Two Remarkable Needles. The international exhibition of needlework, which is to be held at Sydenham in July, 1884, will include, among other curiosities, two things which will not be the least among the attractions of the exhibition. One is the famous needle presented to the Emperor of Germany last year under circumstances worth recalling. The Emperor was visiting the great needle factory at Krenzschau, and was desirous of seeing for himself the relative power of machinery compared with skilled hand labor. A bundle of superfine needles was placed before him, one thousand of which weighed less than half an ounce, and he expressed his astonishment that eyes could be bored in such minute objects. Thereupon the foreman of the boring department asked his majesty to give him a hair from his beard, and receiving it he bored an eye in it, threaded it and handed back to the astonished emperor this improvised and most curious needle. The other at Reddith, and presented to the Queen. It is a sort of miniature Trajan's column. All around it are represented scenes from the Queen's life, executed so minutely that a magnifying glass is required to distinguish them. This needle can be opened, and within it are a number of very fine needles, on which scenes have also been engraved.—London Times.

A Terrible Time Approaching. The period between 1880 and 1885 cannot fail to excite the liveliest interest with astronomers, as the four great planets, Saturn, Neptune, Uranus and Jupiter will then be in perihelion for the first time in about 4,000 years, and in consequence of this remarkable event it is believed that the climatic conditions of the earth will be disturbed and produce alternate degrees of excessive heat, cold, rains, floods, hurricanes and fatal epidemics. During the sixteenth centuries of the Christian era three of the above planets were in perihelion, and from that or some other cause floods, hurricanes, earthquakes, sickness and the plague extended over the world and destroyed vast amounts of life and property. In the sixth century the plague broke out in the East, and sweeping over Africa, Asia and Europe, destroyed, it is estimated, 100,000,000 people. The city of Alexandria lost 200,000 inhabitants. In Constantinople 2,000 died per day during three months, and in and around Rome during the same time 3,000 died per day. A large number of cities, villages and provinces in Eastern Europe, Western Asia and Northern Africa were almost depopulated, and remained in that condition several centuries. The people fled panic-stricken in every direction, and for miles around these cities the dead were left unburied, and thus filling the air with pestilential odors added additional horrors to the scene of distress and misery. In the sixteenth century the plague ravaged the world again. Constantinople lost 200,000 people, and in and around Rome, Naples and other cities of Italy, 400,000 died in five years. Fifteen millions perished in China and 30,000,000 died in the countries bordering on the Red, Black and Mediterranean Seas. Marseilles lost 75,000 inhabitants in six months, and in and around London 250,000 died in three years, and in that city fires were kept burning day and night a long time to purify the air, which seemed vitiated several years. Ireland lost 300,000 people, Paris 100,000, Madrid 75,000, Alexandria 50,000, and the total loss of life of the plague and famine of the sixteenth century is estimated at 120,000,000. If the foregoing calamities were the result of three planets in perihelion what may be anticipated from the four now approaching perihelion? The theory entertained is that the perihelion of the four great planets will affect the sun in turn, and will injuriously affect the earth, and hence disastrous consequences to life and property will follow.—New York World.

Our special correspondent sends us the following description of a dipping arrangement which he saw at the ranch of Woodhull Bros., Kinney county: I saw in course of erection, or rather approaching completion, the best description of dipping vat I have seen yet, and for the benefit of some of our readers, who may think of erecting a dipping apparatus, I will give a brief outline of its dimensions, etc.: The vat is one hundred feet in length in the clear, its width at the top (inside) is twenty-four inches, and at the bottom nine inches. The sides are formed of solid concrete, six inches in thickness. The drain, which has a solid bottom of rock, and will be covered with a thick coating of cement, is forty feet in length by twenty-four in width. It is divided up the centre, and has a fall toward the vat of eighteen inches, and towards the sides of six inches. The vat seems to me to have many advantages over the usual style of vats. It is quite wide, and deep enough for a sheep to swim in, and at the same time there is no unnecessary room, consequently it will not take so much stuff to start it. Then, by the time a sheep gets through to the end, it will, without having been detained, unless to shove its head under twice, have had sufficient time in it.—Texas Stockman.

THE EUCALYPTUS. Its Advantages for Shade and Shelter.

Next to feed and forage, good shelter is the most important question to stockmen, and in this connection we desire to bring to the notice of the stockmen of Texas, particularly those having ranges on the open plains, the advantages of the Eucalyptus, or sweet Gum of Australia, as a protection for stock from storms and the burning sun in summer, and its importance as fuel.

In many places in Texas, particularly in the Northwest, there is no fuel to be had conveniently except a few roots of bushes, and no protection for stock except the natural depression of the ground, and as a consequence, stock drift, during storms, away from the range in search of shelter, causing great loss and expense to owners. We do not know any one in Texas who has given it a trial, but from what we know of it, have no doubt it would grow in any part of the state. We have seen it growing in its natural state on what we would call in Texas very poor soil—in fully as dry a climate as this, where there was nothing else growing on the ground except a few clinging vines.

The trees were large and thrifty, from two to four feet in diameter, with dense foliage, making a perfect shade, or shelter from the storms.

We have seen a grove in Southern California, (where they have less than ten inches of rain yearly), less than three years old, with trees from three to five inches in diameter, making a perfect shelter for stock from the cold storms of winter.

This grove was planted on an open prairie for fuel and shelter, and the owner informed us he was so well pleased with the experiment that he would plant several more on his range.

It is especially adapted to Western Texas, from its ability to withstand drouth, and from the fact that it is an evergreen, and would not only furnish shade in summer, but protection as well.

As an article of fuel, there is nothing we know of that is as rapid in growth or better for fuel. We have seen a grove in Southern California that was planted for fuel, and from which the owner was selling wood, which he told us was paying him better than any other wood.

It is especially adapted to Western Texas, from its ability to withstand drouth, and from the fact that it is an evergreen, and would not only furnish shade in summer, but protection as well.

It requires but little care, only putting the seed in the ground and thinning out as the trees grow larger. Seeds may be obtained with but little expense from Sydney, Australia, or San Francisco, California.—Texas Stockman.

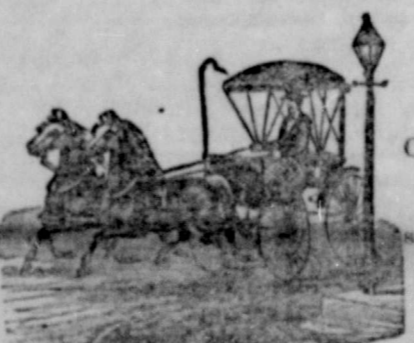
