**Huddleston Writes On Dairy Situation In Hamilton County**

Explaining that there seems to be some confusion regarding the dairy situation in Hamilton County, Representative Earl Huddleston of Ogleby has requested publication of the following statement:

"I have had some write me recently in regard to new regulations being sent out for dairymen from the State Health Department at Austin, so I wrote Dr. Cox who is Health Officer of Texas and asked him not to try to force something on our dairymen which would put them out of business. I had a letter from him saying he would be reasonable and would give you every protection. He said that they desire only to protect the general public. I told him in a letter that I knew it was not the intention of any member of legislature to pass any law which would force small dairymen out of business.

"I would suggest that you see your county agent, Mr. Lawrence at Hamilton. I conferred with him Saturday and left some information with him which I received from Dr. Cox. Mr. Lawrence is doing all he can to assist our people, and after talking with him, I think you will be convinced that we can work the matter out so all of you can go on with your business.

"I will be glad to assist further in this matter if my help is needed, so I told Mr. Lawrence to call me, if he should need me. I think the thing to do first is to see Mr. Lawrence before you dispose of your cows, because we think we can work it out."

**County Agent Tells C. of C. Gathering of Hico's Opportunities**

The Hico Chamber of Commerce met at Vie's Cafe at 7:30 p. m. on Tuesday, Feb. 26, with twelve members present. E. H. Lawrence, county agent of Hamilton county, was a guest of the chamber.

The president, Webb McEver, was in the chair. The following account of the meeting is taken from the notes of the secretary, E. H. Persons:

Minutes of a previous meeting were read and approved.

Luther Knox made a report for his committee on the banquet held for returned service men at the Russell Hotel on January 15th, 1946, showing total collections of \$145.75 and expenses paid amounting to \$90.75, leaving a balance of \$55.00 turned over to the Chamber of Commerce.

L. J. Chaney presented bills for balance due on road signs as follows: Everett's Home & Auto Supply, brushes and paint, \$5.72; two sacks and delivery of signs, \$3.50. These bills were ordered paid by the treasurer.

Motion by L. J. Chaney, seconded by Morgan Moon, that the Chamber of Commerce relinquish its sponsorship of Hico Boy Scouts to the local American Legion Post, they having indicated that they are now actively organized.

Mr. Lawrence, County Agent for Hamilton county, made a splendid talk on various matters, with special emphasis on what a town the size of Hico can and should do for the general benefit of farmers of surrounding territory and their families.

Mr. Paschal of Brownwood attended the business meeting and discussed a locker plant for Hico, indicating that a local plant would be installed with a little encouragement as soon as new equipment can be purchased.

The president then declared the meeting adjourned.

**Grand Jury Report Shows Increase In Burglary and Theft**

To the Hon. R. B. Cross, District Judge:

We the Grand Jurors for the February, 1946 term of the District Court of Hamilton County submit the following report:

We have been in session six days and have examined 46 witnesses and have returned six true bills of indictment, all of which are felonies.

We regret to report that there has been an increase in the crimes of burglary and theft since the last Grand Jury, as well as bootlegging. In some of these cases evidence has been secured sufficient to establish the guilt of the offenders. We ask the complete cooperation of the citizenship and all concerned in order that violations may be kept as low as possible and be promptly punished. Hamilton County still has a record better than most, and we should strive together to keep it that way.

We wish to call the attention of all persons in the livestock business to the law calling for all brands to be registered again after October 1, 1943, and they become the exclusive property of the owner. We recommend that everyone who has not recorded his brands or marks with the County Clerk shall do so.

We want to especially express our appreciation for our District Attorney, Bill Allen, and for the advice and counsel he has given our young people during his service as well as his assistance to the jurists on all matters. We further ask that parents give as much supervision as possible to their children and know their whereabouts so as to avoid wrong influences.

We wish to thank your Honor for your charge to this jury, our District and County Attorneys and all of our officials and citizens who have cooperated with us in our labors. We have inspected the jail and find it well kept and in good condition.

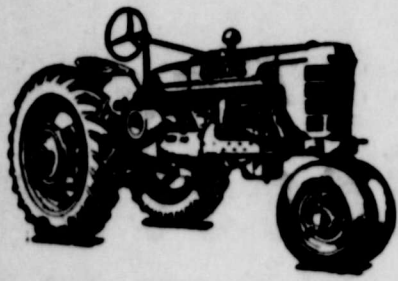

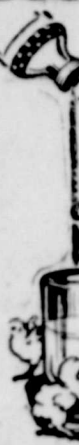

**HE CHEATED HIMSELF:**

A story comes to the desk of  
"This and That" that is much too  
good to pass up.

A rich man in a certain town  
wanted to help a poor carpenter

carpenter to build a house on a  
hillside and when the work was  
begun the rich man went away on  
a long journey.

The carpenter said to himself,  
"My boss is away, so I can build  
the house hurriedly and I can use  
the cheapest of materials and  
thereby make more money on the  
deal. It will be a weak house that  
I build, but no one will ever  
know."

