SINCE YALL got such a kick out of the little piece written by John Terry which appeared in "My Turn" four weeks ago, I'm going to sublet this space to him again for his latest epistle as follows:

Dear John,

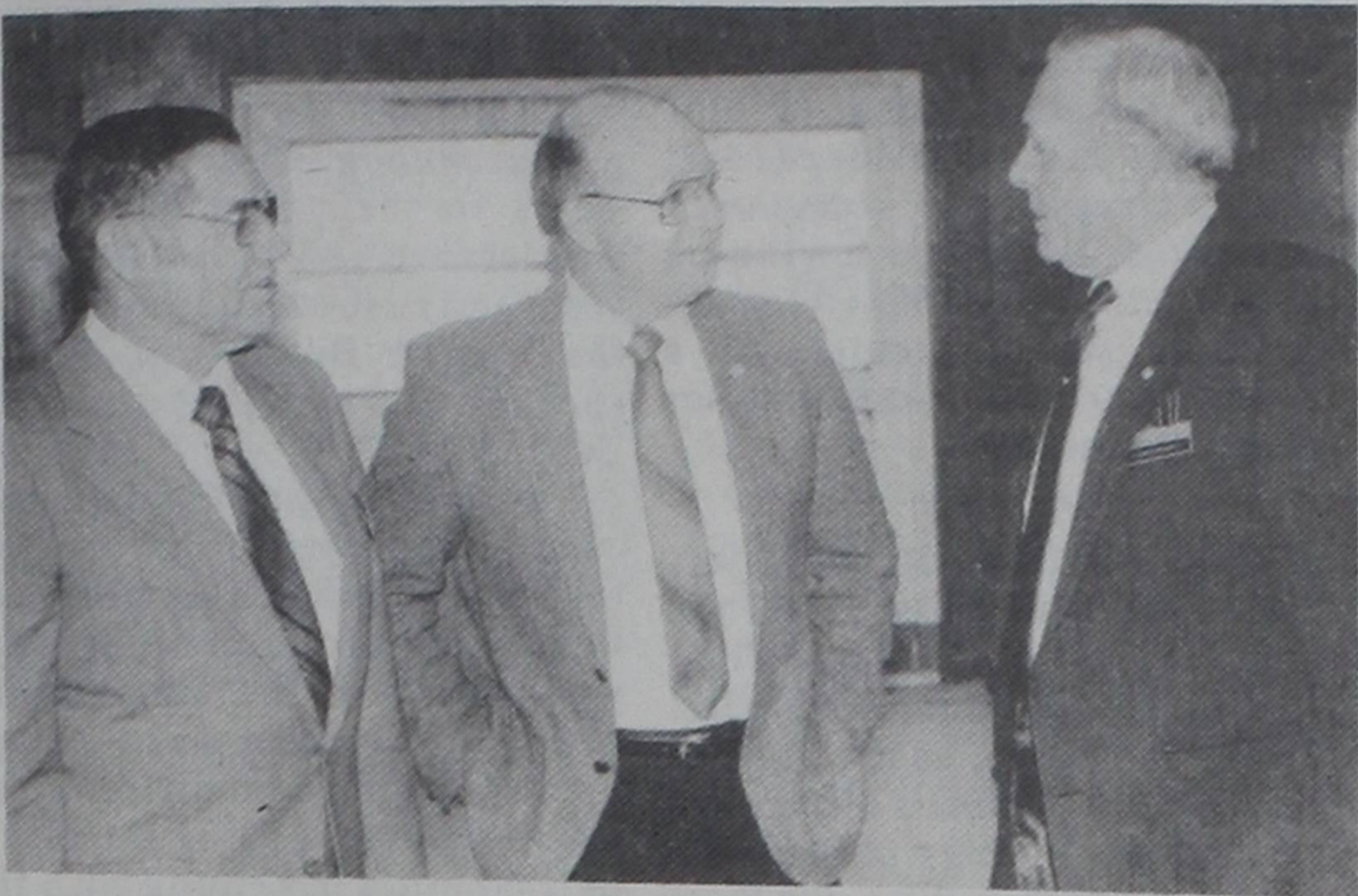

Williams Gets Edge

Parmer County voters gave a majority of their votes to Clayton Williams in the governor's race for the Republican primary last Tuesday.

In the Friona precinct, voters gave Williams 42 votes, 52.5 per cent, to 34 for Kent Hance, 42.5 per cent.

Countywide, Williams received 95 votes, 51.6 per cent, to 78 for Hance, 42.4 per cent.

It was the first time local and county voters had not favored Kent Hance in any election in which he has appeared.

Lesser candidates Jack Rains received only seven votes countywide; W.N. Otwell received two, and Tom Luce, one.

In the attorney-general's race, Buster Brown led the voting with 51 votes in Friona and 99 overall. Pat Hill had 11 votes locally and 37 in the county; "Tex" Lezar had one here and 5 overall; and Bobby Steelhammer garnered 9 votes in Friona and 14 overall.

