

GAS EXPLOSION TOMBS SIXTY MINE WORKERS

SEVERAL HUNDRED MEN AT WORK WHEN CRASH COMES, AND MANY ARE INJURED.

VERY LITTLE HOPE OF RESCUING LOST

Every Effort Being Made to Reach Unfortunate, But It is Feared They Have Already Succumbed.

Nansimo, B. C., Oct. 5.—By a premature explosion of gas in the Wainwright colliery, where hundreds of men were working, today, sixty of the miners were entombed and it is feared that they have all perished.

LOSES.

Miss Haskell Receives Unfavorable Verdict From Supreme Court.

Columbus, Oct. 5.—By a decision of the Ohio supreme court, Mrs. Lillie Haskell, wife of the governor of Oklahoma, lost her case against the Kansas Savings and Trust Company.

The papers in the case were put up several years ago by Governor Haskell as security for a loan that he got on the trust company to promote Texas telephone company.

New York, Oct. 5.—Eugene H. Blange, member of the former firm Schlang & Sons, and one of the known families of the city of St. Louis, was arrested here today charged with forgery.

EARTHQUAKE SHOCKS FELT MANY STATES

St. Lake, Oct. 5.—Earthquake shocks were felt here tonight. They were of short duration and not very severe. The shocks were felt about 10 o'clock. Reports from several states in Utah and Idaho say that shocks of varying intensity and slight duration were felt almost throughout entire states. There is no loss of life or property reported.

St. Louis, Oct. 5.—Bitten by a black rattlesnake while fighting a rattlesnake on the top of Topa Topa mountain, Guy Richards was carried to the floor of the Ajal Valley resort. The distance by the trail is about five miles. The bitten man was borne on the shoulders of a hunter Bob Clark, his face covered with smoke from the burning of the snake's hair-singed by the hunter as he was from fighting the snake for hours. Clark carried Richards down to a point in the Ajal Valley where the snake's bite could be treated.

AUSPICIOUS OPENING FAIR AND CARNIVAL

15,000 VISITORS HERE FOR FAIR

ATTENDANCE RECORD FAR EXCEEDS ALL EXPECTATIONS.

MANY MORE ARE COMING

Exhibits in All Departments Outclass Anything Else of Kind Ever Seen in West Texas.

Wednesday being the Abilene-Santa Fe day at the fair, Col. W. M. Lacey from Abilene, will make a speech in honor of the day before the grand stand at 1:30 p. m.

Col. Lacey is an old-time West Texas man and has watched all the western towns grow from their infancy to a matured age of a city. San Angelo is especially one of the towns that he has kept his eye on and he will tell the story of the city in brief of her early days and the contrast of Abilene with San Angelo.

Col. Lacey is one of the leading orators of the West and is always ready with the proper language to dedicate an occasion in words that appeal. He has noticed the growth and prosperity of West Texas and comes with the subject of fitness to the occasion that will be most pleasing and entertaining to the people.

Great balls of fire and large waves of smoke, have you been to the fair? There is everything that can be thought of from a hamburger stand to a great big grand stand, and every place is doing a wholesale business.

Tuesday afternoon things opened up in full blast and the bell tapped and away went the race horses. Thousands of people were on the grounds all day and thousands more are coming in on each train—people not only from Texas, but from nearly every state in the Union.

The attractions and displays at the fair grounds are simply grand and superb, having the magnificence of the starry heavens on a frosty night. Nearly every business house in the city has a place of representation and all are neatly prepared. The art of advertising at the grounds is one of beauty and simplicity. Not only are such displays made, but there is real Christian and charitable work going on. The Daughters of the Confederacy are looking after the interests of the old soldiers and selling tickets to the Yale theater for Thursday night, which fund will go to some good cause. A lunch stand for the Buckner Orphans' Home is also doing a good business and everybody seems to take a great interest in all the different things of major importance.

The day opened with a great success and closed in like manner, and from the outlook this fair will excel all others in history for San Angelo.

Attendance.