So the carpenter built a ram-  
shackle, weak house for the rich  
man. When the man returned, the  
carpenter said, "Here is your  
house built as you wished it to  
be." "Thank you," said the rich  
man. "Here is the deed and the  
key. I am giving the house to you  
and your family." And the carpen-

cheated the rich man, but himself.

How true it is that the cheater  
gets cheated. It is a known fact  
that each of us must live in the  
house we build and with our own  
conscience.

We may be fearful of the phan-  
tom of others; we may be some-  
times frightened at these silly

nor shade. We may grow slack in  
our service but the cheater knows,  
and in knowing, he loses his self-  
respect, and when that is all lost  
all his worth to himself and to all  
others is lost.

**VICTORY CLOTHING DRIVE:**

If you gave old clothes, or even  
one ragged pair of socks, to the  
recent Victory clothing collection,  
you helped wonderfully. Devastation  
and want in the lands of  
Europe, the Philippines and  
throughout the Far East are on so  
vast a scale as to be almost be-  
yond our comprehension. Millions  
and millions there are who are in-  
adequately clad for winter weath-  
er, for health and self-respect. It  
is said that in China alone 200-  
000,000 people need clothing.

Among these threadbare mil-  
lions there are people of every age  
and from every walk of life—new-  
born babies, school children, aged  
farm couples, the village choir  
master, the women who went out  
and did charity work until their  
clothes wore out, office workers,  
teachers, doctors, sick and fear-  
haunted prisoners of war, the al-  
most hopeless wrecks from slave  
labor camps and even high rating  
city officials. Most of them live,  
work, and sleep in unheated  
rooms, for fuel too is very scarce.

In the bomb-ruined lands, peace  
alone could not bring an end to  
the war-created shortages in raw  
materials, yard goods, clothing,  
shoes, and bedding. The shipments  
of clothing that Americans do-  
nated last spring were not nearly  
enough to go around. These people  
did not ask us to give them Utopia  
—but only serviceable things like  
that old sweater that has hung for  
so long behind the door, or that  
pair of shoes in the attic or the  
old pair of gloves that you threw  
away when the yard work was  
finished last fall.

When we sent clothing to the  
last collection, we befriended  
more boys, girls, men and women  
than we did in the spring when  
over 25,000,000 were made more  
comfortable by contributions from  
American shores.

We mentally manufacture most  
of our luck—good or bad.

**Rodent Control  
Urged to Prevent  
Typhus Fever**

Austin, Texas, Feb. 25. Inas-  
much as typhus fever is, even this  
early in the year, showing an in-  
creased incidence over the State,  
Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Of-  
ficer, today issued an urgent ap-  
peal to every Texan to cooperate  
in rodent control measures.

"The conquest of typhus fever  
in Texas is far from complete,"  
Dr. Cox declared. "There is still  
entirely too much of this disabling  
disease.

"Concentrated effort and close  
cooperation from every citizen of  
Texas is urgently needed if typhus  
fever is to be brought definitely  
under control," Dr. Cox continued,  
"and this certainly must be done  
if our public health in Texas is to  
be protected."

Inasmuch as typhus is spread  
by the flea which feeds on typhus  
infected rats, control measures,  
according to Dr. Cox, depend on  
rat extermination through means  
of starving them out and building  
out rats as well as trapping and  
poisoning them. He stated that re-  
gardless of what a fine garbage  
collection and disposal system a  
community maintains, it is prac-  
tically worthless in rodent control  
unless garbage is put into (and  
not beside) a garbage pail and the  
pail kept covered at all times.

Rat-proofing of all homes and  
business houses should be under-  
taken as quickly as possible and  
the local health departments are  
usually able to assist in overcom-  
ing the obstacle of obtaining mat-  
erials and labor. They can also  
assist in trapping and poisoning  
campaigns and will gladly do so  
upon request.