In the state comptroller's race, Warren G. Harding, Jr., received 35 votes locally and 78 in the county; Jon Hall had 16 votes here and 40 overall; and Irby M. Ford had 13 local votes and 24 total.

For state treasurer, Kay Hutchison had 54 local votes and 117 total, and Charlotte Self had 17 and 35.

In the land commissioner's race, Wes Gilbreath picked up 39 votes in Friona and 93 countywide; William John had ten and 21; and Grady Yarbrough had eight and 24.

In the Commissioner of Agriculture race, Rick Perry had 25 votes in Friona and 62 overall; Gene Duke had 20 and 44, and Richard McIver received 16 and 34.

For Railroad Commissioner, Beau Boulter received 65 votes locally and 142 total; and Ted Lawson had ten and 27.

For Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, Tom Phillips had 55 local votes and 123 overall, and Daniel Rutherford had 15 and 35.

For Supreme Court Justice, Place 1, John Cornyn had 33 votes in Friona and 68 overall, and George Barbary had 29 and 68.

For the Supreme Court Justice, Place 2, Charles Ben Howell received 35 local votes and 82 overall, and Lamar McCorkle had 23 and 45.

In the race for judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 1, Joe Devany received 39 votes in Friona and 91 in the county, and Allen Isbell had 19 and 38.

Total Republican vote was 187 in the county, with 81 voting in Friona, 36 in Farwell, 27 in Bovina and 24 in Lazbuddie, with 19 absentee ballots being cast.

Absentee Vote Dates Noted

The absentee voting period for the Democratic runoff in Parmer County will be April 2-6, it was announced this week.

Since school dismisses early on election day, which is Tuesday, April 12, for the Easter break, voters might give some thought to voting absentee.

It is expected that Friona will have one day for an absentee booth, although the date for the booth was not known at the Star's press time this week.

Buske, Clayton To Meet In Runoff

Bonnie Clayton of Bovina and B.K. Buske of Friona will meet in the Democratic party runoff for the nomination for Parmer County Judge, as a result of last Tuesday's primary.

Mrs. Clayton, who is currently serving as Justice of the Peace for the Bovina precinct, led the voting in the five-candidate field Tuesday with 516 votes (31.9 per cent), and Buske polled 373 votes (23.0 per cent).

Eva Ancira finished third in the voting with 330 votes, Jimmie Mace received 281 votes, and Leland Gustin garnered 119 votes.

Buske won four of the ten precincts, and Mrs. Clayton also led the vote in four.

Buske held the lead in the three Friona precincts, which gave him 232 votes, and also in the Lakeview precinct.

Mrs. Clayton led her home box in Bovina, with 159 votes, and also led at Black, Rhea, and was co-leader with Leland Gustin at Lazbuddie.

The two Farwell candidates (Mrs. Ancira and Mace) finished dead even in their home box with 141 votes apiece, and Mrs. Ancira also led at Oklahoma Lane.

Mrs. Clayton benefitted by being the only candidate from her home box, and received 58.5 per cent of the Bovina precinct votes.

With two candidates from Friona (Buske and Gustin), Buske received 43.4 per cent of the Friona vote.

In the governor's race, local and county voters gave the edge to Jim Mattox, who made the runoff along with Ann Richards. Mattox, who slightly trailed Ms. Richards statewide, received 265 votes in Friona, 55.1 per cent of those cast in the governor's race, and 797 in the county, 56.3 per cent.

Incumbents File For City, School Races

Three incumbents had filed for re-election for the City Council, and two for the Friona School board as of Thursday of this week, but no challengers had filed.

Filing for the City Council are Mayor Clarence Monroe and council members June Rhodes and Bobby Jordan.

Incumbents Kathryn Goddard and Dee Willard filed for re-election to the Friona School Board.

Deadline for filing for either of the local races will be Wednesday, March 21, at either the City Hall or the Superintendent's office.

Mark White, former governor, was second-place vote-getter in Friona, with 83 votes (17.3 per cent) and 267 in the county (18.9 per cent).

Ms. Richards received 82 votes in Friona (17.3 per cent) and 241 countywide (17.0 per cent).

County voters also matched those statewide in giving Amarillo attorney Morris Overstreet an edge. The Panhandle native, attempting to become the first black candidate to win a state office, polled 176 votes in Friona (45.6 per cent) and 470 votes countywide (45.5 per cent).

Otherwise, Parmer County voters favored Hugh Parmer over Harley Schlanger in the nomination for the U.S. Senate, 795-216.

In the race for attorney-general, John Odam received 871 votes to 381 for Dan Morales.

In the state treasurer's race, Tom Bowden received 566 votes; Nikki VanHightower got 291; Karen Friend 253 and Aarmando Guterrez 96.

In the race for Commissioner of Agriculture nomination, Parmer County voters gave the incumbent, Jim Hightower, a "rap on the knuckles," although Hightower beat his six opponents statewide without a runoff.

Grant Will Pay For EMT Class

The City of Friona has received a grant in the amount of \$6,624.00 from the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

The funds were made available to enhance Emergency Medical Services in rural areas of the state.

