Secretary of State Dickinson Claims That Fee Should Be No Less Than \$12,040.

Trenton, Nov. 9 .- Application was made before the second branch of the supreme court today by former Attorney General R. H. Carter for a peremptory writ of mandamus compelling Secretary of State Samuel Dickinson to issue a certificate of authority to the Texas Company to do business in New Jersey, up on the payment of the usual fee of \$10 for OPPOSED TO PRIVATE TESTIMOsuch certificate.

Dickinson insists that the Texas Company is a Texas corporation and having a capital stock of twelve millions, should pay \$12,040 to do business here. That is the amount Texas would charge a similar corporation from this state for a certificate.

Turning Point Off Chadbourne Street Depends On What Inducements Are To Be Offered

ACROSS THE RIVER EXTENSION

Officials Will Take No Definite Steps Until Property Owners Interest Themselves Regarding Bridge Building

The street car company on Tuesday decided to make its first extension om Chadbourne street to East San Angelo.

Orders for the poles and ties for this work will be placed at once and ill shipments should be under way in ten days or two weeks. The other material needed is already in storage here.

The extension committee of the street railroad company, consiting of Sam Crowther, A. M. Hicks and O. E. Stevenson, made this recommendation to the directory, after poring over maps and hiking over almost countleess acres of streets and crossings.

Whether the turn out from Chadbourne street will be made from the Landon hotel corner or as far north as Harris avenue will depend upon the ature of the overtures received by the street railroad company from inerested property owners.

A city's greatness must spring from eternal forces plus a reciprocal activity from internal forces. In other words, were a city left to its own re sources to feed the multitude and clothe the millions, the hour could be forecast when decay would set in and when hopes would wither.

San Angelo is blessed in a peculiarly happy degree with splendid extental 4. encies needed to develop this place and in having an active internal activity to help all things about.

But just suppose-

For instance, suppose that all the land around San Angelo that could be irrigated at a minimum of cost should be placed under "the ditch," what my brother, oh, what would the har

Let's don't, however, for the sake o argument, place it quite this strong Just let us suppose that the tillable land within a radium of 50 miles from this city should be given over to in tensified agricultures, what, in such an instance, would the harvest be?

The result of either of these condi tions would mean a city of at least half million people here just as quick ly as brick and mortar and iron and steel could be bonded together to fur nish domiciles for the men who would come here to engage in business.

Just why so little attention has been paid to the subject of settling th vastlyl fertile country contiguous to this city is one of the anomolies that the greatest cause for this lack of direct attention to this matter lies in he absence to an appalling degree o adequate transportation facilities. This deep mystery, for the people appar ently have not given deep study to the causes that have debarred the building of railroads in the West.

We are getting, with such a slow pace as to be exasperating, yet apparenergies in the future not to any sin gle thing. We should above every thing else see to it that the man with the hoe, the tillers of the soil, the almoners of God, are induced to come to this section where the maximum o returns follow the mimimum of ef-

If any one for one moment harbors a belief that irrigation in this section is any less profitable than irrigation in any other section, let him make journey to Mertzon and interview the people there who have coined money from irrigating their lands. Let hin probe to the bottom every statemen that is made and the scales will fal from his eyes and if he is an earnes! seeker after real truth he is bound to confess amazement at the show ing that has been made.

For goodness sake, let's scatter our ple living in the country contiguous to San Angelo or this city cannot enjoy a healthy growth. No city can be come more powerful than its sur rounding section, nor greater than its citizenship make it. San Angelo has a citizenship that can conquer planets or move mountains and San Angelo is surrounded by a country that can sustain millions. We should induce the millions to come here for their sustenance. It's up to us. We have got to go forward, or we may go backwards. The safest foundation for the forward movement never losing its momentum is for the people of this city to secure actual settlers upon the unbridled tracks of lands lying hard by this city and being given over to the white face steer and the other less intensified forms of agriculture.

MORGAN JONES SIGNS CONTRACT WITH CITIZENS.

Work Is to Begin at Oace-Citizens to Buy \$160,000 in Securities.

Abilene, Tex., Nov. 9 .- At a public aceting of the Abilene 25,000 club that organization, by a unanimous vote, ratified and signed a contract with Morgan Jones to build a railorad to be known as the Abilene and Southeastern from this point to Rising Star fifty miles southeast of Abilene. The work is to begin immediately, it is stated, and this is the first of four roads proposed to be built by Abilene in order to prevent outside interests from cutting off its territory. The 25,000 club is to furnish right

of way and terminal facilities in Taylor county, and in addition to this the citizens and members of the club are to take \$100,000 worth of bonds in the new railroad, which, when the road is completed, will be in the nature of shares of stock. The \$100,000 will represent practically one fifth of the total cost, the remainder to be advanced by Morgan Jones and put into the enterprise. Mr. Jones. has just completed the Abilene and Southern and now owns it. He is also the man who constructed the Wichita Valley road into Abilene. In addition to this contract with Mr. Jones it s said there has been made another arrangement by several prominent and wealthy Abilencites whereby the road can not fail. It is announced on the best authority that construction work will begin immediately and be pushed on to early completion. The oad will probably be continued through Rising Star to other southwestern points.

Bring 500 Farmers Here and Within Ten Years San Angelo Will Have 100,000 Population, He

Says.

The life of farmers, the need of nore of them and the dawn of scienific farming" was made the subject of an address by Colonel Dick Bonner, known throughout the state as "farmer" orator of East Texas. and for an hour he interested the members of the Tom Green County at the court house Tuesday evening.



"Although payments so far bave celpts issued between the first day of er." October and the last day of January, the holders will be entitled to participate in the city and county elections, provided, of course, they have county receipts also.

"The highest number of qualified voters heretofore has been about 1250, but I fully expect to see this number increased to 1400 this year, including overs and unders. By overs and unders I mean those who have reached the age of 21 years and are entitled to exemptions, and those past the age of poll tax paying."

Payments on property taxes are coming in slowly, but the number of receipts issued is in excess of those issued to date this time last year.
