

WILL FILTER CITY WATER

AS PRECAUTION AGAINST FUTURE EMBARRASSMENT

IMPROVEMENT WILL COST SEVERAL THOUSAND DOLLARS AND WILL BE BEST IN STATE.

OTHER BIG THINGS BEING CONSIDERED

Company Intends to Make Numerous Extensions and Otherwise Better System—Morgan Jones Wants Stock in Organization.

In view of the recent water situation, the most objectionable points of which have been overcome, the San Angelo Water company is planning to expend several thousand dollars in installing a filtering system—one that will be second to none in the state. Announcement of this effect was made Wednesday by one of the members of the company, and it present plans do not fail, active work should begin within less than two months. The indications are, however, that there will be no hitch, and that things will be moving within less than the two months allotted.

The entire water supply will be filtered through sand and gravel, and being the best in the state to start with, there is no question but that when the new system is working San Angelo can well afford to claim the purest water in the world.

This step is to be taken by the waterworks company as a precaution. As everyone knows, the company has been up against a hard proposition, and it was through no fault of any member connected with it, either. The big overflow was responsible for a condition of affairs that has not before existed in San Angelo. For many weeks the water was muddy unfit for use.

No one doubts that the source of water supply is the very best that could be obtained, for nothing can be good water coming from the splendid springs. And it is not likely that another such overflow as mentioned in the foregoing will occur again soon.

But the waterworks company does not intend to run any more risk, it is said. The filtration system will be a costly improvement, but it will do away with all future worry and San Angelo will have the problem forever solved.

In fact, the waterworks company is figuring on a whole lot of costly improvements these days, and some additional news of great importance will be announced within a few days, it is thought. It is known to be a fact that those at the head of the department have held several important meetings recently, and they are seriously considering making some big extensions and doing other things that will make this one of the greatest systems in the state.

Along with these contemplated improvements comes the statement that Morgan Jones has made overtures to the local company and has expressed himself as being anxious to procure some stock. In fact, it is said, he has offered to buy a controlling interest. This, however, is not confirmed by the waterworks company, but at the same time it comes from a reliable source that Col. Jones has actually submitted the proposition.

Morgan Jones is a good man to tie onto at any place in the road, and it is very likely that arrangements will be made whereby he will be given an opportunity to take over several slices of stock, although it is not at all probable that he will be given a controlling interest.

STREET OILING STUNT COMES OFF ON MONDAY

LEAVES IN ABOUT TWO WEEKS FOR JOHNSON CITY, TENN., WHERE HE HAS CALL.

A BIG SURPRISE

HAS NO STATEMENT TO MAKE BEFORE NEXT SUNDAY.

WORK IN SAN ANGELO

After six years of faithful service as pastor of the First Presbyterian church, Rev. J. W. Siler has tendered his resignation and will leave in about two weeks for Johnson City, Tenn., where he is to take up his new work.

Wednesday morning Dr. Siler made known his intentions, and at a meeting of the elders of the church Wednesday night he handed in his resignation. This action came as a complete surprise and the elders were unprepared to meet the shock. They took no action and will exert every effort to induce Dr. Siler to remain.

Asked regarding the matter Wednesday night, Dr. Siler said that he had no statement to make at this time, but would report to the congregation Sunday. He has received a call from the Johnson City church and feels it his Christian duty to respond.

Dr. Siler is a man of great ability and his sermons are always conservative. He is a worker, and is not only regarded as one of the strongest ministers in the San Angelo pulpits today, but as one of the leading preachers of Texas. He came to San Angelo from South Texas, and one of the first things undertaken was to raise funds for a new place of worship. The matter was taken up in a systematic manner, and with the substantial aid of the congregation enough money was raised to start the actual work of construction. Then the rest came easy, and last fall the congregation moved into the new edifice, one of the hand-

somest that is to be found in West Texas. It cost \$35,000.

In other ways Dr. Siler has proven his ability. He has worked up a large membership and has been a leader in rendering assistance to the poor and suffering.

"It will be a great loss," said a member of the congregation, in discussing the matter, "and we are going to insist that Dr. Siler remain with us. We realize that in wanting to go, he feels that he will be in a position to do more good in a new field. But we don't think so. His work here has been remarkable; he has given us a splendid church, he has built up the membership and has given us impressive sermons, but there is still much to be accomplished, and we need him just at this time."

SURVEYORS IN FIELD WITHIN NEXT 10 DAYS

LINE RUNS THROUGH STERLING CITY AND LAMENA TO CONNECTION WITH CUT-OFF.

STORY COMES STRAIGHT

RAILROAD MAN PRESENT AT THE MEETING WHEN CONSIDERED.

