



This is the general complaint of the growers, and from what I can gather I am constrained to believe that the farmer only receives what would amount to fair day wages for his work. Cotton is strictly a labor crop, and those who cultivate it are pretty certain of making a living, and, if they are frugal and industrious themselves, of saving a little something for a rainy day. 
