QUARANTINE MODIFIED.

County in Texas Affected by Federal

Washington, Dec. 10 .- By an order issued by the Secretary of Agriculture, effective December 6, the following areas are released from the federal quarantine for Texas fever or tick fever of cattle: In Texas, Scurry county; in Oklahoma, Harmon county, that portion of Greer county west of the Kansas City, Mexico & Orient railway, that portion of Caddo county north of the Mangum branch of the Chicago, Rock Island & Pacific, and the remainder of Canadian county; in Arkansas, the counties of Mississippi and Poinsett; in Tennessee, Warren county and the remainders of Putnam and Dekalb counties; in South Carolina, the countles of Ocones, Pickens, Greenville and Anedrson; in Virginia, Lunenberg and Mecklenburg counties, and Bruton district of York

This action is taken as a result of the progress made in the extermination of the ticks which spread the disease. Since the beginning of this work in 1906 over 80,000 square miles of territory have been freed from ticks nd released from quarantine.

PREACHER GETS EVIDENCE.

Calls Bluff of Chief With Real Liquor Rought on Sunday.

Indianapolis, Decfl 10 .- A week ago the Rev. Harry G. Hill, pastor of the Third Christian church, declared from he pulpit that the police make no effort to enforce the law and that the force is corrupt.

Chief Metzer denounced the minister as a liar and said he proposed to have him before the grand jury.

Two young men, members of the church undertook to prove the accusations of the minister true, and in a few hours the minister's study contained a dozen bottles of beer and whiskey that had been bought after closing hours Saturday night and yeserday. ## COTTON CROP BETTER THAN WAS EXPECTED

Col. Penn Predicts Price Will Be Good and That West Texas Will Lead.

According to Col. W. C. Penn, who is a prominent cotton man of Ballinger, the cotton crop in West Texas this year is very much better than was expected at the beginning of the sea-

Mr. Penn stated that West Texas held first place in Texas in yielding cotton this year. While he can not go to 20 cents this year, he believes ing for 16 cents, it is likely that this right around twenty cents.

Col. Penn says that the people of year, even though they raised less cotton. One bale of cotton this year is practically worth twice as much as one baie sold for last year.

Many farmers of West Texas, especially those of Coke and Nolan ounties, have been rather surprised n the amount of cotton they gathered from their fields. Several have raised over one-half bale to the acre. There are many places in Texas this year that only got one bale from about every ten acres. On an average West Texas has raised about one-third of a bale to the acre this year.

During October 109 persons were killed, an increase of hirty-three over the number of fatal accidents in October of last year, when not so many trains were run. There is a corresponding increase in nonfatal accidents.


