

CUBANS DYING.

Beyond Description-An Appeal to McKinley.

HAVANA. Dec. 1 .- Throughout Ha vana Province and in the towns of Casilda, Rio Blanco, Jibacoa, San Antonio and Guanabacoa hundreds of persons are dying of starvation. The condition of the people is pitiful, and while food from the supply vessel Brattau has been delivered at Matanzas, Baraino and other points, the supply is in no wise adequate. More food and more ships to carry it are needed.

The Spaniards are doing all in their power to prevent the truth becoming known, and the local press dare not describe the horrors of the situation. A fine of \$200 is imposed on every paper that prints a line about starvation. One paper more daring than its contempor aries. La Lucha, by paying a fine and risking the supression of its issue, appeals to President McKinley, asking that another ship be sent to Cuba immediately with food for the natives.

SPAIN MUST PAY DAMAGES.

\$50,000,000 in Claims Filed by Americans for Property Destroyed in Cuba.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 1.- Congress will be asked at its approaching session to establish a tribunal or court to have exclusive jurisdiction of all claims of American citizens against Spain grow ing out of the recent war.

So far there have been filed at the State Department claims as to Cnb. alone about \$50,000,000. Some additional claims were filed to-day by the agent of the Condert Brothers, of New York at the State department. This agent said that his firm had claims aggregating \$5,000,000 for damages Spain by reason of the destruction of the property of American citizens in

SMALLPOX AT CAMERON.

A Statement Issued by the County Health Officer.

CAMERON, Texas, December 8.-Dr. Greer, city and county health officer, made the following official report as to the condition of smallpox in Cameron up to noon today :

Since official report issued on Nov. 27, 1898, there have been approximately twelve cases of smallpox, all of which, with three or four exceptions, are able to sit up.

Nearly all cases are out of danger, but are still kept under guard.

Total number of cases in town since September 10 to date will exceed thirtyfour.

New cases will be reported from time to time.

People need not be afraid to come to

town to transact any business. The disease is almost entirely confined

to the colored people. There are some few cases in the Clarkson neighborhood in this country,

but all are doing well. Aside from Dr. Greer's report the citizens of Cameron held a mass meeting yesterday and discussed the smallpox situation, especially the manage ment. It was largely attended and a resolution was unanimously adopted indorsing the management of the city health officer and his assistants.

The citizens expressed themselves as being perfectly satisfied that there will be no spread of the disease outside the residence already afflicted. The public and private school all continue except the colored schools .- Post.
