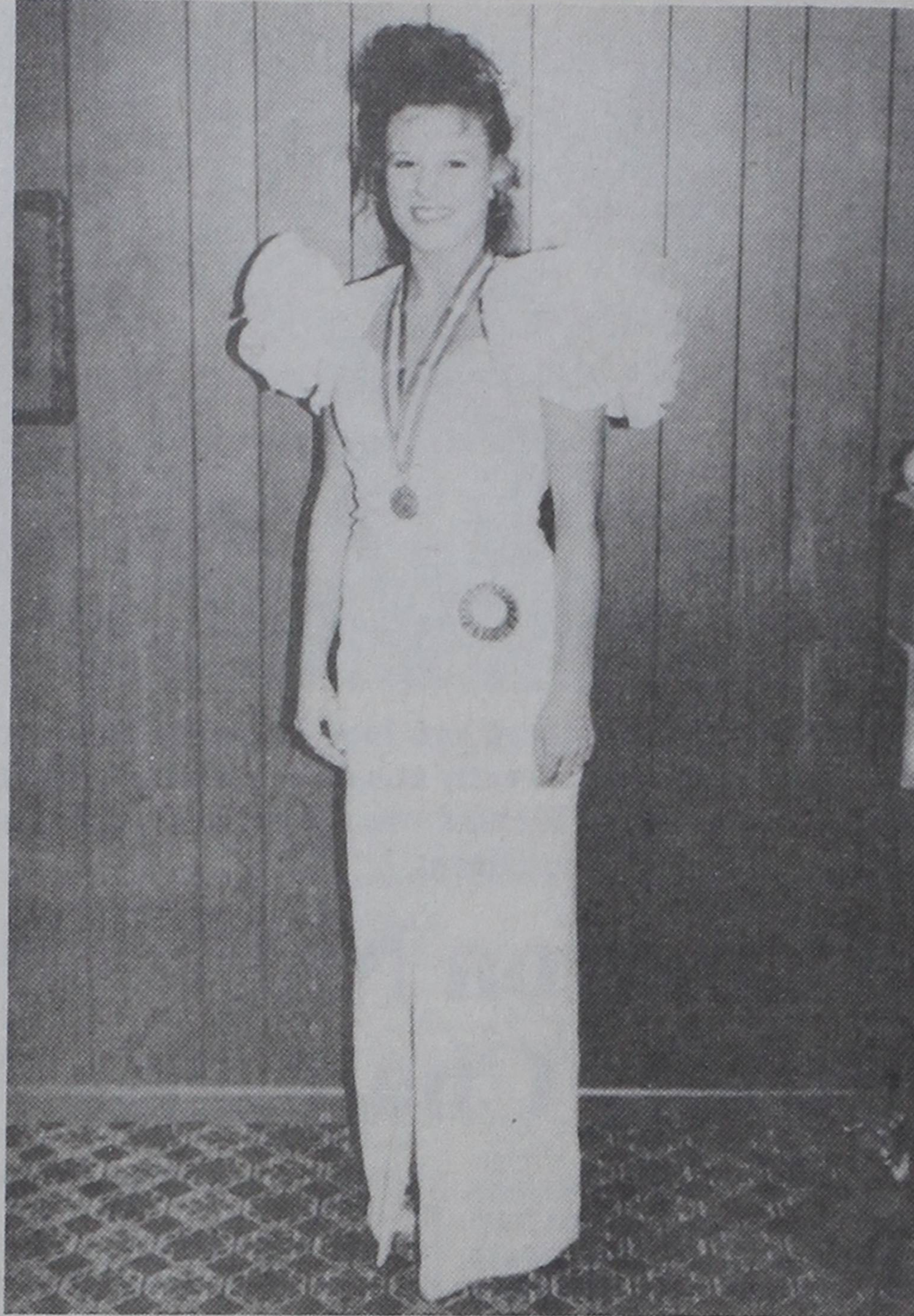

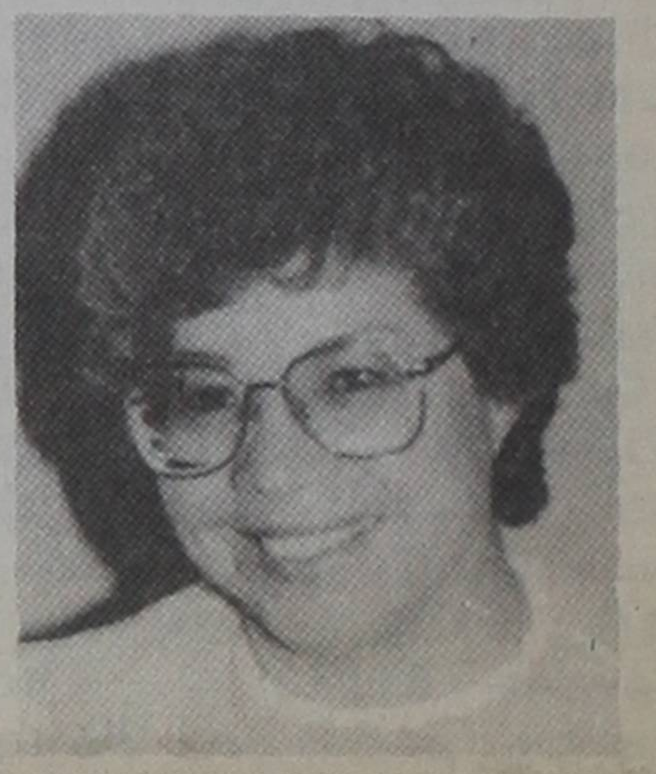

The program was brought by Bonnie Wilhelm, who told of her experiences in growing Christmas trees, and also in growing pecan trees.

