# KING INDICTED; **CAN'T BE FOUND**

GRAND JURY RETURNS A BILL EMBEZZLEMENT.

More Than Fifty People Are Subpoenaed and Asked Regarding the \$8000 Bank Robbery at Fort Worth Tuesday Week.

Adjourning Thursday afternoon, afr having examined more than fifty witnesses with reference to the Waggoner Bank and Trust company robbery, involving something slightly in excess of \$8000, the grand jury in Fort Worth has returned an indictment against Walter King, charging him with embezzlement. Mr. King, however, was not to be found Thursday, and it is believed htat he has gone to fields unknown.

This forms the second chapter of the nost sensational robbery ever commit ted in Fort Worth. According to Mr. King's statement immediately following the disappearance of the money, he was held up in the bank by a lone bandit, and at the point of a revolver and a threat to kill, compelled to give up the money he had placed on the counter for the purpose of arranging and putting in bags. All of this is alleged to have occurred on Tuesday, a week ago.

About two days after the reported robbery was announced, the Waggoner Bank and Trust company was presented with a check to cover the loss. and, it is said, it did not come from the insurance company, either. Walter King, who is charged by in-

dictment with having committed the deed, had been at the head of the Main street branch of the Waggoner Bank and Trust company for about two years. Prior to that time he had served several years in the county clerk's office, and had become so well known in a political way that he ran for the office, but was defeated. He is a man of good business ability ,and his connections were of the very best. In fact, he was one of Fort Worth's one of the most beautiful homes in Fort Worth.

GRAND JURY RETURNS A BILL CHARGING HIM WITH EMBEZZLEMENT.

More Than Fifty People Are Subpoenaed and Asked Regarding the \$8000 Bank Robbery at Fort Worth Tuesday Week.

Adjourning Thursday afternoon, afer having examined more than fifty witnesses with reference to the Waggoner Bank and Trust company robbery, involving something slightly in excess of \$8000, the grand jury in Fort Worth has returned an indictment against Walter King, charging him with embezzlement. Mr. King, however, was not to be found Thursday, and it is believed htat he has gone to fields unknown.

This forms the second chapter of the most sensational robbery ever committed in Fort Worth. According to Mr. King's statement immediately following the disappearance of the money. he was held up in the bank by a lone bandit, and at the point of a revolver and a threat to kill, compelled to give up the money he had placed on the counter for the purpose of arranging and putting in bags. All of this is alleged to have occurred on Tuesday, a week ago.

About two days after the reported robbery was announced, the Waggoner Bank and Trust company was presented with a check to cover the loss. and, it is said, it did not come from the insurance company, either,

Walter King, who is charged by indictment with having committed the deed, had been at the head of the Main street branch of the Waggoner Bank and Trust company for about two years. Prior to that time he had served several years in the county clerk's office, and had become so well known in a political way that he ran for the office, but was defeated. He is a man of good business ability and his connections were of the very best In fact, he was one of Fort Worth's most popular young men, being a mem ber of several of the leading lodge and had always taken an active part in society. He is married and owns one of the most beautiful homes in Fort Worth.
