Gates Are Open. Down are the gates, the fences and every other barricade that would serve to hinder the entrance of any who would desire to come in and see fair San Angelo in gala attire. Not only are the homeseekers cordially welcomed by the fair association and the people of this city at large, but also the pleasure seeker, coming from afar, to witness the glories and triumphs of the new West. From every hamlet of this portion of the state have been gathered agricultural productions, cattle, poultry and everything conceivable in the matter of living beast or plant that bespeaks in itself the coming possibilities of Concholand. At the race track is gathered as fine a collection of racers as it has been the privilege of any fair in Texas to draw. From many states come these horses. Tuesday morning at first daybreak the fair grounds will be completed and Wonderland will be unfolded to the visitors. Not a Wonderland as regards freak palaces and gold and silver illusions, but something that beats all of that—agricultural and live stock exhibits—the backbone of a country and a fairland to the man in whose bosom beats a love and appreciation for all of those things that make up the sustenance of the human race. On the streets are pitched tents of as fine a carnival as ever graced a city twice the size of San Angelo, and the lights and music attending causes many a heart long since withered to expand once more and feel that life is worth the living. Exhibits. A magnificent exhibition hall has been erected at the fair grounds in which the exhibits are superb, local merchants coming to the front and making displays that the advertisers from other cities find had to equal—none surpass them. The Findlater Hardware company is one of the first to get in line and that company has placed in its allotted space a splendid collection of stoves, ranges, agricultural instruments, combined with all else to show the versatility of a large hardware establishment. In connection with the water troughs, it has erected a big pump and a bottomless tank, which makes a splendid advertisement. The San Angelo Manufacturing company has gone on record for high-class wagons and buggies, and shows many of them in the hall. The Robertson Paint company leaves no doubt of the nature of its business by stacking up the paint and paper to superfluity. The J. B. Taylor Grocery company takes a back seat to none and is on hand with a line of everything edible in the fancy grocery line. The San Angelo Business College is out in the full bloom of ledgers, desks, etc., suitably arranged to demonstrate to visitors that San Angelo has commercial as well as theoretical education. Walker Smith company has put up an exhibition hall of its own, filled to repletion with all of the fanciest of West Texas roasted coffees and other fancy lines of stuff manufactured by that popular wholesale firm. Other local firms are represented in excellent style. Other cities beside San Angelo are represented in the monster collection. The Rock Island Plow company, the Avery Implement Co., and several other outside firms have foreseen the great results accruing from advertising in San Angelo and have acted accordingly. Stock. Lee Bros., as is customary with those big stock raisers, have a splendid line of registered Herefords on exhibition—cattle that have won prizes everywhere they have been shown. The Head of the River ranch, owned and supervised by William Anson, is identified by a large stable of its own, in which some of the finest quarter horses in the state are being exhibited. John Chambers, too, comes in for a full share of recognition with a line of thoroughbreds with which he expects to carry off many rakes-offs. And the ladies—over all things, the ladies in the hall especially spaced off for them—have placed a display of the brains and culture of San Angelo's women, for tribute to their skill at the higher lines of study as well as the divine elements that attend exemplary home work. Poultry. William B. Hunter is as busy as his middle initial nowadays putting the poultry exhibits in the allotted spaces and an excellent line he has charge of, too. Plymouth Rocks, Rhode Island Reds, every class of standard bred chickens will be looking out of coops in the poultry department Tuesday morning. It is calculated by the close observers that an exhibition of this merit was never before known in San Angelo. Two wells are in operation on the grounds, serving ample water to all. MILLIONS LOSS AS RESULT OF FOREST FIRES

REPORT FROM WINNEPEG SAYS PEOPLE ARE TERRIFIED AND ARE FLEEING FOR LIVES.

THREE SWALLOWED BY FIERCE FLAMES

Every Possible Effort Exerted to Check Its Spread, But People Are Unable to Make Any Headway.

Winnipeg, Oct. 4.—Sweeping the prairies of Hutton, Alberta District, is a fierce prairie fire. The flames are overlapping the earth and spreading out over a great amount of territory. The devouring element has been raging for a day or so and is utterly uncontrollable and far distant can the rolling smoke and the angry flames be seen. Three lives have been swallowed up and two million dollars worth of damage has been done. People are fleeing from the fire like wild cattle, seeking shelter from that awful terror. Up till the last report the fire was still raging fiercely and was out of the control of the people. Every possible means is being used to check it, but nearly all hopes are lost and it seems that the whole country will be wiped out for many miles around.

REFUSED LUNCH NEGROES KILL JOHN S. HARLOW

Carrollton, Ky., Oct. 4.—John S. Harlow, a prominent citizen, was killed Monday by two negroes, who were refused something to eat and a place to sleep. The negroes seemed violent from the start, but Harlow never suspected anything and refused their requests, and was immediately killed. It is believed the negroes have been arrested and placed in another jail and are being hidden to prevent being lynched.

IN SAN FRANCISCO. Taft Gets Into Earthquake City Monday and Gets Reception.

San Francisco, Oct. 4.—President Taft arrived Monday afternoon, after stops at Redlands, Sacramento and Berkeley. He was greeted by the Redlands school children. A reception was given the president at the Fairmount hotel Monday night, where a very enjoyable time was spent by the party.

