PIONEER CATTLEMAN DIES.

R. S. Slover Came to Texas in Ox Cart-Aged 71 Years at Death.

R. S. Slover, one of the best known early cattlemen of Texas, died Thursday at Bridgeport, where he has been making his home for many years.

Mr. Slover, who was 71 years old. came to Texas with his wife from Tennessee just after the war. The trip was made to this state in an ox cart. He acquired land in Parker, Wise, Palo Pinto and other counties, and had large cattle holdings. He has remained robust despite his age. His death was due to complications following an attack of typhoid fever.

Mr. Slover was the father of Rev. George F. Slover, former pastor of the Mulkey Memorial church of Fort Worth now president of Clarendon Two other sons, John H. and W. S. Slover, survive at Bridgeport, with their mother.

The funeral was held at Bridgeport Friday afternoon. His remains were taken to Fort Worth Saturday moruing, and from there to Weattherford, where interment was made in the fam- Is Confident That Something of a Se-