The grant will be used to fund training in Parmer County. "There is a need across the county for more trained emergency medical personnel," City Manager Beelee Goodwin said. "We applied for this grant for the benefit of all the ambulance services in Parmer County. Our goal is to add 40 EMT's to the four services," he added.

Because of the grant, anyone interested in becoming an Emergency Medical Technician can do so almost without cost. The Highway Department funds will pay all tuition costs. The student will, however, be responsible for books. Those interested in the course should call Friona City Hall.

polled 518 votes, but the six challengers received 849 votes.

This was the strategy the opponents had deployed to try to force Hightower into a runoff, but the incumbent, who has been charged with favoring consumers over farmers, may have proven that there are more consumer voters than farmer voters in the state of Texas.

Bob Kruger outpolled Clint Hackney for the Railroad Commissioner post vacated by Kent Hance, 901-344. Gene Kelley won Parmer County over Fred Biery for Supreme Court Justice, Place 1, 697-304.

In the Supreme Court Place 2 race, Ross Sears received 447 votes; Bob Gammage 258 and Scrappy Holmes 279.

In the Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 3, Bill White outpolled Pat Barber, 680-350.

In the Place 4 race, Charlie Baird was favored over Herb Hancock, 545-454.

In the contested Justice of the Peace races, Vi Hutto won over Mearle Morgan for the Bovina JP position in a close race, 159-146; and Louise Hancock won over Irene Woods for the Farwell JP spot, 278-239.

Each of the three referendums were favored by county voters in the Democratic primary.

Referendum 1 (trial by jury) was approved, 915-370. Referendum 2 (election of judges rather than appointing) won, 1137-172, and referendum 3 (insurance reform), passed, 1237-111.

50 YEARS AGO—MARCH 22, 1940

Julian, Lazbuddie.

The Chieftain track team scored 108 points, and placed third overall as a team at the Hornet Relays last Saturday in Tulia.

Distance runner John Ed Duke was a double winner for the Chieftains, winning the 1600-meter run with a time of 4:51, and the 3200-meter run in 10:20.63.

In addition, Ismael Rocha won the 100-meter dash with a time of 11.55. Local sports fans said it was the first time since Charlie Morgan, who was a sprinter in 1983-84, for a Chieftain runner to win the 100-meter race.

Friona finished 1-2 in the 3200 meters, as Ramon Sanchez clocked a 10:29.2.

Jeff Stowers was second in the 3200-meter intermediate hurdles with a time of 44.34.

Duke's 3200-meter time, Stowers' hurdles time and Sanchez' 3200-meter time were good enough for them to rank on the Amarillo Globe-News' honor roll this week. Stowers is third, Duke seventh and Sanchez tenth.

The times take into account athletes of all classifications in their various events.

Other point-winners for Friona in the meet included the 1600-meter relay team (Sanchez, Andre Duran, Stowers and Rocha), which placed third with a time of 3:34.0.

Also, Brian Herring was third in the high jump, clearing 5-8.

Otherwise, Scott Houston placed fourth in the 300-meter intermediate hurdles with a time of 44.34; Saul Espino placed fourth in the 400-meter dash at 54.59, and Javier Correa was fourth in the 1600-meter run with a time of 5:06.

Correa also placed second in the 800-meter dash with a 2:08, and Warren Duke was third at 2:10.

Friona's 400-meter relay team placed fourth with a clocking of 46.0. Members of the foursome were Lance Outland, Scott Houston, Ismael Rocha and Jeff Stowers.