How many visitors are there in San Angelo? Well, that is a pretty hard question to answer. Every incoming train brings them by the hundreds, and they have been flocking in since Sunday. A conservative estimate of the number of paid admissions at the fair grounds Tuesday places the mark at 10,000.

It is figured that at least 15,000 out of town people are already here, and by Wednesday afternoon this number will have been increased another 2,000. Without doubt, this is the greatest fair from every point of view that West Texas has ever seen.

President Hagelstein and others who have taken an active part in planning for the big celebration declare that the attendance and interest have far exceeded their fondest expectations. It goes to show that the eyes of the world are on San Angelo, and that with the proper encouragement people will be flocking into this city by the hundreds during the next five years, and that they are coming to make San Angelo their home.

Tuesday's Results.
Opening the fair season for 1909 in San Angelo, the 2:30 pace, best 2 out of 3 race, led off Tuesday about 2:30 p. m. This was the major race of the day and some very exciting things occurred.

Starting this race was easy. Amy Brooks, the winner, made a good start and finished in the first heat in the lead of Brooklyn Brooks by a small margin.

As the pacers rounded the race track there was yelling and gusts of excitement from every spectator. People cheered as one horse would gain and when the home stretch mark was reached, all eyes were keen to see the finish. The finish came and Amy Brooks, from Waxahachie, led the bunch.

The second heat was taken with more enthusiasm than the first, as many people believed that Brooklyn Brooks would win out. This was a vain thought, as Amy easily traversed the track with much grace and a perfect cadence. The finish was made with Amy Brooks in the lead.

The yearling event was not only a race of winning, but a race that told the coming probability as regards a racer. In this race there were three heats and all of them were run. Baby Valentine and Miss Valentine scored on the track in the first two heats, but "Baby" proved the winner in the third by a close call, for Miss Valentine was closely disputing the turf with her. Baby winning only by a neck's length.

The running race was quick and to the point. The racers took little time to warm up and got down to work. All eyes were on Prince, but, lo, it was not that way long, for Wahoo stretched himself out and fought for the finish and came under the wire winner. Wahoo won, but it was not easily done, for there was another runner named Bessie A. that was closely crowding at the finish.

Wild cries went up when Wahoo won and cries of joy by her favorites, but the other side said there was revenge coming when Buster Brown would clean the track.

This was the greatest surprise of all, for Buster Brown was defeated by Miss May. He was the favorite of the grounds as regards runners and everybody was saying Buster would lead the bunch. Buick 16, driven by G. W. DeWitt, from Dallas.

Buick 10, 30 seconds handicap, driver unknown.

Friday, five-mile handicap, with same machines and Buick 10 will have 10 seconds handicap.

Saturday, ten-mile handicap and Buick 10 30 seconds handicap.

Entries are held open for Marion Flyre and White Steamer, which are expected to be here to participate, but all other machines are barred as to entrance.

Try-Out.

You talk about the Barney Oldfields and the Jesse Hlingsworths, but the fair attenders had the pleasure of seeing a G. H. Clark Tuesday afternoon, speeding a 4-cylinder 36-40 H. P. Jackson at the rate of about 60 miles per hour around the circular track in a try-out. Clark opened the throttle and let it loose and that was all that was necessary only to sit steady and let it tear and it did tear. Not only did this machine tear the air, but it ripped the dirt from the earth and dissipated it around in the air for several hundred feet.

Clark sat at the wheel and Guy Tuna was the master mechanic of the company. Mr. Clark was the most pleasing looking fellow you ever laid eyes upon while steering the racer around the track and really seemed to be happy. Not only did he seem to enjoy the ride, but the master mechanic had a pleasant smile and was ever ready to reach back and turn on a little more speed.

Mr. Clark made a round on the track just to warm up a little and turned on the speedometer and made two miles in 2:24. He said that the track is not exactly in the proper shape in some places to do his best. However, he let it get at a very rapid rate. The car rounded the track and sped onward to victory. The home stretch was made and at a high rate of speed, too, for when the Jackson started on the home run, there was nothing but a sheet of dust to be seen, but a rippling noise was heard, and presently there came a buzz war on by the grand stand so fast that it took two people to see it—one to say there it comes and the other to say yonder it goes.