WHAT ABOUT MR. LANIN?

Like a bolt from the blue came the information Wednesday morning that the Santa Fe is to immediately begin work on an extension of its road from San Angelo to Sterling City, and that engineers will be on the ground within the next ten days.

This story comes from a railroad man who only a day or so ago happened to be present in the office of prominent officials of the road in Temple when the matter came up, and the cat escaped from the bag.

"I was not placed under any obligation to keep it a secret," he said, "but for certain reasons I don't want my name mentioned. However, I will say that as certain as the Santa Fe train leaves for Temple this afternoon the road will be extended to Sterling City as soon as the officers can secure a right of way and get the engineers on the ground. The extension will be built up the North Concho valley, with a possibility of touching Carlsbad and Water Valley. However, it may miss one or both of these places.

"From Sterling City it is the intention of the high moguls to extend to Garden City, Stanton, Lamesa and thence to a point on the Coleman cut-off east of Lubbock, far enough to avoid building through the cap rock.

"The Santa Fe officials are probably making this move to beat the Lanin road, but whatever their intentions are, they are ready to begin work, and what is more, they are going to rush it through like wildfire.

"It is surmised by many of the leading officials of the road that Lanin and his associates got wind of the fact that the Santa Fe was to extend from San Angelo and conceived the idea of getting in ahead of that road and then selling out at a nice profit. Well, that scheme won't hold water, even if two parallel roads are built."

It has long been known that the Santa Fe intended to build an extension from San Angelo, because the growth of this city demanded it. However, the exact route to be followed was not made public before Wednesday. And it is no wildcat move. The Santa Fe is a great system, capable of doing anything in a railroad line that it desires, and as it is its intention now to build to Sterling City and onward, no doubt is entertained but that it will be going some in a short time.

What effect this startling move will have on the Lanin railroad movement is only a matter of conjecture. It is evident that the Santa Fe realized that the Iowa capitalists were plucking a plum too luscious to be passed up, so it decided to get in first.

It hardly seems probable that if the Santa Fe gets its work in first, that the Lanin interests will carry out their intentions. It seems that the Santa Fe is confident of delivering the goods, or otherwise it would not at-

UNCLE SAM IN TEST OF AUTO FOR WAR WORK

Not to be outdone by the foreign governments in seeking the greatest results from experiments in aviation and the practical adoption of the high class automobile for the purpose of warfare, the United States government is pushing every advantage at its command to solve the air problems and minimize the dangers in utilizing the motor car in times of peril to the nation. Plans have been perfected at Washington for exhaustive tests in the use of the automobile in dispatch service.

Wednesday the first "transcontinental" organized war car ever entrusted with a military mission embracing the postal road work and official dispatch bearing features left New York bound for San Francisco.

Major General Leonard A. Wood, commanding the department of the east, has prepared an official dispatch to be delivered to Major General John F. Weston, commander of the department of California, which is to be carried across the continent by a military man who will endeavor to overcome numerous obstacles—constructive, from a military standpoint—adhere to a fixed running schedule, and visit such military posts on the long transcontinental route as the courier in charge of the expedition may elect to include in his itinerary.

M. E. Parrott of Poughkeepsie, a private in the New York state National Guard, a trained soldier, enthusiastic automobile tourist and a graduate of a military school that made a specialty of training men for large military operations in the field, has been appointed to bear the dispatch from General Wood to General Weston.

The machine selected for the test is the Mitchell "Ranger," a four cylinder Mitchell touring car, the first 1910 model turned out at the Racine factory, under the personal supervision of Designer Bate. The car will have no special mechanical equipment, the motor and all parts of the frame, axle, wheels, springs, etc., being the same as the Mitchell Motor Car company will supply for all its 1910 output. In the tonneau, however, will be carried shelter tents and sleeping paraphernalia for Private Parrott, his driver and the remainder of the khaki-clad detail assigned to the car.

Specifications submitted to General Wood for the motor car used in making this memorable test provided for a modest legend painted on the bonnet of the "war car" briefly stating its mission.

Private Parrott has elected to wear the regulation khaki uniform of the army service, an dull who travel with him will be similarly attired. The official driver of the Mitchell "Ranger" will be Frank X. Zirbes, well known as the pilot of the Mitchell car in 1908 "around the clock" endurance race at Milwaukee, Wis., and other big events, who will hold the wheel of the war car all the way from New York to San Francisco.

Private Parrott started from Governor's island in New York city and will follow in a general way the route taken two years ago by the New York-Paris racers. It is not unlikely that the Mitchell Ranger will make a few detours in order to report at the most prominent military posts slightly off the route.