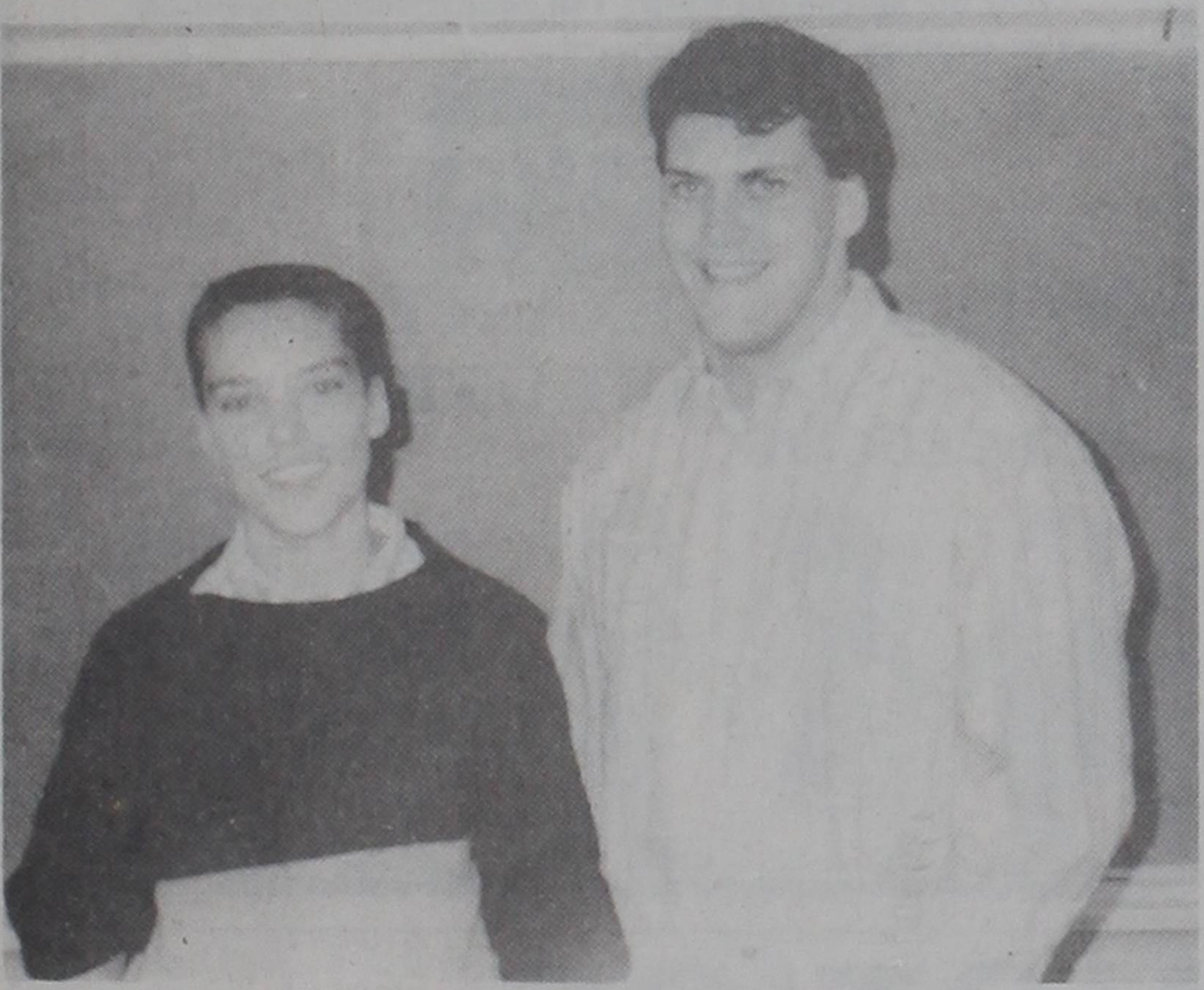

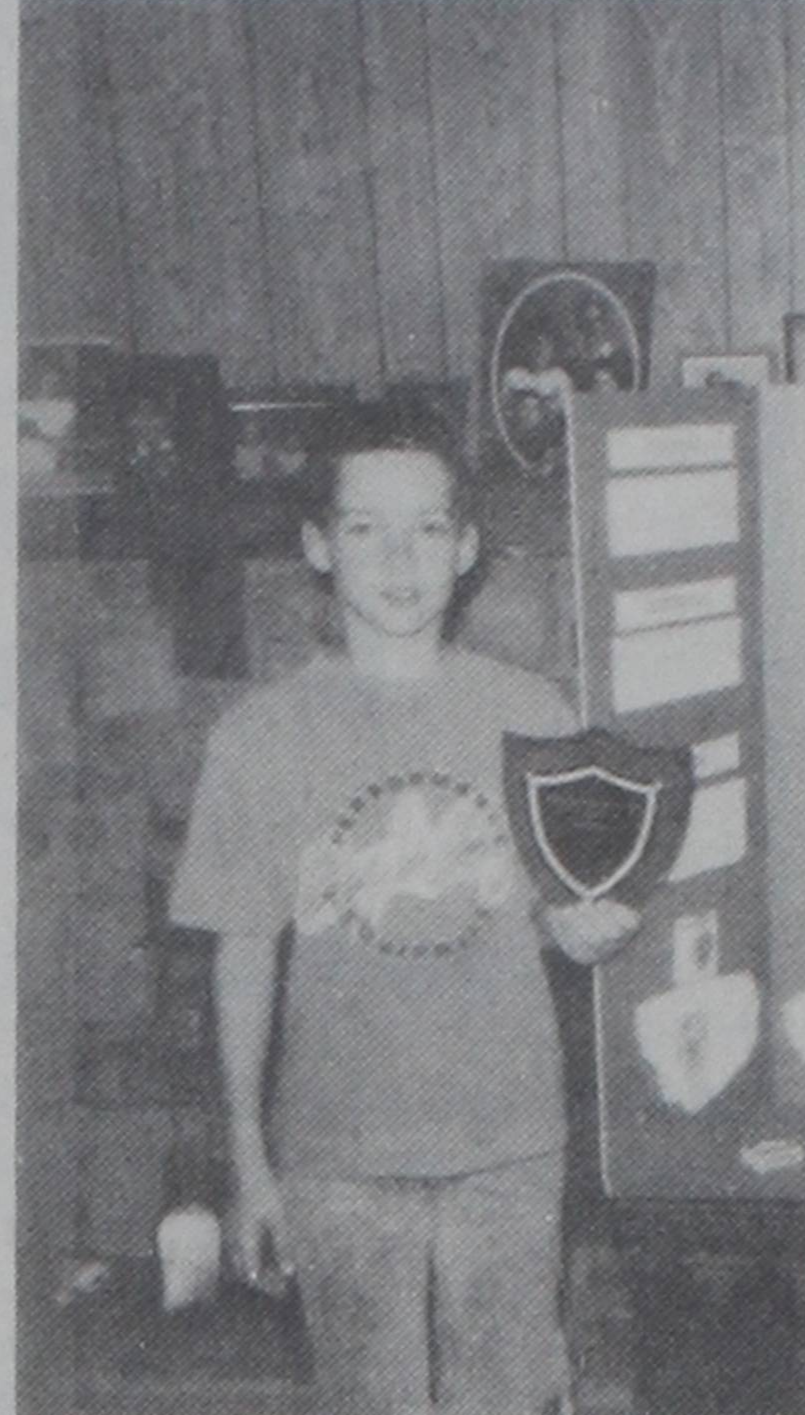

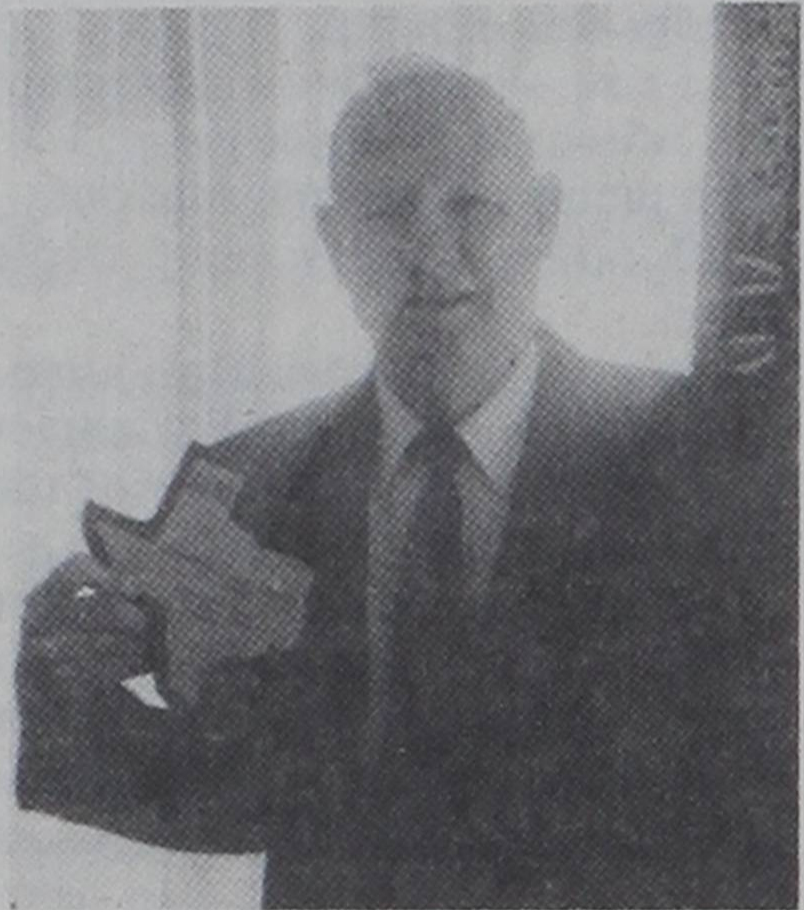
Students In DECA

Module XIV: Mutual Funds Help Spread Risk

If you're looking for the most important rule of investing, diversification is high on the list. Whether you call it spreading your risk or not putting all your eggs in one basket, it means one thing--adding safety to your investment program.

Mutual funds have traditionally offered a simple way to diversify and guard against major setbacks without giving up the potential of future gains. Yet to put all your money into one mutual fund might not offer enough diversification to satisfy you.

If this is the case, consider three basic ways to use mutual funds with other investments for more diversification.

1. **Buy a balanced fund.** These funds, also called total-return funds, divide their portfolios between stocks and bonds. Generally the percentages are flexible enough to allow the fund managers the discretion of being top heavy in either stocks or bonds yet not so liberal as to allow them to chase after trends.

2. **Buy certificates of deposit for guarantee of principal, and invest the interest in a common-stock mutual fund.** Now, your only risk is the income because your original investment is returned to you when the CD matures. Plan this strategy on a five- or ten-year program.

This lets you select a mutual fund that has a consistent record of gains during that particular time frame.

One recent study hypothetically invested the 8 percent interest paid quarterly from a \$100,000, 10-year CD into a conservative growth-and-income fund. That reinvested interest grew to \$174,000 with the original \$100,000 still intact.

3. **Split your investment between U.S. Treasury zero-coupon bonds and a mutual fund.** Again, none of your original principal is at risk. For example, in today's market with \$100,000 to invest, you could purchase U.S. Treasury zeros for about \$45,000 and place the remaining \$55,000 in a high-quality mutual fund.