Several months ago in the state races at Waco, M. A. Homes, state agent for the Jackson, drove the same car, but was a little unsuccessful in the race. Instead of winning, his machine took to sliding and butted into a fence. The machine was making about 65 miles per hour and when the tear-up happened, Mr. Homes said he took a sojourn in the air for about forty feet and was a little banged up. However, he is all right now.

If you've never been in attendance on a West Texas carnival carousel, you have yet an experience of moment to happen to you, for it is one of the best jollification propositions that ever struck a city.

They are here and the streets are full to overflowing with happy, jolly, good-natured sight-seers from early morning till the wee hours of the next day. The rowdiness, boisterousness and wild antics that sometimes accompany these occasions in other places are painfully absent and that makes it all the better. The crowds all of Tuesday and up till the midnight hour filled Chadbourne street and most of the cross streets to the brim, and then some, and there was not one objectionable feature about the celebrations of the day. Like the milling of a thousand cattle, the surging crowds drilled from end to end of the main portion of the business district, and if you did not keep tight hold of yourself you were likely to be lost in this shuffle of happy and contented yet expectant humanity.

They visited the shows of the Parker Amusement Company in bunches and droves and the whole day through, and the carnival proprietors have no complaint on that score. They are prepared to take care of and amuse all that come and give them a good show for their money. No matter which tent flap they lift, there is something to be seen worth the seeing. From the carousel with its load of wheel struck patients to the "Booger Red" wild west show, with its fancy stunts.

They came in all fashions, from all points of the compass, from the two excursion trains to the old-fashioned stage coach that has seen the days of the Indian holdups, and they are still coming.

Although the streets are lined, crammed, jammed, and crowded until it was impossible to pass a man unless one stood still while the other passed, and impossible to pass down Chadbourne street unless you watched for the cracks and slipped in sideways, the merchant made no complaint, for in the ebb and flow of the crowd the overflow filled the stores comfortably with good customers and the clerks were kept busy all day attending to the needs of the "out-of-towners." The streets through the main portion of the city presented a pretty picture of varietal lights that gave sufficient illumination for all purposes and filled the view with a flow of colors equal to the scintillating aurora.

Martin's fireworks display is easily one of the features shows on the pike. For over an hour Tuesday night Prof. Martin entertained an audience of 1500 people. There was a continuous fusillade of mines, bombs and shells. The rockets were exceptionally good and carried many elaborate effects. The whole program went off without a hitch from start to finish. A change of program is announced for each night.

BIG HOTEL PLANNED FOR SAN ANGELO

AT LEAST \$200,000 TO BE TURNED
LOOSE IN THE CONSTRUCTION
OF MAMMOTH HOSTELRY.

NORTH TEXAS MONEY BEHIND MOVEMENT

Location Already Selected
and Lease May Be Secured at
Any Time—Announcement
Soon.

It has been reliably reported that
movement is on foot now and will
be announced within the next few days
through the columns of the papers
put up a \$200,000 hotel, furnished
complete and modernly equipped with
every device that goes to make up
a up-to-date hotel.

One of the finest corners of the city
has been spoken for and it is expected
that opportunity will be given for
in Angeloans to take stock in the
enterprise.
It is also stated that a lease on the
premises can be made at any time
and that experienced hotel people are
ready to take a lease on the property

at a price that will bring ten per cent
on the money invested either for three
or five years. The plans will be put
on exhibition and it is probable that
stock subscription lists will be opened.
It is stated that North Texas money
will be used to build the hotel, but
that San Angelo will be given oppor-
tunity to take as much of this 10 per
cent investment as they may wish to
carry.

NOW UP TO LEGISLATURE

FIVE HUNDRED CHARGED WITH PLAYING RACES

PINKERTON DETECTIVES MAKE
THE GREATEST HAUL IN THE
HISTORY OF NEW YORK.