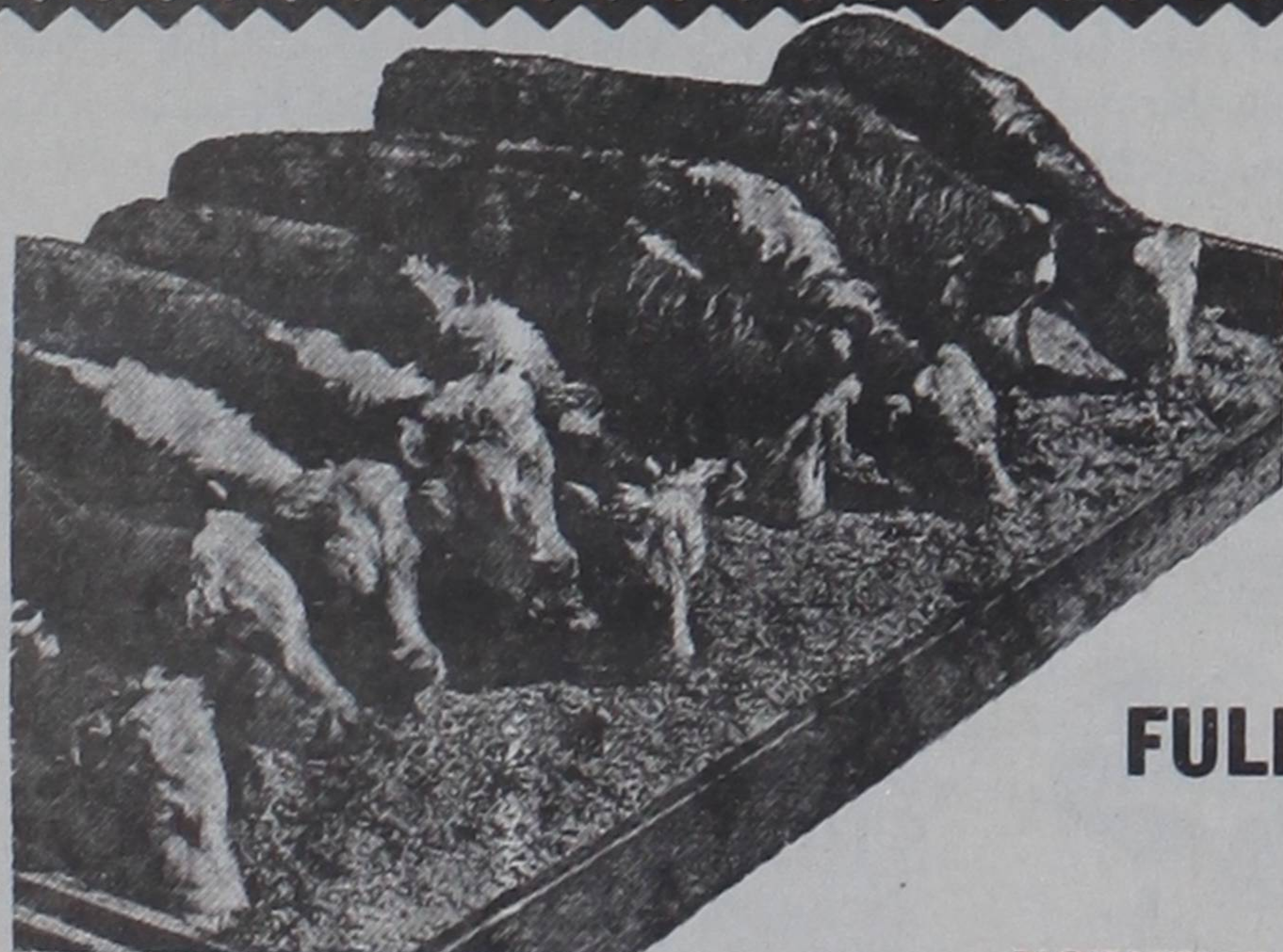

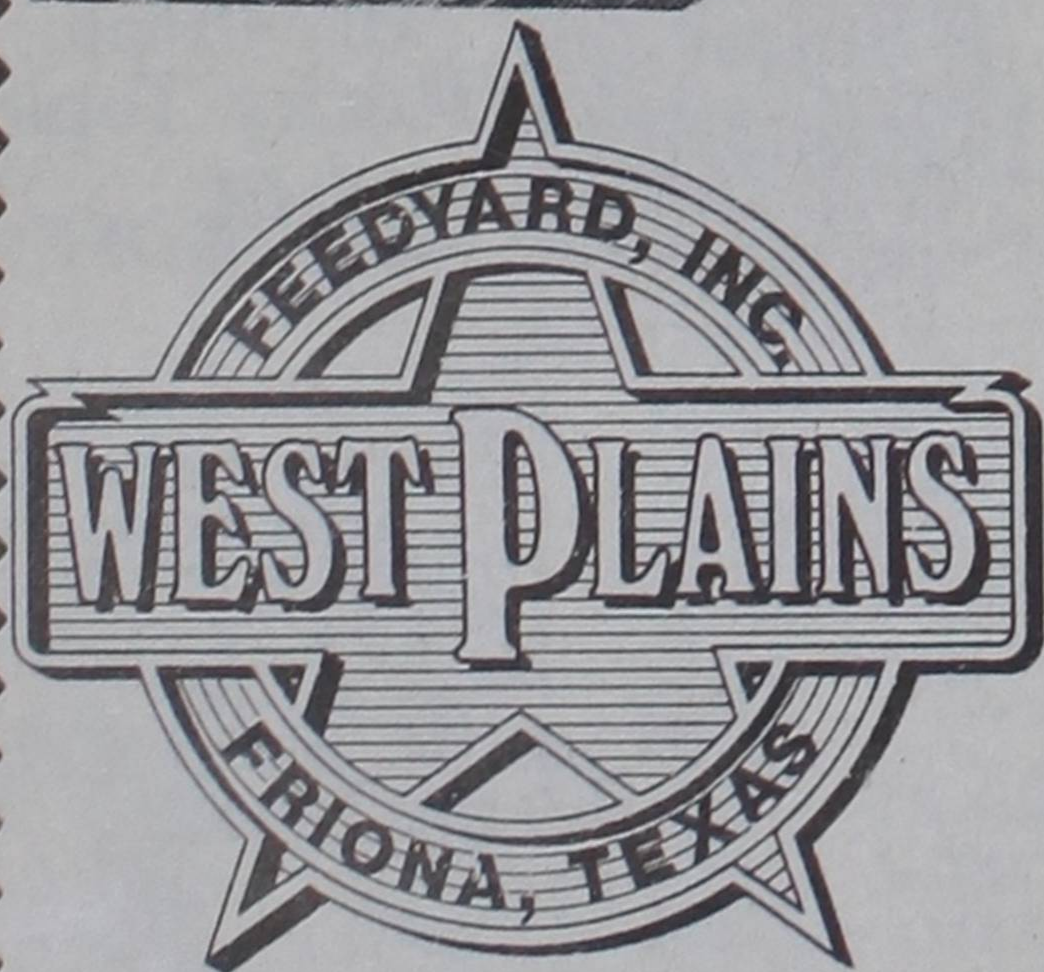