In 10 years, the zero-coupon bonds would mature at \$100,000, your original total investment, and your mutual fund, compounding at a reasonable 12 percent, would be worth more than \$170,000.

By using either U.S. Treasury zeros or certificates of deposit and holding the investment until maturity, your original principal is not at risk. You could lose everything in the mutual fund and still have your original investment.

There are numerous variations of these three risk-spreading techniques. The idea is to invest in such a way that over a period of time your original principal will be returned to you. Diversification can do this.



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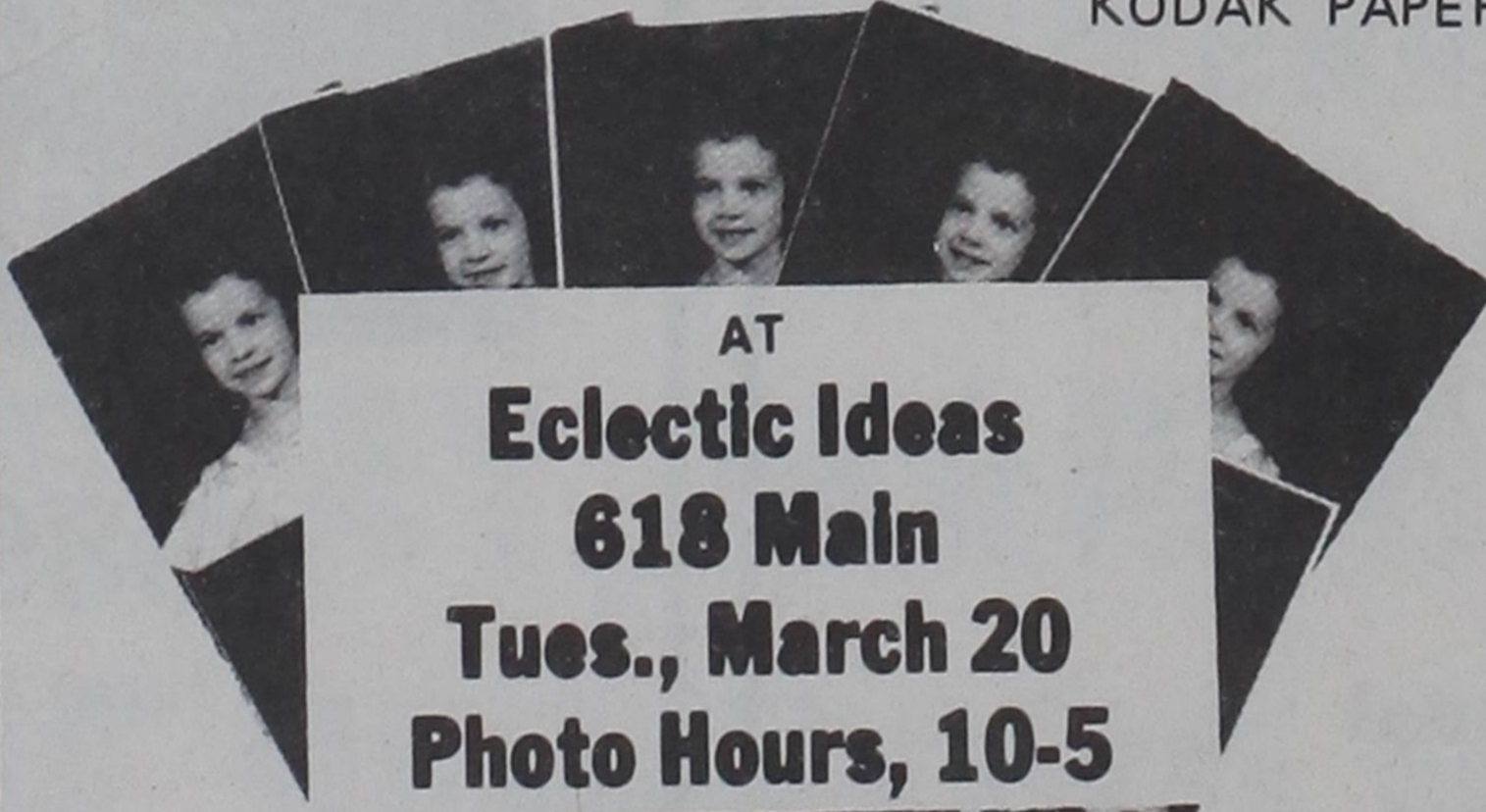
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NOTICE OF TARIFF CHANGE TO CENTRANET® SERVICE

GTE Southwest Incorporated gives notice of its proposed tariff changes to CentraNet® service, which is a Central Office-based service that provides PBX-type features to multi-line business customers and is currently being offered in all company wire centers where such facilities exist to provide the service.