DETERMINED EFFORT TO ENFORCE THE LAW

Cases Are to Be Prosecuted to a Finish—Outcome Awaited With Much Anxiety.

New York, Oct. 5.—One of the greatest sensations connected with the anti-gambling act as regarding betting on horse racing and the making of books was sprung here today when five Pinkerton detectives made a successful round up of 1500 men charged

with aiding and abetting gambling at the Metropolitan track.

This is the largest number ever rounded up charged with any misdemeanor and it will prove a big blow to the racing fraternity who seem to desire to evade the provisions of the law. If conviction can be had in a majority of the cases. The outcome of the cases is a matter of conjecture as yet, but it is thought that those apprehended will be prosecuted to the full extent of the law in an attempt to put a stop forever to the tendency to run over the provisions of the anti-race betting statute.

MARKETS.

NEXT SATURDAY**

While looking over the material at the San Angelo Collegiate Institute I find that there are a number of men who will make the best kind of timber for a fast and a gritty team. There are a few old men who are showing up good and the new material is doing extra fine. Taking into consideration that they have only had ten days of practice, their line bucking is good and their end running is fine, and from all present indications the college boys will make a better showing than was expected at the beginning of the season.

The old men who are back are Gillis, Mitchell, Rawls, Holland and Montgomery and the new men who are doing the best work are Ulmer, Cocks, Hodges, S. Hestor, Reed, Mullen, Bodeman and Cornelison.

Ed Gillis, who is the captain this season, has two years of football to his credit and will doubtless lead his team to victory. Mitchell, the sub-end of last year, is showing up exceedingly well for his weight, as he only weighs 130 pounds, and he is making some of the heavier men get up and work if they want their names on the team. Rawls is playing half-back and end and is doing very well. Holland, the 180-pound fullback, is doing wonderful work behind the line and he will doubtless make one of the star players this season. With his weight and speed, something can be expected of him, so look out, boys. When Holland hits the line it must give. Montgomery, the last year's right tackle, is also doing work worthy of mention.

The coach is greatly handicapped, as he has nearly all "green" men, and it will take some time to get them all in first class shape, but yet they are willing to hold up their end, so he will doubtless hold up his end.

As I know there is a great deal of football that can not be taught, and the only way to learn it is to learn through observation and by asking questions.

The football season has started and San Angelo, like other cities, wants to show the outside world that she cannot be out done on anything, so the San Angelo Collegiate Institute and the San Angelo High School are both striving for the supremacy, and from all present indications, the Institute will be on top.

Football is a game in which comparative scores count naught. One team might play one of the weakest teams in its class a tie game and yet when it approaches its worst enemy on Thanksgiving Day, it can make it get up and hustle and the spectators stand and wonder how it is possible for it to make such a good showing.

Football training has its full meaning and for that reason the larger colleges near a professional trainer large sums of money to take charge of the men, and he has full control of their training. When the trainer says don't do this, this rule must be abided with and no excuses are accepted and no variation from his rule can be made under any circumstances. So much for the training part of football.

There are, no doubt, many people in San Angelo who have never witnessed a good football game, and at the same time say to their sons who are attending school in the city or out, "Now, son, I don't want you to play football," and have no other reason for such a statement than some friend's or neighbor's word, and they in turn received it from another friend, and in this way formed their opinion that football is the most dangerous game in the world. Now, you parents who have never seen a football game played, make it a point to see the one that is going to be played at the San Angelo fair next Saturday afternoon and see for yourself if it is as rough as some people picture it to you.

By referring you to statistics, I can show you that the majority of accidents come from lack of training either on the gridiron or from lack of physical training, and in such you can plainly see that accidents must occur. I have played five years of football and have my first accident to meet with, and I can refer you to any number of players who have the same record. I will admit that there are minor injuries that befall us all. For instance, you might be out driving and the horse may get frightened, and if you are hurt it was not your fault—you thought the horse was gentle. In fact, it was gentle, but you were hurt. Now whose fault was it? Not yours, of course, and it is the same way with football.