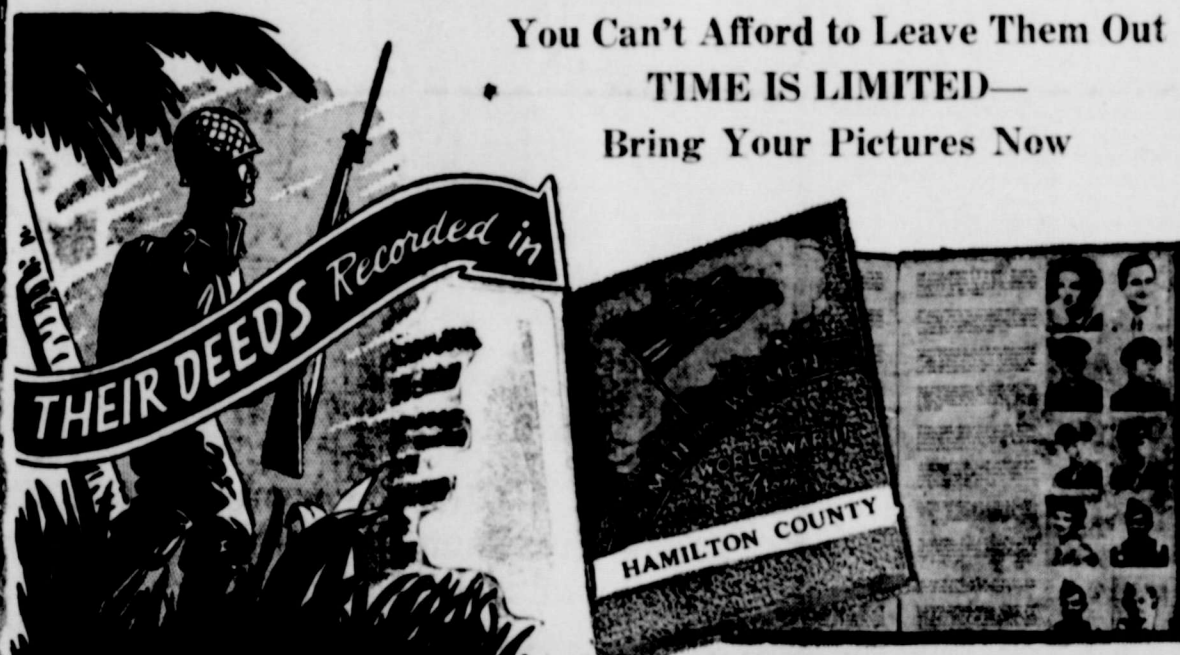

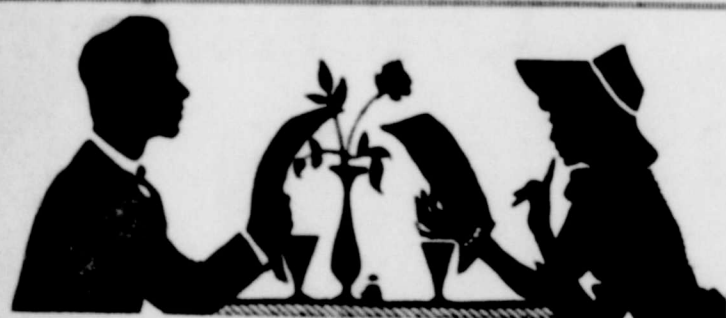

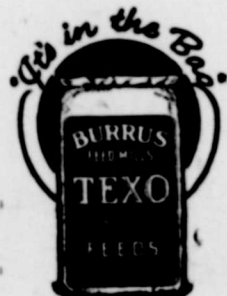

**Pictorial History  
Of 36th Division  
Available Soon**

Austin, Feb. 25.—Texans soon will be able to have a pictorial history of the contribution made by their famous 36th Division to the winning of World War II.

Award of a contract for publication of the book to Newsfoto Publishing Company of San Angelo was made here recently by the board of directors of the 36th Division Association, H. Miller Ainsworth of Luling, president of the association, said.

Publication date is scheduled in June.

The book will depict the Fighting 36th's activities in from its entrance into the war to its march into Germany where it captured, among others, such Nazi big-shots as Hermann Goering, Kesselring, and Von Rundstedt.

It was the 36th Division which became the first American outfit to pierce Hitler's fortress of Europe and stick in the battle of Salerno, one of the bloodiest of the war.

Profits from the sale of the book, if any, will go to the 36th Division Association and to the erection of a suitable memorial at Red Beach near Salerno, Italy, where the Division hit the beaches and forced back the waiting Germans to establish a foothold on Europe and the beginning of a long trail of fighting that led it to north of Rome, through Southern France and on into Germany.

The book, which will be compiled largely of actual pictures of the Division in combat, will sell to any veteran of the Division or his family for \$3.29 and to the general public for \$5.00. Orders for the book may be sent to Col. Ainsworth at Box 2174, Capitol Station, Austin, or to Box 669 at Luling, Texas.

In addition to prospective profits from the sale of the book, contributions to the memorial fund also are continuing to come in. Col. Ainsworth said. Texans who wish to contribute to the erection of the Salerno Memorial to the Lone Star State's fighting sons may also send their contributions to the above addresses.

**Social Security  
Cards Lost by Vets  
Should Be Replaced**

During the war many men who entered the armed forces lost their social security account cards. Now many of them have been discharged, and they find it necessary to secure duplicates.

Many of them apparently think it necessary to secure the duplicate from the office which issued the original card. Quite a few have been telegraphing Social Security Board offices from various parts of the United States, according to Gordon James, manager of the Waco office. However, any field office of the Board will be glad to accept an application for a duplicate and thereby save the applicant time and expense in wiring back to the office where the original was issued. The office receiving the duplicate need not be in the same state, either.

By applying to the nearest office of the Board, the applicant will save from five to ten days, since it will take the original office just as long to obtain a duplicate card from the central office records.
