

Signs the President's Name. Mrs. Margaret Wilson Young of Chiholds the unique office of autograph

substitute for the president of the United States. No attempt is made by Mrs. Wilson to copy the signature of the president in signing his name to public documents, and no resemblance exists between the original and the signature she writes. She held the same position in the last year of the Roosevelt administration, and in 1908 she signed his name 80,000 times to public documents. The work requires more patience than brain work, although Mrs. Wilson is quite competent to transact any ordinary business. Mrs. Wilson is the great-granddaughter of General Stokely, who was on Washington's staff during the Revolutionary war. He equipped at his own expense and commanded a regiment at Brandywine. Before her appointment to the position she now holds, in 1908. Mrs. Wilson beld an important place to the postoffice department. The first woman to get this place was Miss Marcia McKean, who was a close friend of the wife of Mr. Aethur before be ecame president. She was succeeded by ber sister. Mrs. Wilson is the third woman to hold the position.