The Public Utility Commission of Texas approved a generic tariff for CentraNet® service up to 100 lines in Docket No. 7652. The proposed tariff revision would establish specific rates for CentraNet® service involving 101 to 400 lines. Other proposed revisions involve the rate applicable to changes, additions, or deletions to the data bases and a new rate is proposed for additional trunks.

The names of the three CentraNet® packages have changed from Standard, Premium, and Deluxe to CentraNet® 1000, CentraNet® 2000, and CentraNet® 3000, respectively. Direct Call Pickup has been added to the three CentraNet® packages while Multiple Call Park and Shared Speed Call 30 have been added to CentraNet® 2000, and Speed Call 30 and Call Forward Busy/No Answer Split have been added to CentraNet® 3000. Flexible Night Answer and Automatic Route Selection also have been added as new optional features.

The proposed changes and new service offerings have been assigned Docket No. 9251, and pursuant to Section 43(d) of the Public Utility Regulatory Act will become effective June 23, 1990. Rates for service will be applicable to customers who subscribe to the service as well as existing customers. Therefore, there will be no effect on any other rates of the company. The company's gross annual revenues will increase by approximately \$399,600, or less than one percent annually.

The proposed rates are on file with the Public Utility Commission of Texas, and are available for public inspection at the offices of GTE Southwest Incorporated. Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission. The deadline to intervene in this docket is 3:00 p.m., April 9, 1990.

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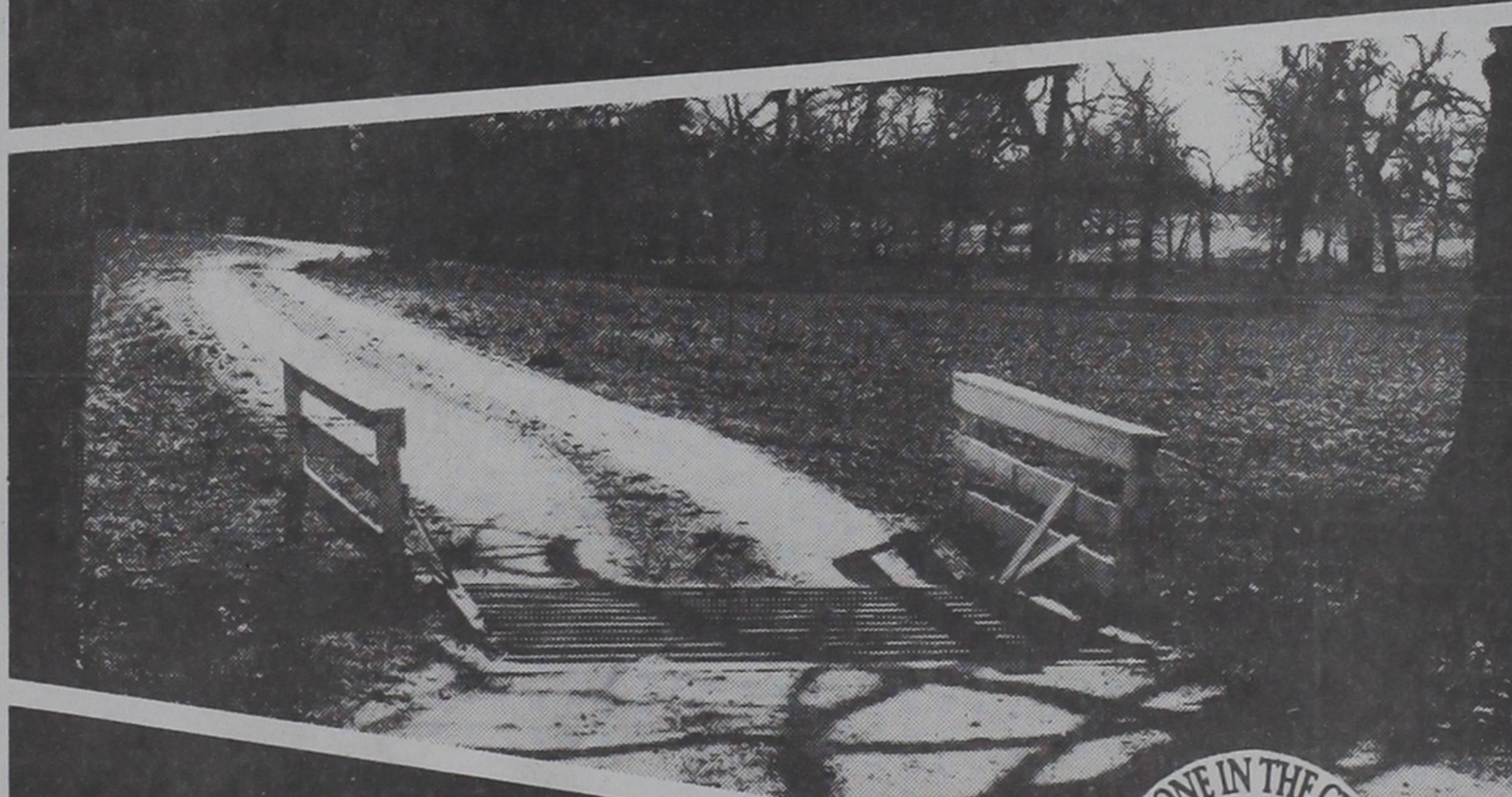