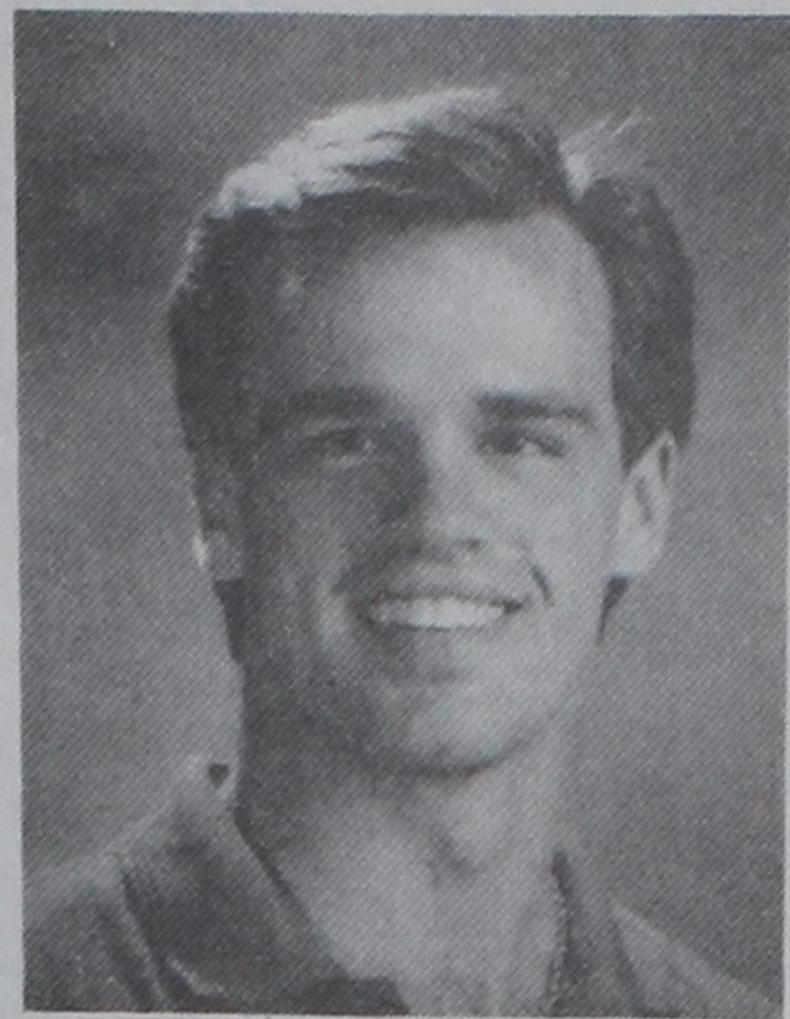

## J. Lafuente Honored By Navy

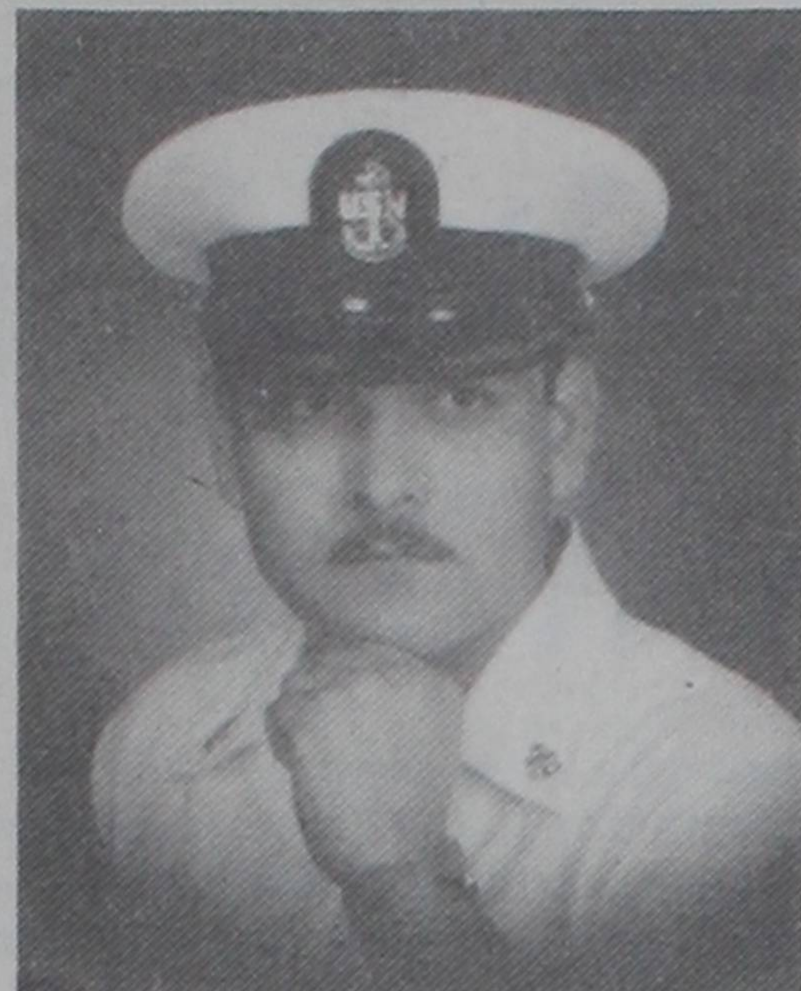
Chief Cryptologic Technician (Technical) Joe Lafuente recently received awards from the U.S. Navy.
