

Commission to Continue Inves. tigating Applications,

Austin, June 15,-This is ihe fourth of a series of questions asked by citizens of this State and answered by Orville S. Carpenter, executive director of the Texas Old Age Assistance Commission:

Q-Did the United States gov ernment have any part in draft ng the Texas law?

A- Texas Legislature, drafted the Texas Old Age Assistance Law in such form as to enable Federal co-operation. In pre paring the bill the Legislative Committee had the assistance and advive of a representative of the National Social Security Board.

Q-How many applications for assistance have been received? A-About 190,000,

Q-How many applicatins do you believe will be approved by July 1?

A-Approximately 40,000.

Q-What about the payments to these old people whose applie cations have not been approved July 1?

A-The Commission will continue investigating applications for assistance, and as each application is approved, the applicant will receive a check for all payments beginning July 1. New French Premier Helps Labor Win All Demands

STRIKING workers who paralyzed the industrial life of France at the moment when the "popular front" socialist majority was taking over the reins of the government, won complete victory with the aid of Leon Blum, new premier, as the general strike was settled, a disquieting note was added by a walkout of 150,000 coal miners and textile workers in northern France. Labor won the following five de-

1. Wage increases from 7 to 15 per

2. Recognition of workers' rights to organize in unions.

3. A forty-hour work week. Vacations with pay.

5. Collective bargaining contracts. Settling of the strike marked a significant victory for the new government

which assumed extraordinary powers to devise measures to bolster France's financial system and revitalize national defenses. "White collar" workers were the only group excluded from he general agreement which was signed by employers at the behest of the govern-

Leon Blum ment, but the premier promised relief for them. Premier Blum gained support from conservative forces with his announcement that "The People's Front is and will remain hostile to devaluation of the currency." The end of the strike restored a measure of confidence to a panic-stricken nation faced with possible famine due to the tie-up of its transportation, processing and distribution systems by 1,- President Roosevelt of Chester C. Texas Opens Its Great Centennial Exposition

EXAS celebrated the one-hundredth anniversary of its independence by ening a \$25,000,000 centennial exposition in Dallas. Foremost among distinguished visitors attending the world's fair the first week was President Roosevelt. To obtain the centennial exposition Dallas made available more than \$9,000,000 in cash and property, The exposition will be open until November 29. Numerous other celebrations marking the state's 100 years of freedom have been held in various cities and towns of Texas. The exposition presents educational, historic and sary-nature, study and practice.- recreational features associated with a world's fair,

Largest building on the exposition ground is the \$1,000,000 Texas Hall of State, which cost an additional \$200. (80) to equip. The building was erected as a memorial to the patriots and pioneers of Texas, and is the largest historical museum on the North American continent.

Senate Passes Its Own Tax Revenue Measure

THE senate passed the \$829,000,000 compromise revenue measure by a vote of 38 to 24. The bill then went to conference with the house of representatives which had enacted a revenue measure carrying out tax proposals made by President Roosevelt. The senate measure called for a 151/2 to 18 per cent tax on net corporate incomes as compared with the present 121/2 to 15 per cent levy; a new type of 7 per cent tax on undistributed profits; repeal of the existing exemption of dividends from the 4 per cent normal income tax; an increase of 1 per cent in the individual income surtax on surtax brackets between \$6,000 and \$50,000. The house measure called for a tax on corporate net income scaling up to 421/2 per cent, depending upon the amount of undistributed