Rioting. Barcelona, Oct. 4.—Rioting in Spain for the last few months will cost the lives of many people and the executions have started. Monday two were shot and many sentenced to life imprisonment. These are the leaders of the riots and following these will be many executions and imprisonments.

CITY DENIED USE OF JAIL

IN THE FUTURE PRISONERS WILL BE PLACED ELSEWHERE.

RESULT INVESTIGATION

Police Committee Makes Favorable Report, Though Outsiders Declare First Statements Are Correct.

Deciding to erect a city prison or calaboose in the immediate future, the city solons held a meeting Monday night. A complaint was registered by a city officer to the effect that he had not been allowed the use of the county jail for a prisoner arrested on the streets Saturday night for abusive language. No immediate action will be taken on this matter, but as near as possible the city will refrain from the use of the county jail, and to this effect, a resolution was passed that an unused cell at the court house be brought into requisition, moved to an adjoining lot, a house placed over it and that the temporary structure be used for a city prison. Alderman Hassell was put in charge of this work, and was empowered to act as his judgment demands.

After thoroughly making an investigation of jail conditions, the committee appointed for that purpose at the last meeting made a favorable report. "I looked over the jail Monday afternoon, and what I saw fed the prisoners was enough for men not working, but insufficient for men doing such hard work as is the lot of the convict," declared Alderman August Balfanz.

W. E. Newton, another member of the committee, expressed himself as follows: "I think the men are fed amply. While I was looking on they received beans, bacon and baker's bread, and sometimes they get biscuit, so one of the prisoners told me. I went in the kitchen and saw food piled up in quantities. If they are fed all the time like I saw them fed, they have no kick coming. A Mexican in jail informed me that he got two meals a day and plenty to eat."

These statements, though favorable, were not admitted by Joe Lynn and J. W. Montgomery, men who have been over the jail and in places where the men are working. They stoutly asserted that first reports of conditions are correct. Mr. Lynn, who has been connected with the city work for a year, maintained that the prisoners were not fed enough, and J. M. Montgomery supported his statement. No definite action was taken.

City Secretary McDonald read the resignation of Pound Keeper A. R. House, and it was accepted.

FOUR AUTOMOBILES COME IN HEAVILY LOADED.

FLAGS AND BANNERS

Rear of Each Car is the Sign, "We Are From Del Rio," and Their Word is Good in San Angelo.

Ho! Ho! Choo! Choo!

Around the corner and up Chadbourne street came four automobiles from Del Rio Monday, loaded with people to attend the fair. The cars had flags, banners and all sorts of signs on them that designated where they were from.

On the rear end of each car was the sign, "We Are From Del Rio," and everybody took their word for it. The machines were well loaded and the occupants seemed to be as happy as larks. STARVING.

Cherokees Suffering On Account of Crop Failures.

Muskogee, Oct. 4.—In danger of immediate starvation are several thousand Cherokees, is what John D. Benedict, superintendent of the Indian Schools, reported Monday upon his return from the Flathill district.

The Indians have failed in their crops and are in a critical condition, and are earnestly pleading for aid. Nothing has been done as yet, but it is expected that the government will soon take action.

Cholera.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 4.—Cholera is ravaging Russia and causing much excitement. Many cases of Asiatic cholera have been reported in the city and near by towns. The disease is the most deadly one ever known and kills thousands of people when it gets a start.

Every possible precaution is being taken to prevent the scattering of the disease, but little success has resulted so far.

WILBUR WRIGHT BREAKS RECORD

New York, Oct. 4.—Making a new record flight, Wilbur Wright aeroplaned it across Governor's Island and around Grant's Tomb in his aeroplane today. Warships were gathered in the river in order to save Wright should his machine fall into the river. The flight lasted 33 minutes and 33 seconds, during which time he traveled 18 1-2 miles as a crow flies, going at the rate of 45 to 50 miles per hour.

Preparations were being made for another flight Tuesday, when the cylinder head blew out and further trials were postponed. Wright left for Washington Monday night to instruct Lieutenant Lem in the use of his machine, and from there he will go to Dayton, his home, shortly afterward.

Curtiss was unable to make a flight during the day.

FATE JONES LINE HANGS BY THREAD

Having failed to raise the entire amount asked for the extension of the Abilene & Southern into San Angelo and thence west out of the city, the railroad committee met Monday afternoon and decided to draw a new contract and submit it to Col. Jones. The committee will simply offer as a bonus the amount it has on hand.

At one time the amount subscribed reached \$93,000, but after it was learned that Col. Jones had decided to go west instead of south, several subscribers withdrew. The bonus raisers have worked faithfully, but the citizens have failed to respond as liberally as they should for an enterprise of this kind.

Whether or not Col. Jones will entertain the new contract, which will reduce the amount to be given for the road, is a matter that cannot be answered. It will be recalled that Col. Jones originally intended to build from Ballinger to Sonora, or some other point in that section, and had no intention of coming to San Angelo. A committee from San Angelo approached Col. Jones and induced him to reconsider and make this city a proposition.