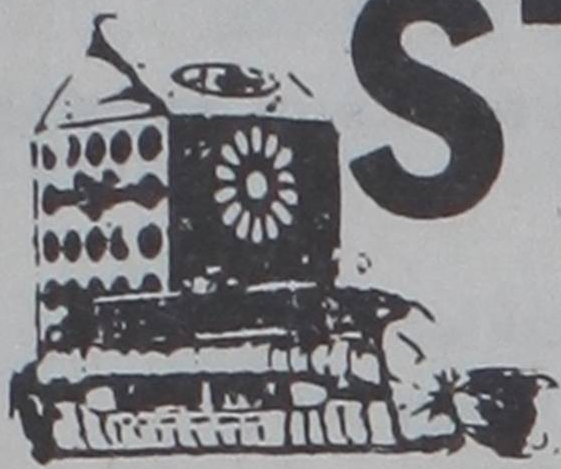

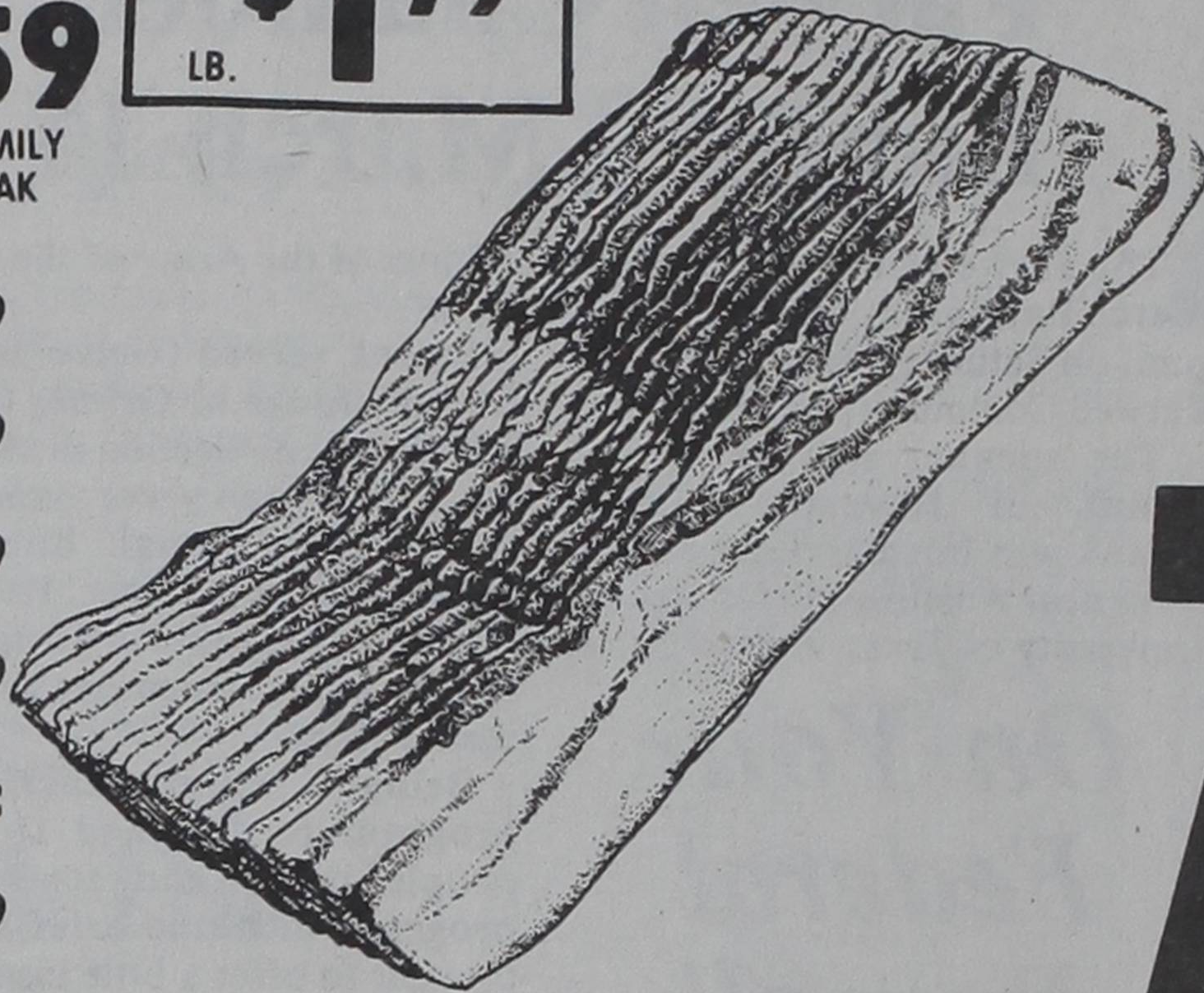
