

In the summer of 1921, G. C. Keeney who had fought through World War I, was back in the States with a wife and son-and no job

He, like many other veterans, decided he wanted to farm, so he purchased 125 acres of land near Carlton, Texas. He and Mrs. Keeney decided the proper thing to do was to go down to A. & M. Suffice it to say that when the Keeneys headed their Model T toward home they were the proud owners of a "mammoth" 12,000-egg incubator.
